

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## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

As the leaves of the old oak again offer shade to brothers across our land, it's hard to believe another school year has closed. Pi Kappa Alpha has had a good year with many blessings to be thankful for... Fifty years ago this spring and summer, we were giving thanks for a different blessing: the end of World War II. This issue of the *Shield & Diamond* pays tribute to those brothers — those heroes — whose lives were marked indelibly by that great conflict. We owe them endless thanks.

Military service has been part of our heritage since three Founders fought in the Civil War. Just recently, at least 40 brothers are known to have been in Desert Storm. Even the Memorial Headquarters in Memphis is named in honor of all brothers who died in service to our country. Some men went to WWII after initiation and graduation, like my father Whit Morse (*Hampden-Sydney, Iota '37*). Others had college interrupted. Over 500 brothers never returned. During WWII, many chapters "went to sleep", as National President Roy D. Hickman (*New Mexico, Beta Delta '22*) said, and the Supreme Council openly questioned our future. But many brothers did return, as did other young men who joined our bonds in the post-war era. We rebounded with vigor, and many of those WWII veterans became some of our most prominent and loyal alumni.

Recent travels gave me the pleasure to meet one such man, Jacklyn H. Lucas (*High Point, Delta Omega '56*). Jack dove on two grenades at Iwo Jima, saving several lives. President Truman gave him the Congressional Medal of Honor and President Clinton spotlighted Jack in the gallery at his 1995 State of the Union address, noting he was the youngest Marine ever to have been so honored. To see Jack and a dozen of his pledge brothers gather with their families for a Founders Day celebration in North Carolina was delightful! One could feel the spirit of brothers for life being lifted to a whole new level.

Since my last letter, I have flown from New Mexico to New Hampshire. The warm welcome from students, alumni, parents and university staff has been very touching. The 100th anniversary of Upsilon Chapter at Auburn University in Alabama was outstanding. It was amazing to see how many legacies they have. Rush is truly a family affair! Trips to Memphis, visits with brothers in Atlanta, and the Congressional Founders Day were all so memorable. While in Boston, there was an unforgettable day at Fenway Park with men from Kappa Delta Chapter at Northeastern University. We also had four recent charterings, three being re-installations of silent groups. Zeta Iota Chapter at Old Dominion University was particularly special. They initiated 105 men, the third largest chartering ever! And, ten years ago I had the sad duty of pulling this charter. It evoked real emotion and personal happiness to re-light that flame.

The alumni that I have met and worked with throughout my tenure are so impressive. They represent the best that this fraternity stands for. You will find them always giving — giving of time, patience, zealous energy, wisdom and even money. Whether it's to plan a Founders Day, coach a student leader, help with an expansion proposal, or endow an excellence award, our alumni are a constant force for good. They never forget the focus on the undergraduate brother, but in the process they widen and deepen contemporary friendships while building new bonds with younger students sometimes many years their junior. The chapter advisors, assistant advisors, house corporation and alumni association officers — these are today's heroes for Pi Kappa Alpha. Our undergraduates and international officers owe endless thanks to these men.

Have a great summer! May the flame of phi phi kappa alpha remain with you always.

### Executive Vice President Announces Changes, Additions to Headquarters Staff

This issue of the *Shield & Diamond* marks several changes in the magazine's staff. Timothy J. McNary (*Kansas, Beta Gamma '85*) left staff May 25 to take a management position in the public relations department of the American Osteopathic Association in Chicago. McNary had served the Fraternity as editor/director of communications since 1991. During his tenure McNary brought a wealth of attention to the *Shield & Diamond* through his speaking at conferences, meetings and interviews with alumni, and participation in interfraternal associations. McNary left his mark on the publications of the Fraternity by editing the revisions of both the *Garnet and Gold* and *The Oak: A History of Pi Kappa Alpha* in addition to updating the appendices of the two books. McNary will also be remembered for spearheading the initiative to renew the *Shield & Diamond* Endowment Fund to insure the future of the magazine.

As a result of McNary's departure, some restructuring has taken place that gives two veteran staff members increased responsibilities in the Fraternity's communications department. Effective June 1, Kevin E. Virta (*Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83*) became the Fraternity's executive director/editor and Barbara E. Perkins became director of communications/managing editor.

Executive Vice President Raymond L. Orians (*Memphis, Delta Zeta '66*) explained the formation of the two new positions:

"This restructuring was allowed primarily because of Tim McNary's excellent job in upgrading all of our publications to a quality we are confident we can maintain. Beyond that, with the recent duties assumed by Ralph Simon (*Central Florida, Eta Phi '89*) in the accounts receivable area and other minor shifting of the executive director's duties to other staff, the executive director should have sufficient time to continue our publications in the manner which you have come to expect. We have filled these positions with two seasoned veterans, Virta having eight years of experience and Perkins having ten years of experience on the staff."

Leaving the expansion staff is Christopher S. Hough (*Pittsburgh, Gamma Sigma '89*). Hough had served as an expansion consultant in 1992-93 and returned to the Memorial Headquarters staff in June 1994 to serve in the same capacity. As a part of Pi Kappa Alpha's 1994-95 expansion team, Hough's experience was invaluable. He was instrumental in establishing PiKA colo-

nies at the University of the Pacific, California State University-San Bernardino, State University of New York at Albany, and the University of Maine.

#### Consultants Hired for 1995-96 Year

Executive Vice President Ray Orians also announces the hiring of four new consultants for the 1995-96 academic year.

Mark C. Dziatczak is a 1991 initiate of Delta Nu Chapter at Wayne State University. He graduated with a bachelor of science degree in applied physics with a minor in math and is certified in the state of Michigan to teach physics and math in secondary schools.

Dziatczak served his chapter as SMC, ThC, SC, rush chairman, and membership educator. He also served the Fraternity as an undergraduate vice president on the Supreme Council in 1993-94.

On campus Dziatczak was involved in WSU Student Council, and the Lead On Program. He was a WSU diplomat, and was named WSU Outstanding Leader in 1994.

Tom Larsen joins the Headquarters Staff from Delta Gamma Chapter at Miami University-Ohio. Larsen received a bachelor of arts degree in arts and sciences with a major in history. He was initiated in 1992 and went on to serve his chapter as SMC, risk manager, house manager, and homecoming chairman.

Larsen was active in the Miami University IFC, having served as member on the governing board and playing an active role in the revision of that group's alcohol policy. He is a member of the Pre-Law Society. In 1994 he received the Outstanding Greek Senior Award.

Jeremy McKelroy was initiated into Delta Theta Chapter at Arkansas State University in 1990. He graduated from Arkansas State with a bachelor of science degree in zoology.

McKelroy was involved on campus as a student government association senator for two years. He was chairman of the financial aid committee.

In his chapter, McKelroy was involved at all levels. He served as SMC, IMC, and alumni relations chairman. He also was a two-term rush chairman.

Jeffrey C. Rohwer graduated from the University of California-Berkeley with bachelor of arts degree in economics with a minor in forestry and resource studies. He was initiated into Alpha Sigma Chapter in 1991 where he went on to become SMC, SC, pledge educator, and historian. Rohwer served the international fraternity as a member of the 1994 nominating committee and as an undergraduate vice president on the Supreme Council in 1994-95.

On campus, Rohwer was a member of the IFC/CPA Greek Judicial Committee, and a delegate to the Interfraternity President's Council. He is a volunteer for the U.S. Peace Corps., and the City of Berkeley Department of Parks and Recreation. In 1994 he was awarded the Greek Man of the Year by Chancellor's Committee on University/Greek Relations.

These four new consultants will join returning consultants Nick LeRoy (*Utah, Alpha Tau '90*), Blake Monroe (*Texas-Arlington, Eta Upsilon '93*), and Jef Meletio (*Winthrop, Theta Sigma '91*).

Max G. Holland III (*Georgia Southern, Iota Upsilon '93*) will serve another year as expansion consultant. He will be joined by Shad D. Williams (*Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '90*) who is completing a year of travel as a chapter consultant. □

# New Mexico State University Becomes Kappa Eta Chapter

On March 25, 1995, Pi Kappa Alpha began the spring by adding yet another chapter to its illustrious ranks with the installation of Kappa Eta Chapter at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces. Initiations were conducted by teams from Beta Delta Chapter at the University of New Mexico and Gamma Delta Chapter at the University of Arizona. Saturday evening's installation banquet was highlighted by International President F. Anderson Morse's (*William & Mary, Gamma '76*) keynote address. Also on hand for the festivities were Rockies Regional President John P. Malik (*Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '85*), Director of Expansion Steven S. Vincent (*Missouri-Columbia, Alpha Nu '83*), past Expansion Consultant Jeffrey S. Brown (*Southern Illinois, Iota Mu '90*) and past Chapter Consultant Joseph P. Egan (*Central Florida, Eta Phi '89*). For Brown and Egan, it was their first return to Las Cruces since they coordinated the colonization in October 1993. To commemorate the historic weekend, Kappa Eta presented the Fraternity with a beautifully etched Nombé wine coaster.

## Kappa Eta History

The Pi Kappa Alpha Colony at New Mexico State University was founded on October 24, 1993, through the efforts of Brown and Egan. Several sources were utilized in order to find likely candidates. These sources included the five national sororities on campus, coaches, faculty and staff members.

Members of Beta Delta Chapter at the University of New Mexico and Gamma Delta Chapter at the University of Arizona made the trip to Las Cruces to pin the colony members. In the spring semester of 1994, the colony continued its growth. In order to help facilitate management and operations, the colony sent Todd J. Cover to the 1994 Chapter Presidents Conference and the 1994 International Convention.

The NMSU colony also set out to help the surrounding community through events such as weekly meal service and cleaning at the Gospel Rescue Mission, and the first annual Pi Kappa Alpha Bowl-a-Thon, where the colony contacted local businesses and organizations

for cash donations and pledges to be donated to the Rape Crisis Center.


One of the first things organized for Fall 1994 was an on-campus goal setting retreat. In this retreat, the colony addressed its progress. One of the areas of focus was community service. Through weekly work at the Gospel Rescue Mission, a highway clean-up project and a tremendous individual effort on the part of all the members, 2,000 community service hours were accumulated.

In scholarship, the NMSU Pikes had the highest overall and average GPA for the semester. The colony also developed its first alumni newsletter. This was accompanied with the NMSU Pikes' first alumni event. One of the colony's biggest successes in the fall semester was a surprisingly strong showing in the formal IFC rush. Through rush, the colony was able to enlist 22 new members into the colony (the largest received through formal rush). Much of this success was due to careful planning on the part of the rush chairman, a strong individual effort on the part of the colony members and the innovative use of the Zeta Tau Alpha house for a formal rush party. This event marked the first time that a sorority house was used as a location for an IFC rush event, and has since been imitated by other fraternities on campus.

At the end of the semester, focus turned towards academics. A study room was provided for members for four hours a night for the three nights prior to finals week.

At the beginning of the spring semester, Michael E. Wolf attended the 1995 Chapter Presidents Conference. This event was followed by a retreat in the mountains of Ruidoso, New Mexico. At this retreat, a number of goals were set for the semester. In spring rush, the Pikes made another strong showing. Although this rush didn't generate nearly the numbers that fall rush did, Pi Kappa Alpha's NMSU colony was able to enlist the seven finest men going through rush and once again have the largest new member class on campus.

The colony continued to pursue activities in the Greek community on campus, including a second place finish in the Greek 3-point shooting contest. Members also exhibited their distinction as campus leaders by representation in the Order of Omega and in Greek Week activities.

## NMSU Greek System

New Mexico State University's Greek system began in 1928 with the establishment of a chapter of Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority. In 1934, Tau Kappa Epsilon became the first fraternity to charter a group on the NMSU campus. Today, there are 12 fraternities and four sororities at NMSU.

## NMSU History

In February 1889, the 28th New Mexico Territorial Legislature established the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts as a land-grant college. In 1960, the growth and maturity of the institution were formally recognized when the New Mexico Constitution was amended to change the name of the institution to New Mexico State University. Since 1963, the institution has held preliminary to full accreditation status, at the doctoral level, by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

## Zeta Iota Chapter Rechartered At Old Dominion University

On the morning of April 15, 1995, 103 gentlemen were accepted into Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity as brothers of the re-founded Zeta Iota Chapter at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. The chartering banquet was held at the Norfolk Marriott. The Pikes set a new precedent for Greeks at ODU by inviting family members to share in this festive occasion.

During the banquet, a splendid dinner was served, followed by the presentation of speakers. Chapter President Michael G. Pleasants thanked all those involved in making the recolonization a reality. Faculty Advisor Charles Booth thanked the Fraternity for allowing him the opportunity to work with the colony. Mindy MacNeil, ODU's Greek advisor, outlined the colony's quest for chapter status. Also in attendance were Founders Regional President R. Russell Alexander (*Northern Kentucky, Eta Rho '78*), Director of Expansion Steven S. Vincent and International President F. Anderson Morse. Aside from delivering a stirring keynote address, Morse also served as a member of the alumni installation team.

Unfortunately, past Expansion Consultant Jeffrey S. Brown and past Chapter Consultant Hap H. Deneen (*California-Santa Barbara, Iota Kappa '90*) were unable to attend the festivities. Brown and Deneen were sent by Vincent in 1993 to establish a PiKA colony at ODU. These two men successfully accomplished their task, recruiting 52 men into the colony. Two other gentlemen, Anthony M. Zontini (*Zeta Iota '66*) and David M. Eck (*Toledo, Epsilon Epsilon '88*), who also played prominent roles in the rechartering of Zeta Iota, were able to attend the banquet. These alumni took time out of their busy schedules to devote themselves to assisting and teaching the colony members the appropriate way of conducting a top fraternity. Following the speeches and the presentation of awards, the brotherhood rose to pay tribute to PiKA by singing of "Down in Ol' Virginny".

Zeta Iota has truly become a "family" experience for its members. A number of ODU Pikes have served or are serving in the armed forces. One Pike was going through training in Quantico, Virginia last summer. As his graduation from Officers Candidate School

was nearing, he learned that his father would be unable to attend his graduation due to illness. Witnessing this situation, a number of ODU Pikes got up at 5:00 a.m. and drove three hours to attend the graduation. In February, this Pike's father passed away as a result of the illness. Again, the Pike family was there. On the night of the chartering banquet, this Pike had the time of his life, and as the night progressed, he often reflected on this huge family of brothers he had gained through his membership in Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.

### Zeta Iota History

The early days of Zeta Iota's recolonization began in December 1993 as the members established colony objectives and began to learn more about each other in the process. When the ODU Pikes returned from winter break they worked to further their identity on campus. They developed a social calendar, athletic teams, committees, and began the task of rush. Soon, the colony stood at 72 members and was on its way to becoming the largest fraternity at ODU. Aside from excellence in rush, social activities and athletics, the Pikes got their first taste of community service. The colony members answered phones at the WHRO (PBS) telethon and raised money for Operation Smile. The colony also devoted much of its first full semester to establishing a solid alumni relations program.

When the colony returned in Fall 1995, it continued its winning ways in rush. 33 men were pledged into the colony. Academics were given priority status during the fall as the colony adopted its first written scholarship policy.

The spring semester found the colony focusing its attention on its March 19 inspection. Handling the inspection was Expansion Consultant Max G. Holland III (*Georgia Southern, Iota Upsilon '93*), Founders Regional President R. Russell Alexander, and representatives from Epsilon Mu Chapter at East Carolina University and Iota Zeta Chapter at Randolph Macon College. The colony passed inspection and Zeta Iota was approved for rechartering after nearly a ten-year absence from the Old Dominion campus.

### ODU Greek System

There are 16 men's organizations at ODU. 12 of these groups are members of the IFC and four are members of the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC). Of the 10 women's organizations, four belong to the National Pan-Hellenic Council and six groups are members of the National Panhellenic Council (NPC). Approximately ten percent of ODU's 16,423 students are members of the Greek community.

### Old Dominion History

Old Dominion University was formally established in 1930 as the Norfolk Division of the College of William and Mary. In 1954 the school was authorized to offer baccalaureate programs. In 1962, the institution gained its independence from William and Mary as a result of legislative action. The school was then named Old Dominion College. Then, in 1968, the name was changed to Old Dominion University, effective September 1, 1969.

## Pike Chapters Conclude '94-'95 Academic Year

### **Θ** THETA CHAPTER Rhodes College

Founders Day at Theta was an exciting event as chapter members were joined by alumni to celebrate the occasion. Founders Day activities included a softball game that featured upperclassmen and alumni competing against a team of new initiates. The event was followed by a barbecue dinner. In other chapter news, community service continued to be a significant part of Theta. Community Service Chairman J. Frank Day IV worked in conjunction with Athletics Chairman Duane J. Robichaux in the planning of a Theta-sponsored sports camp for Snowden Elementary School. Several Rhodes Pikes have also been involved in a neighborhood soup kitchen.

On campus, Pikes have stepped into many leadership positions with the student government. Scott S. Brown is student government assembly president; and J. Frank Day, Jordan D. Schniper and Tony Martin gained judicial and legislative positions. The PiKA intermediate softball team has enjoyed some success on the diamond. Theta was also represented in spring varsity athletics with members competing in track and baseball.

### **M** MU CHAPTER Presbyterian College

Mu has devoted much of its community service efforts to helping find a cure for Lou Gehrig's Disease. To aid this cause, the chapter has held car washes since the beginning of the semester. At the 1995 Founders Regional Leadership Conference, Mu was awarded the region's community service award.

In the area of campus involvement, many Presbyterian Pikes are involved in football and track. This summer, three Mu Pikes will be attending ROTC training camp. Two PiKAs have also been selected for Airborne school.

### **O** OMICRON CHAPTER University of Richmond

Omicron can boast of an extremely productive and successful year. The chapter was well on its way to its fourteenth intramural championship in sixteen years. They were also the 1994 Greek Week champions as the recipients of the highest GPA of all fraternities at Richmond. On campus, Pikes are involved in Richmond's senate, IFC, intramural committee, judicial and honor councils as well as var-

sity athletics. Omicron's 12 Division I varsity athletes include Todd D. Morris, who led the CAA soccer teams in scoring; Robert S. Horton, soccer captain and first team South Atlantic Academic All-American; Clifford J. Harbourt, swimming captain and one of the top ten butterflyers in the CAA; and Patrick M. Campbell, who finished in the top ten in the Richmond Marathon.

### **AA** ALPHA ALPHA CHAPTER Duke University


Alpha Alpha bid farewell to an exceptional senior class this spring. Jonathan D. Lamb and Peter A. Kottke will receive commissions in the U.S. Navy and J. Whitten Wright will receive a commission in the U.S. Army. Jeremy L. Godwin and Drew O. Muzslay finished outstanding wrestling careers at Duke. Paul A. Friedman graduated with honors and will be attending Harvard University Law School.

In community service, 30 percent of the chapter donated blood during the American Red Cross blood drive. Six Pikes are also heavily involved in tutoring at Triangle Day, a Durham elementary school. The chapter also raised over \$300 for the grade school by selling serenades and roses on Valentine's Day. In cooperation with the Duke IFC and Panhellenic council, the Duke Pikes participated in efforts to beautify the campus. Vice President James P. Walsh helped form a council with the rest of the groups living in PiKA's quadrangle. Alexis Wolf was elected Duke's IFC President this year. Russ Fusco was elected IFC chairman for special events, and was a key figure in planning rape awareness seminars for all fraternity and sorority pledges. Ryan S. Henriquez was elected a Duke student government representative. J. Whitten Wright was battalion commander of Army ROTC. Christopher J. Heckel qualified for the NCAA wrestling championships. Five Duke Pikes competed in the Atlantic Coast Conference swimming tourney. Three Alpha Alpha members are also on the Duke rugby team.

This semester's social and membership development committees unified the chapter more unified with their introduction of weekly cookouts and football games. Todd Albright worked with the chapter's residential advisor, Rob King to form a fellowship group. To strengthen Alpha Alpha even further, the chapter is pledging 17 new members.

Alpha Epsilon was also in contention for the President's Cup (the intramural championship trophy for fraternities) thanks to impressive showings in softball and track.


ter house that is double the size of the previous chapter house.

**WESTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY COLONY**



Ray’s my friend and my Brother and my life has been immeasurably enriched as a result. The amazing thing is that there are untold numbers of Brothers across the nation who could pay similar tribute, for Ray has provided a quarter century of outstanding leadership to our Fraternity, seemingly one Brother at a time.

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The measure of his impact on our lives lies both in our personal experiences — who among us doesn't have a "Ray Story" — and the fact that over the past 25 years, during which Ray, more than anyone else, has been a constant, PiKA has attained a status among college fraternities reserved for the very, very best.

So thanks, Ray, for being my Brother and, from all of us, for committing your life to our beloved PiKA.

This year, Pi Kappa Alpha's executive vice president celebrates his twenty-fifth year of employment with Pi Kappa Alpha. Such longevity is rare, and Raymond L. Orians (Memphis, Delta Zeta '66) has a record of service unmatched in the Greek world. *Shield & Diamond* asked Orians and his friends to look back over his 25 years with Pi Kappa Alpha.

**S&D:** How did you get associated with Pi Kappa Alpha as an undergraduate at Memphis State?

**RLO:** I had every intention of pledging Kappa Alpha Order. After all, all my older high school buddies were members there. But, fortunately, I decided not to go through formal rush. Open rush provided me the opportunity to get to know members of various fraternities in a more relaxed atmosphere. One PiKA member in particular, a scholastic all-American football player, took me under his wing and made it a point to introduce me to practically every member in the house. I was impressed not only with him, but also with the many members of different backgrounds, who obviously had a common bond and goals. All of a sudden, the choice became easy.

**S&D:** As an undergraduate, what were your early impressions of fraternity life?

**RLO:** Being the oldest of nine children, of course, I was the first to go to college. I needed and wanted an extension of my family life back home. The chapter members immediately provided that. I also wanted to be a leader and confidant of my brothers, maybe too quickly. But after some guidance from the older brothers, that eventually came. My undergraduate Fraternity experience was so rewarding that I will always be indebted to Pi Kappa Alpha.

**S&D:** What led you to working part-time at the Memorial Headquarters in 1966? Was this when you first thought about working for PiKA after college?

**RLO:** To be honest, I needed the money. My parents couldn't afford college tuition, less than \$100 per semester in those days. I also wanted to live in the chapter house. That was where one could enjoy fraternity life to the fullest. The thought of working for PiKA following college never entered my mind. It was only as graduation grew near that I realized the many challenges which PiKA offered and I became interested.

**S&D:** What was your first position as a full time staff member?

**RLO:** Director of Housing and Finance.

**S&D:** When did you realize that you would make a long term commitment to the organization?

**RLO:** Probably a year or two after Pat Halloran became the chief executive. Pat was a heck of a leader, developed an outstanding staff, and we all believed in being a successful and winning team. He made a long term commitment to PiKA and to his staff. I thought I could do the same. Then as I developed PiKA friends across the country, it was an easy commitment to make.

**S&D:** Do you deal with issues today that you never envisioned back in 1970? Do you try to anticipate issues the Fraternity may have to address down the road? If so, what are they?

**RLO:** The issues are the same, just disguised from time to time. For example, our chapters never heard of the term "risk management" 15 years ago, much less in 1970. Yet PiKA was losing more chapters in 1970 because they did not manage risks. Rush has always been a critical issue and is no doubt our lifeblood. Housing is quickly becoming critical if only because most of our houses were built 25 to 35 years ago. The need for a good chapter house maintenance program is already a vital necessity.

In answer to the second part of your question, yes, I try to anticipate future issues but only with experienced input from our international officers and staff. An immediate issue is our alumni. We need more alumni programming and support. We are poised now and have the resources to make tremendous strides in that area. Secondly, and probably most importantly, our image will become a bigger issue with society as a whole, probably because of our secrecy and male membership as much as behavior. People are generally suspicious of secret organizations and we are one of the last bastions of the all-male club. For example, I read in the *Wall Street Journal* recently that the Shriners, who have a fair amount of respect, have lost over 300,000 members or 32% of their membership in the last 15 years. They attributed their losses to these same reasons. Not that we should change, but we will need to address these issues. The answer might simply be getting more into the public relations game. That

could be difficult to do alone because the issue involves every social fraternity and sorority. Perhaps a place to start would be for every member, undergraduate and alumnus, who believes in fraternity, to convince his relatives, friends and neighbors of the value of fraternity life, especially the PiKA experience. The highest compliments I ever receive are when non-Greek parents tell me how much the Fraternity helped their sons to become successful gentlemen.

**S&D:** You've been involved with undergraduates in four different decades. Are there extreme differences, or are they more alike than people may realize?

**RLO:** They are more alike than people realize. The basic values are there. To be frank, many of our institutions have become less tolerant and many parents and alumni have become more tolerant. That confuses our undergraduates. It is a great challenge to try to influence various segments of our society to deal with our undergraduates in a consistent way from one case to the next. They want the guidance just like they did four decades ago. And they will generally respond in a positive manner if treated in a fair and adult fashion.

**S&D:** After 11 years as executive vice president and 15 years as director of housing, have you altered your approach to the job?

**RLO:** It was a fairly tough transition to go from a two-person housing staff where most things were tangible with measurable results to managing several people with many different programs, some of which don't provide measurable results. I had to alter my approach quickly to become a good listener to our various national officers and allow more freedom for our staff to create. I would say my role is one of a motivator: holding staff accountable, while also trying my best to make sure we do not make the same mistake twice.

**S&D:** When you became EVP in 1984, did you have a game plan for the direction of the Fraternity?

**RLO:** Primarily, it was to assemble and develop the best staff in the fraternity world. It's amazing what can be done when you don't settle for second best. Secondly, the biggest issue then was legal liability, something that threatened our very existence. I knew we had to find a way to obtain blanket liability coverage which would not be cost prohibitive for all of our chapters and alumni groups. But more importantly, we had to establish a comprehensive and effective risk management education program.

**S&D:** In the fraternity world, there is some pretty high turnover at your level. What is it that keeps bringing you back?

**RLO:** Did I ever leave? I tried a few times when I was director of housing if only for my family's sake. But my PiKA friends kept bringing me back. Not because they were personal friends, which they are, but because they sincerely believed in the Fraternity and what I might do for it. And I have always recognized that the Fra-

ternity belongs to its members and volunteer leaders, who are much more intelligent than I am. Those who think differently have a hard time succeeding in this business.

**S&D:** *As an undergraduate, was there an individual who inspired you to become so dedicated to PiKA?*

**RLO:** Our local house corporation president, Bob T. Williams, because of his love for the Fraternity and his work ethic....

**S&D:** *Have you had individuals act as mentors for you during your years on staff?*

**RLO:** Garth Grissom, the first national president I ever met, because of his uncanny ability to get everyone around him to agree quickly with what needed to be done. I have already mentioned Pat Halloran. Richard Ralph, our housing commission chairman for 20 years, because of his decision-making ability and his progressive attitudes toward the Fraternity. (He'll disagree with the latter.) And, of course, the last seven presidents with whom I have worked directly — Joe Turner, Bill LaForge, Gary Menchhofer, Ed Pease, Jerry Askew,

Tommy Turner and current president Andy Morse. They have taught me valuable lessons. The list goes on—but you probably don't have space.

**S&D:** *Your family obviously means a lot to you. Has it been difficult at times, serving the needs of the Fraternity while being a husband and father?*

**RLO:** To say the least. It's a hard balancing act and sometimes I don't know how my wife, Paige, puts up with me. But I think John Candy said it best in the movie *Planes, Trains, and Automobiles*, "like your job, love your wife." I can say one thing, if it wasn't for my wife and children, I wouldn't be here. They know how much fun I have at my job, and they enjoy the same fun. They have made many PiKA friends as well. Their support has been more than I could ever ask or expect.

**S&D:** *Did you see undergraduates differently when your own children approached that age? And have your own children given you additional insight on the current undergraduate perspective?*

**RLO:** Not really. Paige is an elementary school teacher, so she taught them young. Being associated with undergraduates, it was easy for me to communicate with them especially as they became teenagers. But it's not all peaches and cream, as any parent will tell you, and in our case time will still tell. The true test is if your children are still your best friends when they fully mature. We are confident they always will be. My daughter, Aileen, is grown and my son, Jeff, is a year from college. The main insight which both reaffirmed in me is the need to belong to a small group of friends with common goals who will support each other. That seems more true today than ever. I'll admit, though, both Paige and I were a little startled when the first poster our daughter hung on her college dormitory wall was that of a tiger captioned "support wildlife, throw a party." Some things never change.

**S&D:** *When you think about 25 years as a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha staff, what's the first thing that comes to your mind?*

**RLO:** Friendship, love and truth. □

# The Fraternity at War:



Louis H. Wilson, Jr.  
(Millsaps, Alpha Iota '39)

“As Commanding Officer of Company F in action against the enemy Japanese forces at Fonte Hill, Guam, Captain Louis H. Wilson, Jr. (Millsaps College, Alpha Iota '39) initiated his attack in mid-afternoon, pushed up the rugged, open terrain against terrific machine-gun and rifle fire for 300 yards and fully captured his objective. Promptly assuming command of other disorganized units, he organized his night defenses in the face of continuous hostile fire and, although wounded three times during the five-hour period, completed his disposition of men and guns before retiring to the company command post for medical attention. Shortly thereafter, he voluntarily rejoined his besieged units and repeatedly exposed himself to the merciless hail of shrapnel and bullets, dashing fifty yards into the open to rescue a wounded Marine. Fighting fiercely in hand-to-hand encounters, he led his men in furiously waged battle for approximately ten hours, tenaciously holding his line and repelling the fanatically renewed counterthrusts until he succeeded in crushing the last efforts of the hard-pressed Japanese early in the following morning. Then, organizing a seventeen-man patrol, he immediately advanced upon a strategic slope essential to the security of his position and, boldly defying intense mortar, machine-gun and rifle fire which struck down thirteen of his men, drove relentlessly forward with the remnants of his patrol to seize the vital ground. By his indomitable leadership, daring combat tactics and dauntless valor in the face of overwhelming odds, Captain Wilson succeeded in capturing and holding the strategic high ground in his regimental sector, thereby contributing essentially to the success of his regimental mission....”

Thus reads the text of the Congressional Medal of Honor awarded to General Louis H. Wilson in a much more peaceful moment on the White House lawn on October 5, 1945. President Harry S. Truman presented the medal to Brother Wilson, who served as the 26th commandant of the Marine Corps from July 1975 until July 1979.

Born on February 11, 1920 in Brandon, Missouri, Wilson graduated from Millsaps College in 1941 and received a regular commission in the United States Marine Corps. He attended one of the earliest Marine Corps officer candidate schools and was commissioned a second lieutenant in November 1941.

In February 1943, Wilson went overseas as a company commander with the 9th Marines and participated in the Guadalcanal, Efate, Bougainville, Northern Solomons and Guam operations. It was during the assault on Guam, on July 25 and 26, 1944, that he earned the nation's highest honor for heroism in combat.

General Wilson has received many other honors throughout his career. Among these are an honorary doctor of laws degree from Millsaps and Pi Kappa Alpha's Distinguished Achievement Award in 1946. He was inducted into the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation's Order of West Range on October 20, 1990.



During the years 1941 through 1945, the pages of the *Shield & Diamond* were filled with reports of the brothers who were serving their country in the largest war of the twentieth century. With almost every able bodied man in uniform, the news of the Fraternity was the news of war.

Members of Pi Kappa Alpha familiar with the history of the Fraternity during World War II know of the critical leadership that Roy D. Hickman (*New Mexico, Beta Delta '22*) provided during the difficult days of the War.

Following a stint as the national alumni secretary, he was elected national president of Pi Kappa Alpha in 1940.

# Our Alumni Remember



**Roy D. Hickman**  
(New Mexico,  
Beta Delta '22)

Hickman served during World War II as a lieutenant colonel in the Ordnance Department of the U.S. Army. Through the turbulent days of the War, he was a constant presence, serving as national president for six years. As members of the Supreme Council were called to active military duty, he immediately brought in Freeman H. Hart (Hampden-Sydney, Iota '28), author of *A History of Pi Kappa Alpha* and immediate past national president, to assume the role of executive secretary.

In 1942, the Supreme Council established two objectives: secure the finances of the Fraternity and ensure the continued operation of chapters. Under Hickman's guidance, the Supreme Council accomplished both objectives. At the Fraternity's 1946 Victory Convention at Mackinac Island, the Council was able to report to the assembled delegates that the Fraternity had a surplus of \$50,000 in the General Fund at the end of the War and two new chapters had been installed: Delta Alpha at George Washington University and Delta Beta at Bowling Green University.

In a letter to Robert D. Lynn in 1968, A. Leo Hoegh (Iowa, Gamma Nu '29), who had been the first member of the Supreme Council called into military service during World War II, recalled the importance of Hickman's national presidency during the War years.

"Roy was a great leader.... His dedication, loyalty, and aggressive leadership contributed to the strengthening of Pi Kappa Alpha. We were fortunate to have him during the trying times of World War II."



Virgil R. McBroom (Illinois, Beta Eta '25) is another Pike VIP who saw active duty:

"In 1925-29, I served three years of ROTC cavalry at the University of Illinois.

Due to this experience I received a commission of Lt. GG in the Navy after Pearl Harbor.

I took Naval training for three months in 1942 at Dartmouth College. After training I was attached to the Navy Air Force and sent to naval air station in St. Louis, MO, where the pilots were trained. I was appointed as administrative aide to the commanding officer, Capt. Greene. Later that year, Capt. Greene received orders to the South Pacific and asked Naval personnel to trans-

fer me with him. Personnel denied his request, stating I was needed by the new Captain Premo, later the same request was made by Capt. Premo as he was sent to Alaska. He also asked for me but again I was to stay with the new Capt. Fuller.

Finally, in the summer of 1944, I asked for transfer and was sent to Puerto Rico, as aide to the commandant of the 10th Naval District. I was promoted lieutenant senior grade in 1944.

I was privileged to visit every island from Puerto Rico to Rio de Janero in South America to take a census of all Navy equipment.

I was promoted to lieutenant commander in 1945. After the war ended in August, 1945, our duty was to provide patrol of the Caribbean and take possession of all German subs and crews as prisoners, relaying them from Puerto Rico to prison camps in Florida. All German subs had orders to emerge and anchor until picked up. I was amazed to find out that two of the sub commanders had graduated from our schools (the Universities of Dayton and Cincinnati). The crews were mostly teenagers, the last males available for duty.

Our 10th Naval District Headquarters in San Juan had jurisdiction over sub-bases in St. Thomas, air stations in Trinidad, Martinique, Rio de Janero and the training base on Vieques Island. I was placed on inactive, retired duty on February 26, 1968 after 20 years of active reserve.

I believe I may be the only past national president to have had so many years of military duty."

John H. "Duck" Neal (*North Carolina, Tau '46*) provided this photo of a parachute jump made on one of the drop zones at the Parachute School, Fort Benning, Georgia during WWII. Fort Benning was the only official "Jump School" for the Parachute troops. However, troop commanders set up so-called schools all over the world when replacements were needed. And, of course, replacements were needed by the thousands in the Parachute Infantry regiments due to casualties. During WWII, Neal was with the 511th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 11th Airborne Division from December 1942 through December 1945 in North Carolina, Georgia, Louisiana, New Guinea, The Philippines and Okinawa. He was with the first contingent of troops to occupy Japan in 1945, flying in to Atsugi in August. Neal pledged Pi Kappa Alpha in early 1941 but was not initiated until early 1946 when he returned to the University of North Carolina.

E. E. Jebousek (*Iowa, Gamma Nu '39*) sent a photo reminiscent of many taken during the War of soldiers and their loved ones. He said, "I entered the U.S. Navy in May, 1944; served aboard the USS *Corvus*-AKA-26 for a year; made invasion of Okinawa Easter Sunday; loaded the 71 U.S. Army ordnance personnel at Seattle, Washington June 15 and proceeded to Tinian Island where the 71 men assembled the atomic bombs.

Having completed that task of prime importance, our further accomplishments were quite routine. I was discharged in 1946 at Terminal Island, California and returned to purchasing and continuing publication of *The Conrad Record*, in Conrad, Iowa. I sometimes wonder if our sacrifices have been appreciated in view of the terrible moral condition of our tottering world!"

Jack Johnson (*Southern Methodist, Beta Zeta '36*) served 3½ years with the 8th Air Force, and with his degrees from S.M.U. in both English and journalism, he qualified as an "army correspondent" with the 8th Air Force. This included the span of over 100 airdromes in the East Anglia area of Great Britain, from Norwich on the East to Oxford on the West, Kings Lynn on the north to Canterbury on the South.

Millions of American youth sent to air bases in East Anglia performed duties as everything from office workers to maintenance men on aircraft, and as pilots and teams of men manning aircraft.

In the "after duty" hours and strictly not on Air Force time, Johnson started an entertaining show. It was established at the American base at RAF Honington, near Cambridge. For over three years, a group of 20 men would go to the large and small English towns such as Diss, Eye, Great Yarmouth, Oxford, Ipswich, etc. to present the hour's show, "Victory Varieties". Its reap from ticket sales provided funds for three London orphans to be schooled and educated until their 18th birthday. In all three cases, the parents of the children were killed in the London Blitz.

The show was set up by Johnson and he handled the bookings at the various venues, and in addition played the piano as a part of the show. It was a tremendous success among the British audiences.

In the winter of 1944, Johnson was assigned to be driven to a headquarters base, Milton Ernest, to meet, interview and photograph the popular Glenn Miller.

The assignment was easy, completed and the "bid farewells" were made; Miller was driven to a nearby operations base, Brentwood (he asked at noon if he could hop a flight in a plane scheduled to leave after lunch); the plane taxied down the runway and has never been seen to this date. Glenn Miller was gone.

Morison Buck (*Rhodes College, Theta '41*) took the opportunity to remember an old friend while recalling the war years:

"At 71 and having the good fortune to live a long time, I feel somewhat like a museum piece, and thanks to your generous invitation, that destiny seems assured. Please give old friend, Dave Jolly, my best wishes. He and I go back a long way.

I am sending a breezy looking snapshot made sometime in 1944 during my 33 month stint in what was then called Army Air Corps. Luckily for me, I remained in the States throughout in the air cadet training program. Dave, unless I am mistaken, was a real soldier with a real affection for the military from boyhood. I later became a reserve officer in Army JAG Corps, retiring at lieutenant colonel in 1971. After many years of practicing law in Tampa, I served as circuit court judge, retiring four years ago.

Good luck on your project at the Memorial Headquar-

ters. My later father, J. M. Buck (*Tennessee-Knoxville, Zeta '10*) was one of those in the forefront working to have the Memorial Headquarters located in Memphis."



**D**ave Jolly, Jr. (*Rhodes College, Theta '42*) recalled a hair-raising incident from his army days:

"This is the helmet I went overseas with and brought back from there in September 1944.

On/about the 25th of April 1944, I was on Anzio Beachhead as a member of Cannon Co. 30th Infantry Regiment. We were in positions supporting the line companies and I had been bathing in the steel helmet and got ready to bed down for the night in a dugout I shared with another soldier. I neglected to reassemble the steel helmet with the plastic helmet liner (which I had left above ground on the edge of our dugout). During the night the Germans shelled our area with the nearest shells exploding within 10 yards of my dugout. Upon emerging from the dugout the following morning, I found that a German shell fragment had shot a ragged rectangular hole through the frontal area of the helmet liner. The steel

helmet itself (being in the dugout with me) was untouched.

We made our breakout from the beachhead on/about the 27th of May, 1944 and fought our way towards Highway 6 leading to Rome. About 28-29 May, we were in the vicinity of Cisterna di Littoria and stopped for the evening. On the north side of the roadway, we set up positions and prepared to spend the night. I looked across the ravine to the north and spotted a huge

cherry tree, loaded with the biggest, ripest, most juicy looking big Bing cherries I have ever seen.

Being a normal, hungry, GI enlisted man, I carefully went down the edge of the ravine, watching for mines and booby traps and up the other side. I parked my steel helmet and rifle at the foot of the tree and took the helmet liner as a berry bucket and up the tree I went.

There wasn't supposed to be any Germans within 20 miles of here... So much for that erroneous supposition.

I had gotten well situated about 20 feet up the tree and was alternately eating some of those fabulous cherries and putting others in my helmet liner/berry bucket, held over the crook of my arm by the chin strap and thinking of nothing more than filling it up and going back to the company area and gorging myself.

Well, one German had apparently gotten run off and left behind by his buddies and he decided to 'get himself a Yank'.

The first thing I know is a tug at the helmet liner and the sound of a shot. I look at the liner and see cherry juice dripping from it and immediately make a very smart decision — I dropped out of the tree...

Then I ran like hell (oh, I did grab my rifle). I had no idea where the German was, other than a general direction and I had no intention of giving anyone another clear shot at me.

Bushes gave me cover as I departed the vicinity rapidly; I got fired at again as I passed a gap in the hedge line; I took cover just past that point and waited, watching just above the ground to see if I could spot my enemy.

The German apparently didn't like the game any better than I did at this time and I could hear him running away, and some bushes moving. I fired a couple of shots at the movement and he took off even faster.

After he had gotten out of earshot, I went back to the tree, got my steel helmet, plastic helmet liner, picked up all of the spilled cherries and went back to the company area to eat my dinner.

Believe me, it's a lot easier to buy them at the store nowadays.

You will note that the bullet holes are extremely clean, dead center from side to side just beside where the chin strap clipped onto the plastic liner.

Angled shots (see the fragment holes) tend to be ragged, but bullet holes at right angles were very clean.

My helmet liner, fortunately for me, wasn't on my head on either occasion."



**A**t the end of President Bill Clinton's 1995 State of the Union address, he honored Jack H. Lucas (*High Point University, Delta Psi '56*) as the youngest U.S. Marine ever and the youngest person this century to win the Medal of Honor.

At Iwo Jima, Lucas fell on two Japanese grenades to save his comrades. The date was February 20, 1945, and Lucas was 17 years old.

"I saw a lot of people get killed around me," Lucas said, "The only thing you could do to survive was to keep fighting. You were there to stay and that's what we did."

The great-grandson of a Confederate soldier, Lucas says he has always been a fighter. He was 13 when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. At 14, he forged his mother's name on a consent form and entered the Marines.

He lasted through training and shipment to Hawaii before his true age — then 16 — was discovered.

Lucas then stowed away on a combat-bound transport and hit the beach with the 26th Regiment, 5th Marines.

The following day, Lucas and three other Marines took cover in a trench, only to discover they were among 11 Japanese soldiers. After opening fire, Lucas spotted some grenades and warned his comrades.

“I fell on the grenades. The thing blew me up in the air and I see them running out of the trench firing back at the remaining Japanese,” he remembers.

The grenades punctured his right lung, blew open his chest, right arm and leg.

Back in the States, President Harry Truman hung the Medal of Honor around his neck and helped Lucas get a job with the Veteran’s Administration in Winston-Salem. While there, he finished high school, and attended college at Duke University and High Point University. He graduated in 1956 with a degree in business administration.

In 1961, Lucas enlisted in the U.S. Army. He wanted to go to Vietnam, but his superiors wouldn’t let him. They assigned him to Fort Bragg to train troops. He made captain before he was honorably discharged in 1965.

Lucas paid a return visit to Iwo Jima in 1985, along with veterans from both the United States and Japan. He said of the battle, “They paid their price, and we paid ours. I hope somebody learned a damn lesson from it.”



General Courtney H. Hodges (*North Georgia College, Psi '03*), a four-star general in the United States Army, was Pi Kappa Alpha’s highest ranking officer during World War II. As commander of the First Army, he led his troops in the capture of Paris, in crossing the Rhine River and into Nazi Germany.

Known for his courageousness, Hodges was determined to bring honor to his troops as he did throughout his military career.

Initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha by Psi Chapter at North Georgia College in 1903, Brother Hodges enlisted in the Army as a private in 1906. He soon was promoted to the rank of corporal and then sergeant in the 17th Infantry before being commissioned as second lieutenant in November of 1909.

During World War I, Hodges was awarded the Silver Star for his leadership in the battle of St. Mihiel, and he was a recipient of the Distinguished Service Cross for his success in the Meuse-Argonne offensive during which his regiment forced a crossing of the Meuse River and protected the Allied position there. His acts of valor resulted in his immediate promotion to the rank of major upon returning to the United States in the summer of 1920.

Hodges spent the next ten years studying military tactics and teaching in the Army schools. He became the first man in history to ever teach infantry tactics at West Point without having graduated from there.

In 1936, Hodges was sent to the Philippines to serve as General MacArthur’s plans and training officer. Here he became associated with Dwight Eisenhower, who was at that time a lieutenant colonel on MacArthur’s staff.

After serving as commandant of the Infantry School for five months, Brother Hodges was appointed to serve as Chief of Infantry in 1941 with the rank of major general. He was named commander of the Southern Defense Command. In 1944, Hodges succeeded Gen. Omar Bradley as commander of the First Army after the War Department was reorganized in 1942.

Hodges was well known for giving credit for his victories to his corps commanders. His lack of selfishness and determination to win are qualities all Pikes should emulate. The recipient of the Fraternity’s 1942 Distinguished Achievement Award, Brother Hodges died on January 16, 1966.

*Pi Kappa Alpha wishes to thank all the brothers who responded to the request for wartime memories. Without their selfless valor and courage, we might not be here today to do them honor. The display of wartime memorabilia will remain on display at the Memorial Headquarters throughout 1995. Among the alumni who contributed were:*



## Over 15,000 Alumni Respond Generously to Spring Phonathon

Brother Thomas added, "The value of my membership in Pi Kappa Alpha was almost as important to my career as my formal education at Carnegie Mellon University."

Educational Foundation President Joe Brown (*Kansas, Beta Gamma '50*) commented "We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Brother Thomas. His generosity will have a positive impact on our undergraduate brothers throughout the next century. **A Plan for Success**

*Jeff Rotsky's foundation for mentors links eighth-graders with professionals.*

A stockbroker is working a crowd of Cleveland middle-schoolers. Jeff Rotsky (*Case Western, Epsilon Xi '88*), shouting into a superfluous microphone, says the students' principals have chosen them for Rotsky's mentoring program "Because they believe that you are going to take this opportunity and leverage every bit of it!"

"I have a dream for this program, and I talk from the heart," says Rotsky. The dream features college, career and connections. "You can never have too many friends," he tells 19 pairs of mentors and protégés. "You may be a borderline student, and I bet a letter of recommendation from a successful person...may be the difference."

The 29-year old Case Western alum is

selling the Rotsky Foundation for Mentors, a year-old program at Case Western Reserve University which tries to build long-term relationships between successful professionals and eighth graders from A.B. Hart and Carl Shuler Middle Schools.

Several other programs assign adults to youngsters as academic and vocational role models. Still others assign them as personal advisors and friends. Rotsky wants his mentors to be all of the above. Besides attending group meetings, each pair of participants meets informally at least once a month.

Rotsky, armed with undergraduate and graduate business degrees from CWRU, has been called a "star broker" by the *Wall Street Journal*. He reported grossing more than \$2 million in commissions in 1993. Last year, he made national headlines by leading a team of colleagues and clients from the troubled Kidder Peabody investment firm to Smith Barney Shearson. He promptly joined an inner circle of the top selling 1 percent of Smith Barney brokers.

But he missed something from his younger days: a now defunct mentoring program he had run at CWRU with schoolmate Eric Stephenson (*Case Western, Epsilon Xi '88*). So he created the Rotsky Foundation, funded it for \$4,000 and runs it with the help of his wife, Gina, Eric Stephenson, now his business partner, and a board of trustees.

The program has long waiting lists. The principals choose those applicants they consider most likely to benefit from mentoring. The protégés and their parents must sign pledges of commitment to the program. All the mentors so far have been alumni of CWRU, and most have been fellow Pike brothers. But Rotsky would like to open the program to successful professionals from any college, generation, race and location.


**Upsilon Chapter at Auburn University







When World War II began, Tuttle, at 45, enlisted with his National Guard unit and served as an artillery commander. He fought on Guam and Okinawa, was wounded on the Island of Ie Shima and was awarded the Bronze Star, Legion of Merit and Purple Heart.

On Tuesday, February 21, 1995, the 97-year old Tuttle, perhaps the most influential civil rights judge in Southern history, sat quietly as he was honored for his military service over the past 75 years.

"I'm deeply honored," he said softly, grinning at his 74-year old son, Elbert Tuttle, Jr. "I'm very thankful."

Sen. Paul Coverdale presented Tuttle with the World War I 75th anniversary commemorative medal at the federal courthouse in Atlanta that bears Tuttle's name.

In the 1960s, as chief federal appeals court judge, Tuttle ordered the integration of state universities in Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi.

Tuttle, though slowed by a stroke two years ago and hard of hearing, is still active on the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals as a senior judge. He works out of his Ashley Park home, screening cases to determine whether they merit a hearing.

## News of Bygone Days



The continued prosperity of Pi Kappa Alpha and a definite program to plan for the future were the highlights of the meeting of the Supreme Council in Chicago July 4-7."

**25 YEARS AGO...** Patrick Halloran III (*Nebraska-Omaha, Delta Chi '62*) was named executive secretary of Pi Kappa Alpha by the Supreme Council at its April 1970 meeting... Approximately 150 brothers, alumni and guests attended PiKA's First Annual Congressional Founders Day.

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## Chapter Eternal

### Howard B. Hudiburg (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '32)

Howard B. Hudiburg entered Pi Kappa Alpha's Chapter Eternal in September 1994. He was born October 1, 1912 in Yokohama, Japan to Elmer and Besse Hudiburg. He grew up in Independence, Kansas and attended Kansas State University, pledging Pi Kappa Alpha in Fall 1931, his freshman year. He graduated in 1935 and pursued his Masters Degree from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He served a full career in the regular Army from 1940-1962. As a World War II veteran, member of the 31st AAA Regiment, Hudiburg fought in the Battle of the Bulge in the end of 1944. He rose to the rank of full Colonel.

Following his retirement from the Army, he had a second career with the government service in Thule, Greenland, serving with the Ballistic Missile Early Warning System from 1962-1965. Upon his retirement from Thule, Hudiburg taught for several years at the University of Texas as well as serving as a consultant and contractor for Southwest Sound and Electronics until 1982. He was a member of the American Delay League being an active HAM (KB5NW) for many years. Hudiburg was also a member of the State Board of Professional Engineers and a 32nd degree Mason.

Hudiburg is survived by his wife, Leif, and four children: Carol Hitt of Austin, TX, Jackie Davis of Collinsville, TX, Sherri Gardner of Richmond, TX and Howard

Hudiburg, Jr. of Seguin. His legacy includes 13 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

### J. Harold Trinner (Rhodes College, Theta '26)

J. Harold Trinner entered the Chapter Eternal in June 1994, at the age of 87. He received Pi Kappa Alpha's Distinguish-ed Service Award on March 19, 1966. Trinner served as president of Pi Kappa Alpha's Memorial Foundation from 1957-60, and was on the Building Committee of PiKA's first Memorial Headquarters, which was dedicated September 5, 1954 in Memphis, Tennessee. He is survived by his wife, Mildred Trinner, and two children, Walter Trinner Moore and Mary Anne Oliver.
