

# Executive Vice President Orians Announces Changes to Headquarters Staff

## Vincent Named Executive Alumni Officer/*Shield & Diamond* Editor

On March 1, 1999, Executive Vice President Raymond L. Orians (*Memphis, Delta Zeta '66*) named Steven S. Vincent (*Missouri, Alpha Nu '83*) to the position of executive alumni officer/editor.

As editor of the *Shield & Diamond*, the 17th to hold the position, Vincent is charged with magazine responsibilities including overall quality and appeal, content development and direction, and continued stewardship of the quarterly publication as Pi Kappa Alpha's living history. Vincent served as interim editor for the conclusion of the December 1997 issue and the entire March 1998 issue. The March issue, which featured the 1997-98 Pi Kappa Alpha Sports Review, received a 1998 Certificate of Merit for General Excellence by the College Fraternity Editors Association. Vincent will work closely with Director of Communications/Managing Editor Barbara E. Perkins, a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha staff since April 1985.

"Steve's outreach and communication skills, as well as his experience on the Headquarters staff, will be invaluable to the *Shield & Diamond*," commented Perkins.

As executive alumni officer, Vincent will

further develop the responsibilities held since his appointment in July 1996 as director of alumni affairs. Primary areas of attention include the overall operation of the *International Alumni Association*, the continued enhancement of the merchandising/licensing program, and ongoing relationship development with Pi Kappa Alpha's 60 area and chapter alumni associations.

"Steve is an experienced staff member who thrives on new challenges," Orians said. "We are confident he will take us to new levels in alumni programming, including work on our magazine."

Vincent also served as director of expansion from June 1992 through July 1996 and worked as a chapter consultant in 1987-88. He served as a leadership scholarship consultant for Delta Mu while earning his marketing M.B.A. in 1990 from Southern Mississippi. Prior to re-joining the staff in 1992, Vincent worked for Andersen Consulting in New Orleans, serving at the time as chapter advisor for Eta Chapter at Tulane. As an undergraduate he served Alpha Nu Chapter as vice president and rush chairman. Vincent is an annual member of the *International Alumni Association* as well as a member of the Educational Foundation's **Oak Trust**.

Vincent and his wife, Suzanne, reside in Memphis in a newly purchased home. Vincent is president of the award winning Mizzou Alumni Association Memphis chapter and serves on the university's alumni association long range planning committee.

# Fire Destroys Alpha Kappa Chapter House, Brother Killed

In the early morning hours of February 13, 1999, the brothers of the Robert Adger Smythe Award winning Alpha Kappa Chapter at the University of Missouri-Rolla suffered a severe loss. A savage fire destroyed the chapter house and tragically claimed the life of member Jered Newman Adams (*Missouri-Rolla, Alpha Kappa '97*).

Early reports suggest that the fire started in the chapter house basement and then quickly spread. Smoke was first noticed by members on the second floor of the house. These members then proceeded to wake all the other fraternity members in the house at the time. Due to smoke and fire, the basement which included Adams' room could not be searched. Upon arrival, the Rolla Fire Department entered the house and quickly proceeded to the basement. Unfortunately, heavy smoke and intense heat prevented basement entrance.

Three other local fire departments were called to the scene. The firemen attempted to fight the blaze for fifteen hours. The once beau-

tiful Alpha Kappa house burned for a total of thirty-nine hours.

While dealing with their grief, all 60 Alpha Kappa members continue to go on with their lives and studies. Much needed support in terms of clothing, food and temporary housing has come from Pi Kappa Alpha chapters, Alpha Kappa alumni, the university, the Greek system and the community of Rolla, Missouri. Despite some insurance assistance, though, a great financial challenge to raise funds for a new house exists. For those wishing to make financial contributions, please address them to:

## PI KAPPA ALPHA'S 1998-99 SPORTS REVIEW

**1998-99** was a phenomenal year for Pi Kappa Alpha athletics. Highlights include an owner winning his second Super Bowl, a national championship football long-snapper, several college bowl participants, a #1 college basketball center, a premier major league pitching prospect, captains in all sports, All-Americans, Academic All-Americans, a Rhodes Scholar nominee, legendary coaches, and the attention of a nation focused on a humble baseball groundskeeper who captured Mark McGwire's record-breaking 62nd home run. Leadership, scholarship, gentlemanly conduct and athletic accomplishment are celebrated by Pi Kappa Alpha. A record high 149 chapters produced an amazing 709 athletes. The Fraternity is proud of these men and their exemplary commitment.

### FOOTBALL

Once again, Texas A&M provides Pi Kappa Alpha with its most prominent

Division I-A football presence. Starting every game for the Big XII champion Aggies was offensive tackle Rex Tucker (*Theta Theta '97*). Based on his excellent performance in the nation's highest rated conference, Tucker earned All-Big XII third team honors. Also starting every game up front was offensive guard Cameron Spikes (*Theta Theta '97*). At 310 pounds, Spikes was the largest starter on the offensive line. Both potential NFL draftees started in the Sugar Bowl versus Ohio State.

**Kansas State** defensive back Jake Havick (*Alpha Omega '98*) was a key special teams player and defensive reserve. In the Alamo Bowl, Havick recovered a fumbled punt snap in the end zone for his first college touchdown. Also playing for the Wildcats was backup offensive guard Tige Stone (*Alpha Omega '97*). Contributing to National Champion **Tennessee** and their Fiesta Bowl victory over Florida State was Volunteers long-snapper David Vassar (*Epsilon Sigma '98*), a Tennessee-Martin transfer.

Defensive end Shane Elam (*Gamma Iota '98*) starred for Independence Bowl champion **Mississippi**. Elam posted 21 tackles, recovered a fumble and started three games for the Rebels. His season highlight was an 87 yard interception return for a touchdown in an Ole Miss victory over Vanderbilt. Competing against Elam in the Independence Bowl was backup quarterback John Gurasich (*Epsilon Gamma '98*) of **Texas Tech**. Contributing for Cotton Bowl champion **Texas**

was defensive back Bryan Willingham (*Beta Mu '98*) and for Outback Bowl participant **Kentucky** was linebacker Matt Dusing (*Omega '97*).

Promising wide receiver Aaron Moser (*Gamma Omega '99*) saw action for Micron PC Bowl champion **Miami**. Moser, also a track star, caught a touchdown pass for the Hurricanes in their regular season upset of UCLA. Squad members on other bowl teams included long-snapper Keith

Caton (*Delta Mu '96*) of Humanitarian Bowl participant **Southern Mississippi**, linebacker Cam Myronowicz (*Gamma Eta '97*) of Sun Bowl participant **USC**, defensive back Matt D'Acunto (*Alpha '98*) of the **Virginia** Peach Bowl squad and Jason Smith (*Delta Iota '96*) and Blaine Crabtree (*Delta Iota '98*) of Motor City Bowl champion **Marshall**.

Linebacker Mike Palmer (*Eta Phi '96*) posted 81 tackles, good for second on the

team, for 9-2 **Central Florida**. Wide receiver Tyson Hinshaw (*Eta Phi '95*) caught a touchdown and kicker Chad Downey (*Eta Phi '94*) averaged 34.4 yards on 16 punts and kicked one field goal for the Golden Knights.

Colin Vadheim (*Beta Zeta '97*) of **SMU** ranked 28th in NCAA Division I-A punting. The Mustangs punter averaged 42.1 yards per kick with a season long effort of 72 yards versus Wyoming.

Vadheim's 3240 total yards set a school record. **Auburn** tight end Reid Tankersley (*Upsilon '98*) was a key blocker, wide receiver Patrick Henderson (*Gamma Xi '98*) saw special teams duty for **Washington State** and Gavin Goodlife (*Alpha Gamma '98*) is a backup kicker for **LSU**.

The ground-oriented offense of **Indiana State** was led by starting quarterback Steve Englehart (*Theta Omicron '98*). The Sycamores star ran for 329 yards on 115

carries and threw for 330 yards. Defensive back teammate Keith Richard (*Theta Omicron '98*) posted 11 stops. Defensive end Jeremy Konvalinka (*Delta Theta '97*) contributed for **Arkansas State**.

In Division I-AA, All-Pioneer first team member Jason Grove (*Delta Omicron '96*) solidified his hold on the **Drake** rushing record. In another 1000 yard season, Grove averaged 106.2 yards per game, good for an overall ranking of 27th in the nation. The star running back scored ten touchdowns this season and in two separate games rushed for over 160 yards. In his stellar career, Grove amassed 4,182 yards for the Pike laden Bulldogs.

Other standouts on offense for Drake were All-Pioneer Academic guard Steve Pettit (*Delta Omicron '96*), leading receiver Robert McFadden (*Delta Omicron '98*), fellow wide receiver Kevin Cade (*Delta Omicron '97*), tackle Chris Bagby (*Delta Omicron '97*) and running back/kickoff return specialist Clint Blackburn (*Delta Omicron '97*) who averaged 26.8 yards per return. Also contributing on special teams was punt return specialist Zach Baayen (*Delta Omicron '98*).

On defense, Drake safety Tait Johnson (*Delta Omicron '97*) won All-Pioneer and All-Pioneer Academic first team honors. Johnson had three interceptions, one returned 72 yards for a touchdown, and led the Bulldogs with 92 tackles. Linebacker Scott Wilhelm (*Delta Omicron '98*)

earned All-Pioneer second team honors with 65 tackles. Wilhelm was named Pioneer Defensive Player of the Week after making 15 tackles against Butler. Also playing well were backs Noah Joseph (*Delta Omicron '96*) and Ben Gebhart (*Delta Omicron '97*).

Although coming off an injury, running back Recolon Jump (Iota Chi '98) was the second leading rusher for Division I-AA playoff quarterfinalist **Connecticut**. Jump totaled 767 yards, nine touchdowns and 174 carries for the Huskies. UConn quarterback Brian Hoffman (*Iota Chi '98*), a certain starter next season, rushed for 1,137 yards and eight touchdowns. On defense, lineman Ronel Jump (*Iota Chi '98*), cousin of Recolon, contributed 43 tackles.

Pikes were a major factor for **Pennsylvania**. Kicker Jason Feinberg (*Beta Pi '98*) was third in Ivy League scoring with 11 field goals and 31 extra points. Mike Bertolino (*Beta Pi '97*) started on the offensive line while Quakers nose guard Adrian Puzio (*Beta Pi '97*), a true run-stopper with 38 tack-

les, was named All-Ivy second team.

Handling kicking duties for **Tennessee-Chattanooga** were kickers Matt Vick (*Delta Epsilon '98*) and Scot Kielblock (*Delta Epsilon '98*). The teammates combined for ten field goals and 23 extra points. Starting for **Stephen F. Austin** were Shannon Yates (*Epsilon Omicron '98*) and Scott Fabian (*Epsilon Omicron '97*). Lumberjacks defensive back Fabian made 13 tackles.

**Wofford** offensive lineman Eric Cole (*Nu '97*) earned GTE Academic All-District honors. The Terriers stalwart was also a featured Burger King Scholar-Athlete of the Week. Joe Perez (*Epsilon Lambda '98*) finished second in receptions with 36 for **Murray State** and Tony Lockhart (*Eta Tau '96*) was a standout at center once again for **Austin Peay**.

Kicking for the **Richmond** playoff team was Jeff Falkowski (*Omicron '95*). The Spiders kicker successfully converted 35 extra points and three field goals. Defensive lineman Mike Carlin (*Zeta Gamma '98*) posted 46 tackles for **Eastern Illinois** and linebacker Jason Malouf (*Zeta Pi '97*) saw playing time for **South Florida**.

In Division II, kicker Mike Mayeux (*Epsilon Phi '98*) led **Central Arkansas** in scoring with nine field goals and 34 extra points. Versatile teammate Kelly Lovell (*Epsilon Phi '94*) played nose guard, fullback and tight end. Also contributing were defensive back Matt Huddleston (*Epsilon Phi '98*) and offensive linemen Thad Eiland (*Epsilon Phi '98*) and Chris

Breyspraak (*Epsilon Phi '98*).

Offensive guard Luke Orvis (*Epsilon Omega '96*) of **East Central** was named to the All-Lone Star honorable mention team while safety Dru Wilson (*Epsilon Omega '96*) made 16 tackles. At **Nebraska-Kearney**, safety Andy Bonczynski (*Iota Gamma '97*) finished fourth in tackles with 58 and wide receiver Dan Easton (*Iota Gamma '97*) saw considerable playing time.

Greg Chandler (*Theta Alpha '95*) started every game at tight end for **North Alabama**, linebacker Josh Stamer (*Kappa Pi '97*) of **South Dakota** made 17 stops and tackle Scott Murphy (*Alpha Kappa '98*) of **Missouri-Rolla** made ten tackles.

In Division III, center/offensive guard Chris Belmont (*Kappa Chi '98*) of **Plymouth State** was named to the AFCA Good Works team, the All-Freedom second team, the ECAC All-New England second team and the GTE Academic All-District first team. Quarterback teammate Eric Rush (*Gamma Mu '96*), a transfer from New Hampshire, completed 20 passes for 287 yards. Other key Panthers were offensive tackle/guard Rob Mason (*Kappa Chi '98*),

offensive tackle Pat Leahy (*Kappa Chi '98*) and defensive tackle Mike LaPointe (*Kappa Chi '98*).

Seven Pikes saw playing time at **Presbyterian**. Quarterback Blake Wilkey (*Mu '97*) completed 51 passes for 732 yards and seven touchdowns and running back Ryan Knight (*Mu '97*) led the team in rushing with 119 carries for 439 yards. Eight Pikes saw playing time for **Linfield**. All-NWC second team linebacker Joe Pate



"If I'm going to do all the work, I might as well own the company." After more than ten years of sportswriting for various newspapers and magazines, these were the sentiments of **Tim Fitzgerald** (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '82*), president, editor and publisher of *Powercat Illustrated*. Fitzgerald decided to combine his journalistic talents with the recent success of the Kansas State University athletic program, particularly the 1998 Wildcats football team, to form a sports magazine for the most avid K-State fan.


Launched prior to the 1998 football season, *Powercat Illustrated* now has over 4000 subscribers, more than twice what was originally projected in the business plan for the first year. Said Fitzgerald, "The timing of the magazine's release was no accident. There's an absolute love affair between the football program and the fans."

As most sports fans know, 1998 was a year to remember for the Wildcats, not long ago the absolute dregs of college football. Victories over ranked teams Texas, Missouri and Nebraska led the undefeated program to harbor national title hopes until the Big XII

Championship game. Fitzgerald personally enjoyed his close relationship with the football program. "I'll never forget 11-0. In the middle of the season, I realized how lucky we are to see it close up. This season was on course to be everything we imagined it could be, but Texas A&M stuck the needle in the balloon."

Despite the disappointing end to the football season, *Powercat Illustrated* continues to do very well. Fitzgerald created a partner website [www.superkstate.com](http://www.superkstate.com) that on its busiest day received over 90,000 page views. The magazine's success has opened doors for Fitzgerald, a journalism major, to appear on national radio talk shows, host a football pregame radio show and occasionally substitute as a color analyst for K-State basketball.

Former chapter consultant and *Powercat Illustrated* investor Mike Riley (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '84*) remembers the college era Fitzgerald, "As a Pike intramural athlete, he was a great volleyball player and perhaps the greatest slowpitch softball





Forward Aron Wellman (*Iota Kappa '97*) led **California-Santa Barbara** with eight












In baseball, pitcher Seth Greisinger (*Vir-*



As Atlanta Falcons kicker Morton Andersen's field goal sailed straight through the Metrodome uprights, athletic trainer **Matt Smith (Southern Mississippi, Delta Mu '88)** experienced euphoria. The Falcons, with whom Smith has been a trainer for five years, had just upset the heavily favored Minnesota Vikings in the NFC Championship game. aware of Jeffrey Martin, a ten year old leukemia patient. Brenner invited Jeffrey and his entire family to an open house held by AMEREX, his title sponsor. At the end of the day, Brenner and his crew gave Jeffrey, whose health is improving, and his family autographed pictures, team hats and even a signed nosepiece from the car he drove at the Michigan International Speedway.

Based on Brenner's racing success, he has opted to pass on the remaining ARCA short track races and run with CSG Racing in the main ARCA events at Daytona, Talladega and Charlotte super-speedways. The business communications major is committed to pursuing his dream of NASCAR prominence. Said Brenner, "I'm looking forward to competing in more ARCA races this year, but in five years I'd like to be in Winston Cup."

**O**n September 8, 1998, St. Louis Cardinals slugger Mark McGwire broke Roger Maris' record of 61 home runs. The world's attention was focused on the record chase. Along with the attention came speculation about the monetary value of the record breaking ball. Every person entering Busch Stadium that night wondered “what if I caught #62?”. At evening's end, only **Timothy J. Forneris (St. Louis, Iota Nu '95)** needed to answer that question. The crowd went crazy, and I'm mad dashin' it for the ball. I got there first, picked it up and shoved it in my pocket. I said, “Tino, I have the ball”. He smiled and said, “I know”.

**S&D:** Did you go right to the clubhouse?

**TJF:** Actually, no. All four of us started running through a tunnel to the clubhouse, but halfway there I remembered we were supposed to be on the field. So we turned and headed out. I said, “Tino, stay right on my hip pocket”.

**S&D:** So you're out on the field, picking up streamers, and no one but the four of you knows the ball's in your pocket?

**TJF:** Right (laughing). Once we got our area cleared, we ran through the tunnel to the clubhouse where I gave the ball to the Cardinals equipment manager who then gave it to representatives of Major League Baseball

and the Hall of Fame to be authenticated. It's at the Hall of Fame now and will stay there unless Mr. McGwire decides to do something else with it.

**S&D:** What happened during the rest of the game?

**TJF:** It was crazy. I was interviewed by ABC, Fox, Chicago Cubs station WGN, Biff Henderson of David Letterman's show and KMOX Cardinals broadcasters Jack Buck and Mike Shannon,


a dream for every Cardinals fan. Between interviews, I sat in the owners' seats by Cardinals heroes Lou Brock and Stan Musial.

**S&D:** How was the postgame ceremony where you presented Mark McGwire with ball #62?

**TJF:** My Mom, who works in the Cardinals Club, my brother and I were on the stage. My whole family has been supportive all the way. When it was time for the presentation, I walked over and said, “Mr. McGwire, I think I have something that belongs to you”. Cardinals catcher Tom Lampkin yelled, “No! Do it again, this time into the microphone!”. So I gladly said it again.

**S&D:** What happened after the ceremony?

**TJF:** I was immediately flown to Disney World in Orlando. After a day at Disney, I was taken to a small private airport to meet President Bill Clinton. It was all very *Forrest Gump*. Then, I flew to New York to guest on

*Letterman* and tour Yankee Stadium, where I met first baseman Tino Martinez and manager Joe Torre. That night I flew to Los Angeles for the *Howie Mandel Show*, where I met fellow guest Magic Johnson. After all that, it was back home to Collinsville, Illinois. It was like being a rock star for three days.


**S&D:** Have you stayed in touch with Mark McGwire?

**TJF:** Yep, he's an extraordinary person, both on and off the field. We've had dinner once and still exchange e-mails about once a week.

**S&D:** Tim, even though you're now a significant part of St. Louis Cardinals history, huge in itself, there are those who say you should have taken the million.

**TJF:** Well, even before I got the ball I knew all along I was going to give it to Mr. McGwire. As a true Cardinals fan, I felt he deserved that record and everything that comes with it.

For me, that event wasn't about financial gain. That evening was so special for Mr. McGwire, St. Louis and really, the world. It's sad people want to put an economic value on everything. The best commercial was Mastercard's “#62: priceless”. Right now, that ball *is* priceless. ♦



# Wisconsin-Whitewater Chartered As Kappa Omega Chapter

The Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity welcomed the men of Kappa Omega into the bonds of brotherhood on Saturday, December 12, 1998. After seven months of preparation and hard work, 84 men were initiated as founding fathers by Theta Omicron (*Indiana State*) and Iota Delta (*Rose-Hulman*) Chapters. Following the initiations, the men received the designation of Kappa Omega Chapter from International President Thomas J. Handler (*Illinois, Beta Eta '74*).

To celebrate the chartering, the men of Kappa Omega traveled to Oshkosh, Wisconsin for a black-tie banquet. Joining in the celebration were Director of Expansion Chuck Hunt (*North Alabama, Theta Alpha '93*), Chapter Consultant Tim Brady (*St. Joseph's, Iota Rho '94*), Midwest Regional President Al Perone (*Indiana State, Theta Omicron '78*) and alumni John Winkler (*Tennessee-Chattanooga, Delta Epsilon '68*) and Ernest Arlart (*Wake Forest, Gamma Phi '70*). Parents, friends and several distinguished guests also shared in the festivities of this special evening. International President Handler delivered an inspirational message about the past, present and future of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. A glass tower was presented to Handler on behalf of the chapter for display in the Memorial Headquarters. The evening concluded with awards, gifts and remarks from the chapter president and president-elect.

## Chapter History

As the newest fraternity at Wisconsin-Whitewater, Kappa Omega Chapter is dedicated to establishing a tradition of excellence that will guide the chapter, Fraternity, university and community well into the 21st century. Colonized on April 13, 1998, Kappa Omega is the product of dedicated and visionary men who dreamed of a fraternity that nurtured and encouraged the qualities of scholarship, leadership, athleticism and gentlemanly behavior.

First conceived by J.J. Arnold (*Indiana State, Theta Omicron '96*) who transferred to Wisconsin-Whitewater, the idea of a new fraternity attracted many talented men. After several conversations with the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters staff, a decision was made to begin the colonization process. By October 1997, 17 gentlemen from diverse segments of the campus population had been selected to participate.

In late 1997 the group encountered its first major obstacle. In an attempt to seek official recognition from the university, it was discovered that no policy existed for Greek expansion. After weeks of input, an expansion policy was approved. A newly formed Greek expansion committee convened to consider the approval of a Pi Kappa Alpha colony. On April 13, 1998,



approval was granted. Consultants Ted Rowe (*Western Ontario, Iota Omega '94*) and Tim Brady traveled to Whitewater to assist in colony development and recruitment. Only a few days later, an Alpha Class of 59 men was pinned. Focused on continuing the growth and development of the colony, a Beta Class was pinned in May 1998.

During the fall semester of 1998, the Whitewater Colony engaged in a number of activities including community service, a benefit concert, interfraternity softball, sorority exchanges and various other campus, community and Greek activities. Following three rush events, 17 gentlemen were pinned in October 1998 as members of the Gamma Class. On November 8, the colony was inspected by brothers from Eta Nu (*Northern Illinois*) and Kappa Lambda (*Western Illinois*) Chapters. The inspection committee unanimously recommended chartering the colony.

Kappa Omega Chapter is currently the largest fraternity at Wisconsin-Whitewater and is proud to have the highest fraternity grade point average. The chapter has set its sights on the acquisition of a chapter house and is in the early stages of an \$800,000 capital campaign. The men of Kappa Omega would like to extend their sincere appreciation to those who offered their support and assistance over the past year. Specifically, the chapter recognizes Congressman Edward A. Pease (*Indiana, Delta Xi '71*), Chancellor H. Gaylon Greenhill, Assistant Chancellor Roger Ludeman, Dean of Students Diane Bailiff, Greek Advisor Tracy Maxwell, Financial Advisor Rob Williams (*Wisconsin-*

*Whitewater, Kappa Omega '98*) and Faculty Advisor Bruce Bukowski.

# DEVELOPING LEADERS

## The 1999 Chapter Presidents Conference and Rush Summit

**T**he Chapter Presidents Conference was one of the most impressive things I've ever attended," said James Vitrano (*Florida Tech, Zeta Sigma '96*). Now an officer for Gamma Psi Chapter at Louisiana Tech, Vitrano added, "I was amazed you could combine that much education, inspiration and useful information in just three days."

Pi Kappa Alpha hosted its premier undergraduate leaders at the Chapter Presidents Conference January 7-10, 1999. Held at the historic Peabody Hotel in downtown Memphis, Tennessee, the Chapter Presidents Conference is the mid-year highlight for chapter presidents and rush chairmen. Conference participants attended leadership sessions on membership education, risk management, alumni relations, housing and financial management.

At the same conference, chapter rush chairmen participated in Rush Summit '99, an intensive strategic training course on absolutely everything pertaining to rush. The rush summit focused on "winning rush", campus specifics, leadership development, total chapter motivation and strategic plan implementation.

After braving arduous journeys in severe January weather, chapter officers were treated to one of the finest conference faculties ever assembled. Feature presenter Bob Noelke (*Illinois, Beta Eta '76*), a Wall Street executive for Lord, Abnett & Co., offered his thoughts on developing chapter excellence in "Creating a Culture for Success". Noelke, a first time Pi Kappa Alpha conference speaker, stressed the importance of an environment conducive to individual and team success. "If you develop the right culture, you will attract the right people," Noelke said. "With the wrong culture, the right people will sadly move on to a culture more suited to their talents."

Nationally known legal expert and Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity alumnus Judge Mitchell Crane also joined Pi Kappa Alpha's conference faculty for the first time. With valuable interfraternal perspective, Judge Crane delivered two different sessions, one titled "Legal and Ethical Issues" and the other "Alcohol Use and Social Policy". With an adept use of humor, Judge Crane stressed education followed by common sense, particularly in the membership education and social aspects of fraternity life.

Other featured speakers and perennial conference favorites included former National President Dr. Jerry Askew (*North Carolina, Tau '73*) with his always outstanding presentation on strategic leadership, Supreme Council Legal Counsel Allen W. Groves (*Stetson, Delta Upsilon '72*) with his humorous and in-

formative session on risk awareness, and of course, Dr. Jerome V. Reel (*Tulane, Eta '57*) with his marvelous presentation on the history of the Pi Kappa Alpha ritual. Once again Dr. Reel earned the highest session rating on conference evaluations. One enthusiastic brother remarked on his conference evaluation, "I could listen to Dr. Reel speak for hours."

The Rush Summit portion of the conference was superbly coordinated by International Rush Director Kevin G. Knaus (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '82*). Patterned after corporate marketing training, the Rush Summit programming track provided a comprehensive look, from the beginning steps of how to appoint an ideal rush chairman, to total chapter participation, and to the final steps of successfully offering a bid. Knaus was assisted by fellow Rush Commissioner and chapter brother Steven S. Heck (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '88*).

In addition to educational programming, the conference also featured four popular "Bench-

mark Discussion" sessions. Conference participants met in small groups to discuss goals, educational sessions and action plans. The benchmark discussions provided a forum for idea exchange on a less formal basis.

As always, the Chapter Presidents Conference was capped off by a Saturday evening final banquet in the beautiful Peabody Continental Ballroom. International President Tom Handler (*Illinois, Beta Eta '74*) delivered the first of the banquet's two keynote speeches. President Handler cited numerous examples of Pi Kappa Alpha alumni who have risen to the top of their chosen professions. He then challenged the chapter officers to acquire the necessary leadership skills to fill the ranks of the next generation of leaders, businessmen and

educators. Handler then shifted his focus to the importance of the Pi Kappa Alpha recruitment strategy. Echoing chapter brother Noelke's remarks, Handler stressed the recruitment of quality men in significant quantity, thus enabling our leaders and chapters to become champions presently on their campuses and professionally in the future.

The second keynote was wonderfully delivered by special guest and Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation Trustee Marvin Dennis (*Illinois, Beta Eta '56*). Before his speech, Dennis was presented with a framed December '98 *Shield & Diamond* cover featuring him and his wife, Nancy. The Dennises generously donated a significant lead gift in a challenge campaign for a scholarship that will fully endow the Chapter Presidents Conference.

In his moving keynote, Dennis admitted that he hadn't been as immediately or continuously involved as the other officers with whom he shared the head table. He believed, however, that it was vital to participate as an alumnus whenever and in whatever capacity available.

Without question, the Pi Kappa Alpha Chapter Presidents Conference was a rousing success. The Fraternity's undergraduate leadership, 144 chapter presidents and 96 rush chairmen from 138 chapters and eight colonies, left Memphis motivated, energized and ready to accept the challenges our chapters willingly face. Chapter President Cosmo Marfione (*Rensselaer, Gamma Tau '97*) commented, "USC President John Moshy (*Southern California, Gamma Eta '97*) and I spent all night comparing notes from the meetings and bouncing ideas off each other. We had learned so much, and we didn't want to forget anything." Certainly their chapters and all of Pi Kappa Alpha will reap the benefits of the 1999 Chapter Presidents Conference.



# Alpha Eta Chapter Initiates 3000th Brother

On Saturday, November 7, 1998, Alpha Eta Chapter at the University of Florida initiated its 3,000th brother into the fraternal bonds of Pi Kappa Alpha. Alpha Eta, already the Pike world's largest chapter (Upsilon chapter at Auburn University is second with 2,434), reached this unprecedented milestone in its 94th year of existence.

Michael Patrick Ames '98, the 22nd initiate of a fall 1998 pledge class of 30, became the 3,000th member inducted into Alpha Eta at 11:15 a.m. Ames is a freshman from Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. He is studying accounting and intends to pursue a career as a CPA.

The initiation ceremony was performed by Brother A. Frank Smith '66, who has now performed the initiation ceremony a record 1,760 times from 1968 to the present. Brother Smith, a legend of sorts at Alpha Eta, is a former chapter advisor for both Alpha Eta Chapter and Zeta Pi Chapter (South Florida), a former Sunshine regional president, and a member of the Educational Foundation's **Oak Trust**. He personally initiated every member of Alpha Eta from spring 1968 to spring 1971, and again from winter 1974 to spring 1993 (a total of 1,220 Alpha Etas, including both authors of this article). In the past, Brother Smith has performed initiations at Delta Delta Chapter (*Florida Southern*) and Kappa Gamma Chapter (*Florida International*) as well as conducting the model initiation program at numerous International Conventions and Officers Leadership Academies.

## A Brief History of Alpha Eta

Alpha Eta Chapter was founded on November 17, 1904 at the Blue Goose Inn in Lake City, Florida, where Florida Agriculture College, the predecessor school to the University of Florida, was located. Two years later, in 1906, Alpha Eta moved 45 miles south to Gainesville when the present-day University of Florida was created by an act of the Florida legislature. Pi Kappa Alpha was one of three fraternities to move from Lake City to Gainesville (along with Alpha Tau Omega and the Kappa Alpha Order). As one of three original fraternities on a campus that is today one of the largest in the Greek world with over 30 fraternities and 17 sororities, Pi Kappa Alpha has a strong tradition at the University of Florida.

In its 94-year existence, Alpha Eta has experienced exponential growth. From the first initiate in 1904, Barnard T. Bridges, it took Alpha Eta 51 years to reach the 1,000 mark, which occurred in 1955 with Ernest D. Kemp's initiation. However, it only took 24 more years to add the next thousand when, in 1979, Robert Gregg Perkins be-

came Alpha Eta's 2,000th initiate. The road to 3,000, though, took only 19 years. At its present pace of growth, Alpha Eta will initiate its 4,000th brother before the year 2010.

Alpha Eta enjoys prominence not only within Pi Kappa Alpha, but also enjoys pre-eminence on the University of Florida campus and in the State of Florida. During its long history, Alpha Eta has included in its membership countless outstanding scholars, leaders, athletes, and gentlemen. Some of these brothers made the ultimate sacrifice for our country. For example, seventeen Alpha Etas gave their lives in World War II. Three Alpha Eta Pikes have been inducted into the Order of West Range: Col. Harlan Sanders '65, founder of Kentucky Fried Chicken; William H. Dial '27, founder of SunTrust Bank, which is now America's 10th largest bank; and E. Dixie Beggs '27, a World War II hero and


former Florida Bar president. Alpha Eta has also produced numerous All-American and Academic All-American student-athletes in every sport. Alpha Eta boasts alumni such as former Florida Supreme Court Justice James C. Adkins '33, current Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton, Jr. '62 and the incoming president of the powerful American Bankers Association, Hjalma E. Johnson '58. As a chapter, Alpha Eta has received the coveted Robert Adger Smythe Award seven times. Alpha Eta is also consistently in the top of every giving and membership category, both in number of donors and total donations, to the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation, the **Oak Trust**, the Shield & Diamond Society, the Lily of the Valley Society, and the International Alumni Association.

## Alpha Eta Today

The current undergraduate members are continuing the proud tradition of Pi Kappa Alpha and upholding the high ideals of our Fraternity. With an emphasis on scholastic excellence, leadership development and athletic success, Alpha Eta remains one of Pi Kappa Alpha's outstanding chapters in virtually all programming areas and is perennially the top fraternity on the University of Florida campus. For example, Alpha Eta had the highest GPA at UF last year (3.08) for the third consecutive year, and the pledge class had the highest GPA of all pledge classes on campus (3.20). The chapter won the all-fraternity sports title in both 1996 and 1997 and finished third in 1998. These accomplishments are particularly impressive given the size and competitiveness of the University of Florida, which at 45,000 students ranks as the third largest university in America.

On an individual level, in the last three years, Alpha Eta has boasted the valedictorian of the College of Arts and Sciences, a "Greek Man of the Year," an international Ultimate Fraternity Man Award recipient, a Sunshine regional vice president, an international Most Outstanding Undergraduate finalist, a Sabre & Key Honor Society inductee, and multiple members of Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, Mortar Board, Order of Omega, and Florida Blue Key. Moreover, over the past three years, Alpha Eta has kept its strong sports tradition alive with over a dozen Gator varsity athletes spanning almost every University of Florida intercollegiate men's sport, including players on UF's National Championship football team and College World Series baseball team, several Academic All-Southeastern Conference selections, and an Academic All-American selection. Additionally, in the last two years, Alpha Eta has sent over 20 of its graduates to medical, dental, law, and other graduate programs. Alpha Eta is truly on the cutting edge of preparing today's young gentlemen to be tomorrow's leaders.

Alpha Eta's alumni are equally impressive; they are consistently some of the most active and loyal alumni in Pi Kappa Alpha. The Alpha Eta Alumni Club has over 100 members, each paying a \$200 per year membership fee that is used for alumni programming, chapter enhancements and chapter house upgrades. Under the direction of President Larry Ramers '71, the Alpha Eta Alumni Club won the 1997 William R. Nester Award as Pi Kappa Alpha's top alumni

program and was named an Honorable Mention in 1998. The Alpha Eta House Corporation and the Alpha Eta Alumni Advisory Board have contributed greatly to the chapter's current success. Following a low ebb in the early 1990s, Alpha Eta was placed into receivership status and was dangerously close to losing its charter. Like the loyal alumni who kept the chapter alive during World War I, the Great Depression, World War II, and the 1970s, a handful of Alpha Eta alumni stepped forward and assumed the responsibility of bringing the chapter through receivership. Led by House Corporation President C. Richard Nail '65, a Clearwater, Florida attorney, and Faculty Advisor E. Stevens Beeland '66, a former All-Southeastern Conference tennis player and former University of Florida men's and women's varsity tennis coach, the House Corporation and a group of dedicated active members transformed Alpha Eta from a troubled chapter to winning Smythe Awards in both 1994 and 1997. Based upon a return to the traditional ideals of

the Fraternity, and with the reintroduction of a housemother, the transformation was swift and impressive. Today, Alpha Eta once again sits atop the Greek world at the University of Florida and looks forward to the challenges that the new millennium will bring to both our actives and our alumni.

# Eta Kappa Chapter Dedicates New House At The University of South Alabama

**E**ta Kappa Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha was chartered on May 8, 1971 at the University of South Alabama. In its 27-year history, the brothers and alumni can recall the many different off-campus houses the Pikes of South Alabama called home. Many of those, which are now occupied by other fraternities and organizations, slept no more than two to three people. For years, attempts to begin the construction of a traditional fraternity house on campus were discussed. Finally, in fall 1994, planning started not only for a new Pike house, but also for the development of a Greek housing area on campus. Through a combined effort of the Interfraternity Council, University officials and local fraternity house corporations, construction on the infrastructure of a Greek row began in fall 1996. This new development is on University land, immediately adjacent to the main campus. Construction commenced on the Pike house, one of the first

facilities to be built, in early 1998. On August 16, 1998, the men of Eta Kappa claimed their new home. Thanks to the efforts of many alumni and undergraduates, this dream finally became a reality.

Over 200 parents, school officials, alumni, students and fellow Greeks gathered to dedicate the new Pike house on November 21, 1998. Keynote speakers included University President V. Gordon Moulton, Chapter President John L. Mulvihill, and the Executive Housing Officer of the International Fraternity Daniel W. Corah (*Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '83*). Past Chapter Advisor Robert C. Campbell, III (*Georgetown, Alpha Lambda '62*) was recognized for his lifetime commitment to the chapter. Current Chapter Advisor Ric Savadra (*Southern Mississippi, Delta Mu '75*) was recognized by the chapter for his selfless efforts in working with the University to make this plan a reality, and overseeing the development and completion of Eta Kappa's new home; for this the building was dedicated in his name.

The experience of building this facility aided the chapter in strengthening relations with its alumni and the school. With the help of the University, alumni were allowed to make tax-deductible contributions to the housing project. This allowed many alumni to actively participate in the construction of the new facility. The cost of this 8,700 square foot structure was approximately \$975,000. Although the house corporation is leasing the property from the

University, Eta Kappa is allowed to decorate the interior as it wishes. The facility includes a chapter room, a large residential kitchen, a formal parlor, a laundry room, several storage rooms, and a 1,450 square foot social hall with gold ΠΚΑ letters inlaid in garnet tile on the floor. To meet the demands of the modern student, each of the twelve dorm rooms is amply sized for two occupants and contains its own bathroom with a shower. Even though the structure was sturdily built with cinder block walls, solid core wood doors, metal jambs, etc., the building still makes a great impression with its traditional Greek Revival architecture and other such features such as the large foyer which contains a grand staircase, tiled floor and beautiful chandelier.



ond one bounced once and hit the hole." A statistician figured the odds of accomplishing this feat were one in 363 million. Almost forgotten in the delirium of the feat was the fact that Littleford's tee shot on #13 came to rest just 18 inches from the hole, a foot and a half from three aces.

If two holes-in-one in a single round isn't enough, Littleford hit a phenomenal third ace exactly 90 days after his historic round. "How lucky can you get? These things just don't happen to a 17-handicapper."

**A Tale of A Pin**

**John R. Sobotka** was initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha at Vanderbilt University in spring 1959, and soon proudly began wearing a white gold Fraternity pin with diamonds and garnets. The initials "J.R.S.," "Sigma" and "59" were engraved on the back of the pin.

After he had worn the pin only a matter of weeks, it – along with the shirt to which it was attached – went through the Fort Negly Laundry near the Vanderbilt campus. The shirt was returned quite clean, but sans pin. Sobotka protested a great deal with the laundry to no avail, and assumed the pin was forever lost.

Approximately 34 years later in 1993, Sobotka's former wife reported that she had been going through old letters and documents, and forwarded to him two letters of great interest, as they concerned the lost pin.

**Edward L. Brawner (Middle Tennessee State, Eta Zeta '86)** had discovered a pin matching the above description at an old jewelry sale, and had written to the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity office in 1988 in an attempt to locate the original owner. Barbara E. Perkins, managing editor of the *Shield & Diamond*, wrote back to him suggesting that all clues led to Sobotka.

On receipt of that information, Brawner wrote to Sobotka's former Baltimore ad-

dress, where it was received by Sobotka's former spouse. As an oversight, she did not forward the letter to him until five years later, in 1993.

Once Sobotka received the information, he attempted to locate Brawner, but could not do so as he had apparently moved.

Five more years passed, and Sobotka came across the documents again in mid-1998. On a whim, he again began a search in Tennessee for a telephone number for Brawner. To his gratification, he was successful. Brawner was surprised and happy to hear from Sobotka, and told him that he was going to an annual Fraternity party in the next few days and intended to wear that very pin. Sobotka related that he was not as concerned with retrieving the pin as he was with bringing the story full circle, and letting Brawner know of his appreciation.

Brawner wore the pin to Middle Tennessee State's homecoming game, and told the story many times. He then returned the pin to Sobotka, with the condition that he inform the *Shield & Diamond* of the intriguing history of the lost pin.

With delight, Sobotka welcomed the homecoming of the pin he bought, lost, and had not seen for 40 years.

Dr. Thomas Henry Simmons died February 21, 1998 in Greenville, Mississippi. He became a member of Gamma Theta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity in 1947.



Simmons was born in Meridian, Mississippi, May 5, 1927. He attended Meridian High School and joined the Navy during World War II, serving as a hospital corpsman. Simmons attended Mississippi State University and graduated from Millsaps College. He received his doctor of medicine degree from the University of Mississippi in 1957. He practiced medicine in Leland, Mississippi for 37 years, retiring in 1996.

Simmons was a member of the Leland Presbyterian Church where he served as deacon and elder. He was also a member of the American Academy of Family Physicians and past president and member of the Leland Lions Club. He served as a trustee of the Leland School Board for 20 years and was a member of the Republican Party, which he served as Washington County chairman for several years.

Simmons is survived by his wife, Juanita Atwood Simmons; two sons, David and Barry, and two grandchildren.

### Frank J. Tipler

(Alabama, Gamma Alpha '35)

Andalusia, Alabama attorney Frank J. Tipler died December 5, 1998. He was one of the charter members of the Alabama Trial Lawyers Association, serving as ATLA President in 1959. Included in those serving as pallbearers or honorary pallbearers were Judge Truman Hobbs and former U.S. Senator Howell Heflin, both Tipler contemporaries and former ATLA presidents.

Among those remembering Tipler was his law partner for 26 years, Syd Fuller. "Tip was an excellent litigator," Fuller says. "He loved his work and was good at it. He always fought for his clients. It might sound trite to say that, but it was true. Nothing stood in the way of that for Tip. He was truly a pioneer of plaintiff attorney work in Alabama. He brought trial practice, at least in the world of torts, to life in this state."

Tipler graduated from the University of Alabama in 1939 with a LL.B. and was awarded a juris doctor in 1969. He served

as president of the Alabama State Bar Association in 1964-65, and was a member of the International Academy of Trial Lawyers (diplomat, 1964-1998), and the American College of Trial Lawyers (fellow, 1969-1998).

In 1967 and again in 1968, Tipler was appointed associate justice of the Special Supreme Court by the governor of Alabama. He was selected by his fellow lawyers for inclusion in *The Best Lawyers in America* and in *The Best Trial Lawyers in America*.

Survivors include his wife, Katherine Tipler, two sons, Dr. Frank J. Tipler III and J. Harvey Tipler; two stepchildren, Randy Johnson and Leigh Metzger, and three grandchildren.
