### Eric P. Wulf Rejoins Headquarters Staff As Executive Director

Executive Vice President Raymond L. Orians (*Memphis, Delta Zeta '68*) is pleased to announce that Eric P. Wulf (*Iowa, Gamma Nu '92*) was appointed November 17, 1999 to fill the vacant position of executive director. Wulf is the Fraternity's sixth chief operating officer. Responsibilities include coordinating all conferences and conventions, primarily the Chapter Presidents Conference, the Officers Leadership Academy and the International Convention. Wulf will also manage the Fraternity's services and expansion departments.

Wulf graduated from the University of Iowa in 1996 with a B.A. in political science. While an undergraduate, he served Gamma Nu Chapter as vice president, rush chairman and pledge educator. Wulf was active in the Iowa Interfraternity Council and was a member of the Hawkeyes club lacrosse team.

Upon graduation, Wulf joined the Memorial Headquarters staff as a chapter consultant. During 1996 he traveled to over 50 chapters throughout five different regions. In 1997, he was appointed director of services, where he managed educational programming, regional conferences and the chapter consultant program. At the same time he served as program director of the Risk Awareness Foundation. Wulf also facilitated the 1998 Chapter Presidents Conference while the executive director position was vacant. He is an Educational Foundation contributor and an annual member of the *International Alumni Association*. Until rejoining the staff, Wulf resided in his hometown of Chicago, Illinois with his wife Bryn. He was employed as a financial advisor with Morgan Stanley Dean Witter. Prior to that position, Wulf worked as a corporate recruiter for TechniSource, Inc.

About the rehiring of Wulf, Orians commented, "Eric is exactly the man we were looking for. His professionalism, outside business expertise and prior headquarters staff experience make him the ideal person for this important position. We're excited to have both him and Bryn back in Memphis."

### Edward A. Pease Installed as President of National Interfraternity Conference

*Congressman from Indiana led Pi Kappa Alpha as 1988-90 National President*

On December 4, 1999, Edward A. Pease (*Indiana, Delta Xi '71*) was installed as the 87th president of the National Interfraternity Conference. Pease is the fourth member of Pi Kappa Alpha to hold this prestigious position. Past Pi Kappa Alpha NIC presidents were C. Robertson Yeager (*Kentucky, Omega '29*), Robert D. Lynn (*Presbyterian, Mu '31*) and William R. Nester (*Cincinnati, Alpha Xi '47*). The installation took place in Denver, Colorado at the NIC/Association of Fraternity Advisors annual meeting.

The NIC consists of 67 member fraternities. Founded in 1909, the NIC represents approximately 4.5 million alumni, over 400,000 college students, more than 5,500 chapter and 800 college campuses. The NIC advocates the needs of fraternities through the enrichment of the Greek experience, advancement and growth of the systems, and enhancement of the educational mission of the host institutions.

Pease currently serves as a Republican congressman in the United States House of Representatives for the 7th Congressional District of the State of Indiana. Now in his second term, Pease's popularity was evident during his re-election when he captured an overwhelming 70% of the vote. He serves on the judiciary and transportation/infrastructure committees. During the first session of the 105th Congress, Pease was one of only eight representatives out of 435 present for 100% of the 633 votes taken.

Prior to Washington, D.C., Pease was an attorney in private practice and served for 12 years as a member of the Indiana State Senate. During his tenure in the state legislature, he was named "Legislator of the Year" four times. After voluntarily leaving state politics, Pease went to Indiana State University where he served at different times as an instructor, general counsel, and development officer.

Despite his incredibly busy schedule, Pease always makes time for Pi Kappa Alpha. He served Delta Xi Chapter as president while only a sophomore, then the youngest president in chapter history. Following his graduation from Indiana University, Pease was named the 1973 Powers Award winner as Pi Kappa Alpha's most outstanding undergraduate. He then earned his juris doctorate in 1977, also from Indiana. In 1975, Pease was hired to the Headquarters staff as director of alumni affairs.

In the volunteer ranks, Pease quite possibly has no equal. He served Theta Omicron Chapter at Indiana State as chapter advisor from the time of its colonization, only relin-

quishing the post when other Fraternity positions needed his skills. Pease was named Pi Kappa Alpha's Chapter Advisor of the Year in 1983.

At the 1984 National Convention in Dallas, Pease was elected to a two-year term as vice president on the Supreme Council. He was re-elected in 1986 at the Boston National Convention. Then in 1988 at the Chicago National Convention, Pease was elected national president, a position he held until the term's completion in 1990. During his time on the Supreme Council, Pease was a staunch supporter of the Fraternity's academic mission, leadership development and expansion. He also was known to always make time for any Pi Kappa Alpha officer, staff member or undergraduate who sought his counsel.

In 1998, Pease was presented with Pi Kappa Alpha's highest honor, The Order of West Range. A generous alumnus, Pease is a member of the Educational Foundation's **Oak Trust**, as well as the Junior Founders Donor Society. He is also a charter life member of the *International Alumni Association*.

About Pease's NIC presidency, Executive Vice President Orians remarked, "I've known Ed Pease for over 25 years, and I can safely say that he is one of Pi Kappa Alpha's most outstanding individuals. His leadership, integrity, and commitment to the total Greek experience will certainly lead the NIC and the fraternity world to even greater heights. We're fortunate to have Ed as a member of our Fraternity, and the NIC is fortunate to have him as its president."

# 1999 Housing Awards

## Wayne State and Nebraska-Kearney Chapters Take Top Honors

The Fraternity acknowledges those groups that do an exemplary job of caring for and managing their houses through a recognition program that includes awards for House of the Quarter, Chapter House of the Year and Chapter Room of the Year. The Quarterly winners each receive a \$250 grant for maintenance and improvements, a certificate, and recognition in the Fraternity's newsletter, *The Forum*. The Chapter House of the Year is selected from the quarterly recipients and receives a \$1,000 grant, a trophy, and recognition in the *Shield and Diamond*. The Chapter Room of the Year Award is available to those groups who do not have a "house" per se, but utilize some form of physical chapter room. The winner of this award receives recognition in this article, a trophy, and a \$500 grant.

### Chapter Room of the Year

Iota Gamma Chapter at the University of Nebraska-Kearney was presented the Chapter Room of the Year Award at the 1999 Officers Leadership Academy. Their facility actually has three rooms – a game room, a lounge and a chapter room that are all beautifully maintained. The chapter room is dedicated to past Pi Kappa Alpha National President Dr. William R. Nester (*Cincinnati, Alpha Xi '47*). Dr. Nester was instrumental in the founding of the Iota Gamma Chapter while president of the university. The chapter room has space to seat the entire chapter and is headed by a traditional mahogany presidential table. The room contains a trophy case that is home to some of Iota Gamma's many Robert Adger Smythe Awards. Pictures of the founders adorn the walls to "watch over" the chapter as it conducts business.

The three rooms are on the main floor of a University dormitory building that serves as a fraternity facility. Two chairmen oversee the property, one responsible for improvements and the other maintenance. The improvements chairman is responsible for pricing and collecting materials, then supervising the improvements. The maintenance

chairman is responsible for posting and supervising weekly clean-up schedules and organizing all chapter clean-ups.

The brothers of Iota Gamma are to be commended for exemplifying the high ideals of Pi Kappa Alpha by maintaining their facility as a model for all chapters. Congratulations.

### Chapter House of the Year

Delta Nu Chapter at Wayne State University was presented the Chapter House of the Year Award at the 1999 Officers Leadership Academy. Delta Nu's home has a long and unique history. The slate roofed, red brick, white pillared, plantation-like home was built in 1895. It was constructed as a four-family residence and served that purpose for approximately 30 years. In 1925 it was purchased and renovated into a 7,500 square foot

funeral home. The building was complete with viewing parlors, casket storage, an embalming room and a refrigerated area for cadavers. It's believed that the great Harry Houdini was prepared within these walls upon his death. Delta Nu purchased the house in 1992 and retrofitted it as a fraternity house. The building houses 26 men. With the tile already in place, the embalming room became a great kitchen.

The Delta Nu house is in a prime downtown Detroit location. The neighborhood is in a complete revitalization phase. The university as well as the city are developing new buildings as well as renovating existing surrounding buildings. The most pronounced improvement is the soon to be opened new Tiger Stadium which is only a few blocks from the Pike house.

The house suffered damage in a relatively

minor fire in the fall of 1997. Since that time the chapter has accomplished over \$20,000 of improvements. New carpets, painted walls, replaced furniture and generally improved facilities have returned the house to Pi Kappa Alpha's upper echelon.

The chapter has a house manager who stocks cleaning supplies, oversees needed repairs, and posts a weekly cleaning schedule. All live-in members have a specific weekly task and all chapter members participate in comprehensive monthly house "clean-ups".

Listed below are some of the key management practices that the chapter and house corporation utilize to insure success:

- ♦ The house corporation charges the chapter a flat (doesn't fluctuate with actual occupancy) annual rental rate.
- ♦ The house corporation uses a written operating agreement with the chapter.
- ♦ The chapter has written live-in requirements for all of its members.
- ♦ The chapter has written room contracts.
- ♦ The chapter charges a market rental rate.
- ♦ The chapter charges in-house brothers a security deposit equal to one months rent.

The house corporation and the chapter are to be commended for taking pride in their historic home and managing it in such a successful manner. Congratulations.



## Spring 2000 International Work Day

In 1999, over \$50,000 of house improvements were completed in Pi Kappa Alpha chapter houses across the United States and Canada on just one day. The International Work Day Program is now starting its third year, and this year is already looking like it will be the best one yet. The International Fraternity has committed several thousand dollars to encourage groups to organize and complete a successful Work Day.

### What is International Work Day?

Chapters and house corporations are setting aside one day in the spring of 2000 for students, alumni, parents, and guests to work on the chapter house and/or grounds. The chapter and house corporation work together to select the best date, develop an agenda, and choose projects that will improve the property. Invitations are sent to chapter alumni, area alumni, parents and guests to inform them of this opportunity to participate. This is a tangible way for alumni to contribute, see old friends and open up lines of communication with today's Pi Kappa Alpha members.





## Alpha Upsilon Chapter Rechartered at New York University

The original chartering of Alpha Upsilon Chapter took place on April 12, 1912, amidst a thriving Greek community at New York University. The chapter lost its charter in 1933 and lay silent for 66 years until the fall of 1999.

Chapter consultants Geoff Fiedler (*New Hampshire, Gamma Mu '95*) and Jim Yolch (*Minnesota, Beta Chi '93*) began the recolonization effort in fall 1997. They relied on the recommendations of respected leaders to find and unleash the potential of the many young men on Washington Square. The recruiting class of founding fathers grew from six brothers to 52 over the next two years. In that time, all chartering objectives were accomplished and the colony became the largest and most respected fraternity on campus.

Director of Expansion Ryan Flickinger's (*Southern Illinois, Iota Mu '94*) constant contact with the colony's executive board and his frequent visits kept NYU's colony members on track toward their ultimate goal of becoming a chapter. Aiding in Flickinger's quest were Mike Pujol (*Florida International, Kappa Gamma '95*) and Chuck Fellers (*Oklahoma, Beta Omicron '95*) whose timely visits helped answer critical questions and reassure the colony that it was ready to move on to chapter status.

Former Pi Kappa Alpha chapter consultant Emil Peters (*Southern Methodist, Beta Zeta '92*) was the colony's first advisor. After a career change moved Peters to Dallas, current advisor Steven Antone (*Michigan, Beta Tau '95*) took over and guided Alpha Upsilon Colony on a full-time basis. His dedication and accessibility were vital in the refounding process. Antone was greatly assisted by Michael Hirshfield (*New Mexico, Beta Delta '86*) and Riccardo Spadola (*American, Kappa Upsilon '97*). Both Antone and Spadola had been colony members in their now chartered chapters, thus providing valuable insight to the NYU colony members in their pursuit of a charter.

The men of Pi Kappa Alpha took seriously the objectives put forth in the *Garnet and Gold* and always tried to maintain the reputation of scholars, leaders, athletes and gentlemen that they worked so hard to obtain. As the academic rigors of NYU dictate, scholarship has been a top priority. At the time of inspection, the

colony's cumulative grade point average was an impressive 3.6. Active on campus, the members of the colony participated in student government, the accounting society, the student newspaper, Inter-Greek Council, Inter-Fraternity Council and Italian Club, among others. Each and every brother takes a leadership role in at least one organization at New York University. Members of the colony have participated in varsity track, varsity wrestling, varsity soccer, varsity basketball, varsity golf, junior varsity basketball, club baseball, club hockey and club lacrosse.

On October 8, brothers from Iota Chi Chapter at Connecticut, Gamma Tau Chapter at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and Kappa Xi Chapter at SUNY-Albany made the trip to New York City to serve as host chapters on installation weekend. Four of Antone's Beta Tau brothers also assisted. From the Headquarters staff, Fiedler, Yolch and Flickinger were also participants in the great event.

To celebrate the transition from colony to chapter, a lavish banquet was held at the University Club. Parents, alumni, school officials and friends were invited to celebrate the special bonds that were formalized over the course of the weekend. International President Tom Handler (*Illinois, Beta Eta '73*) was the keynote speaker, offering words of support and advice that the brothers of Alpha Upsilon Chapter will never forget.

### Greek System at New York University


The Greek system at NYU is directed by three student-run governing councils and the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life. The Inter-Greek Council (IGC) is the central govern-

ing body of the entire Greek System and sits on the University Committee for Student Life (UCSL). The UCSL is the governing organization for the NYU student body. The purpose of the IGC is to promote and represent the interests of the fraternity and sorority community. The Inter-Sorority Council (ISC) and the Inter-Fraternity Council (IFC) govern the activities of the five women's sororities and eleven men's fraternities respectively. IFC and ISC are sub-councils of the IGC.

### New York University History

In the early nineteenth century, a major emphasis in higher education was on the study of Greek and Latin, with little attention to modern or contemporary subjects. In 1831, the founders of New York University intended to enlarge the scope of higher education to meet the needs of persons aspiring to careers in business, industry, science, the arts, law, medicine and the ministry.

New York University is recognized as a leader in scholarship. Of the more than 3,000 colleges and universities in America, only 27 private institutions, including New York University, are members of the distinguished Association of American Universities. Students come to the University from all 50 states and from 120 foreign countries. The University includes 13 schools, colleges and divisions at five major centers in Manhattan. Enrollment in the undergraduate divisions ranges between 44 and 5,400. More than 2,500 courses are offered, leading to more than 25 different degrees. ♦




Center Jason Collier leads the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets into ACC play.

# Focus on Leadership

## Bobby Bowden (Samford, Alpha Pi '49)

*Focus on Leadership is an ongoing series from the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation. Its purpose is to provide a forum through which ideas and insights on leadership can be communicated from Pi Kappa Alpha alumnus members who have demonstrated outstanding leadership in their chosen vocations.*

*The development of our undergraduate brothers through leadership education and training is paramount to the future success of Pi Kappa Alpha, and as such, is one of the Educational Foundation's primary missions.*

As Bobby Bowden wraps up his 24th football season as the head coach of the Florida State Seminoles, he once again has his team ranked #1 and poised for yet another run at the National Championship. This season has been even more event-filled than most. Not only did he become just the fifth head coach in history to record 300 career victories, he also became the first head coach in history to face his son as an opposing head coach.

Brother Bowden has been described as, "a proud moral leader for Florida State University, a family man of the first order, a caring disciplinarian, and a calming voice in the face of the turbulence surrounding college football." Words like respect, sincerity, integrity, class, honesty, charisma and humor perhaps describe and define Brother Bowden better than wins or coaching records. He has become somewhat of a folk hero in the South, and he is constantly in demand during the off-season for speaking engagements.


The Educational Foundation's Director of Development Chris Peters sat down with Coach Bowden recently in Tallahassee to talk about his views on the importance leadership plays in life.

### *What made you want to lead others?*

The positions I wanted in life required me to be a leader. I wanted to be a head football coach at a major university and you can't get that position unless you are a leader. I tried to train myself to read and find out what leaders do to make people want to follow them and I have tried to do some of those things.

### *Do you have some leaders throughout history who have inspired you?*

Oh yes, I read all the time and there have been many great leaders who have inspired me. Most of my reading is military, and generals all the way throughout history inspire and intrigue me. From the Civil War you have General Lee, General Grant, and Stonewall Jackson. From

World War II, you have MacArthur, Patton, and Eisenhower. They came along when I was a youngster and they were my heroes.

### *Who were some of your mentors? Who really influenced you and your thinking?*

I played football at a small college where there was no big name coach that was coaching me. If I told you the name of my coach you would never have heard of him. It's not like I went to Alabama, Tennessee or Notre Dame. I went to Howard College, which is now Samford University. I got a great education there and learned a lot by the "school of hard knocks", having to learn things myself. Therefore as mentors, I studied other guys that coached at other schools, like Frank Thomas who was the head coach at Alabama, Bear Bryant when he came to Alabama, Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech, General Neyland at Tennes-

see, Frank Leahy at Notre Dame, Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma. Those were the great coaches when I first got into coaching back in 1953, so they were my mentors.

### *How do you define leadership?*

Leadership is the ability of a man to inspire others and make them want to follow him. I think it is built around having trust in him, and having faith in him. The great leaders I have studied about have two things that separate them from other pretty good leaders. One, they were very compassionate men. Two, they all have great integrity.

### *What are some of your strengths and weaknesses as a leader?*

I don't know what my strengths would be except I like people. I really do enjoy people. I hardly ever meet someone I don't like. I really don't know anyone I don't like. I may have disagreements, but I really like everybody. I feel compassion for the downtrodden more so probably than those on top. I also believe in enthusiasm and discipline in everything you do in life, and you coach what you believe. Of course I have some faults too. I am lazy at times, and have some others.

### *What are some of the common traits that the leaders on your teams possess?*

Well, most of the leaders of our team are usually upperclassmen. It's just not normal for a freshman to walk in and be an immediate leader. So most often they are the older guys on the team, the guys with more maturity. Then they have to be somebody that will set a positive example. They can't go out there and break all the rules of the university and all the rules of the football team and then expect to be a leader. They have to abide by the rules and support the coaches. Some guys are willing to

do that so they're the guys you look to for leadership. I believe that a boy who comes through our program, and makes the effort and participates the way he should, will be a better man for it.

*So leading by example is imperative?*


Yes, leading by example with a positive attitude and not a negative attitude.

*What advice do you have for our young undergraduates that are aspiring to be leaders?*

For those brothers aspiring to be leaders, I'd say, number one, get as good an education as you can get. Get as many degrees as feasible for you to get. Then go to work and don't look for the easy way. Be willing to work at the very bottom of the profession. I think sometimes the greatest leaders that I've seen in business are guys that started off digging ditches so to speak. They started from there and moved to where they are with a real appreciation of the company. Sometimes they make great leaders with that background. So I'd say get all the education you can get and learn as much about the company as you can. Assert yourself without running over anyone, don't stomp on anybody, don't stampede anybody. Just work your way as hard as you can to the front. Be compassionate and always show integrity and have a positive attitude that you are going in the right direction and stick with it.

*Thinking back to some of your days at Howard (now Samford), what made you want to join PiKA?*

Well, when I graduated from high school I

went to the University of Alabama and it seemed like my closest friends were PiKAs at Alabama. So I rushed at the University of Alabama, but then I left the very next semester and went up to Howard College and PiKA was the strongest fraternity on the campus. So they rushed me, and I joined them as a freshman and became a PiKA, and then when I was a senior I was president.

## Bobby Bowden Fast Facts

- Born and raised in Birmingham, Alabama.
- Initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha at Samford University's (formerly Howard College) Alpha Pi Chapter in 1949.
- Served Alpha Pi Chapter as president in 1952.
- His son Jeff, the Seminoles' wide receivers Coach, is a 1980 initiate of Florida State's Delta Lambda Chapter.
- 24th Season as Head Coach at Florida State University.
- Led Seminoles to the 1993 National Championship.
- Became just the 5th head coach in major college football to record 300 career victories.
- First coach in NCAA history to lead a team to a ranking of fourth or higher in the final Associated Press poll for 12 consecutive years.
- First coach in Division 1-A football history to record 10 or more wins in 12 consecutive seasons.
- Ranks first among coaches with an all-time bowl winning percentage of .750 (16-5-1), and is the only coach to win 11 straight bowl games.
- First coach to face his son as an opposing head coach on the collegiate level when FSU faced Tommy Bowden's Clemson Tigers.
- Named to the Sports Hall of Fame in Florida and Alabama.
- Named National Coach of the Year in 1979, 1980, 1991, and 1996.
- Named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in 1993 and 1997.

*Thinking back on your time as president of the chapter, what was your proudest accomplishment?*

That's easy. Our chapter had the highest grade point average of any PiKA chapter in the nation when we were seniors in 1952. I'm very proud of that. It's striving for high goals like that, whether it's in the Fraternity, or on the field, or in your church group that builds character and determines what kind of man you are going to be.

*Do you think your experiences as an All-American football player and president of the fraternity shaped you in later life?*

No doubt about it. Many of the things that happened to me at that time of my life had a very positive effect on me later. The discipline, the emphasis on teamwork and organization, the commitment to excellence, all those things helped make me a better coach and a better man. The fraternity helped me because I learned something about values and codes and I learned something about being a leader, having restrictions to follow and guidelines to follow to be a good PiKA. I enjoyed learning the service part of it. I learned to serve others, which is good. The best thing about football is you learn to sacrifice. You learn to sacrifice your body and your own glory to try and help the team win. So I think I learned a lot there that carried over into later life.

*Would you characterize both of those experiences, football and fraternity, as being leadership laboratories?*

I think so. You take a guy that goes to college and he joins the PiKAs, and three or four years later he's the president or one of the leaders, and it probably means that the cream has come to the top. Often he happens to be some of that cream and that's how you can get some of your great leaders.

*I know that you're a long way from being finished with coaching, but when you do retire, how would you like your fellow coaches, players, and fans to remember you?*

When I leave Florida State, about a hundred years from now, I'd prefer to be remembered more for building character in young men than for winning national championships. But of course I think we can and have done both. I believe that character is built through the hard work and perseverance that's required of young men playing on a quality football team.

I would like for people to think that Bobby Bowden was as good a coach they've ever seen. That he did it right, and he didn't cheat. He did it by the rules. I'd hate to be a great coach that cheated. I'd like for them to be able to say, "boy, he's a great coach and he did it right." That's what I want.

**Opportunities to Support the Educational Foundation Through Planned or Deferred Giving**

**Learn the Lingo...**

The following terms are often used when speaking of estate planning. We hope this will help you understand the terminology and that you will consider supporting the Educational Foundation in your philanthropic endeavors.

**501(c)(3):**

Section of the Internal Revenue Service Code that designates an organization, like the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation, as charitable, tax-exempt and nonprofit.

**Bequest:**

A gift made through a will, a living trust or codicil to a will or trust. Bequests may include cash, marketable securities, life insurance proceeds, closely held stock, real estate and/or tangible personal property. They may be of a specific sum, a percentage or the residue of an estate.

**Appreciated Securities:**

Stocks, bonds, or mutual funds that have increased in value and are now worth more than what you originally paid. Gifts of appreciated securities to the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation create an immediate income tax deduction based on their current value, and allow the donor to avoid capital gains tax on the corresponding securities.

**Charitable Lead Trust:**

Trusts that distribute annual income to a charity like the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation. After the prescribed period (one or more person's lifetimes, a set number of years, or a combination of the two), the trust principle returns to the donor or someone designated by the donor.

**Charitable Remainder Trust:**

Individualized trust under which the donor and/or a designated beneficiary receive income for life or a fixed number of years in return for the irrevocable transfer of cash or property to a trustee like the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation. When the trust terminates, the remainder interest is distributed to a charitable organization, such as the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation.

**Endowment:**

Fund in which the principle is invested, and only a portion of the investment earnings are spent. Thus, endowments through the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation offer a perpetual source of funds for whatever scholarship or leadership program you wish to support.

## Reel Named Honorary Clemson Alumnus

Jerry Reel is a unique man. One might say he's one of a kind – until recently, even in his own family. His wife, his three children, and their spouses are all Clemson University alumni. His wife was Mother of the Year for Tiger Brotherhood in 1998. And with hopes of keeping the family tradition alive and expanding on it with more degrees, Reel believes his four grandchildren will someday be Tigers.



**100 Years Ago...**In the *Shield & Diamond* of December 1899, Grand Secretary J. Pike Powers, Jr. (*Virginia, Alpha '1895*) submitted these insightful thoughts on the importance of perpetual rush: "Do not neglect the men who first failed to attract your attention, for many of them would make good Phis (pledges). While at first they don't appear to be particularly brilliant, they develop into excellent fraternity material. Therefore, be ever on the watch for developing talent. Do not rest satisfied. Do not be content if there are any good men yet to be obtained."

**75 Years Ago...**In December of 1924, **Beta Alpha Chapter (Penn State)** reported on the *Pi Kappa Alpha Entertainers*, a full or-



chestra that was receiving wide attention. Aside from broadcasting regularly on local radio station WPAB, the excellent combination entertained at the Fifth Annual Industrial Conference and the prestigious Ninth Annual Engineering Extension Conference, both under the auspices of the college. "They play at all the banquets, entertainments and dances that a full academic schedule will permit and have built up an enviable local reputation as the best orchestra between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia."



## Chapter Eternal

### Robert C. Hahnen (Minnesota, Beta Chi '25)

Pi Kappa Alpha and Beta Chi Chapter lost a dear brother with the passing of Robert C. Hahnen (Minnesota, Beta Chi '25). Known to all as simply Bob, Hahnen was quite possibly the single most identifiable person in the history of Beta Chi.



Before his passing, Hahnen was believed to be the oldest living Beta Chi initiate, and one of the very few living members from the chapter's first phase 1922-1934. Even though he ran track for the Minnesota Golden Gophers, Hahnen's true passion was Pi Kappa Alpha. Despite Beta Chi going silent in 1934, Hahnen remained quite involved with Pi Kappa Alpha. Aside from constantly working for the chapter's return which eventually happened in 1986, Hahnen served as president of the Beta Chi Building Corporation, district president and national pledge-training director, the last position from which he resigned in 1954 in protest over the Fraternity's failure to remove the "white clause", a cause for which Hahnen fought for 16 years (*Editor's Note - The "white clause" was finally stricken from Pi Kappa Alpha at the 1960 convention, thus opening Pi Kappa Alpha to all men.*).

Hahnen attended a total of 11 Fraternity conventions, including Memphis in 1954 when the old Memorial Headquarters was dedicated. He was a regular donor to both Beta Chi and the Educational Foundation, was awarded Diamond Life Member Status, and was named into the prestigious Order of West Range at the 1994 Innsbrook, Florida Convention. Those fortunate to be in attendance at that convention will never forget Hahnen leading the entire delegation in the song, "How'd You Like To Be A PiKA?"

Hahnen is survived by sons Robert Jr. and Richard, four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. His memory will certainly live on with Beta Chi Chapter and Pi Kappa Alpha.

### C. Thomas Clifton (Cincinnati, Alpha Xi '26)

C. Thomas Clifton was born in Oak Park, Illinois and in 1925 entered the University of Cincinnati College of Engineering, where he was initiated into Alpha Xi Chapter in 1926. He graduated in 1930 and in 1935 earned a doctorate in philosophy. Brother Clifton worked as the director of operations for the national Youth Administration until he entered the Navy as a commander. After the war, he opened his own business, Clifton Corp., a management consulting firm in Washington, D.C. In 1964, Clifton represented the United States at an International Labor Organization conference in Geneva, Switzerland. Upon retirement, he returned to Cincinnati and served on various organizations including SHA and CE & CF. Clifton was a counselor in the career resource center at the University of Cincinnati. He exemplified all the characteristics of a scholar, leader, athlete and gentleman. Adam Brady (*Cincinnati, Alpha Xi '94*) remembers seeing Clifton in action at a CE & CF meeting. "He was feisty and would always give the chapter president his opinions on how to improve Alpha Xi. His intelligence shined through and his rationale was on the mark even though he had been removed from the chapter for quite some time. Through thick and thin, Tom Clifton dedicated his life to helping make Alpha Xi a better place. He is a model for all of us to look up to in admiration." Clifton entered Chapter Eternal on October 26, 1999 at the age of 91.

### Charles Jolliff, Jr. (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '43)

Charles Jolliff, Jr., head coach of boys' basketball at Walnut Valley Christian Academy died October 1, 1999 in Little Rock, Arkansas. He was a letterman in basketball at the University of Arkansas, where he was initiated into Alpha Zeta Chapter in 1943, and played for the Razorback teams that qualified for the NCAA Semi-Finals (today's Final Four) in 1944 and 1945. He was also a member of the ROTC and graduated with a B.A. in English, journalism emphasis, in 1946. Jolliff began his coaching and teaching career at his alma mater,

Manila High School (Ark.) and in 1949 began a long and distinguished career in organization management, which was followed by his return to coaching in the 1990s. His career included 27 years in the chamber of commerce, industrial development and tourism work in Arkansas, Missouri, Indiana, Massachusetts, Colorado and Texas. He served terms as president of the Arkansas Retail Grocers' Association and of the North East American Chamber of Commerce Executives. In 1988, Jolliff received the Spirit of America Award from the National Retail Grocers Association for his "diligent efforts to preserve and protect free enterprises." In the 1960s and 70s, he was involved in Southern Baptist pioneer mission work in Massachusetts where he was instrumental in organizing the Holden Chapel, today a 1,000 member congregation. Brother Jolliff had a gift for working with young people. For nearly 50 years, he served in many leadership positions in various churches and communities. He coached AAU boys' basketball, which led to an AAU National Championship in 1993. His most cherished role, however, was husband and father. He is survived by his wife, Barbara Ann, and their two children, Charles and Kara Ann.

### Wheat Williams (Emory, Beta Kappa '44)

Wheat Williams, a 1944 initiate of Beta Kappa Chapter, entered Chapter Eternal on Tuesday, October 20, 1999. A World War II veteran and graduate of Emory University's School of Law, Williams practiced law for four years in the 1950s, and then joined his father's company. He inherited Decatur, Georgia's second oldest real estate firm, sold houses in the city for decades, and helped shape the way real estate brokers do business in DeKalb County. Except for two years in the Navy, the Decatur native lived his entire life within five miles of the spot where he was born. In the early 1960s, while serving as director of the DeKalb Board of Realtors, Williams developed the country's multiple listing service to help smaller realty companies share information on properties. He served as president of the board until 1969 and held memberships in various organizations including the Atlanta Board

of Realtors, the DeKalb County Chamber of Commerce, the Decatur-DeKalb Bar Association, the First Baptist Church of DeKalb and the Atlanta Pi Kappa Alpha Alumni Association, where he served as president. Williams kept in contact with 50 Beta Kappa brothers over the past 49 years by sending newsletters of his own creation and when brothers were in Atlanta, he would plan events for dinner and other gatherings. In 1983, after he was diagnosed with cancer, those 50 brothers and their wives gave a dinner in his honor to show their appreciation for his dedication to them and Pi Kappa Alpha. Pallbearers included 15 Beta Kappa brothers. Williams is survived by his wife and two sons.
