

Chaplain's Corner

September, 1956

Dear Brothers,

September points up the beginning of college life all over our land. The importance of a good beginning to every one of our Pi Kappa Alpha Chapters is obvious. The thoughts of the upper classmen will be directed toward pledging a good class of men to take the place of the seniors who have graduated. The writer remembers the old pledge pin, a little smaller than a dime, and of the same shape, garnet in color, with a crossed dagger and key superimposed thereon.

What will be the distinguishing qualities you will be looking for in your pledges? Their names will be sifted out and juggled with, and there will be the various pressures from the alumni and friends before the great day when the decision has to be made. I suggest three tests of the pledge:


First of all, a man of self respect, not to be confused with vanity or conceit, and which, of course, has manhood for its basis. An old writer described such a person as one who is "blameless, vigilant, sober, and of good behavior," one who has a sense of humor and a nice regard for truth and sincerity, and a person who has a sense of good taste in all things.

Second, a man of courtesy – possibly the finest of the human graces, which issues in good manners. A test of this valuable trait is found in every relationship of life toward those who may be our superiors, inferiors, or equals. It is the embodiment of ancient chivalry in modern dress, and shows itself again and again in the generous and magnanimous deed.

Third, another test is the spirit of appreciation. One does not want to leave out of account his debt and obligation to others. A sense of gratitude makes a person modest and humble. Thomas Hughes, who was the author of Tom Brown at Oxford, sets forth the pattern of the good life in a person's character and walk and conversation. He puts it this way: "Loyalty to truth and right; merciless to sham and pretense; charitable toward the erring, brave in defending the friendless, forgiving of injury, pure in word and deed." In saying this, Thomas Hughes remembers an ancient saying, "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report, if there be any virtue, if there be any praise, think on these things," for these are the things that make for manhood.

Alpha-Gamma Chapter at Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, La., dedicated this splendid modern house on campus fraternity row this spring. A. R. Johnson, Baton Rouge, is president of the house corporation. Ed Maurer, BM, Austin, Texas, was the architect.

• "It was cloudy and wet at Louisiana State University on March 11, 1956, but the rain could not depress the great tide of enthusiasm and pride that engulfed the new Pi Kappa Alpha House that day." This account was given of the open house ceremony that celebrated the completion of the new ultra-modern Pi Kappa Alpha House on the LSU campus, which is located in Baton Rouge.

Among the features that make this house outstanding are the partitioned bedrooms, which enable one member to study on one side, while another may sleep undisturbed on the other, the large combination dining room and living room and the modern, efficient kitchen. This is one of three houses over the nation in the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity that have the same design and plan.

Besides being cleverly designed on the inside, this house has a modern and beautiful exterior. It was the result of many hours of planning, much hard work and considerable financial sacrifice on the part of many.

At the dedication ceremony a plaque was unveiled that bore this inscription: "Dedicated to the alumni and student members whose lovalty and service have made this house a reality, and with special recognition to the dynamic leadership of Brother A. R. Johnson."

Among those to witness the climax of a decade of hopes on this day were the Pi Kappa Alpha National President, John F. E. Hippel: Chapter Service Secretary Earl Watkins and his wife of Memphis, Tennessee; Dr. John Beard, president of the Memphis Alumni Association; and Robert T. Means, district president of the New England area and an alumnus of Alpha-Gamma Chapter.

The total cost of this building was more than \$60,000. It would have cost more than that if it were not for the help received from Mr. Edward Maurer of Austin, Texas, a brother from another chapter. Mr. Maurer played an important role in the planning and designing of the house. He is a member of the American Institute of Architects, and is with the firm of Lundgren and Maurer of Austin, Texas. Mr. Maurer made his services available at a very minimum charge.

The structure is located in LSU's fraternity row, just a stone's throw from the quiet University Lake. Its combined brick stucco, wood and glass, set off in striking tan, brown and white are in keeping with the outdoor living so common in Louisiana's near-tropical climate. It is the new home for about 25 Pikes.

Many have contributed to the work of building this house of the Alpha-Gamma Chapter. The Alumni Building Committee consisted of A. R. Johnson, Sr., president; James (Yank) R. Fuller, vice president; Otis C. Edwards, Jr., secretary; H. H. Huckabay, treasurer; H. Lyle Barnett, budget officer; George Vordenbauman and William B. Bates, executive advisors.

A. R. Johnson, president of the local alumni, is now the president of the American Bank and Trust Company in Baton Rouge. Johnson graduated from LSU in 1920, and in the following year he received a master's degree from Harvard University in business administration. He has held at least two important posts in the government of the State of Louisiana. He was at one time the State Banking Examiner, and from 1936 to 1940 he held the post of State Welfare Commissioner. Before becoming the president of the American Bank and Trust Com-

pany, he was the vice president of the City National Bank in the same city.

Besides his many duties in the responsible positions he has held in the past, Johnson has continued active and enthusiastic in the Alumni Association of Pi Kappa Alpha. He served as National Secretary from 1953-54. Pi Kappa Alpha is deeply grateful for the leadership he has given in making possible the completion of this home for the Alpha-Gamma Chapter.

James R. Fuller, the local alumni vice president, has given much time and effort toward the completion of this project. Brother Fuller received a B.A. degree from LSU in 1924 and an LL.B degree in 1926. He is now with Porter. Taylor, Brooks and Fuller law firm in Baton Rouge and serves the University as its legal aide.

Otis C. Edwards, committee secretary, entered LSU in 1929, and though he did not complete all his studies at this university, he has been active in the Fraternity for many years. Brother Edwards has been Assistant Welfare Commissioner in the Louisiana State Government for many years and his civic leadership marks the good example that so many alumni of Pi Kappa Alpha have been.

H. H. Huckabay, treasurer of the local alumni, graduated from LSU in 1922. He has held three important government positions. He was a member of the Louisiana State Legislature from Caddo Parish from 1940 to 1942; from 1942 to 1944 he held the position of Louisiana State Tax Commissioner; and from 1944 to 1948 he was State Director of Public Safety. Mr. Huckabay is now the business manager of the Baton Rouge General Hospital.

H. Lyell Barnett, budget officer, is the owner of the Kenberry Press in Baton Rouge. He entered LSU in 1923 and though he did not complete his education at LSU he has retained his interest in the local chapter.

George Vordenbauman, executive advisor, graduated from LSU in 1938. He is now employed by the Esso Standard Oil Company in Baton Rouge.

William B. Bates, another executive advisor, received his B.A. degree from LSU in 1938. He now is part owner of Bates and Thigpen Clothiers in Baton Rouge.

Other men have been active among the alumni of Pi Kappa Alpha who were not on the building committee. In their maturity, many alumni of Pi Kappa Alpha have attained great heights as coaches, statesmen, bankers and attorneys. Of interest is Mike Chambers, one of LSU's former coaches. Mike the Tiger, mascot of LSU, was named after him. J. T. Owen, former LSU boxing coach, is an alumnus of the Alpha-Gamma Chapter at LSU. Charles W. Gray, who is now secretary of the Delta Tank Manufacturing Company and residing in Illinois, is an alumnus of this chapter also.

Alpha-Gamma Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha was founded at LSU on June 4, 1903. Among its charter members were G. B. Golson of St. Francisville; W. W. Hutchinson, Maudeville; A. W. Buckner, Newelton; and P. H. Griffith, J. K. Fahey, and G. P. Garland, all of Opelousas.

Tom Wade, Alpha-Gamma's delegate to the 1909 National Convention, was responsible for casting the decisive vote to place Pi Kappa Alpha on a national basis. Prior to that time, the organization had been strictly Southern. When the battle for Northern expansion was deadlocked, Brother Wade changed his vote, effecting a great forward step in the history of the Fraternity.

John R. Perez of Alpha-Gamma Chapter served as National President of Pi Kappa Alpha for 16 years, which is longer than any before him or after him. A portion of the lounge area of the new Alpha-Gamma Chapter House

◆ In June of 1930, a gringo named William Spratling strayed into the hilltop mining town of Taxco in the rocky state of Guerrero.

This man is the same William Spratling who joined Upsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha at Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Auburn, Alabama. He quickly earned a place and a name for himself in the field of architecture, education, and journalism. While teaching architecture at Tulane University, he accepted an assignment to do a story on Mexico for one of the national press associations. The charm and potentialities of Mexico quickly converted him from a tourist to a resident, and his place of abode became Taxco.

This famous member of Pi Kappa Alpha will be the featured speaker at the 1956 National Convention luncheon at Hotel Del Prado, Monday, September 3. Following the luncheon those in attendance will have the privilege of viewing a sound color movie produced by Warner Brothers and portraying the contribution made by Brother Spratling to the silver industry in Taxco and throughout Mexico.

He is an artist, artisan, philosopher and promoter who also goes through the motions of being a businessman, and not too badly. His name is so closely identified with the making of Taxco's modern history that when he walks around the plaza it is a little as if he were a monument, which by some peculiar happenstance, possible only in a place that looks as much like storyland as this town does, is out for a promenade.

His house, at Kilometer 177, near Taxco on the Acapulco Highway, is an old ranch, where he also has his workshops and a showroom of choice pieces. It is a place rather like a piece of jungle, with old stones—some of them sculptures of great beauty—thrust among the vegetation. In the house too, one has the sense of a lot of things all growing over William Spratling, Upsilon, Taxco's creative genius.


and around each other; even the books look like that. There are noises wherever one is, whether in or out of the housethe kind of soft, whispering, pat-pat noises that a jungle makes; and animals -birds, a monkey, slip in and out of sight.

The accumulation of objects in this house points very clearly to Spratling's interest in textures, form, and glowing color, and speak of a search, over many years, back to older and older forms of art, as if looking for the primeval beginnings and components of beauty; rejecting imitations and influences, simplifying and purifying his own designs guided by his own senses only, and individual feeling. This search, and constant busyness about improving his work, is of course the point of any creative life. It requires a certain peace, freedom from pressures, and thrives on appreciation, all of which Taxco gave to Bill.

He says he has no idea how it happened that because of his activities, a sleepy picture-town became a place where one hears the chinkety-chink of silversmiths' hammers from almost every doorway. He didn't aim at this, or organize anything for the purpose. "It was just an experiment that stuck," he says. We think it's even simpler. Among a people so sensitive and gifted in the arts as Mexicans are, what Bill did—with a canny North American eye to merchandising was set the example. From which result-

ed a host of success stories that in some cases really deserve the word "fabulous." As for instance, the Castillo brothers, who as boys were among Spratling's first apprentices. Today the family owns a luxury shop in Mexico City as well as one in Taxco, plus a hotel, and a couple of amethyst mines; and they're all young yet.

Once upon a time Taxco had been a place of grandeur, a monument to silver built on one of the country's most fabulously wealthy silver veins. Even before silver was discovered in its steep surrounding mountains, the town had been important: first in the days of the Aztecs, as a stopover for runners carrying baskets of fresh fish from Acapulco to Tenochtitlan; and then under the Spanish conquistadores, as a stopping place on the long inland route from Acapulco to Veracruz. Silks and spices from the Indies passed through Taxco on their way to Spain, in a laborious shortcut that avoided the long sail around the Horn.

The same Spanish conquerors discovered the first silver vein in Taxco, but it was of short duration. Then in 1717, the mule of Don Jose de la Borda stuck a leg into a hole that turned out to be the immensely wealthy silver vein of San Ignacio.

Don Jose was an arrogant, stern-featured Spaniard of French descent, who had come to Mexico as a child with his hopeful immigrant family. Being industrious, tenacious—and lucky—he accumulated an enormous fortune; spent it all, and hit the jackpot the second time, to die a very rich man. Unlike most magnates of his time, he returned to Taxco much of the wealth he had dug from its hills.

Following his famous motto: "God gives to Borda, Borda gives to God," he built an extensive water system for the town, put up houses for the poor, and most impressively, repaired and enlarged the richly ornate church of Santa Prisca. He furnished the church with so many works of art from his silver and goldsmith shops, that at one time it was equal in splendor to the great Cathedral in Mexico City and was one of the most beautiful churches in the world.

When the lavish era of Don Jose ended, Taxco became an empty town. Its silverworkers occasionally filled church commissions, but their art was dying out. Some of the old remembered, but most of the young took up new trades or left for the larger cities. The town slept; its twin carved church towers were the only reminders of its one-time splendor.

Taxco was almost a ghost town when Spratling arrived in 1930. He settled there, like many Americans who moved to Mexico in those years, because it was beautiful and cheap.

But Spratling looked around and saw a wealth of artistry in weaving, in pottery, stonecutting and metalworking. He found that silver was cheap-15 pesos a kilogram-and plentiful. Learning of the town's long tradition as a silverworking center, Spratling hunted out the few remaining artisans from their homes. In June 1931 (last year the town celebrated in advance the Silver Anniversary of this date) he opened the doors of a small silver workshop.

In the years that have passed since then, Taxco has mushroomed into a sort of Silver Hill—or better, Gypsy Hill—a mountain riddled with caves and coves and shop after shop of silversmiths. The pat-pat tortilla rhythm that marks time all over Mexico takes second place to the ring of craftsmen's hammers that set the pace in Taxco.

Some of these craftsmen, mostly former apprentices to Spratling, now rank as first rate designers in their own right. To them, Spratling is *El Maestro*, and their pieces are tributes to his teaching, and to his respect for "the noblest of metals." Spratling's hand is in many of the other arts that now mark this town as a crafts center: tin working has been revived; a furniture industry, also fathered by Spratling, has sprung up. Other artists specialize in dress design, some of the country's finest. In June each year, Taxco celebrates its economic and artistic rebirth with a Silver Fair, a riotous week of dances, parades, towers of fireworks and papier mache firecracker bulls, fashion shows, parties and sports events. Highlighting the fair is the annual Silver Contest, now a national event open to silver designers throughout the country. A distinguished list of judges, usually important painters, art critics, and eminent silversmiths, select outstanding pieces of hollowware and jewelry.

Spratling comes into town from his ranch at Taxco-el-Viejo and, though the tourists who throng plazas and hotels during the Silver Fair rarely notice this gaunt man with silver-colored hair, even the toddlers of Taxco stand back with respect and a greeting as he makes his way alone along the streets.

Richmond Members Celebrate Progress

♦ Many notable achievements have been made by Omicron in the year 1955-56—a lodge, a high position among fraternities on campus, and a working active chapter. No achievement has been as great as that made by our alumni and their interest in us.

On Saturday, April 7, we held our ground breaking ceremony. Alumni present included Moses D. Nunnally, Clint Shephard, Temple Broaddus, Guy Borkey, Harold Farley, and Walford Gregory. The lodge is scheduled for completion at the beginning of the fall term.

Prior to September of 1955, alumni relations were handled almost exclusively by one man, T. Carter Coates. Brother Coates was twice elected SMC and had worked hard on the concept of a new lodge. Stirling Dickinson – Versatile Director of Instituto Allende

• When Stirling Dickinson slides home in a rural Mexican baseball game, he raises enough dust to obscure the incongruities.

Dickinson is a bony, six-foot Princetonian who is so reticent that few of the 1,000 American students who confer with him each year in a school in the Mexican mountains know much about him.

One of the achievements they know least about is his key role: guiding a highminded but financially-doubtful shoelace venture through its infancy 18 years ago and building it into what is now a booming private cultural enterprise with international prestige.

The private enterprise is Instituto Allende school of fine arts in San Miguel de Allende, where Pi Kappa Alphas will be attending Leadership School next fall. As Instituto director, Dickinson will be on hand to help fraternity men get settled, and answer their questions about Mexico. But one thing they would not be likely to learn is why the seeminglycontradictory, bespectacled, scholarly director wound up in a Mexican village instead of in a Chicago advertising agency.

Dickinson, 46, is the son of Chicago corporation lawyer and ad agency head Francis R. Dickinson of 1500 Lakeshore Drive. As a young man, Dickinson absorbed art history at Princeton, graduated cum laude, spent three more years on art at Chicago Art Institute, polished off his studies with a year at Fontainbleau. Then he collected an adventurous former Princeton classmate, writer Heath Bowman. The two boarded a dilapidated but personable jalopy and headed for Mexico.

The pair wandered that country for six months. It wasn't until their return to the States that it occurred to them to write a book about their travels. Mexican Odyssey was finished in two months, published by Christmas, sold out in a week and ran into four editions. A tour of South America was followed with equal success by Westward From Rio. But the third year, the writers kicked over the travel book traces and decided to do a historical novel.

They wrote to Jose Mojica, worldrenowned singer and Mexican movie producer, for suggestions. Come, he told them, to San Miguel de Allende, a little town rich in history and beauty. They came.

Dickinson and Bowman were the first

Americans in town. It was all Mojica had said. Dickinson promptly bought a house for \$90 – an old tannery, unused since the Revolution. Research was finished quickly and their publisher soon put *Death Is Incidental* on the market. The collaborators went home, but one of them-the artist-returned, drawn by the rich Mexican color and the handsomeness of the mountain town.

Back in San Miguel, Dickinson met wealthy Peruvian diplomat, writer and painter Felipe Cossio del Pomar, who wanted to pass his political exile by starting a school of art to attract some Americans. The Chicagoan agreed to serve as associate director. The school opened for summer session only in 1938, in an old building behind the market place. There were eight students.

The school idea appealed to Dickinson. He was a one-man office staff, publicist, propagandist both in San Miguel and in the U. S. His work was bringing results when Pearl Harbor broke. The artist went to Washington, served in OSS, then did Naval Intelligence work in Italy. He was on the Isle of Capri when church bells signalled the end of World War II. He returned to Mexico with the first civilian jeep sold in Chicago and the first to enter Mexico.

The school was still in existence, but shortly Pomar sold it to go back to Peru. The faculty, under Dickinson, kept the school going, with Dickinson continuing as associate director.

In 1952 the school came fully under the ownership of former state governor Enrique Fernandez M., who still operates the institution with the aid of his American wife.

As for the Princetonian – while the school grew from eight to 80, from 80 to 800, he was also busy in other fields. He got some boys together, cleared the rocks

off a field a mile outside town, painted "S M A" on nine T-shirts and had a baseball team. The players have been mostly Mexicans over the years, and because of the discipline and constant practice under "Deekie," the nine have become the state's best, with a 1955 record of 50 wins, four ties, and one lost. Today, to keep his team together, Dickinson builds houses for Americanos who want to live in San Miguel. He does it free, so that his pitchers, infield, outfield and subs will have steady work as plasterers, masons, carpenters.

Orchids became a sideline 10 years ago when a few were given him. At the former tannery—now a San Miguel showplace—there are three orchid houses with choice specimens from all over Mexico. Friends who have accompanied Dickinson on rugged orchid-hunting excursions shudder at the chances he takes. The dignified director tears his trousers to shreds shinnying up a tree teetering out over the lip of a 100-foot-deep canyon because he spots an orchid half hidden in a crotch at the top. (Usually it turns out to be one he already has.)

The bookish-looking scholar tends to appear frail because of his thinness. Actually he's about as fragile as steel wire. A passionate lover of duck hunting, his Sundays fall into a set pattern from fall to early spring open season: off into the dawn in the Jeep truck for a day of clambering up and down canyons, creeping up on lakes and banging away at Mexico's big, fine-flavored ducks. Usually there are a couple of Mexico City writers, artists or educators puffing along behind; and invariably the back of the truck is loaded with beer, eight or ten pounds of steak, and half the baseball team.

There are some things Dickinson does almost furtively—but his close friends sometimes find out about it. There are daily crises in the families of San Miguel's working people; and Senor Deekeensohn quietly sends food—or medicine —or the doctor—or pays for the funeral or bails someone out of the pokey—or finds papa a job—or sends some penniless youngster to school. Asked about it by friends, he will only shrug vaguely and change the subject.

When San Miguel celebrated its 400th anniversary a few years ago, two men were named "hijo adoptivo predilecto" adopted son. One was the president of Mexico. The other was the thin Chicago artist.

But those who have seen the influence -direct and indirect-exerted on the town by the North American in 19 years, say that the best thing that happened was when Dickinson adopted San Miguel. Gov. and Mrs. Enrique Fernandez M. Hosts To Leadership School

◆ The business manager of Latin America's largest and most noted art school doesn't look like one.

More often she's mistaken for one of the students. She's a smartly-dressed, friendly, easy-going woman in her early forties whose soft drawl still hints at her Arkansas background after 24 years in Mexico.

She is Nell Fernandez Martinez, wife of the school president, Enrique Fernandez Martinez. They will be hosts to Pi Kappa Alpha's Leadership School August 30 through Sept. 2.

It was appropriate to pick Instituto Allende as the stage for the Leadership School. It is the first convention Pi Kappa Alpha has held outside the United States borders. The Instituto is also international in character — in point-ofview, faculty, and student body.

In a current show at the Instituto gallery are the works of a German, a New Jerseyite, a Filipino, a Mexican, a Chicagoan, an Alaskan and two Canadians, one of them Japanese. The faculty includes Mexicans, Europeans and Americans. The student body, while mostly American and Canadian, includes Orientals and Europeans.

Although the Fernandezes's success at operating the school makes them seem like old hands at the school and hotel business, they're not. Don Enrique, as he's invariably called by students and foculty, spent most of his life in politics. When an incompetent governor was impeached in the important Mexican State of Guanajuato in 1935, the Guanajuato congress appointed Fernandez to fill the unexpired portion of the term. After a successful three years in office, Don Enrique was returned to the governor's mansion for another four-year term. He left office in 1943.

Three years later the ex-governor married the former Nell Harris of Hot Springs, and the couple cast about for something constructive to occupy them.

In 1949 they went into partnership with Felipe C. Pomar, a Peruvian politician living in San Miguel, and the team purchased the former palace of the Count de la Canal. Their aim: to turn it into an art school which would attract students from Mexico and the United States.

The building that went on was as much virgin construction as restoration, yet the flavor of the old palace grounds was retained and landscaping joined the handsome buildings into a cohesive whole. Brilliant bougainvilla climbed the ancient stone walls again, and flamewinged songbirds darted over the acres of new grass carpet.

In Peru, a shift of parties called Dr. Pomar home again. The Fernandezes assumed full ownership of the Instituto. They have been sole operators for the past four years.

Don Enrique has been mentioned in some quarters as a presidential possibility in the coming national elections in Mexico. But so far he has indicated no desire except to continue as president of Instituto Allende.

Transamerica Executive Heads Bank of New Mexico

• New chairman of the Board of Directors of the Bank of New Mexico is Col. M. E. Zetterholm, Beta-Eta, a long time, staunch IIKA who helped organize the chapter at the University of Illinois and has gone on to become one of the university's prominent alumni.

Colonel Zetterholm has had a distinguished career as lawyer, sales manager, advertising director and soldier and banker. Although born and educated in the Middle West, he has made his home in the Southwest since World War II, following an outstanding military record.

As a law student at the University of Illinois, Colonel Zetterholm was a member of the legal fraternity, Phi Alpha Delta. It was the Illinois chapter of this professional group that petitioned and obtained a charter as Beta-Eta Chapter of IIKA.

After his admission to the bar in the State of Illinois, Brother Zetterholm practiced law for 10 years at Galesburg, Illinois, where he was attorney for the Bank of Galesburg and a group of surrounding rural banks. During the same period, he was attorney for and a director of the Knox County State, Knoxville, Ill., and the Mutual Building and Loan Association of Galesburg.

For nine years he was an assistant general sales manager of General Motors Corporation, in charge of dealer finances for the Pontiac Division, supervising all contacts with General Motors Acceptance Corporation, General Exchange Insurance Corporation, on customer financing, dealer reserves and equalization of insurance rates, including all contacts with the Motor Holding Corporation.

In 1934, at the request of General Motors interests, Brother Zetterholm organized General Screen Advertising, Inc., a national advertising organization which produced and exhibited commercial films in local movie theaters throughout the country. It was organized, with general offices in Chicago, primarily to dominate motion picture advertising for the benefit of all General Motors Corporations divisions. He was general manager, a director and secretary-treasurer of the company, whose business ran into millions of dollars per year.

Being a Major in the Army Reserve, on 8 December 1941 Zetterholm was called to active duty by the War Department, U. S. Army, in the Inspector General's office. He served a year and a half at the top level in the War Department and for three and one-half years overseas as Assistant and Deputy Inspector General and Acting Inspector General for Africa and the Mediterranean Theatre of Operations.

During his overseas service. Colonel Zetterholm handled many important assignments in contact with the crumbling

Italian Government. He was headquartered in a villa outside of Naples, from where he held command of the Army Inspector General's forces over a wide area.

Colonel Zetterholm holds a long list of personal decorations, including the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Commendation Medal of the Secretary of War with Oak Leaf Cluster, Commander of the Crown of Italy and the House of Savoy, the order of knighthood as a Cavalier of the Cross of Saint Maurice and Saint Lazarus (highest award bestowed by the Italian Government), North African Theatre of Operations and the Mediterranean Theatre of Operations Campaign Medal with three Battle Stars, the American Campaign Medal and the Army of Occupation Medal. The Italian decorations were personally confirmed by the King of Italy.

After his return to the United States in 1946, Brother Zetterholm disposed of his interests in Chicago and was elected as Vice President and Director of the Bank of Douglas, Phoenix, Arizona. He organized and built the Tucson Branch of the bank and operated it for six years, then joined the head office staff in Phoenix, Arizona, as a vice president and director.

Last year he resigned from the Bank of Douglas and became identified with the expansion program of Transamerica Corporation and participated in the acquisition of banks in New Mexico and Colorado, which culminated in acquiring five principal banks and ten branches in New Mexico and 3 banks in Colorado. On 12 January 1956, he was elected Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Bank of New Mexico.

Colonel Zetterholm has maintained his interest in fraternity affairs, visits Illinois and Beta-Eta chapter whenever possible and has been an active alumnus in Chicago and Washington, D. C. He is Roll No. 47 in the Diamond Life Chapter.

He also maintains his interest in military affairs and hold the permanent Army rank of Colonel, Infantry, U.S.A.R.

David F. Maxwell – No. 1 Lawyer, U. S. A.

♦ Pi Kappa Alpha can now boast the top lawyer in the United States. David F. Maxwell, a founder member of Beta-Pi Chapter, University of Pennsylvania, was installed as the 80th President of the American Bar Association on August 31, 1956, at its annual meeting in Dallas, Texas. As President it will be Mr. Maxwell's function to lead the Association to England to which country it will, in July of 1957, make its first pilgrimage since 1924.

A native of Philadelphia, Brother Maxwell received his B.S. in Economics from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania in 1921 where he was elected a member of Beta Gamma Sigma, the honorary scholastic fraternity. In 1924 he graduated from the University of Pennsylvania Law School after having served as an editor of the Pennsylvania Law Review.

For years he has been active in the Philadelphia Alumni Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha, and it was he who instituted the Alumni Award of Merit which has since become a fixture of that chapter's Founders' Day celebration. Brother Maxwell himself received the award in 1939.

Upon graduation from Law School, he became associated with the law firm of Edmonds, Obermayer & Rebmann of which he is now one of the senior members. One of his partners in that firm is John F. E. Hippel, National President of Pi Kappa Alpha.

His civic activities include service as President of the Kiwanis Club of Philadelphia, Vice President of the St. Andrew's Society of Philadelphia, Chairman of the Citizens Highway Safety Board, Vice President of the Germantown Cricket Club and a Past Master of his Masonic Lodge. He also served as a member of the Task Force on Legal Services and Procedure of the Hoover Commission on the Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government and is presently a member of the Board of Governors of the Philadelphia Bar Association and of the Alumni Board of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. He is a former Vestryman of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Mr. Maxwell has long been active in the affairs of the American Bar Association, having served as State Delegate from Pennsylvania to the House of Delegates from 1944 to 1952. He served a two year term from 1952 to 1954 as Chairman of the House of Delegates and

is presently a member of the Editorial Board of the American Bar Association *Journal* and of the Board of the American Judicature Society.

His clubs include the Union League of Philadelphia, the Caveat Club, the Lawyers Club, and the Bachelors Barge Club.

In 1925 Brother Maxwell married Emily Ogden Nelson of New York and has two children, Mrs. William H. Pasfield of Arden, Delaware, a graduate of Wellesley College, and David O. Maxwell, a member of the Pennsylvania and District of Columbia Bar Associations, who graduated from Yale University in 1952 and the Law School of Harvard University in 1955. Although associated with his father's firm, the latter is presently doing his tour of military duty as an ensign attached to the Office of Naval Intelligence in Washington, D. C. Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell have three grandchildren.

100 Alumni Meet In Los Angeles

♦ Almost 100 alumni gathered in Van Nuys, California, for the June meeting of the Los Angeles Alumni Association, June 15. The program, under Co-chairmen Dwight Tudor and Gil Martin, was highlighted by a buffet dinner, door prizes, a tour of the plant and facilities, and a film on rifle marksmanship.

By invitation from District President Bud Knoblauch, three members of a local fraternity at California Polytechnic Institute at San Luis Obispo were on hand for the evening's activities and to meet the alumni. The local, Gamma Epsilon, is under consideration for petition for a charter as a new chapter in Pi Kappa Alpha. Ray Guenther, president, headed the delegation.

Following the door prize drawing and dinner, the business portion of the meeting was turned over to George Burns, who outlined the Gamma-Eta Building Fund Program, and the plans for the coming year's activities of the Association.

The plans include four "spectaculars" similar to the June meeting, emphasizing social aspects, while the business sessions will be held monthly and attended by the officers of the Foundation, the Alumni Association and Gamma-Eta Chapter. Much greater attendance is expected to result with this shift in emphasis. The change was felt necessary due to the unusual geographic situation in Los Angeles, an area of 400 square miles, which presents many unique organizational problems.

The Building Fund program was received with a great deal of enthusiasm. Gamma-Eta has long needed a new house. The old one, built in 1896, has outlived its usefulness and must be replaced. This was recognized several years ago by the undergraduate members who, at that time, added to the by-laws an assessment of \$25 per year on each man in the house. Since then more than \$2,000 has been set aside. By law, the money is sent to the National Office where it is held in trust. It can only be withdrawn by the vote of approval of two-thirds of the membership of the Gamma-Eta Foundation, the holding corporation of the chapter, and the chapter. The enthusiastic reception to the plan indicates the alumni are eager to participate.

Dr. Meffley Donates Toledo Scholarship

 For the past ten years, one of the alumni of Epsilon-Epsilon Chapter at the University of Toledo has most generously given an anonymous scholarship in the name of his fraternity. This award is made annually at the Honors Day program and is called the Pi Kappa Alpha Scholarship. It is given to the most outstanding junior in the Premedical Division of the University. The Director of the Premedical Division is Dr. H. H. M. Bowman, Chairman of the Advisory Committee of Epsilon-Epsilon Chapter. He also is Chairman of the committee which makes the Scholarship award. Dr. Bowman now feels that the name of the donor of this scholarship might well be known to his brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha, although it will not be made known publicly at Toledo University. This year on Honors Day, May 16, the award was given to Miss Renee Sourenne.

The founder and donor of the Pi Kappa Alpha award is Dr. William Harold Meffley, who is a native of Toledo. He attended the University from 1921 to 1925 and then transferred to the University of Michigan. As a student he had to earn a large part of the cost of his education. One of a large family, he inherited from his widowed mother a capacity for hard work and a tenacity of purpose to achieve his goal, which was the M.D. degree. This he received from the University of Michigan in 1930, two years after he had won his A.B. degree. After serving the usual internships and residencies in various hospitals, he settled down to practice in Toledo as a member of a medical group called the Toledo Clinic. He was made a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons in 1938 and a Fellow of the International College of Surgeons in 1942. From 1946 to 1951 Dr. Meffley was President of the Toledo and Lucas County Cancer Society and a member of the Ohio State Board of Trustees of the American Cancer Society. Dr. Meffley is a member of the American Radium Society, the American Geriatrics Society, the American Medical Association, the Ohio State Medical Society, the Ohio Surgical Society, and of the Toledo and Lucas County Academy of Medicine.

He is Director of Surgery at Flower Hospital in Toledo, Chief Surgical Consultant at Toledo State Hospital, and from 1949 to 1950, Director of Surgery at

Maumee Valley Hospital. He is on the surgical staff of the Toledo Clinic, Toledo Hospital, St. Vincent's Hospital, and Surgical Consultant to Bixby Hospital, Adrian, Michigan, and Wood County Hospital, Bowling Green, Ohio, and is a Trustee of Flower Hospital, Toledo.

His hobbies are gardening, fishing, photography, and woodworking. His fellow Pike alumni are justly proud to call this distinguished member of the medical profession – Brother.


Colorado Mines Alumni Form Association

Outstanding Chapter History Compiled on Alpha-Nu

◆ Two enterprising earlyday alumni of the University of Missouri (Alpha-Nu) chapter have recently published what is probably the finest 40-ormore-year-old fraternity or sorority chapter life history and biographies.

A brief biography of each of the first 86 members up to July 1915 from time of installation in 1909, was compiled upto-date.

The history of those first six years is intimate and detailed.

Three 8 x 10-inch photographs were sent to each living member or to the nearest-of-kin. These were composites of photos of the first six college annual group photos, plus a photo of each of the first three houses and a photo of the original signed agreement to petition IIKA.

The pamphlet was printed by multilith and is 26 pages of legal 14-inch length.

Publisher was Judge Laurance M. Hyde, '14, for over 20 years on the Supreme Court of Missouri, a former Chief Justice, former Presiding Judge of the Association of Chief Justices of the 48 States and a leader in the American Bar Association. Editor and Research Analyst was Wilson B. Heller, '14, who in 1912, while a student and roommate of Hyde's, founded the College Analyst Bureau. He still operates it and its nationally syndicated subsidiary, the College Survey Bureau. Since 1920 he has been an independent Hollywood entertainment personality publicist. He resides at 1574 So. Hayworth Ave., Los Angeles 35, Calif.

The original agreement-to-petition IIKA, mentioned above, has been presented by these men to the National Archives.

Longtime observers of the fraternitysorority scene state that the entire project has never been duplicated to such completeness.

Especially unique was the up-to-date biography of all but two of their first 86 (22 now deceased).

If there is such a thing as a "value to memories," then these men have wrought the utmost for "Old College Grads."

JOSEPH B. BOURNE

Joseph B. Bourne, BA (Penn. State), died January 29, 1956 in El Cajon, California. Brother Bourne operated a building material manufacturing company. He was a member of the El Cajon Chamber of Commerce and had lived in the San Diego area ten years.

He is survived by his wife, Dorothy; a daughter, Marcia; and two sons, Joseph and Robert. Robert is a member of Delta-Kappa Chapter, San Diego State College.

THOMAS L. TIDMORE, SR.

Dr. Thomas L. Tidmore, Sr., Υ (Alabama Poly.), Piedmont Hospital anesthesiologist, died suddenly at his home, 1225 Peachtree Battle Avenue, N. W., Atlanta, Georgia, February 5, 1956. Brother Tidmore was chief of anesthesiology at Piedmont. He had been on the hospital's staff since his graduation from Emory University Medical School in 1923.

A native of Moundville, Alabama, he was a member of the Peachtree Road Methodist Church. Professional groups in which he held membership included Fulton County Medical Society, American Board of Anesthesiology, and the American Society of Anesthesiology.

JOHN ALSEY PARK

John Alsey Park, AE (North Carolina State), editor and publisher of *The Raleigh Times*, Raleigh, North Carolina, for 44 years, died March 15, 1956. He was 70.

Brother Park attended Raleigh public schools and graduated in 1905 from North Carolina State College with a degree in mechanical engineering.

As Raleigh's first automobile dealer, he owned one of the earliest cars in North Carolina, and in 1908 drove the first auto to the Tar Heel coast. The trip took two days and a night while he and the mechanic who accompanied him built bridges to ford streams along the way.

In 1911 Mr. Park bought *The Raleigh Times.* He later owned papers at Fayetteville, New Bern, and Greenville. Although he served as editor and publisher of *The Times* for 44 years, he actually marked the beginning of his newspaper career as a newsboy during the Spanish American War when he sold papers to soldiers encamped in a wooded area, now the site of Cameron Village. During the 1920's Mr. Park served as Associated Press correspondent during naval maneuvers in Central America.

John Park was a product of the rough and tumble days of journalism. Many people did not agree with the politics and opinions of Mr. Park, but there were few who questioned his sincerity and determination.

During his life Brother Park was president of the North Carolina Press Association, Southern Newspaper Publishers Association, Raleigh Chamber of Commerce, Community Chest, YMCA, State College Alumni Association, Carolina Highway Association, Boy Scout Council, Executives Club, and served as District Governor of Rotary. He was a life-long member of the Methodist Church.

GORDON E. WIGGINS

Gordon E. Wiggins, 42, an alumnus of Delta-Kappa Chapter at San Diego State College, was killed in a head-on collision in San Diego, California, May 19.

Brother Wiggins was a civic-minded citizen, serving unselfishly in many capacities, including that of President of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He was a leader among Pi Kappa Alpha alumni in that area. He was employed as a cash register salesman.

Survivors include his wife, Doris Jean; a daughter, Peggy; and two sons, Bruce and Robert, of 2636 Sunset Boulevard, San Diego. He was a member of the Mission Hills Congregational Church.

HOWARD FULLERTON

Howard Fullerton, $B\Delta$ (New Mexico), died suddenly as a result of a heart attack on May 20, 1956, in Memphis, Tennessee. Brother Fullerton maintained his interest in and work for Pi Kappa Alpha throughout his life.

An editorial in *The Commercial Appeal*, Memphis daily newspaper, June 2, 1956, paid an unusual tribute to him:

"Official regret expressed in a resolution by the Memphis Board of Adjustment over the recent death of Howard Fullerton, long-time county planning engineer, is inadequate praise for the man known to thousands of Shelby County residents.

"In the offices of the Planning Commission and the Board of Adjustment employees remark that Howard Fullerton was one of the nicest men to work with they had ever known.

"And all over the county there are people for whom Howard Fullerton went out of his way to do a favor. He was one of the most accommodating men on the public pay roll in Memphis—quiet, and even eager to give up his own time to help anyone who happened along with a problem."

THURMAN OSCAR DAY, JR.

Tormoen Succumbs To Heart Attack

◆ The Chapter Eternal claimed another bright star in Pi Kappa Alpha when Clarence O. Tormoen, chief personnel security officer of the Treasury Department since 1954, died of a heart attack at his office in the Treasury, June 1.

Brother Tormoen, BX (Minnesota), has been a leader in Pi Kappa Alpha affairs ever since his initiation. He served as Grand Chancellor from 1931 to 1933, at which time the title of the office was changed to National Counsel. He continued in that office until 1936.

He graduated in Law from the University of Minnesota in 1926 and was a trial lawyer in his native Duluth, Minnesota. In 1942, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, he was assistant European theater judge advocate. Later, he served as judge advocate of a task force in Norway. While in Oslo, he was an official observer at the trial of Vidkun Quisling, Norwegian traitor.

From 1946 to 1950, he was president of the Baker Electric Company of Rotherham, England, and of several other small manufacturing concerns in Scandinavia. He was recalled to active military duty in 1950. and served two years as legal officer in Washington. He was awarded the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, and Saint Olaf's Medal.

It was a mutual pleasure for Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity brothers Elbert P. Tuttle and Clarence O. Tormoen to be on the same team again as they both served in the U. S. Treasury Department—Tuttle as General Counsel and Tormoen as personnel security officer. It was during Brother Tuttle's presidency of the Fraternity that Tormoen was National Counsel.

He is survived by his widow, the former Helen Baldwin of Minneapolis; four sisters, and three brothers.



Beloit Chapter Dedicates New Fraternity House

♦ A five-year-old dream became reality this past spring when Beta-Iota Chapter at Beloit (Wis.) College dedicated its new \$150,000 fraternity house. Prominent college and fraternity officials gathered in the new building on March 10 to view the latest addition to Beloit's long range building program.

Speakers at the dedication ceremonies included dignitaries from both the college and the fraternity-Dr. Miller Upton, president of Beloit College; Harold S. Wood, vice president of Beloit and director of the building program; Robert D. Lynn, executive secretary of Pi Kappa Alpha; Charles Freeman, president of District Six of Pi Kappa Alpha; C. Robert Douglas, president of Beta-Iota alumni; and Tony Kamberos, president of the Beta-Iota active chapter.

The new Beta-Iota chapter house was converted from a private residence into a home for 35 men. On the first floor are a living room, dining room, den, kitchen, and housemother's suite, plus three dormitory rooms. The second floor houses 26 men in dormitory rooms for one, two, three or four men. The other dormitory room, affectionately known as "The Roost," is located on the third floor. Other features of the house are a mammoth basement, used as a recreation room and for fraternity dances, and a large flat roof, accommodating PiKA sunbathers. The fraternity put its roof to good use in another way by holding its spring informal dance under the stars.

The new chapter house, built by Beloit College for fraternity occupancy with the aid of Pi Kappa Alpha alumni funds, is only one link in a long chain of proposed structures on the Beloit campus. Beloit, a liberal arts college of 950 students located 100 miles northwest of Chicago on the Illinois-Wisconsin border, also built during the past year an addition to the present Field House, which has a capacity of 3,500 people. The addition includes a 75 by 36 foot natatorium, a clayfloored "cage" for indoor track and other athletic activities, a gymnasium room, plus additional shower and locker room facilities.

Now under construction is a Student Union which will contain a large grill room, a ballroom, bookstore, bowling alleys, lounges and offices for student organizations. Blueprints also have been drawn for new residences for the Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity and the Kappa Alpha Theta sorority. These two new Greek houses, plus a plan for a large women's dormitory, complete the current vast building program of this outstanding small Wisconsin college.

The history of Beta-Iota Chapter goes back to 1917, when the national fraternity presented a Pi Kappa Alpha charter to a local fraternity of 17 members. The chapter grew steadily until 1931, when it went inactive due to the effects of the national depression. In 1947, following World War II, a group of returning veterans worked with Harold S. Weiser, BH (Illinois), Charles L. Freeman, BA (Washington, St. Louis), John Wheeler, BI (Beloit), and other alumni in the area and reactivated Pi Kappa Alpha. The growth of Pi Kappa Alpha at Beloit has almost tripled during the past two years. In the fall of 1954 the chapter had 23 members, including 17 actives and 6 pledges. Under the leadership of SMC Leary Kennedy and others, by the spring of 1956 the roster rose to 62, 53 actives and 9 pledges. This fall Beta-Iota returns with a nucleus of 50 men to begin its activities for the college year. With the added rushing point of the newest fraternity house on the Beloit campus, Pi Kappa Alpha should continue to climb in stature.

Working along with chapter president Kamberos during the spring semester were Rich Sachtleben, vice president, class of '58, from Chicago; Craddock Duren, secretary, class of '58, from South Milwaukee, Wisconsin; and Ron Larson, treasurer, class of '57, also from Chicago. The officers for the fall semester include Jack Cusack, president, class of '57; Casey Banas, vice president, class of '58; Jim Frodin, secretary, class of '58, all from Chicago; and Larry Saxby, treasurer, class of '58, from Blackhawk, Illinois.




