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



Mants International College Fraternities



NTERNATIONAL college fraternities as the means of spreading the gospel of brotherhood to bring order out of present world chaos and make right might by the force of unity of opinion, are suggested by Irving Bacheller, author and lecturer, in a recent number of the Journal of the Academy of Political and Social Science.

"It is the young who learn the seeds of understanding" he writes "and the common spirit must be sown in the minds of the young if it is to bear fruit. The heart of youth the world over is naturally open to generous impulse and friendly sentiment.

"Our college fraternities should lead the way. They have helped to bring the young manhood of our far-reaching Republic into brotherly accord. These growing and enlightened circles of friendship have established sympathetic relations between the sons of the North and the South, the East and the West, and given them a common devotion to principles that make for good citizenship.

"Now is their opportunity to enlarge their circles and set the rhythm of a new march toward the goal of a mutual understanding between nations. Let our strongest fraternities amend their charters and their constitutions if need be, so as to extend their vision across the shortened spaces of a new world.

"If their spirit is unequal to this task, another and a greater fraternity should be started, with chapters in the leading universities of America and Europe, bound by a common oath to the broad principles that make for human understanding."

Who could estimate the moral value of such a Panhellenic bond embracing the best young blood of the world, holding sessions on both sides of the sea and

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making plans that look to the good of all, Mr. Bacheller asks.

"Who could measure the effect of our delegates going into friendly council with their brothers in Europe eating with them, playing with them, conferring with them and finally, let us hope, agreeing with them as to the things which would widen the growing arch of their spirit "

Such a meeting, Mr. Bacheller believes, would be the first Parliament of Man.

"In it, I think," he continues "the blue bird of the nations would come to life. Slowly indeed, but surely, it would create the needed background for international peace and stop the confusion on the Tower of Babel.

"Not to be lightly thought of would be the habit, formed therein, of using the best word the tongue of man has spoken— the word 'brother'. One cannot call a man his brother without seeking to justify the word with conduct. It is a compelling word and I would use its magic for the healing of many ills."

Abbreviating Ideals



OMPARISONS may be odious, but there is nothing more offensive than abbreviations. To abbreviate the name of objects or places denotes a temperament that is sluggish or careless or disrespectful. And yet many fraternity men speak of their society by its initials or by

shortening the name to some harsh, meaningless monosyllable.

This habit of lopping off the name is said to be an American trait born out of conditions of life that demand precipitate action and in which speed is classed as among the greatest of virtues. The fact remains that we go to the Y, attend the U, and are members of the T. P. A., A. A. A., the S. C. V., A. P. I., I. O. O. F., A. O. H., A. P. V. A., A. A. E., S. P. C. A., get news over the A. P. and U. services, deal with chain stores with letter names, and even eat prepared foods known by catch-letters.

Perhaps it is easier to say "Y" than "Young Men's Christian Association," but to say "Pi K," "Peake," "Pika," or "Pi Kap," does not save much time as compared with saying "Pi Kappa Alpha." Should there be any time lost in giving the full name of the fraternity it is recompensed in the dignity and respect it will add to the organization.

To sum up all that Pi Pappa Alpha stands for into Pi K A ignores the high standards, noble traditions, and progressive policies of the fraternity and places it on the same footing with any business club or institution in which membership is practically unlimited and for which a name means little or nothing other than to differentiate it from similar organizations.

Pi Kappa Alpha is too big to be diminished to Pi K A or any similarly lettered-phrase. The habit should be

discouraged. It is only through training from the beginning that any such shortened term for a fraternity can be eliminated, and if every chapter of every fraternity will frown upon the use of English letters for a Greek letter secret society, a greater respect for the meaning behind the Greek letters would be the result. If every Greek letter man and woman will call his fraternity or sorority by its Greek letters it will not be long before those outside will do likewise.

Anderwood Dpens Texas Campaign==:Appeals to South

N OCONA, Texas, October 24.—Senator Oscar W .Underwood, of Alabama, formally opened his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination here this afternoon.

"I am going to give the south a chance to select a southern man to carry the banner of democracy. The south must assert itself and I believe if the south asks, the great democratic north will recognize the right for you to carry the banner yourself.

From the platform of his train here he said:

"I have come to ask something of you; I have led the democratic party in both houses of congress for years. I am a southern man, bred and born. We are approaching the time when the democratic party must name the man to carry its banner in the next election. It has been eighty years since the south carried the banner of democracy. It has been eighty years since the south elected a president of the United States.

"If you don't think I am the man to carry this banner send your delegation to the convention pledged for another southern man, but let him be a southern man."

"Certainly! Didn't you ever notice his frat pin?"

Quite a common question with a common answer, and yet, the simplicity of the conversation shows and illustrates our greatest weakness.

Because you are a fraternity man it is your duty to serve your fraternity, your chapter, and your brothers. The brother that is made by the fraternity jeweler is the man that we do not want.

Frequently our official jewelers develop a man who claims to be the "big show." We find this man wearing his regular fraternity pin loaded with the largest and most flashing jewels in existence; a large, conspicuous, clumsy fraternity ring; a beautiful dangling watchcharm bearing his fraternity crest and up in the lapel of his coat we see a recognition pin. When he offers us a cigarette he will ask us what we think of the crest on his cigarette case; when he smokes a pipe you can easily distinguish his fraternity crest on the bowl of it: when he fills the same pipe with tobacco he will take out a nice leather tobacco pouch and the fraternity crest will be on that; when he writes a letter he will use a fountain pen and stationery which bear his fraternity crest, and, if you read into his will, you will probably find a clause stating "that the crest of my fraternity be inscribed on my coffin."

A man of this type appears to be a real fraternity man on the surface but seldom, if ever, have I found a man in this class whom I cared to call "brother." He is proud of his fraternity-a million times more proud of himself.

A brother of his wears only his pin, probably not that

at times, and yet he is the most active man on the campus and has done the most for his fraternity. Everybody knows that he is a member of a fraternity—he is not forced to advertise the fact by dazzling and flashing his jewelery in everybody's eyes. And his brothers are proud of him and like him because he is an ideal fraternity man—and a real brother.

Every chapter possesses brothers of the two distinct types—one a parasite, the other a blessing. The former sucks his existence and good time out of his brothers, while the latter lives and enjoys himself with his brothers —the one thinks only of self, the other of his brothers and fraternity.

Too often we enter the bonds of brotherhood with our old pomp and individualism unchanged—we do not realize the dreams and ideals of the fraternity.

It appears in fraternity life, as well as in political life, that those that show and boast the most always have the least to boast about. It seems that simplicity mothers and guides the great and that the person that does something is never forced to tell people about it himself—he gets his advertising free of charge and effort.

If we are going to be real fraternity men, let's get away from the bravado and show part of it and take up the working end. If we can't be a real brother to every man in the chapter, something is the matter.

The fratter and the club man are flashy fixtures representing flashy organizations—the fraternity man is a tool which should prove its worth to the brothers held together in the bonds of union, by serving and fighting for the fraternity.

Yet a silent grip is the only way To tell how glad we've been.


Sometimes our bodies are far apart Our souls are touching still,

OW that the usual rushing activities are drawing to a close at most colleges thruout the country and pledge pins are resting firmly in the coat lapels of the picked men, many questions should be decided at once as to how these freshmen

should be drilled to make real Pi Kaps. The freshman as a pledge owes certain duties towards the fraternity and certainly the fraternity owes the freshman just as much which must be kept in mind thruout the year, and its importance justifies and demands constant repetition and emphasis in the chapter activities.

One does not have to dig very deeply into his mind to clearly remember his first days at school. Nervous? Lonesome? Afraid? Green? Yes, and much more too. So don't be discouraged with the prep who does things a little strangely at first. Maybe he doesn't use "hair grease", hold his knife and fork correctly or wear bell bottoms, but a kindly word of suggestion now and then will help a lot.

It is this new way of doing things that holds back a lot of pent up energy and may keep a good man from activities for the first or even the second year but a quiet tip and little push from one who knows how things are being done will give the pledge an early start and make success possible. It takes schooling and hard drilling to make the varsity team, to become editor of the college paper or be a leader in any line, and the sooner the schooling is started, just that much sooner will the bigger things come. Too many new students think that college is a place to pass a required number of hours of work and do not realize the importance of other activities, such is the duty of his chapter—to make such things definite and possible.

Che Significance of the Grip

Are fraternities exercising sufficient care in the selection of new members?

To present the question seems to require some temerity. Yet this is a live topic in the Greek-letter world and one that is receiving considerable attention, from various viewpoints, in the fraternity press. It is not the intention or the province of this article to consider the question with the eyes of Pi Kappa Alpha alone. Rather, it is intended to summarize the idea of writers in the publications of numerous organizations.

One cannot help but gather the idea from this miscellany of thoughts that the fraternities are not being critical enough in their self-perpetuation. Immediately the counter-suggestion occurs: We cannot afford to go to far in exercising caution in pledging; if we do we will be charged with snobbishness, and we will lose the gains of recent years in democratizing fraternities.

Indeed, there seems to be the problem. The fraternity world must find some "open sesame" to a store of good judgment to be pro-rated among those on recruiting duty. In other words, members of active chapters, and especially the upper classmen, must go slower, think harder in bidding freshmen and must cultivate ability to read character. In that cultivation and in the exercise of that ability there is, perhaps, a field for the older and more worldly wise men of the alumni.

Character judgment; by that is meant the faculty for telling if a freshman is a fellow who will turn out to be the same sort of man as his prospective brothers, whether he has underlying kindred interests, staunch principles, an agreeable disposition, the lasting qualities of a friend. Too often, commentators in the Greek press seem to imply, a chapter is satisfied with a man proposed for

pledging if he was a good football man at high school when it happens the chapter just then has a deep interest in the game of pigskin, or something of the sort.

In short, considering a freshman, consider whether he has qualities of lasting brotherhood, whether he will be, as one great fraternity aptly expresses a basic wish of all our organizations, "Once a Beta, always a Beta."

Parents can help in this fraternity problem. Howard Bement of the Hill School, in an address before the Interfraternity Conference, made this suggestion: "Educate the parents in matters germane to the fraternity and permit the parents to educate the fraternities in matters germane to the guidance of youth," meaning that parents can help if given a full knowledge of the aims and ideals of our societies. Speaking of the power of fraternity men over the newcomers in chapters, he said:

"Was there ever an influence greater? The most plastic material in all God's world comes fresh to the fraternity's hand to be molded as the fraternity will. The average freshman neophyte is the most impressionable creature of the animal kingdom. He is truly simian, apelike, in his terrible eagerness to conform, to be like the norm, to follow his elders, 'to belong' in every sense of the word. No Philistine ever protested himself before Dagon more adjectly than the freshman, in spirit, bows down to the admired upperclassman."

A danger, he pointed out, was in the feeding of "studious freshman into the fraternity hopper, to be ground out at the end of the course intellectually flabby—determined to do as little work as will just satisfy the requirements and bound to have as much fun as will be permitted."

He advocated the initiation of more studious men, as the type which brings to social intercourse its greatest asset. "The modern American collegian," he said, "is the worst converser in the world on subjects of serious import. He can pour out a Niagara of half-baked opinion on college athletes and college politics, but he is mute when really stimulating discussion begins."

He made a comparison between American collegians and Oxonians as to conversational ability, to the distinct disadvantage of the home product. Another danger of our fraternity life, he suggested, was a tendency here and there for houses to ape metropolitan clubs in their appointments and "atmosphere." A charge he left was:

"It becomes the first duty of the fraternities to undertake some earnest soul-searching; to inquire into their real reason for being; to discover anew their real mission as appanages of the college, and to ask in humble spirit how well or how ill they are fulfilling their mission. The particular college fraternity that meets most promptly and most fully this self-inquisition will most safely weather the present storm of reconstruction.* * * * College men are the pick of the nation; fraternity men are the pick of the colleges."

Two chapter letters in two fraternity magazines of late attracted attention. The first is a good example of how a chapter letter ought to be written; indeed, it is an unusually good example, for so very, very many communications of this sort in publications of all the fraternities consist of such dreary drivel. This one tells news in plain language without trimmings of bunk and gush. It represented the Dartmouth College chapter of Phi Kappa Psi in *The Shield*. Read it.

"The chapter takes pleasure in announcing two new pledges taken into the bonds April 25th, Richard Warren Lamb, Hisndale, Ill., and Reginald Whittle Hanson, Quincy, Mass., both members of the freshman class.

"The chapter plans to hold a feed at Moose Cabin May 29th. Each year the boys get together for a final big time, usually indulging in one of Prof. Grigg's famous meals at one of the Outing Club cabins.

"Bob Stone has been at the house for over a week, talking over the plans for an addition which will be made to the chapter house. The new section when completed will increase the size of the house twofold, and will have a new living room almost 30 by 40 feet. Four study rooms will be added, and further accommodations for sleeping quarters

will be made. The colonial design of the main section will be maintained in the new part. If plans go through and financial matters are settled, work will begin in June with the idea of completing the new part by September.

"The annual freshman-sophomore picture fight was staged the week-end of May 5th, and for the first time in three years the freshmen succeeded in taking their picture almost unmolested. Wallace and Hurd, secretary and treasurer of the first-year men, and Carpenter and Leavitt, president and treasurer of the sophomore class, took an active part in the organization of the struggle.

Sturtevant is a member of the 1924 prom committee, whose work terminates with the end of spring affair May 12th, Gallup has been appointed managing editor of the **Bema**, and Spaulding chosen sporting editor of the **Dartmouth**. Borden and Kenney have been elected to Cabin and Trail from the freshman Outing Club competition.

"The College administration has announced a raise in the tuition fee from \$250 to \$300, effective in 1924. Scholarships will, however, be raised to offset the change in the entrance fee. Increased costs of upkeep and running expenses are given as the reason for the tuition increase.

are given as the reason for the tuition increase. "Although initiating for Oregon, Alpha, the Chapter takes pleasure in bringing into the secrets of the Fraternity Frank Roy Rutter, professor of foreign commerce in Tuck School.

"Commencement Day comes June 19th. This will be a good opportunity for the alumni to see the plans for the annex to the house.
