Chaplain's Corner

March, 1957

Dear Fellows,

On leave of absence the past semester, I visited colleges and universities throughout the South in behalf of the Faculty Christian Movement; and I had hoped while doing this to drop in on our local chapters, get acquainted with the brothers and feel the pulse of Pi Kappa Alpha. The pressure of an extremely tight schedule blasted the possibility of realizing so ambitious a hope; still, the few opportunities of visiting in the houses, eating supper with a group of brothers, talking with Pikes in the dormitory, participating in a memorial serv-

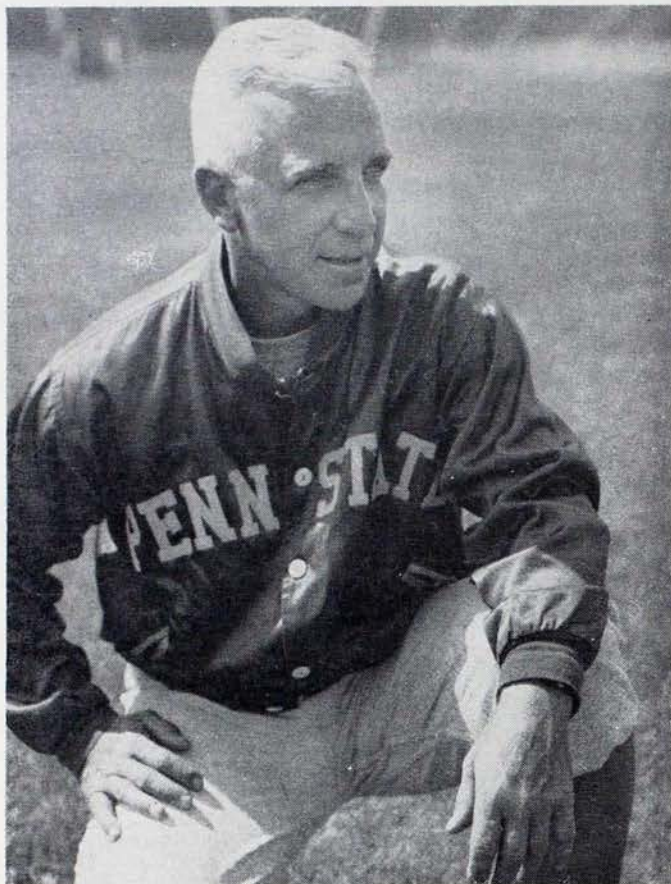
ice for a deceased brother are all treasured memories of the last five months. Where time made any personal association out of the question, a few casual questions concerning the reputation of Pi Kappa Alpha on the campus afforded some knowledge of what was happening.

That which I learned personally and through conversation encourages me! Pi Kappa Alpha is a brotherhood. The warmth and cordiality extended to me simply because I was a fellow Pike demonstrated this as fact. Furthermore, Pi Kappa Alpha is a responsible brotherhood. Time after time I found that members of the fraternity held outstanding posts of leadership in campus activities; but, more important, the faculty members to whom I talked, almost without exception, ranked the fraternity high in terms of its responsible participation in the academic community. To say that this is encouraging by no means implies it to be surprising. After all, no less should be expected from any chapter. Nor does it affirm that Pi Kappa Alpha is the best fraternity—there is always "the fraternity that we can be" that stands as a challenge to what we are and that strikes me as the best criterion for judging ourselves anyhow.

The finest expression of fraternal brotherhood I have experienced came as the result of spending a morning with "Preacher" Gordon at the University of Florida. It was not the enjoyment of "Preacher's" genuinely Southern hospitality, delightful as that proved to be; nor was it the result of Dr. Gordon's taking me to visit the president of the University, appreciative as I was of that. Oddly enough it was a visit to the post office that enabled me to see why this man, who for years was National Chaplain of the fraternity and who now is on the Supreme Council, so epitomizes the spirit of brotherhood of Pi Kappa Alpha. Actually nothing unusual or exciting occurred on that trip downtown. It was just a routine visit; one similar to the others that Dr. Gordon makes every other day in the year. And therein lies its true significance. In the five minutes it takes to walk in the post office "everybody and his brother" had called out to Dr. Gordon; and he had responded with a jest, a word of encouragement, a bit of sympathy, or whatever the occasion demanded. Here was displayed the full outreach of that spirit of brotherhood which must characterize our fraternity. It can be learned in depth in the close-knit fellowship of a local chapter; but when it is genuine, it must reach out beyond the chapter to the fraternity and beyond the fraternity to the community and beyond the community to the world. Then Pi Kappa Alpha will be a brotherhood in the fullest sense.

Announcing the 1956 —

All IKA Football Team

♦ The 1956 Pi Kappa Alpha All-America football team has a distinctly Southern flavor, far more of a sectional imbalance than in many years.

And seldom has one university's chapter dominated the selections as has Zeta of the University of Tennessee this year. Tennessee and the University of Oklahoma were the only major unbeaten college teams of the past season.

Four stars of the Tennessee Volunteers are named to the fraternity's all-star team. They are Bill Anderson, Bobby Gordon and Al Carter, backs, and Landon Darty, an end.

Of the 11 players honored, nine come from the South and two from the Middle West.

Were pledges considered, this would be a more representative team geographically. But traditionally, in selecting the honor teams for more than two decades, we have not included pledges, feeling that they should be initiates before receiving fraternity recognition. Some of these fine pledges of last fall are almost certain to win all-star ranking next season.

Here is your team, the top stars of Pi Kappa Alpha in 1956:

ENDS: Landon Darty, Tennessee, and Jerry Mertens, Drake.

TACKLES: Ed Rutsch, George Washington, and Eddie Moore, Wake Forest.

GUARDS: Tom Pratt, Miami, and Simon A. Simon, Omaha.

CENTER: Jim Keyser, Virginia.

BACKS: Alex Hawkins, South Carolina, and Bill Anderson, Al Carter and Bobby Gordon, all of Tennessee.

The toughest decisions in the selections came with the centers and the backs.

There were at least three fine centers—Jim Keyser of Virginia, Eddie Moore of Wake Forest and Joe Hince of George Washington.

Keyser was named pivot man on the Associated Press All-Atlantic Conference team, while the conference's sports writers association selected Moore. It was that close, both were standouts.

We selected Keyser but, because Moore was too good to leave off the fraternity team and because there was dearth of tackles this last season, we placed Moore at one of the tackle slots.

The Richmond, Va. *Times-Dispatch* selected a Lineman of the Week during the gridiron season. After it had named Keyser one week, a member of the coaching staff at Virginia Tech sent the sports editor this communication:

"Just a short note to pass along one loud AMEN from the coaching staff and

everybody here for your selection of Keyser as Lineman of the Week. He sure played one helluva game against us."

Keyser, a junior who stands 5-feet-10 and weighs 215, played center on offense and middle linebacker on defense.

Eddie Moore, an All-State selection as was Keyser, is another junior. He and Keyser may be battling it out again next year for all-star honors at center, unless one of this year's pledges comes along to outpoint both of them.

Eddie averaged 50 minutes a game in all 10 Wake Forest contests. An offensive center, he played linebacker on defense and also called defensive signals.

Hince and Ed Rutsch, named at a tackle spot, were two of the standouts on one of the finest teams George Washington University has fielded in many years. It won the right to play in El Paso's Sun Bowl on New Year's Day and the Colonials defeated previously unbeaten Western Texas 13-0.

Keep your eye on Alex Hawkins of South Carolina. He's only a sophomore but he caught the attention of every team the Gamecocks played. He was one of the reasons for South Carolina's 7-3 record last year and was one of the leading scorers of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Hawkins took off on a 66-yard touchdown run against Furman in his first

play as a member of the Gamecocks' varsity.

Bill Anderson was wingback on Tennessee's fine team with its single wing offense and was elected co-captain for 1957. A great pass receiver, blocker and defensive halfback, Anderson also had the best rushing average of any of the fleet Tennessee backs.

Six-foot-three, Anderson caught 10 passes for 216 yards and two touchdowns. He carried the ball 15 times for 172 yards and an 11.5 yard average.

Stand-ins for the great Johnny Majors, Tennessee's most publicized back, were a pair of Pikes—Bobby Gordon and Al Carter. They shared the understudy role at tailback, and actually played about as many minutes as Majors. One of them likely will succeed Majors as the key man in Tennessee's attack next year.

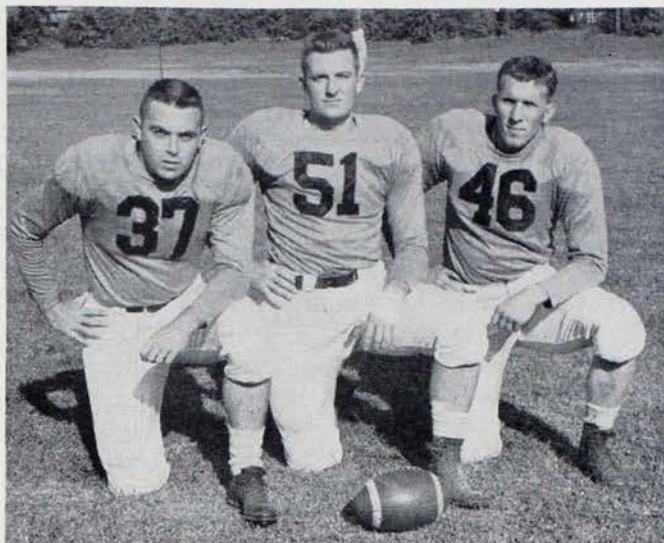
Gordon's tremendous kicking was one of the factors that led to Tennessee's slender win over Georgia Tech 6-0 in its most crucial game of the season. Gordon's punting also was effective in Tennessee's losing go with Baylor in the Sugar Bowl game, 13-7.

Bobby Gordon gained 202 yards in 53 carries and was the Southeastern Conference's top kicker with a 47.1 yard average. Carter lugged the pigskin 324 yards in 73 tries and ranked third on the team in scoring with 42 points.

Tennessee also has two fine pledges who may be contenders for the fraternity team next year. They are Carl Smith, halfback, and Ray Moss, center. Smith was named to the Southeastern Conference All-Sophomore team. He scored 37 points and had a 5.1 yard average for his 341 yards.

Next year, Tennessee could field an all-Pika backfield that would rate with

the best in Dixie—Anderson, Carter, Gordon and Smith.

Landon Darty had the misfortune of having to play understudy to Tennessee's great end, Buddy Cruze. However, Darty saw much action during the season and played particularly well in the Sugar Bowl game. He may make the fans forget Cruze next season.

Northwestern University offered two backfield contenders for fraternity honors—Dale Pienta and Frank Jeske. Pienta tossed the longest touchdown pass in the conference this last season—51 yards—for the Wildcats, surprise team of the Big Ten. Jeske scored one of the touchdowns in NU's upset win over Purdue.

To pair with Darty at the other end position, Jerry Mertens of Drake gets the nod over Ed Janeway of Bowling Green State University.

Mertens caught 11 passes for 140 yards and one touchdown. Because of a fine offensive year as a freshman, Mertens

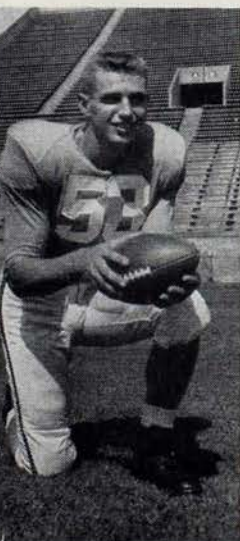
was closely watched by Drake's opponents last season but nevertheless he gave a fine performance. Janeway had an unusual record: 10 passes were thrown his way and he caught all of them. Six-foot-three and 200 pounds, he also handled the kickoff assignments.

Tom Pratt, a senior on Miami's great Florida team—one of the nation's top 10 teams—and Simon A. Simon of Omaha get the guard spots.

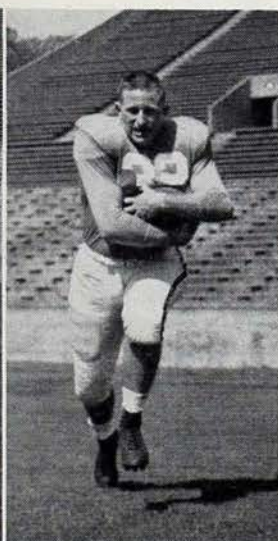
Pratt was voted the outstanding lineman of the year in Florida. Simon, chapter SMC, is a four year letterman with the OU Indians. Despite a broken leg as a junior, he came back—spurred on by the confidence his teammates displayed in naming him co-captain—and made his senior year one of his best.

To get representation on the fraternity team from Oklahoma's outstanding squad we have to go past the Sooners' players, among which there were no Pikes, to the coaching staff for Gomer Jones, top assistant to Coach Bud Wil-

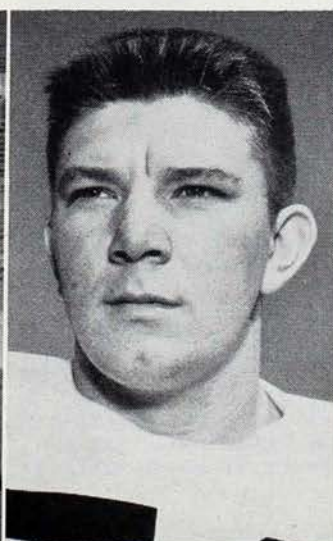

kinson. Jones, himself, was an All-America and an All-Pika while playing center for Ohio State.

Other Pikes among the coaches were George Cafego, assistant coach at Tennessee; Lynn Waldorf, who has just resigned after many years at California; Rip Engle at Penn State; Jack Curtice, Jr. at the University of Utah and Glenn and Bobby Dobbs at Tulsa. The Dobbs brothers and Cafego were on the All-Pika team while college players.

Western Reserve had no players on the football team but claims All-Star honors for its managers. John F. Thompson was senior football team manager and Eli N. Perencevich was sophomore manager.

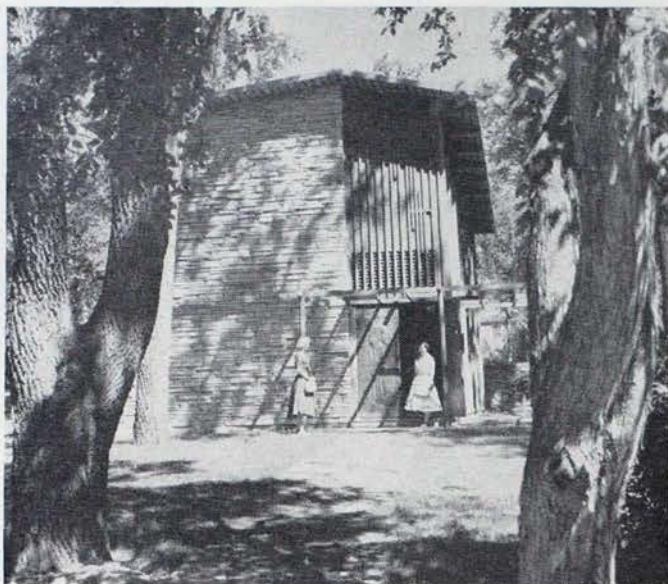

Officers for Pi Kappa Colony elected March 5, 1956 were: Hans Osterhoudt, President; Robert Bond, Vice President; Gerald Siefkin, Secretary; and James Meininger, Treasurer. On April 16, 1956, Dean Robert E. Bates informed the group that it had official status as a fraternity colony.

Through the assistance of Walter J. Osterhoudt, AX (Syracuse), BΞ (Wisconsin), and Diamond Life Member, a chapter house was purchased at 804 Elizabeth Street. Members of the colony and the parents pitched in to get it furnished in

time for occupancy when the fall quarter began. Mrs. Lily Olson, the cook, has already earned a reputation on campus for her fine meals. The first house decorations in the fall of 1956 during homecoming celebration earned a second place cup for our fraternity in its division.

Field Secretary Stan Love administered the pledge tests and handled the arrangements for the installation ceremonies. Friday evening, November 10, 1956, initiation teams headed by Jack Carter, SMC of Beta-Upsilon (Colorado), and John Litz, Delta-Phi (Colorado Mines), conducted the individual initiations. Part II of the ceremony was handled by a combination initiation team Saturday morning.

National Officers participating in the installation were: National President Grant Macfarlane, National Treasurer Charles Freeman, District President Hiram Jordan, Executive Secretary Robert Lynn, and Field Secretary Stan Love. Alumni participating in the installation included Walter J. Osterhoudt, father of the first Epsilon-Theta SMC. Saturday morning National President Macfarlane presided over the chartering ceremonies which were held in the beautiful Danforth Chapel.

Saturday evening a semi-formal dinner dance was held at Ammons Hall. Representatives from the administration and faculty, parents of members, and officers of other fraternities and sororities were

Sigma was honored in having Dr. Freeman H. Hart, National Historian, as principal speaker at an alumni organizational meeting January 31.

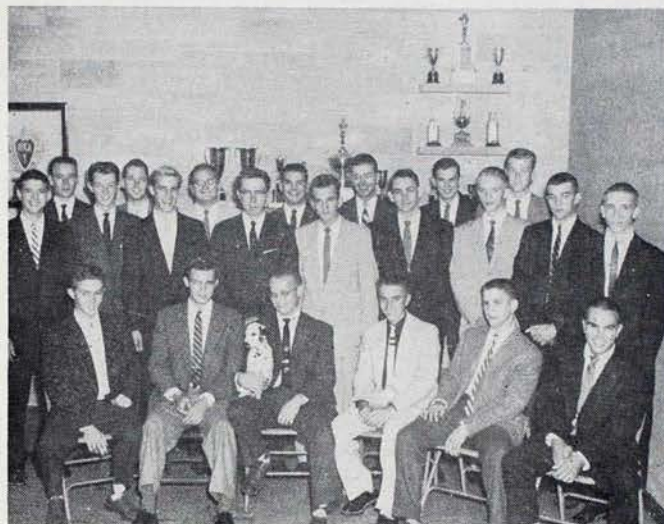

Duke Chapter Slated For New Fraternity Housing

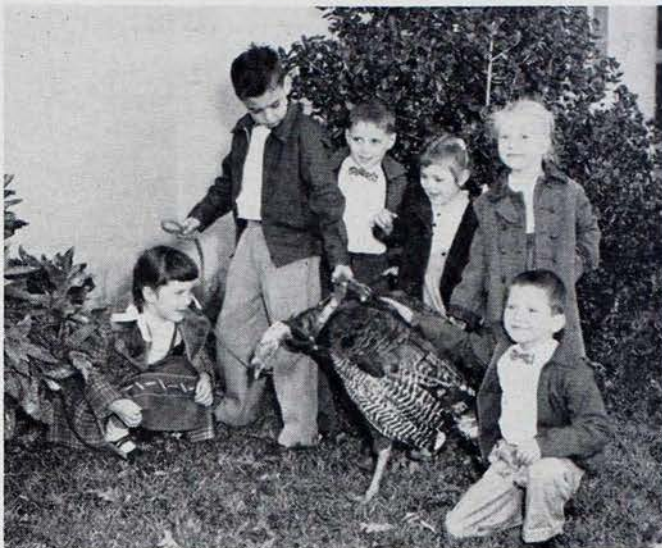

PiKA Son Chosen by Academy of Science For Antarctic Expedition

◆ This story begins four years ago in Buffalo, New York, on an evening when 14-year-old Dick Chappell came home from school and asked his dad, G. Howard Chappell, BT, if there were an adventure book around the house that might do for an English class book report.

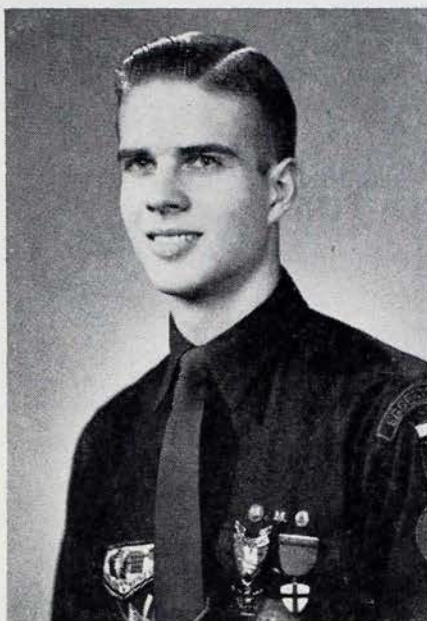
Before bedtime, Dick was deep in the pages of "Cold," the true-adventure record of an Antarctic sledge journey written by Dr. Laurence M. Gould, second in command of the 1929 Byrd Antarctic Expedition and a Beta-Tau brother of Dick's dad.

Dick started dreaming that night before he went to sleep. As Gould's thrilling narrative unfolded before his eyes, Dick began to imagine himself as a member of the expedition. Not as an explorer, perhaps, but maybe just as the famous Boy Scout, Paul Siple, who was taken along to Little America as the youngest member of the expedition and in later years distinguished himself on succeeding jaunts to the Antarctic as a chief aide to Admiral Richard E. Byrd.

"It was one of those dreams," Dick says, "that you think would be nice, but they never happen."

This one happened. Early in 1956 the National Academy of Sciences invited the Boy Scouts of America to conduct competitive tests to select a Boy Scout between the ages of 17 and 19½ years old, qualified to accompany the Byrd expedition to the Antarctic for the International Geophysical Year 1957-58. The competition was nationwide and only one Scout would be chosen. He must have finished high school by June and must hold the rank of Eagle Scout, Silver Award Explorer or Quartermaster Sea Explorer.

Dick had not been marking time during the four years since his father had handed him "Cold" to review. He had been a Boy Scout five years then. During the next four years he became an Eagle Scout, accumulated 46 merit badges, won the God and Country award of the Buffalo Central Park Methodist Church and, as boys will, got to be 18 years old and a senior in high school. The Buffalo

area council of Boy Scouts wasted no time getting Dick's name entered in the competition.

Weeks were required to screen the 250 recommendations made by the various Scout councils throughout the nation. The 12 Regional offices of Scouting selected the best 80 prospects and forwarded their names to the National council, which finally eliminated all but seven. Dick Chappell was one of the seven finalists, but was still afraid to hope. Dreams too seldom come true.

The seven finalists were required to submit reports from school authorities on "the intellectual capabilities of the candidate; his interest in and aptitude for the physical sciences," as well as his academic standing, grades and IQ. He must outline his hobbies and interests, must present a physician's report of a thorough physical examination and record of illnesses. Parents of each finalist must certify the correctness of his statements, signify that they "know of no reason why he should not successfully make the trip" and record their willingness to have him do so.

Then all seven finalists were assembled for personal interviews by Dr. Paul Siple and other leaders and scientists who will take part in the 1957-58 expedition. After Dick met the other six finalists, he told Mr. and Mrs. Chappell he didn't have a chance. "They are the finest boys I have ever seen," Dick said, "and one of them will surely get it."

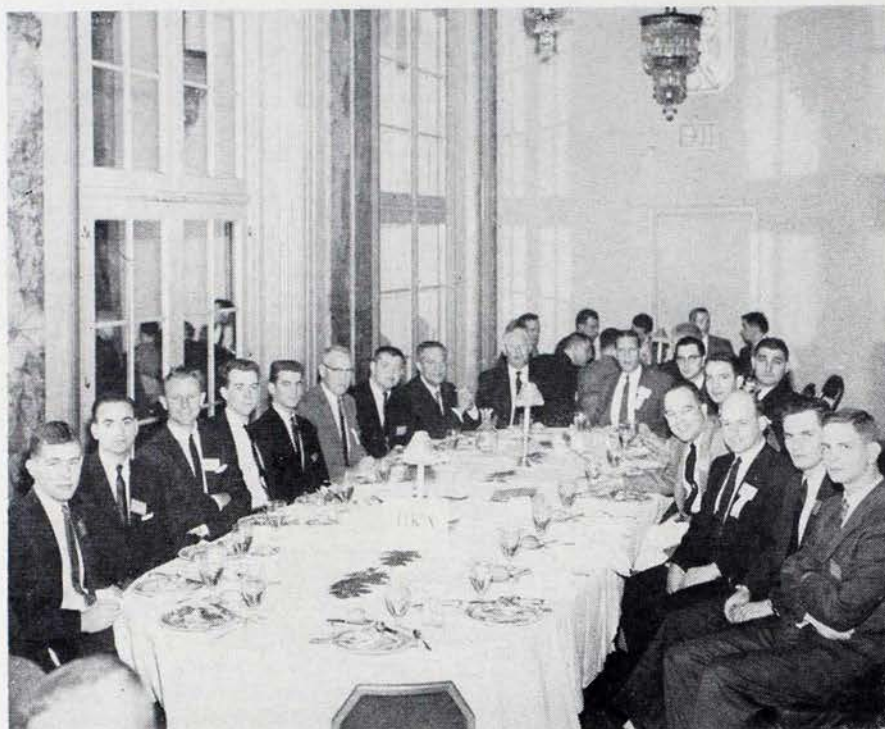
Dick reckoned without one factor. Friends say he had practically memorized Larry Gould's book "Cold." This Dick denies, but admits he absorbed a good deal of its information. In his interviews with Dr. Siple and other expedition leaders, Dick demonstrated an acquaintance with the Antarctic that brought him special attention and, though it surprised Dick, it was not too surprising to the Buffalo persons who know him when he became the final choice as the one Boy Scout who is accompanying this year's Antarctic expedition.

Since his selection, Dick has been to Washington and other centers for special training as a junior scientific aide of the U. S. National committee for the International Geophysical Year, U. S. Antarctic Program, National Academy of Sciences. He has received special instruction in collection of scientific data, glaciology, meteorology, gravity, the use and care of scientific instruments under conditions of extreme cold, safety measures, and a score of other subjects. He has been sworn into the Navy and granted a two-year leave so that he will not lose an ROTC scholarship to Princeton University awarded him by the Navy. He has been guest speaker and guest of honor at so many affairs that he has lost count.

But his biggest thrill came the day Dr. Laurence M. Gould, now president of Carleton College, met him at the New York City airport for a weekend of talk about "plans." Only a few days prior to their meeting, it had been announced that the famous author of "Cold" would also be a member of the 1957-58 Antarctic expedition. They found they had a lot to talk about.

Terhune Memorial Dedicated at

Orlando Florida Air Base

◆ Terhune Memorial Gymnasium, named for William V. Terhune, Jr., AH '40, was dedicated Sunday, November 24, 1956, at Pinecastle Air Force Base, Orlando, Florida. Lt. Terhune was the first airman from Orlando to be killed in World War II.

The ceremonies were held in the \$234,000 building on the air base with Mr. and Mrs. William V. Terhune, Orlando, parents of Lt. Terhune, the honored guests.

Col. Frank P. Bender, base deputy wing commander, eulogized Lt. Terhune as being "held in highest esteem in Orlando by his fellow students and community leaders." Col. Bender dedicated the gymnasium to "Lt. Terhune and all veterans."

Base Commander Col. Michael N. W. McCoy, 321st Bomb Wing, presented Mr. Terhune, who unveiled a portrait of Lt. Terhune which will be hung in the lobby of the ultra-modern gym.

Guests at the ceremonies also included civic leaders from Orlando and members of the Orange County Pi Kappa Alpha Alumni Association. Dr. Neil Powell, president, represented the local organization.

Lt. Terhune was killed in the Panama Canal Zone on February 26, 1942. On his graduation from Orlando Senior High School, Lt. Terhune entered the University of Florida. In his first year at the University of Florida he was selected to membership in Phi Eta Sigma, freshman scholastic fraternity, and he ranked high in the ROTC program. He joined Alpha-Eta Chapter in his first year at the University.

After a year and a half at the University of Florida Lt. Terhune entered the air cadets. He graduated from the Air Corps Advanced Flying School in Selma, Alabama on December 12, 1941. Just three days later he and three other top graduates of the school were sent to the Canal Zone.

At that time the Canal Zone was considered one of the "hot spots" of the world theatres. As a fighter pilot, Lt. Terhune was flying a formation patrol on February 26, 1941 when his P-40 aircraft apparently exploded in air.

Another aircraft in the flight was damaged and both pilots were forced to parachute. The second pilot was picked up unharmed but Lt. Terhune died before reaching a hospital.

Tait Named To Federal Trade Comm.

◆ When Edward Tait, 36, was sworn in as a member of the Federal Trade Commission in Washington, D. C. on November 2, he became one of the youngest members to serve in this responsible post. Brother Tait, a native of Clunc, Pennsylvania, received his B.S. and LL.B. degrees from the University of Pittsburgh where he was a leader in Gamma-Sigma Chapter.

He immediately entered the U. S. Army in which he served 4½ years during World War II attaining the rank of Major.

Upon leaving military service he began "earning his way" through promotions to increasing positions of responsibility. Some of these were law clerk to the late Judge Dithrich of the Pennsylvania Superior Court, Trust Administrator of a Pittsburgh Bank, membership in a Pittsburgh law firm, Executive Assistant to the Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, Executive Director of Securities and Exchange Commission, White Horse Special Assistant, and appointment to the Federal Trade Commission.

Brother Tait is a member of the various bar associations and is a senior warden in the Episcopal Church. He and his wife, the former Betty Lee Weaver, reside with their four children at 8615 Lynbrook Drive, Bethesda, Maryland.

Prominent Physician Initiated By Omaha

◆ In March of 1956, our chapter had the honor of initiating a very prominent figure in the field of medicine. He is Dr. William Lete Shearer who was a member of Theta Phi Delta local fraternity during his undergraduate days at the University of Omaha. Dr. Shearer is one of the leaders in the development of plastic surgery in this country.

Dr. Shearer founded the American Association of Plastic Surgeons and is now a member of the Board of that organization. Founder and member of the American Society of Maxillofacial Surgeons, member of American College of Surgeons, American Society of World Surgeons, American Board of Oral Surgery, and Douglas County, State and National Medical Associations, he is very active in many civic and medical organizations. An Alpha Omega Alpha honor medical society member, Dr. Shearer is Professor Emeritus of Surgery of the University of Nebraska College of Medicine.

Born in Wisconsin, Dr. Shearer moved to Nebraska with his family when he was only a boy. At 16 he worked as a janitor in a dental laboratory, and here he learned dental techniques. He had already decided to study medicine, and when a child with a cleft palate entered the laboratory one day, he decided to enter that phase of surgery.

He first went to college at the Omaha Medical College, and after graduating from there with a degree in dentistry, he practiced for two years before continuing his schooling.

Dr. Shearer has degrees in medicine from both Creighton University in Omaha and the University of Chicago. After his return from Chicago, he attended Omaha University in order to study under Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins, founder of the University. He graduated in 1921 with a B.A. degree. During the time he studied here, he attended all night classes.

During his career, he has handled over 3,000 cleft palate cases from all over the United States and foreign countries. Due to lack of proper equipment for his particular phase of surgery, Dr. Shearer was required to design and develop various instruments for use in plastic surgery. Many of these designs bear his name.

In addition to instruments and equipment, he has designed and experimented with many new ideas in operations and treatment. Among these is one of his

most famous and widely used operations, alveolectomy. His past instructor and good friend, Dr. Jenkins, named the surgical treatment. It consists of reconstructing and completely repairing such serious handicaps as cleft palates, protrusions, malformations, and the like.

Dr. Shearer and his wife have four children. A horse and dog lover, his hobbies are hunting and fishing.

PiKA Invented Tobacco Filter

Editor's Note: Portions of the following article appeared in the Durham, North Carolina Morning Herald.

◆ In a day when almost every major tobacco company boasts a special type filter, another one more or less is not news, unless, of course, it happens to be the first filter recorded in the U. S. Patent Office.

This historic filter, the granddaddy of them all, was invented and patented nearly half a century ago, in 1908, by a native of Durham, Claude W. Rowe. Brother Rowe was initiated in 1902 by Alpha-Apha Chapter (Duke University), and later transferred to Tau Chapter at the University of North Carolina.

Rowe, a former New York lawyer, first applied for his patent in 1907. It was comparable to a popular pipe filter on the market today. It was designed to be used until saturated and then replaced with a new filter. It was made with a cork exterior open fully at one end and with four small holes on the other end. The cork exterior was filled with finely spun silk threads. After Brother Rowe invented his cork and silk filter, he then

designed a pipe suitable to use the filter. For this pipe, he chose rhododendron wood from the mountains of North Carolina. The combined product was eventually manufactured by the S. M. Frank Pipe Company, and the famous Frank Medico pipe came into being.

Brother Rowe resides at 150 Pinecrest Road, Durham, North Carolina. He is author of the book, "The Lawyer's Proof of the Hereafter."

New Mexico Men Outstanding

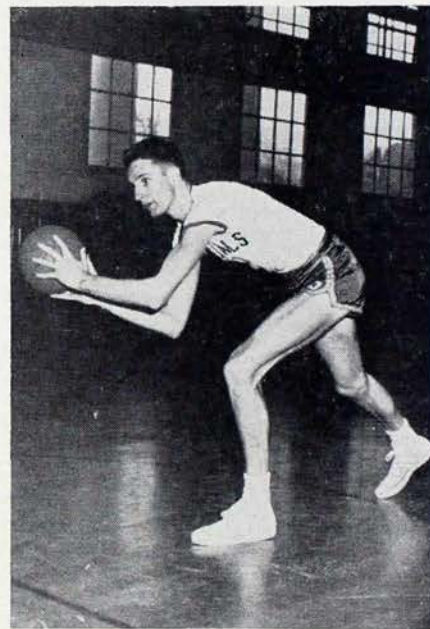

DUNCAN CURRY

Duncan Curry, Γ (William and Mary) & A (Virginia), a Staunton, Virginia attorney and banker, died December 13, 1956 after an extended illness. Brother Curry was president of the Staunton National Bank and had practiced law since the mid-twenties. During the early 1920's, he served as consular official in Finland.

ARCHIBALD DOUGLAS DABNEY

Archibald Douglas Dabney, A (Virginia), judge of the Charlottesville, Virginia Corporation Court for 40 years before his retirement in 1951, died December 1, 1956. He was a graduate of the University of Virginia law school and served in the Spanish-American War. He began the practice of law in 1901 and in 1902 was appointed commissioner of the United States District Court in Charlottesville. Judge Dabney was appointed Corporation Court judge April 15, 1911 at the age of 32.

SAMUEL GARDNER WALLER

Major General S. Gardner Waller, A (Virginia), Virginia State Adjutant General, died December 1, 1956 in a Richmond hospital. Gen. Waller, 73, had been Virginia's adjutant general for twenty-four years since his appointment in 1931.

HAROLD L. AMOSS

Dr. Harold Lindsay Amoss, Ω (Kentucky), physician and former Professor of Medicine at Duke University, died November 2, 1956 in Greenwich, Connecticut. Brother Amoss received a medical degree from Harvard University in 1911, and served as Associate Professor of Medicine at Johns Hopkins University from 1922 to 1930, and Professor of Medicine at Duke from 1930 to 1933. During World War I he rose to major in the Army Medical Corps.

A specialist in internal medicine, Dr. Amoss was an authority on poliomyelitis and other diseases. He was the author of articles in medical journals and textbooks. Since 1933, Brother Amoss had been a consultant in medicine to five hospitals in Connecticut.

CHARLES HENRY CAMPBELL

Charles H. Campbell, H (Tulane), director of the British Information Services, Washington, D. C., died December 18, 1956. He was acknowledged to be the best press officer Britain ever had in Washington and was widely known as

her top "unofficial ambassador." Charlie was born in Liverpool in 1904. Shortly after his birth, his family moved to New Orleans where the elder Campbell was agent for a Liverpool shipping firm.

Brother Campbell tired of his engineering course at Tulane University and became a newspaperman, serving on the staff of the New Orleans *Item* as reporter, city editor, news editor and managing editor between the years 1927-42. In 1942 the British government summoned him to Washington to help tell Britain's story to Americans. He did much to improve relations between the British Embassy and the Washington reporters. He also was largely responsible for the great popularity which Lord Halifax eventually won as British Ambassador. He was highly esteemed in the public relations field and for his brilliance as a wit and raconteur.

BARTON FRANK SEWELL

Barton Frank Sewell, TH (Southern California), was killed October 28, 1956 in an automobile accident near Fresno, California. He was 22. Young Sewell was in a car with three other S.C. students returning to Los Angeles after attending the S.C.-Stanford football game in Palo Alto.

Bart was a member of the Sailing Club, Trojan Young Republicans, and the I.F.C. swimming team. A senior at Southern California, he was majoring in social studies.

JACK ESTABROOK

Jack Estabrook, AH (Florida), was killed December 5, 1956 near Mansfield, Ohio in an airplane crash. Jack was stationed at Webb Air Force Base in Big Spring, Texas as an instructor. One of his friends, Gene Kenhens, had been notified that his mother was dying of cancer in Ohio. Jack was flying his friend home at the time of the accident.

An outstanding member of Alpha-Eta Chapter, Jack will be sorely missed by his many friends in Pi Kappa Alpha.

FRANK J. FARLEY

Dr. Frank J. Farley, BB (Washington), died from shock and exposure on December 1, 1956 after spending a night in the Withlacoochee Swamp, Florida. He and several friends had gone fishing and were returning to camp about 6:30 p.m. when the boat became entangled in some lily pads. The boat capsized, and the trio spent the night in cold water

up to their necks. They were not found until daylight, and Dr. Farley died en route to the hospital.

A notice of Bellingham, Washington, Brother Farley had practiced medicine in Dade City, Florida for eleven years.

MARVIN HAROLD PARTEN

Marvin H. Parten, BF (Kansas), was killed in an automobile accident December 22, 1956 near Great Bend, Kansas. An active member of Beta-Gamma Chapter, he had served as M.C., Alumni Secretary, and House Manager. He participated in the American Society of Tool Engineers, Interfraternity Pledge Council, and many other campus activities. Brother Parten was highly regarded by his brothers for his devotion and loyalty to his fraternity.

ANSEL ALPHONSO KNOWLTON

Dr. A. A. Knowlton, AT (Utah), who won nation-wide recognition for his skill as a professor of physics during his thirty-three years at Reed College in Oregon, died of a stroke January 9, 1957. Dr. Knowlton was 80 years of age. He taught physics at Reed from 1915 until his retirement in 1948. He was on the faculty of Bennington College in Vermont from 1948 to 1950.

For his skill as a teacher Dr. Knowlton received a \$1,000 award from the Research Corporation in 1947. It was based on the discovery that in proportion to its size, Reed had nearly twice as many graduates listed in the professional directory "American Men of Science" as any other college. In 1951 the American Association of Physics Teachers gave him its highest honor, the Oersted medal. He was the author of a widely used textbook, "General Physics for College Students," first published in 1928. He served as president of the American Association of Physics Teachers in 1942.

Born at New Portland, Maine in 1876, he received a degree from Bates College, master of arts degree from Northwestern University and a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

Dr. Knowlton was an enthusiastic golfer and in 1937 was runner-up for the Oregon senior championship.

Atomic energy was one of Knowlton's special fields, and many of his students worked on producing the first atom bomb or research which led to the bomb.

MERTON I. SIGNER

Merton I. Signer, AK (Missouri Mines), dean of faculty at Colorado School of Mines, died November 17, 1956 in Denver, Colorado following a heart attack while he was walking in Golden. Brother Signer, known as an outstanding faculty member and dean by his associates, joined the Mines staff in 1929 after sev-

eral years of mining and highway engineering experience.

He was a member of the American Institute of Mining Engineers, the American Society for Engineering Education, Theta Tau, Blue Key, and the Masonic Lodge. He was appointed to the Colorado State Planning Commission in 1945 by Governor Ralph Carr, and served as chairman of this board in 1950.

Carl G. Nordquist, Treasurer of the Delta-Phi Alumni Association, said: "Sig, as he was known to all his friends, has now joined the Chapter Eternal, and to the Ruler of that Chapter, we can all only say a simple, sincere thank you for sending him our way for a while to guide and befriend us."

A mainstay on Washington and Lee's swimming team in free-style events, sophomore Will Crews Morris, Jr. of San Antonio, Texas, was fatally injured New Year's Eve, 1956. Brother Morris, II (Washington and Lee), lettered his freshman year as anchor man on the 400-yard medley relay team that set a new school record, and swam the 100-yard free style.

Well known as a top-ranked water skiing enthusiast throughout the southwest, Bill had won many trophies and medals in men's jumping and slalom events. He had starred in skiers' exhibitions at Cypress Gardens, Florida.

He attended New Mexico Military Institute where he was voted the Outstanding Cadet in his class. This past summer he attained the number one position in his platoon at Marine Platoon Leaders Corps camp.

Bill was held as a close friend by many on the Washington and Lee campus. His untimely death is felt deeply by his brothers in Pi Kappa Alpha.

BERNARD MAINWARING

Bernard Mainwaring, BN (Oregon), publisher and editor of *The Capital Journal*, Salem, Oregon, and co-owner of the Statesman-Journal Publishing Company, died January 19, 1957. The widely known publisher was a member of the State Board of Education, president of the Salem United Fund, member of the board of the First Presbyterian Church, director of the Chamber of Commerce, Salvation Army and Kiwanis Club, director of the Oregon State College Alumni Association and president of The Associated Press group in Oregon.

Brother Mainwaring, a native of Gotham, Wisconsin, came to Salem in January of 1953 after purchasing the *Capital Journal*. Previously, he resided at Nampa, Idaho, where he was publisher of the *Nampa Free Press* for sixteen years.

He was graduated with a B.S. degree in Business from Oregon State College

in 1920 after wide activities in student affairs. He served as editor of the school paper and was a member of Sigma Delta Chi, honorary journalism fraternity, and Alpha Kappa Psi, honorary commerce fraternity.

Brother James A. Bear was born in Rockingham County, Virginia, but his family moved to Salem, near Roanoke, Virginia, when he was a small boy. James and Charles were educated at Roanoke College as noted above and as students there they learned well the tenets of Pi Kappa Alpha and developed the loyalty to the Fraternity that they have preserved through the years. After attending Roanoke College James Bear received his law degree from the University of Virginia and for over fifty years was a practicing attorney in Roanoke.

From early life James A. Bear was keenly interested in politics. This carried him into long service in the Virginia Legislature where he made a distinguished record. He was also quite active in the civic affairs of his city and was for a time Mayor of Roanoke. Because of the splendid service he rendered as a legislator and as a local civic leader, Brother James Bear was very much in the public eye as a possible candidate for the governorship of his state in at least two or more gubernatorial campaigns.

One of Brother Bear's contributions to his state was the prominent part he had in helping to develop a highway system for his state and he served for a time on

the first state highway commission. Like the proverbial busy man he had many irons in the fire and made his contribution in banking and business as well as in law. During these years he accumulated a sizable estate.

Pi Kappa Alphas everywhere have many reasons to be grateful for the splendid service that Brother James A. Bear rendered to his state and to his Fraternity.

True Democracy Protects Fraternities In Their Social Privileges

Beware lest tearing down your neighbor's fence will destroy
your own security.

Dear Mr. President:

We agree that no resident of the United States should be denied any legal rights or opportunities because of race, color or creed. We agree the university is to be commended for admitting students without regard to these factors. We applaud the fact that this country was founded on freedom of religion—but not freedom *from* religion. We firmly believe that students of your university should have the freedom to form groups among the students which are bound by a community of interest which may be religious, which may be social, which may be literary, or otherwise, so long as they are not deleterious and do not restrict other students from establishing groups based on other criteria.

Your university is concerned with the process of growth and development in knowledge and in spirit of individuals as they come to your institution for study and for living. These are the primary objectives which you seek to accomplish. We agree with you that it is appropriate that the university should not set up standards for admission which are based on race, color or creed. You keep your doors open, then, to teach and educate principally through the classroom and in many other ways all those who qualify. Your students number in the thousands. Your university becomes a community whose members are bound by the common purpose of securing an education.

As is always true, when thousands of people are involved, there are many communities and sub-communities (wheels within wheels). Each, in a sense, may be a segment of another with different primary objectives, but which are not incompatible with each other. We speak of educating the whole man. National fraternities were not foisted on colleges and universities but evolved to meet a need for an intimate in-group of a social nature and of a type which universities do not provide. They are adjuncts or sub-communities of the university because their members are both students

and fraternity men. There must be a cooperative operation in order for success to result.

Every man on your faculty belongs to many different sub-communities, both in and out of the university. Professor Smith might head the Physics Department. He is a member of the Faculty Club, he belongs to the local Country Club, he is vice president of the Kiwanis Club, and he serves as vestryman in the Episcopal Church. Each of these organizations has a different identity and a different primary purpose. Membership in these varying groups with differing objectives is an entirely compatible life for him to live. The same is true with the student. He may be in the engineering school, he may play football, he may be editor of the school paper, and he may belong to the Chess Club. He has a right to "wear many different coats" and this variety of purpose, cooperation and sub-community participation is, in itself, one of his most educative processes.

Fraternities are, by their nature, democracy in one of its best forms. We ferent social institutions and represent are proud of the freedom under which we live and which our institutions teach. If we fall short of what is concerned ideal, the way to ultimately accomplish that ideal is through education. There are many, however, who subjectively interpret fraternities as being wrong and seek to regiment them into the type of organization which they—"outside of the fraternities"—decide is proper. Where is your democracy in such an instance? Where is your educative process? Fraternities are infinitely more democratic than any university or college ever claimed to operate. By his own volition he chose to join these organizations, met their standards and was accepted. It has been said that some fraternities today "find themselves laboring under regulations of their national bodies which prohibit them from making selection of membership without resort to test of race or creed." It is also true that the same chapters of

fraternities frequently find themselves basking in the benefits which accrue from membership because of the assets as well as liabilities of membership in the national organization. It is seldom emphasized that the national fraternity is governed by the rules which its student members prescribe (no national officer or alumnus in Pi Kappa Alpha has any voice in deciding the membership requirements of our fraternity).

Here we come to one of the problems which you, as an administrator, and we, as national fraternity leaders, face—the dual responsibility of a "student-member" to his university and to his national fraternity. We recognize the difficulty and appreciate the splendid spirit of co-operation which your administration has always evidenced in working with national fraternities. First, there is the responsibility of your students to your university, and Pi Kappa Alpha emphasizes that in its pledge training. Secondly, there is his responsibility to the National Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity as a result of his voluntary admission to it and acceptance of its ideals, mode of operation, and procedure for changing those ideals and regulations. There are certain benefits to the individual of membership in the national fraternity. There are certain responsibilities and there are certain liabilities. It is impossible to have national benefits and local benefits without any obligations at the same time. Just as in the local chapter, decisions are made by the group through majority or two-thirds vote; so in the national organization, decisions are made by majority or two-thirds vote.

National fraternities likewise make a contribution to the administration. If, in the sound judgment of the administration, of the local chapter, or of the national organization, the liabilities begin to outweigh the assets, then any one of the three has a right to precipitate a severance of the relationship. Certainly none of the three wishes this to take place as regards your university. If a national fraternity does not have a set

policy which prescribes (I do not think "dictate" is the proper word inasmuch as it is merely the will of the majority duly expressed) national standards of operations, it will soon disintegrate into a confederation and ultimately a loose aggregation of locally autonomous chapters, whose only similarity is the name.

The primary purpose of a fraternity chapter within your university is to satisfy the yearnings for intimate friendships from among your student body by banding together in a chapter and subscribing to certain ideals and standards of operations. The students desire to extend this to other campuses through the medium of a national organization. The purpose of the local chapter is completely different from that of the university, but the test of time seems to have proved it not only is not a handicap, but is actually an asset to the institution in fulfilling subsidiary needs of the students which the university itself cannot supply. A local fraternity can set its own standards of membership. A national fraternity's membership standards are set by the sum total of its members throughout the nation (student). Wherein is it improper, unfair and discriminating (in the bad sense) for these students to restrict their membership? Let us assume that in your university community of 5,000 students there are 700 who are members of the Methodist Church. Of these 700, thirty become intimate friends and desire to establish a group or fraternity so they might engage in social activities. In addition, they feel their community of interest will be further strengthened and the organization made more permanent by restricting membership in their particular group to Methodist, Anglo-Saxons who are six feet tall. Suppose I happen to be a Methodist, Anglo-Saxon who is five feet and six inches tall. Is the organization and operation of this group harmful to the university and is it unfair to me? It seems to serve a legitimate purpose and be a legitimate expression by its members. The men are of a high moral character who live Christian lives and adhere to certain ideals. I am not eligible to join. I would say it would be unfair if it were the only group permitted on campus, but if the five foot six Anglo-Saxon Methodists could form an organization, or if organizations of any variety of standards for selection of members from among the students are permitted, there is no discrimination. Cryptically, if all groups are the same, wherein lies the difference? They thereby fail to satisfy the need for the very lack of a difference. Failure to qualify for membership in certain groups does not cast one into outer darkness. In fact, learning to qualify for some groups and not for others in a student body is an impor-

tant part of education and preparation for life in society as a whole.

When we come to the question of a national fraternity with a chapter on a local university campus, we bring in an additional factor. Here the local chapter is a sub-group of the university community and a sub-group of the nation-wide fraternity. The primary purpose of a national fraternity is to bring into its membership homogeneous, compatible men who can live in intimate friendship with members of that local chapter or any other chapter throughout the United States and can be accepted immediately as having measured up to certain standards. This is a large order considering the diversity of interest in the various geographic areas and the variance in social custom, background and other factors. Democracy plays its part here again in that each chapter has an equal voice in drafting the Laws of the Fraternity and in establishing these requirements for membership. Obviously, this means that a local chapter must abide by the majority decision of all chapters. It cannot reap the benefits of national affiliation unless it performs its responsibilities. A member of our fraternity who is initiated into any chapter in the United States may transfer to any other chapter and be immediately accepted into full membership. Frankly, I continue to marvel at the smooth operation and the magnificent esprit de corps of national fraternities with their members involving all parts of the United States and perpetuating themselves from generation to generation. The most important ingredient is *mutuality*—every member of the fraternity was chosen and voluntarily joined it.

Why is it wrong for a fraternity to be a "Christian Fraternity," for example? Why is it wrong for a fraternity to be a "Catholic Fraternity"? Aren't your students permitted freedom of religion? Is there any violation of the rights of others if a fraternity wants to establish itself on a Christian basis? Is it an educational advance to force the dissolution of such fraternities? Is it not a denial of a basic right? I firmly believe if the organization through "education" wants to change its requirements for membership, that is its social prerogative, but is it proper for those who are not directly concerned as members to tell the members what they should do? Howard Johnson makes twenty-seven flavors of ice cream—one flavor is not better than another flavor, but it is *different*. He makes twenty-seven flavors in order to meet the varying demands of the public. The customer chooses his own flavor. Would the world be better off if someone dictated to Howard Johnson that henceforth there would be only one flavor?

Will Howard Johnson continue making any flavor which the public does not buy?

One of the real strengths of America has been the "loyalty within loyalties" of the citizens of this country. We are all first Americans and yet our pride in our various racial heritages, whether it be Scotch, Jewish, German, or in our profession or in our guild is the very thing that adds strength through variety. Why cannot national fraternities have a variety of membership standards? One may rest assured that the thinking of students will reflect itself in the survival of those fraternities which meet their wishes and desires and the death of those organizations which do not. The answer appears to lie in freedom of action for students to join or not to join those organizations with standards to which they subscribe. National fraternities will "grow" to meet these needs and desires or else perish. There need be no pressure from outside. The student members themselves are in the driver's seat.

The students are directly *subject* to the teachings of the faculty many hours each week. They learn *things* and *values* primarily from their teachers. If their social values are wrong (in the eyes of the faculty, for example) is it not a betrayal of the "educational process" to *decree* a change rather than to lead to a change through "education, enlightenment, and choice"? If the group thinking of the local fraternity is not "progressive" enough for an individual, he may resign or work for a change from within. If the national thinking is not "progressive" enough, the local is free to surrender its charter or work for a change from within. If the national policies remain unacceptable over a period of time (hardly probable since the students establish the policies), the national fraternity will die for lack of customers. Administrative regulations of fraternities' memberships are like pruning the branches rather than feeding nourishment to the roots. Are they not undemocratic and uneducative?

I agree that education is the proper approach to this difficult social problem. I do not agree that educated men will automatically reach the same conclusions or exercise the same social preferences. There has been a frequent tendency on the part of some people to equate a social privilege with a legal right. I uphold both in their respective areas. Just as a professor cherishes his "academic freedom," so do I cherish my social privileges and freedom of association on a mutually compatible basis as provided by the same constitution which guarantees legal rights.

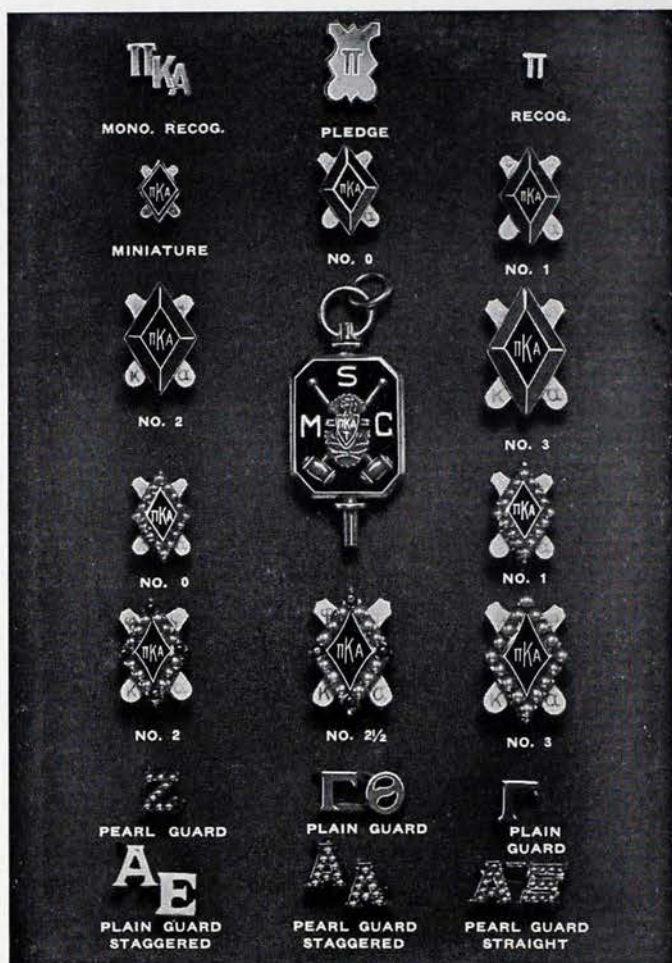
