

In the February issue of Forbes magazine there appears an article entitled "Best Fraternities for Future CEOs." The article cites that "the social skills that help students gain admittance into the Greek system are the same aptitudes that later gave them a leg-up in corporate climbing." While

only 8.5% of full-time university undergraduates are members of either a fraternity or sorority, Greek organizations have been the breeding ground for 120 of *Forbes 500* CEOs. Greeks also represent 48% of all U.S. presidents, 42% of U.S. senators, 30% of U.S. congressmen, and 40% of U.S. Supreme Court justices.

For us alumni, this news comes as no surprise. The Fraternity is a school not in the traditional sense of sitting in a classroom, but in offering opportunities to exercise judgment, motivate others and develop the skills that make good leaders. Hopefully, that is the experience for the majority of our members. While we were given these opportunities, we grew up with a group of men who, in many cases, became the closest friends that we could ever hope to have. Life's lessons which we learned had nothing to do with the quality of the chapter house, number of people attending a social event or the number of trophies acquired. Rather, those lessons were based on the friendships we formed and the importance we placed on being a good friend.

As we all know, the coverage fraternities receive in the press is often less than favorable. Admittedly, irresponsible behavior and bad social climate do exist in some fraternities. I believe, however, that the majority of

our members are experiencing something that will benefit them for the rest of their lives and that they are unaware of the full impact of their growth, as it was in my case, until it is behind them.

As international president, I have the opportunity to meet young men from throughout North America who comprise our current undergraduate membership. For instance, this past January the Fraternity hosted the Chapter Presidents Conference, which commemorated its thirtieth anniversary, in Memphis, Tennessee. Chapter presidents and rush chairmen came, at their own expense, from across North America to experience a weekend of seminars designed to sharpen their leadership abilities. The quality of this conference is only surpassed by the quality of the participants. I had the privilege of meeting and talking with several of our young leaders - I was impressed by their selfassurance, intellect and vision for what they wished to accomplish in their chapters. What struck me most about these men was their strong determination and enthusiasm for the journey ahead. The commitment of the leaders assembled in Memphis to build a better Pi Kappa Alpha was inspiring. As I boarded the flight to return to Atlanta on the last day of the conference, I realized that our chapters are in very good hands and that 2003 is going to be a very good year for Pi Kappa Alpha.

# Delta Eta Chapter Rechartered At the University of Delaware

On November 16, 2002, Delta Eta Chapter, which had been silent since 1998, was rechartered at the University of Delaware with 81 members initiated into the bonds.

The colony took shape in May of 2001 after expansion consultants Mike McMillan (California-San Diego, Kappa Phi'97) and DruWilson (East Central, Epsilon Omega '96) recruited the finest scholars, leaders, athletes, and gentlemen at the University of Delaware. Over the next three terms, colony members worked diligently to attain their chartering goals. They petitioned for installation in early fall, and in October the colony was formally inspected. On the inspection team were representatives from Beta Pi Chapter (Pennsylvania) and Lambda Zeta Chapter (Drexel), along with Lambda Zeta Chapter Advisor Eric Pettine (Coastal Carolina, Kappa Rho'97). The colony passed its inspection and received approval for chartering from every chapter, international officer and member of the Supreme Council.

On Friday, November 15th, 81 enthusiastic colony members were initiated into the brotherhood. This massive undertaking was successfully completed thanks in no small part to the participation of Iota Lambda Chapter (Columbia), Delta Psi Chapter (Maryland), and Beta Pi Chapter. Also conducting initiations were a team of Delta Eta alumni and a team from International Headquarters. Initiations began

at 5:00 p.m. and continued into the night until their efforts culminated with the initiation of Colony President Scott Hausknecht (*Delaware*, *Delta Eta*, '02) at 11:30 p.m.

On Saturday, November 16, the colony was officially installed as the Delta Eta Chapter in a morning ceremony. Following the installation, a banquet was held on campus to recognize the new chapter. Attending were International President D. Mark Anderson (Wofford, Nu '76), International Vice Presidents Bruce Wolfson (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '71) and Howard Goldstein (Lehigh, Gamma Lambda '81), and North Atlantic Regional President Mark Robertson (Southern Methodist, Beta Zeta '82). Also present were past and present members of the international staff, including Director of Housing Programs Justin Buck (Southeast Missouri, Epsilon Iota'96), Director of Expansion Ryan Van Andel (Berkeley, Alpha Sigma '97) and former Expansion ConsultantWilson.

Speakers at the banquet included International President Anderson, who delivered a powerful message to Delta Eta Chapter. Anderson recounted how the chapter had first

founding father of Lambda Epsilon Chapter, and served as rush chairman, vice president and president. He was also a member of the Nominating Committee at the 2002 Convention.









The "Why I Pledged" feature has focused on seasoned Pi Kappa Alpha alumni in past issues, but the insights of our recent graduates can be equally instructive.

Scott Himes was appointed to a one-year term as undergraduate Supreme Council vice president at the 2001 Officers Leadership Academy in Memphis. He served Iota Delta Chapter at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology as president, rush chairman and assistant rush chairman. He is a member of the Educational Foundation's Sabre & Key Honor Society for outstanding academic performance. Himes graduated in 2002 and currently resides in Dallas, Texas where he works for Texas Instruments in technical sales.

The Shield & Diamond asked Himes to tell us about his rush experience, and why he chose to pledge Pi Kappa Alpha:


# What first attracted you to Pi Kappa Alpha?

I had not planned on joining a fraternity when I first came to Rose-Hulman. I came to school to focus on my classes, get good grades and a good job to start my professional career. I viewed fraternities as disruptive, harmful and completely incompatible with academic success. Even after I arrived on campus and met some members of various fraternities, I was not interested in joining. The guys I met seemed to be great, but I still doubted where their priorities were as fraternity men.

Thankfully, our school had an 8-week formal rush program. As time went on I met more members of various fraternities and I began to learn what a fraternity really was. The stereotypical picture I had in my mind began to disappear as I saw first hand the good work the fraternities did and type of people that fraternities attracted. The Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity stood out from all the rest for several reasons. The Pikes seemed to be the guys who were most like myself and made an extra effort to get to know me. I was

surprised by how serious they took not only their academics, but also extracurricular involvement and holding leadership positions. They were known as the 'milk and cookie boys' on campus, and other fraternities would try to portray this image in a negative way. However, for an 18 year-old freshman who drank very rarely, the image of a fraternity that placed little emphasis on drinking appealed to me very much. When bid day arrived, it came down to the friends I made. I formed more friendships with Pikes than with members of any other fraternity, and this is the main reason I joined Pi Kappa Alpha.

# What rush techniques did the Pikes at Rose-Hulman use?

Since rush lasted eight weeks, the Pikes were able to use a variety of techniques to attract me. I attended events such as laser tag, bowling, cookouts, Pike Day (where we played football, volleyball and other sports), movie nights and dinners. Even though the large group events were a lot of fun and a good chance to meet several guys at once, I was most impressed by the small dinners to which I was invited. At least once a week a small group of Pikes would take me out to dinner, where we would have a chance to relax and socialize. Those were great opportunities for me to ask any questions that I had as well as get a good idea of what fraternity life was really like.

I also attended an informal interview at the beginning of rush, which provided a chance for the freshmen to see the house and meet the guys for the first time. As rush went on I went to two formal interviews, which gave the Pikes a chance to evaluate me as a person and decide if I would be a good fit for their Fraternity. I was very impressed with the Pikes' professionalism at these interviews, because the other fraternities I visited were not nearly as organized. After my very last interview, I was led into the chapter room where the rush chairman extended a formal bid. I could tell this was something they took very seriously and only gave to people who they really wanted. After this I was sure that Pi Kappa Alpha was right for me.

#### Why is rush so important?

Any organization or group will change over time as its members change and move through different phases of their life. This is especially true with fraternities, which have members who are only active undergraduates for 4-5 years at the most. Due to this short active period, it is important that fraternities

# 2003 Chapter Presidents Conference Recap

Rush Chairmen Join Presidents In Year's First Educational Event

The Peabody Hotel in downtown Memphis, Tennessee was the site of the 31st annual Chapter Presidents Conference held January 9-11, 2003. This year's agenda once again included a special program for chapter recruitment chairmen, entitled the Rush Summit. The combined programs began on Thursday evening, January 9, and concluded with a final banquet on Saturday evening, January 11. Nearly 300 undergraduates were in attendance for this year's event, making it the largest Chapter Presidents Conference to date – the fourth year in a row that a new attendance record was set.

The Chapter Presidents Conference is unique among Pike leadership events in that its highly focused curriculum allows for intensive interaction among chapter leaders, Fraternity officers and staff. Presidents are exposed to a program specifically designed for chief chapter executive officers. The agenda rivals that found at many similar corporate programs; topics such as leadership, motivation, strategic planning, goal setting and ethical decision-making are featured each day. Rush chairmen are likewise given the unique opportunity to participate in an event custom tailored to address the challenges and opportunities of the chapter rush program. In addition to attending many of the leadership development and motivation sessions with their chapter presidents, rush chairmen also were charged with working hard during four different recruitment sessions.

The Conference was loaded with an allstar cast of Pi Kappa Alpha officers, staff, volunteers and guests. The program began with "Winning Rush". International Rush Director Todd Mudd (Missouri, Alpha Nu '81) and International Rush Advisory Committeemen Steve Heck (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '88) and Darius Sidebotham (Florida Tech, Zeta Sigma '94), assisted by Fraternity staffers Ryan Van Andel (California-Berkeley, Alpha Sigma '98) and Ryan Flickinger (Iota Mu, Southern Illinois '94), led attendees through a high-energy and informative look at the "hows" and "whys" of effective chapter recruitment. Pi Kappa Alpha remains a worldwide leader in the area of fraternity recruitment due in no small part to




the work of these brothers, and this year's program was an outstanding success.

Friday's agenda began with a program by Past National President Jerry Askew (North Carolina, Tau '74) entitled "Strategic Leadership". Askew's program was a fitting beginning to the Conference, as it focused on the concept of advancing the interests of the chapter and Fraternity through empathy and mutual commitment. The day continued with a presentation from members of The Prouty Project, a Minneapolis-based strategic planning firm. Jeff Prouty and Mike Felmlee, who also facilitated a meeting of the

Fraternity's strategic planning group that weekend, provided presidents and rush chairs with a multimedia look at the adventures and the lessons they learned during a climb to the top of Mt. Kilimanjaro (the highest peak in Africa), and how those same concepts could be applied to successful chapter operations. The day also contained an informative presentation by International Legal Counsel Pat Talley (Armstrong, Eta Mu '74) on the hazards associated with poor risk awareness planning, and how chapters can develop programs to address their needs. Executive Real Estate Officer Daniel W. Corah (Colorado State, Epsilon Theta'83) kicked-off the first of the chapter president-specific sessions with his look at how presidents can organize and

align their officers and committeemen for maximum performance.

The Conference's final day began with an energetic presentation by Mark Dziatczak (Wayne State, Delta Nu '90) entitled "One Man - The Leadership Difference". Dziatczak provided attendees with the inspiration-and demanded their dedication -to becoming a force for change within their chapter. Chapter presidents, still buzzing from this presentation, were then able to participate in a special two-part chapter president track, again led by Dziatczak. International Historian and Past National President Dr. Jerome V. Reel (Eta, Tulane '57) facilitated a look at the Fraternity's Ritual and history. The initiated members able to attend were once again amazed by the breadth and depth of Reel's knowledge of the Fraternity, including Pi Kappa Alpha's founding traditions of aggressive growth and focus on character, not demographics. After breakout sessions on public and campus relations, membership development, chapter operations and housing, International Vice President Bruce A. Wolfson (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '71) gave an overview of the Fraternity's values statements (the newlyadopted Mission, Vision and Creed) and

how chapters can develop their own "Return To Values Initiative" with programming that will create a local focus on the important principles contained therein. A new educational session, unveiled for the first time at the Conference, concluded the weekend's educational programs. International Vice President Allen W. Groves (Stetson, Delta Upsilon'79) presented "Active Leadership and the Art of Persuasion", an analysis of the behind the scenes work that must be conducted by leaders in order to be successful, and how presidents can develop these tools of change.

The 2003 Chapter Presidents Conference concluded with the International President's Leadership Banquet, featuring a keynote address from International President D. Mark Anderson (Wofford, Nu '76). Anderson called on presidents and rush chairmen to carry the ideas they learned and energy they created in Memphis back to their home chapters—to better their chapters and advance all of Pi Kappa Alpha. The banquet also included a special thank you to and from Educational Foundation President Marvin Dennis (Illinois, Beta Eta '55). Dennis and his wife, Nancy, began the endowment that funds the Chapter Presidents Conference,

and are its largest contributors. His thank you to the men who attended turned into a thank you from the audience for his leadership and generosity. By the end of the banquet no one could help but be inspired and energized – providing a great kick-off for Pi Kappa Alpha in the New Year!

continually seek out new members. One bad rush can cause a fraternity to decrease by halfin just one to two years. On every campus you can find examples of fraternities that were once dominant and because of one or two bad rushes are now bottom-tier.

Since rush occurs at the beginning of the year for most chapters, it is also the catalyst for a successful year. If rush goes well in the fall, everything else that comes after will go much smoother. The converse is also true, if rush goes poorly, then it will be very difficult to motivate members and be successful in other areas. Rush is the key indicator to people outside the fraternity, other fraternities and members inside the chapter, of how successful and dominant that chapter is compared to its competition. You very rarely see the bottom-tier fraternities on campus dominating rush and taking a lot of members.




Coaches, athletic directors and pro athletes also represent the brotherhood. Pike is proud to present the year's highlights:

#### **FOOTBALL**

Heading the list of outstanding Pi Kappa Alpha standouts is Ray Guy Award finalist Dustin Colquitt (*Zeta '01*) of the **Tennessee** 



Peach Bowl team, who ranked 12th in NCAA Division I-Apunting with a 43.2 average on 59 punts. He boomed a career best 68-yarder and had 22 punts downed inside the 20 yard line. Dustin was named to the All-Southeastern Conference first team and the North American Interfraternity Conference All-Fraternity All-American first team.

Purdue running back Joey Harris (Beta Phi '01) became the seventh runner in school history to rush for over 1,000 yards (1,022 on 227 carries with seven touchdowns). An NIC All-Fraternity first teamer, he had five 100 yard games (high of 144 versus Illinois) and played in the Sun Bowl. Named Sun Bowl Player of the Game was Boilermakers quarterback Kyle Orton (Beta Phi'02), who completed 25 of 37 for 283 yards and two scores. For the season, he hit 167 of 280 for 1,974 yards and 11 touchdowns. Kyle's best game was 24 of 43 for 331 yards, three TDs versus Wake Forest. Also playing for Purdue was defensive end Bedran Dzolovic (Beta Phi '01), who had four starts and 21 tackles.


Leading **Washington State** to a Rose Bowl berth was top scorer Drew Dunning (Gamma Xi'00), who had 111 points on 22 field goals and 45 extra points. He booted four field goals against Washington and three each versus Southern California and Arizona State. Drew's longest kick was 48 yards against California-Berkeley. Quarterback Kevin Fant (Gamma Theta'01) of **Mississippi State** connected on 163 of 311 for 1,918 yards and 10 touchdowns and Jon Mollerup (Epsilon'00) kicked off again for the **VirginiaTech** San Francisco Bowl team.




**Pomona** squad were Julian Astudillo (*Kappa Psi '02*) and Pete Ortiz (*Kappa Psi '02*).





#### WRESTLING



He spent the fall training camp with the Seattle Seahawks after previously playing for the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe in 2002. Punter Adam Wulfeck (Cincinnati, Alpha Xi '99) of the Detroit Lions practice squad was assigned to NFL Europe this spring. Playing in Arena Football League Illast spring was quarterback **Andy Rogers** (Central Arkansas, Epsilon Phi '99), who was with the Arkansas Twisters.

Cleveland Browns defensive coordinator Foge Fazio (Pittsburgh, Gamma Sigma '82) retired following the 2002 season after 15 years as an NFL assistant, 23 years as a college coach and five years as a high school coach. Other Pikes in key NFL roles were Pat Bowlen (Oklahoma, Beta Omicron '63), president-chief executive officer of the Denver Broncos, and wide receivers coach Steve Walters (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '67) of the Tennessee Titans.

The National Basketball Association features the talents of five veteran Pike players. Forward Horace Grant (Clemson, Eta Alpha '91) of the Orlando Magic started his 16th NBA season but played just five games before being released. Eight year veteran guard Fred Hoiberg (Iota State, Alpha Phi '91) is with the Chicago Bulls again. Center Travis Knight (Connecticut, Iota Chi '94) of the New York Knicks, center Jake Voskuhl (Connecticut, Iota Chi '96) of the Phoenix Suns and forward Jason Collier (Indiana, Delta Xi '97) of the Houston Rockets are also in action this winter.

After signing as a free agent, rookie guard Luke Recker (Indiana, Deta Xi '98) played with the Miami Heat's summer league squad and averaged 10.0 per game. He was released by the Heat just before the NBA season opened. Pitcher Seth Greisinger (Virginia, Alpha '95) of the Detroit Tigers and pitcher Ben Kozlowski (Central Florida, Eta Phi '99) of the Texas Rangers were the Fraternity's two big league baseball players during the 2002 season.

Veteran pro golfer **Hubert Green** (Florida State, Delta Lambda '65) had his second-best season out of six since moving to the PGA Senior Tour in 1997. He ranked 16th in earnings with \$1,218,392 in earnings for 2002.

# Pikes in the Big Leagues

A Baseball Retrospective



embers of Pi Kappa Alpha have played a role in major league baseball for ninety years. Two brothers became the first known Pike big leaguers when they broke in during the 1913 season. Catcher Bill McAllester (Tennessee, Zeta '08) got into 49 games for the St. Louis Browns and lefthanded pitcher George Clark (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '13) appeared in 11 contests for the New York Yankees. Outfielder Sammy Vick (Millsaps, Alpha Iota'15) broke in with the Yankees in 1917 and was a regular in 1919, batting .248 in 109 games. After playing for the Boston Red Sox in 1921, he retired with a .248 average over four seasons.

The Fraternity's first star player was outfielder Taylor Douthit (California-Berkeley, Alpha Sigma'19), who was with the St. Louis Cardinals (1923-31), Cincinnati Reds (1931-32) and Chicago Cubs (1933). Over 1,074 games, he batted .291 with 1,201 hits, 665 runs scored and 396 runs batted in. Taylor's best year was 1929, when he hit .336 with 206 hits, 128 runs and 52 RBI. He also had a big year in 1930, batting .303 with 201 hits, 109 runs and 93 RBI. Frank Brower (Washington & Lee'13) played third base, first base, outfield and pitcher during five big league seasons. He joined the Washington Senators in 1920 and hit .331 in 36 games. He hit .293 with 71 RBI for the Senators in 1922 then played two seasons with the Cleveland Indians. Over 450 career games, Frank hit .286.

Righthander Gordon "Dusty" Rhodes

(Utah, Alpha Tau '29) pitched briefly for the Yankees in 1929-30 then posted a 6-3 record in 1931. He was traded to the Red Sox midway through the 1932 season, then won 12 games each of the next two seasons. Gordon finished up as a starter with the Philadelphia Athletics in 1936. Also playing during the 1920s were shortstop Ben Sankey (Auburn, Upsilon'25), who was with the



Pittsburgh Pirates (1929-31); infielder Tommy Sewell (Alabama, Gamma Alpha '24), who was with the 1927 Chicago Cubs; and third baseman Ed Crowley (Georgia Tech, Alpha Delta '25) who was with the 1928 Senators.

Four more Pike brothers broke in during the decade of the 1930s. Shortstop-third baseman **Charlie Wilson** (*Presbyterian*, *Mu'25*) was with the Boston Braves (1931) and St. Louis Cardinals (1932-33,1935). Outfielder **HalWarnock** (*Arizona*, *Gamma Delta'30*) played in six contests for the Browns in 1935. Infielder **Johnny Gerlach** 

(Wisconsin, Beta Xi '36) had brief appearances with the Chicago White Soxinboth 1938 and 1939. Pitching for both the Red Sox (14 games) and Brooklyn Dodgers (12 games) during the 1938 season was Lee Rogers (Alabama, Gamma Alpha '32).

Crafty lefthander Tommy Byrne (Wake Forest, Gamma Phi'40)

had a good 13 year big league career with the Yankees (1943, 1946-51, 1954-57), Browns (1951-52), White Sox

(1953) and Senators (1953). In



1955, heled the American League with a .762 winning percentage (16-5 record) and also had 15 wins during the 1949 and 1950 seasons. Tommy pitched in four World Series for the Yankees and was one of the game's best-hitting hurl-

ers, posting a .238 career average with 145 hits, 14 home runs and 98 runs batted in.


Joining the big league ranks during the 1940s were three more Pike players. Lefty

Charlie Ripple (Wake Forest,

Gamma Phi'41) pitched for the Philadelphia Phillies in parts of three

seasons (1944-46). Catcher FredWalters (Mississippi State, Gamma Theta'34) spent a number of years in the minors before playing in 40 games for the Red Sox in 1945. Catcher Ferrell Anderson (Kansas, Beta Gamma '38) also had a lengthy minor league career with two big league shots: 79 games with the 1946 Dodgers and 18 games with the 1953 Browns.

The Fraternity's top big leaguer, pitcher Lew




the club moved to Milwaukee in 1953, he became a starter and won at least 10 games for the next 10 seasons. He led the National League with a 2.70 earned run average while posting 19 wins in 1956 then won 20 games in 1958 and 21 in 1959. Lew was World Series MVP with three wins in the 1957 series, following a 17-9 regular season. Helaterpitched for the Cardinals (1963-64), Cubs (1964-65),

Phillies (1965) and California Angels (1966-

67), posting a 203-144 career record, 3.66 earned run average and 1,074 strikeouts over 626 games and 3,068 innings.

All-American quarterback Jake Gibbs (Gamma Iota, Mississippi '59) passed up pro football to sign abonus contract with the Yankees as a catcher. After reaching the big league club at the end of the 1962 season, he played nine more seasons for New York before retiring after the 1971 season. Jake averaged


tests. Reliever Bob Humphreys (Hampden-Sydney Iota'55) pitched in 319 games for the Detroit Tigers (1962), Cardinals (1963-64), Cubs (1965), Senators (1967-70) and Milwaukee Brewers (1970). His career record was 27-21 with a 3.36 ERA. Bob stayed in the game and is now minor

league field coordinator for the Cardinals. He also spent 14 years as Milwaukee's coordinator of pitching and player development and

five seasons as minor league pitching coordinator for the Toronto Blue Jays.

(California-Berkeley, Alpha Sigma '65) joined the Cubs for three games at the end of the 1966 season then had a good year the following season as a rookie: 13-10record, 3.20ERA and 119 strikeouts in 205 innings. He also pitched for the Cubs in 1968-69 then split '63) pitched briefly for

> California-Berkeley'62) pitched six seasons in the minors before getting into one game for the 1968 Phillies.

Playing three positions (first base, outfield, designated hitter) over four big league years was Sam Ewing (Tennessee, Zeta '70). He was with the White Sox in 1973 and 1976, then had his best year in 1977 for the

first year Blue Jays, batting .287 in 97 games. He also was with Toronto for 40 games in 1978. Righthander Jack Whillock (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '61) spent a long time in the minors before making his only ap-

pearance for the Tigers in 1971. The only Pike major leaguer of the 1980s was outfielder Mike Fuentes (Florida State, Delta Lambda '78). The former All-American had brief shots with the Expos in both







1983 and 1984, appearing in a total of nine contests.

The 1990s saw four more brothers earn their big league stripes. All-American righthander **Richie Lewis** (Florida State, Delta Lambda '86) played for the first of his five big league clubs, the Baltimore Orioles, in 1992. He then pitched for the Florida Marlins (1993-95), Tigers (1996), Oakland Athletics (1996) and Cincinnati Reds (1997) before rejoining the Orioles for two games in 1998. Over 217 contests, he was 14-15 with 244 strikeouts in 293 innings. Lewis continued pitching in the minor leagues the last three seasons, primarily in the International and Mexican Leagues.

Righthanded reliever Matt Whiteside (Arkansas State, Delta Theta'87) saw action for Colorado Springs of the Pacific Coast League in 2002 after pitching in the big leagues for 10 consecutive seasons. He was with the Texas Rangers (1992-97), Phillies (1998), San Diego Padres (1999-2000) and Atlanta Braves (2001). His busiest year was 1993 with 60 appearances and he had three other years with 40 or more games. Whiteside was 18-15 with nine saves over 284 games and 402 innings. In 2002, he had 26 saves in 60 games for Colorado Springs and signed a 2003 contract to pitch for the Yokohama BayStars of Japan's Central League.

Outfielder Andy Tomberlin (Western Carolina, Zeta Xi'86) spent seven seasons in the minors before joining the Pirates for 27 games in 1993. The lefthanded hitter then played for the Red Sox (1994), Athletics (1995), New York Mets (1996-97) and Tigers

(1998). Over 192 career games, he hit .233 with 11 homers and 38 RBI. Tomberlin retired after spending the 1999-2000 seasons in the International League and is now a scout for the Brewers.

Tigers first round draft choice Seth Greisinger (Virginia, Alpha '95) joined the club in his second pro season (1998), started 21 games and had a 6-9 record. Arm problem caused him to miss all but three minor league games in 1999 and the entire 2000-2001 seasons. Greisinger pitched briefly for Toledo of the International League

and Erie of the Eastern League during 2002, but was dropped from the Tigers' 40 man roster following the season.

The Fraternity's newest big leaguer is lefty **Ben Kozlowski** (*Central Florida, Eta Phi '99*), who pitched for the Rangers at the end of the 2002 season. A 12th round pick of the Braves, he spent four seasons in the Braves system before going to the





Rangers in a minor league deal last spring. Kozlowksi received the Nolan Ryan Texas Rangers Minor League Pitcher of the Year award at the team's mid-winter banquet. Still hoping for his big league shot after playing in Triple A the last two summers is infielder **Josh Klimek** (Illinois, Beta Eta '94), who hit .262 for the Blue Jays Syracuse farm club of the International League.


Two Clemson Pikes were in the Reds organization in 2002. Former Cleveland Indians first round pick **David** 

Miller (Clemson, Eta Alpha '95) played briefly in the Southern League after three seasons at the Triple Alevel as an outfielder with Buffalo. A future big league prospect

is righthander Ryan Mottl (Clemson, Eta Alpha '96), a sixth round pick of the Reds in 2000. He posted a 15-6 record for Dayton of the Midwest League in 2001, then was 13-6 with a 3.50 ERA and 148 strikeouts in 180 innings for Stockton of the California League in 2002.

Other members of Pi Kappa Alpha have made contributions to major league baseball as executives. Serving as the second commissioner of baseball from 1945 to

1951 was Albert B. "Happy" Chandler (Transylvania,



Kappa '19), a 1982 inductee into the Baseball Hall of Fame. During World War II, he spoke out about his belief that baseball should remain in operation through the war years for the fans. His support for integration made Jackie Robinson's appearance in the big leagues possible in 1947, despite opposition from many team owners.

Gary Hughes (San Jose State, Delta Pi '60) has been Cincinnati's director of pro scouting/special assistant to the general manager since December of 1999. That season, Baseball America named him as one of the 20th century's Top 10 Scouts and one of the top three men in player

development during the 1990s. Hughes began his scouting career in 1967 and has worked for the Yankees, Expos, Marlins and Colorado Rockies in key front office posts.

### The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People

#### HABIT 7

Sharpen the Saw.

Suppose you come upon a man in the woods feverishly sawing down a tree. "You look exhausted!" you

exclaim. "How long have you been at it?"
"Over five hours," he replies, "and

I'm beat. This is hard."

"Maybe you could take a break for a
few minutes and sharpen that saw.
Then the work would go faster." "No
time," the man says emphatically.

"I'm too busy sawing."
Habit seven is taking time to sharpen the saw (you being the saw). It's the habit that makes all the others possible.

To sharpen the saw means renewing ourselves, in all four aspects of our natures;

- Physical exercise, nutrition, stress management;
- Mental-reading, visualizing, planning, writing;
- Social/Emotional service, empathy; synergy, security;
- Spiritual spiritual reading, study, and meditation.

To exercise in all these necessary dimensions, we must be proactive. No one can do it for us or make it urgent for us; it is a Quadrant II activity. For instance, exercise is a typical, high-leverage, Quadrant II activity that most of us don't do consistently enough.

We think we don't have time to exercise. What distorted thinking! We don't have time not to. We're talking about three to six hours a week. That's a drop in the bucket compared with the enormous, beneficial impact on the other 162-plus hours in the week. Be proactive. If it's raining on the morning you've scheduled to jog, do it anyway. "Oh good!" you'll cry. "It's raining! I get to develop my willpower as well as my body!"

Reading for your work and planning require their own allotment of Quadrant II time; and you obviously must be wise enough not to "sacrifice" so much for your profession that you neglect your family, friends, and community.

Taking care of your spiritual dimension

renews your core, your center, your commitment to all your principles. People do this in a variety of ways. Some meditate on the scriptures. Others immerse themselves in great literature or music, or commune with nature.

In a story called "The Turn of the Tide," Arthur Gordon describes a time when he found his world stale and flat. His enthusiasm for life waned, and he was getting worse daily.

The noon prescription read, "Try reaching back." To what? He thought of the joyful times of his childhood, and felt a growing warmth inside.

The 3 p.m. message threw some cold water on him: "Examine your motives." At first, he was defensive. Of course he wanted success, fame, security – he could justify them all. But then it occurred to him that these motives weren't good enough, and that fact was making him

stagnant. "It makes no difference," he wrote later, "whether you are a mailman, a hairdresser, a housewife – whatever. As long as you feel you are serving others, you do the job well. When you are concerned only with helping yourself, you do it less well – a law as inexorable as gravity."

When 6 p.m. came, the final prescription didn't take long to fill: "Write your worries on the sand." He knelt and wrote several words with a piece of broken shell; then he turned and walked away. He didn't look back; he knew the tide would come in.

A medical doctor found nothing physically wrong with him, but said he might be able to help if Gordon could follow his instructions for one day. He was to spend the next day in the place where he'd been happiest as a child. He was not to talk to anyone, nor to read, write, or listen to the radio. The doctor then wrote out four prescriptions and told him to open one at 9 a.m., noon, 3p.m., and 6 p.m.

The next morning, Gordon went to the beach. His first prescription said only this: "Listen carefully." It seemed insane to listen to waves for three hours. But he did it – and began to hear more and more sounds that weren't obvious at first. He began to think of lessons he'd learned as a child from the sea; patience, respect for the interdependence of things. He felt a growing peace.

Millions of people around the world enjoy Coca-Cola products everyday, but for Jeff Dunn, The Coca-Cola Company truly is in his blood. Dunn literally grew up at Coca-Cola. During his 21 years at Coke, he has experienced a rapid ascent through leadership positions in several areas of the company. Dunn is now president and chief operating officer of Coca-Cola North America and serves as executive vice president of The Coca-Cola Company.

Dunn is a second generation Coke executive, following in the footsteps of his father, Walter, who spent 47 years with the soft drink giant and who is revered as a pioneer in sports marketing. The younger Dunn is known throughout the beverage industry as an innovative thinker and manager who empowers his associates and encourages them to bring fresh perspectives to their jobs. He is recognized as a leading authority on the integration of marketing with new technologies. Dunn is also renowned for the relationships he builds with Coke's major customers. According to Dunn, "the key to great customer relationships is caring about their business first. If you care about their business first, and then figure out how your product or service really delivers benefits to their business, then you will develop trust and both parties will succeed."

The Educational Foundation's former Director of Development Chris Peters sat down with Dunn recently in his Atlanta, Georgia office to talk about his business, Pi Kappa Alpha, and his views on the importance leadership plays in life.


#### Please tell me about your current role with Coca-Cola.

I currently oversee our North America strategic business unit (SBU) which is one of five similar units across the world. Each has a president and chief operating officer. Inside the North America SBU are our retail sales division, which sells concentrate to franchised bottlers, our foodservice sales division, which is a direct sales unit that calls on our foodservice customers nationally, and our various support functions including strategy and planning, marketing, innovation, supply chain, finance, etc.

My role in running this business unit is composed of three main responsibilities. One is obviously the profit and loss of the total business and driving business results. We use unit cases to convert everything back to one measure on a worldwide basis, and our unit does about 5.5 billion unit cases annually. Each of those 5.5 billion unit cases equals 24 eight-ounce equivalent Cokes or other brands that we sell. That amounts to about 30% of our worldwide volume and we have roughly 27% of the worldwide operating income of the company. There is about \$6.5 billion revenue in our SBU. We have about a 44% market share of the United States soft drink business and about a 20% market share of all commercial non-alcoholic ready to drink beverages, so about one out of every five products sold between water, juices, soft drinks, and isotonics is ours. Thus, my first job is really delivering operating results, profit and setting the overall business strategy and plans for all of the business units for which I'm responsible. My second responsibility is aligning that strategy with our bottler partners. Coca-Cola Enterprises is the world's largest bottler and the primary bottler for us in North America. My third task is developing the organization, the people, and the culture. We have over 7,000 employees in the SBU.

#### What are the keys to success in the soft drink business?

The keys to this business are really grouped in three key areas. Key area one involves having great brands that consumers love whether they're Coke, Sprite, Minute Maid Orange Juice, Dasani or PowerAde. Building our brands is really job one. We're a high transaction business with those 5.5 billion cases out there—that equates



to roughly 120 billion beverages that we sell every year. Alot of those are sold one drink at a time, so it's about building the relationship between our brands and the target consumers. The second key area involves developing the right systems and capabilities to service our customers. We service, directly or indirectly, one million retail outlets in the United States. The last key area is research and development – devising innovative capabilities to build new things for the future because the beverage business is constantly evolving.

#### How would you describe your leadership style?

Almost everything I know about leadership I learned from my father. His lessons were very straightforward. First and foremost is integrity: saying what you mean and meaning what you say, and keeping your commitments. Maintaining your integrity at all times is so important, because without that you don't have anything.

The second dimension of leadership that is very important to me, and that I try to model, is constant communication with the organization. I try to create open lines of communication and environments for all levels of the organization to be able to give input and get input. I tend to subscribe to the theory that the best leaders have a certain degree of humility, have an intense passion and focus for what they do, and are good communicators. But what they focus on is serving the people who do the work. When you combine integrity with passion for the business and that servant leadership mindset, you can accomplish just about anything. It is really about the achievements and accomplishments of the team as opposed to what the individual leader is interested in. That leadership

mindset has served me well. I have gotten a lot of responsibility at a relatively young age. I think it is a direct result of having very good people around me and effectively leading them as opposed to trying to over-direct or micro-manage their day-to-day activities. If you get smart people, give them a vision and a clear strategy, create a culture of passion for the business, provide empowerment and accountability, then people can accomplish wonderful things.

# In addition to the bottom line profit and loss, are there some other tangible things that you hope to accomplish during your watch?

From a personal standpoint there are a couple of overriding themes that weave their way through all I do. The first one is innovation and our ability to be seen as one of the most innovative companies in America. I don't necessarily think we are seen that way today - we are doing some good things, but we still haven't ramped up what I call our innovation capability, the constant stream of new ideas, so that innovation is a hallmark of the Coca-Cola system. The second thing is the development of leadership, broad leadership in the company, so much so that we are the place that recruiters turn to first because we produce really strong business leaders who reflect the diversity of America today. It's not just making the numbers, but how you make them - and the side benefit of making them is creating opportunities for people. Those are the things that I spend a good deal of my personal time thinking about: innovation and leadership and how they work. I look at what are the impediments, what are the enablers, and how you take a culture and get those imperatives manifested at every level in the company – that is how you build a sustained competitive advantage.

# What characteristics do you look for in the leaders with whom you surround yourself?

Passion for the business is first and foremost. I don't think you can make up in intellect or anything else for passion for the business. We are in a very tough, very competitive, everyday type of business. You win and lose in the business everyday, so a strong passion for the business and for the people inside the business is something I look for. I look for intellect, but not necessarily as manifested by a 'Top 10' business school MBA. Our business is an up and down the street business and we want the best. We have a huge entry program, we recruit out of the best business schools mostly for marketing kinds of roles, and we pride ourselves on that. But I'm looking for the 'portfolio of intellect'. I'm a big believer in different kinds of intelligence. Intellect is not just about people who are highly analytical, highly strategic, conceptual, or creative. It's about getting a person who possesses a diverse portfolio of those traits and then creating a culture where that diversity can be brought to bear against a problem. In a marketing driven business like ours, it's very much about strategy and creative execution. So we're looking for

high integrity, passion for the business, different kinds of intellect, and the last thing is, for lack of a better word, commitment to building a career here. We are not naive, we recognize that today there is much more portability of skills, and jobs aren't done for a lifetime as they might have been at different points in the history of American business. Today it's about "while I am here, I am going to commit myself to my own development, to the goals of the organization, and to making sure that we are accountable to deliver what we said we would deliver."

# Do you have any words of wisdom for our undergraduates who are striving to be leaders?

Yes. Not to steal a  $Nike^{TM}$  thing, but just do it. If you have an idea about doing something, try it. The worst thing you can do is overintellectualize things. If you have an interest in an industry or an area, go volunteer or try to get an internship or just go see so you can know it. What you need to do is understand what it really is, and the only way to really understand something is to go get in the game. You must identify some areas of interest, whether they are your long-term areas or not it doesn't matter when you are 20, 21, or 22. You have a long career so you don't have to have every answer, but

you do need to identify some general fields of play and then look for opportunities to get direct experience in those


fields. The type of experience doesn't matter as much as just getting out there and talking to people. You have to find ways to engage people. Then relative to your own development, look at your experiences as a journey and not a destination. If you are not having fun then you should re-evaluate what you are doing and how you are doing it, because it should be fun. You should enjoy your work. You need a life plan. You need clarity in what is important to you and where your career fits in. Keep setting goals for yourself and then re-evaluating them.

#### What is your favorite part of your job?

I love the process of marketing. Probably the thing that interests me the most now, and this would not have been true throughout my whole career, is creativity and innovation. I'm interested in how you take the strategic plans we've built and create environments in which people can be very creative and translate ideas that light people up. I love dealing with customers and I think that's really where commerce is done. Anyone in my kind of role has to like people. People are coming in and out of my sphere of influence all day long and I genuinely like interfacing with people, I like the dialog, I like solving problems with teams, and I like leading and helping people develop their own potential. Doing those things is a lot of fun for me. Over a period of time you can actually see individuals and teams grow and do great things. It's their accomplishment and their reality, but there is something very personal and sustaining in it when you help somebody develop their career. It is a gift in a sense, and they get the benefit throughout their whole career. Things like that are your ultimate legacy. Maybe once every 20 years you might create a new brand that sticks, but your real legacy is in the people. If you think about the power of those people, there is a whole lot more leverage in that legacy than any other because they are going to continue to create and do great things. If you pass it on and you help them, generally speaking, 95% of the time they are going to exhibit that behavior forward by helping other people. That's what it's all about.

The reality is if you manage the human side and people side of things the right way, and if you have a good business strategy and you have passion for the business, you'll get results. Results are an output of the process, you can't manage them. The best thing to do is create an engine of growth and then the results come because people will do the right things, with the right focus, at the right time, and do them in the kind of culture that sustains them and their effort. This is the difference between push and pull. You can push things out to the consumer for a while, but ultimately they have to want to buy your product. A good idea, executed well is like pulling a string through your system. Innovation and

creativity are important because they reduce friction. If you get a good idea and you execute it well then it will accumulate its own energy, as opposed to trying to force an idea through your organization. If you find yourself having to force an idea relentlessly, it's generally a bad idea. It may be a good idea that is misunderstood, but when other people are asking "why are we doing this" then you should ask yourself the same question.



My memories of college at the University of Georgia and Pi Kappa Alpha are all very positive. One of the biggest things I treasure from that time is the friendships and the relationships I built, many of which I still have today. That period of your life is such a great time -we had great times together at the Pike house. The second thing is the leadership experience. I played multiple roles within the chapter and got some very valuable leadership experience early on. I was rush chairman, social chairman, president, and regional director. I held a lot of roles in the chapter while simultaneously holding fulltime jobs and going to school. That multi-tasking experience taught me to prioritize and keep attention to detail so I could get lots of

things done. As I think about being a Pike and the things that we did while I was there, we accomplished a great deal. Just like I talked about the journey and having fun earlier, we did that in the Pike chapter. We increased the number of brothers in the chapter from 25 my sophomore year to 130 by the time I graduated as a senior. So we really grew the chapter, made it much more competitive. We were very innovative, we tried lots of different things. While other fraternities had beer parties, we had champagne. We tried to do things differently and generate some attention for the chapter.

So it was about the camaraderie, about doing things together and building those relationships, but it was also about running the Fraternity. The chapter is an organization that needs revenue, it needs a position in the market, it needs to recruit, and it needs to uphold its brand and image. Now 25 years later, I'll run into people here in Atlanta who may have been in another fraternity. Even if I didn't know them, our Greek experiences were similar and provide a common ground. I would always recommend young people entering college to have that fraternity experience. Not just for what happens when you are in college, but for the shared experience that goes forward that you can relate to in being part of that community.

Those are the things in terms of application to my life today that I carry with me. There were very clear experiences that helped me develop my own leadership style, and plus we had a great time and lots of fun.

#### Is it fair to say that Pi Kappa Alpha prepared you for life in the working world?

I don't think there is any question about that, especially during the period of time when I was president and a dear friend of mine named Mike Lane was the treasurer. We had to go borrow money from the Bank of Athens to fix the bathrooms in the house and we had to get our fathers to co-sign the loan. Dealing with those kinds of nuts and bolts, real life, profit and loss oriented issues, there is no question that it helped prepare me for the real world. When you're in college, that bridge between your developing stages, when you're at home and when you're in the working world, is huge. One of the things that I think fraternities do is create a safe transitional environment that helps you bridge into being on your own. Not only does fraternity life help from a business and career development standpoint, it helps from the personal development standpoint of having those experiences and that support system. I don't think there is any question about that.







They changed the distribution of the Shield & Diamond from five times per year to three; and a motion to extend the Fraternity to the west and northwest was defeated. In the Shield & Diamond, Upsilon Chapter (Alabama Polytechnic - now Auburn) writes: "Unusual interest was taken here this year in the class foot-ball games, each class getting out a strong eleven. Brother J.D. Walker, our crack left-fielder, again fills the position of Captain of the base-ball team. In base-ball, as in every walk of life, Π.K.A. stands well to the front."

**75 Years Ago** ... From the *Shield & Diamond*, February 1928: Alpha Eta Chapter owns more real estate than any other



fraternity at the University of Florida, and... has the best location on the campus. Not satisfied with a \$65,000 home, the Florida boys engaged the services of a landscape architect and began the beautification of their property, which covers three-quarters of a block.

# Tulsa Football Great Glenn Dobbs Leaves Legacy

The greatest football player in school history dies at age 82

University of Tulsa football legend Glenn Dobbs (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '40) died Tuesday night, November 12, 2002 at his home in Tulsa. A memorial service held on Monday, November 18, at the Donald W. Reynolds Center on The University of Tulsa campus was attended by nearly 800 friends, family and former players.

Known as the greatest football player in school history, Dobbs has been recognized with numerous awards during and after his collegiate and professional career.

Dobbs played at Tulsa from 1940-42. He was a consensus All-American as a triple threat tailback and safety, Heisman Trophy contender, Rookie of the Year and All-Pro selection in two professional leagues. Dobbs was elected to the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1980, and in 1982 was an inductee into The University of Tulsa's inaugural class of the school's Athletic Hall of Fame. He was also inducted into the Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame. On October 21, 2000, Glenn Dobbs Drive was unveiled on the TU campus as Eighth Street between Harvard and Florence Avenues was renamed after the legendary player and coach. On June 5, 2001, the All-American Football Foundation honored Dobbs with its Pioneer All-America Award.

Dobbs earned his All-America merits in 1942 after leading the Golden Hurricane to a 10-1 record and final national ranking of fourth in the Associated Press poll. Dobbs led Tulsa to appearances in the 1941 Sun Bowl and 1942 Sugar Bowl. A three-time Missouri Valley Conference performer, Dobbs led the Hurricane to an overall 25-6 record during that time span.

In 1942, Dobbs completed 63-percent of his passes for 1,066 yards and led the nation in punting with a 48.3 yard average. As a team, the Hurricane led the country in passing offense with an average of 233.9 yards per game. To this day, Dobbs still has four of the top-five longest punts in school history –87,79,78 and 77 yards. During his playing days, he led Tulsa in passing, pass efficiency and punting in 1941 and 1942, and was the team leader in interceptions in 1942. His No. 45 is one of seven retired jersey numbers

He starred for Brooklyn (1946) and Los Angeles (1948-50) of the All-American Football Conference and with Saskatchewan (1951-54) of the Canadian Football League. Upon completion of his playing career, Dobbs returned to the University of Tulsa in 1955 as athletics director (1955-70). He was the Golden Hurricane head football coach from 1961-68. Dobbs led Tulsa to Bluebonnet Bowl games in 1964 and 1965. His teams led the nation for five consecutive seasons in passing, 1962-66.

"Coach" as he was most endearingly referred to, continued his involvement with the TU athletic department through the years in the areas of fundraising and support.

"We are deeply saddened by the passing of "Coach" Dobbs. He has been such an integral figure in Tulsa athletics from the early 1940s to present day," said TU's Director of Athletics Judy MacLeod. "As a player, he set standards difficult to duplicate; as a coach, he was instrumental in developing a passing offense that today's game is patterned after; as athletic director he oversaw the expansion of Skelly Stadium to over 40,000 seats; and, as a person, he was one of the best. He was a perfect gentleman who loved this university and community dearly. He will be deeply missed by the TU community."



Glenn Dobbs

He was born on July 12, 1920 in McKinney, Texas. He played his prep football in Frederick, Oklahoma.

# Renowned Trumpeter Was Fixture At Cowboys Games

Tommy Loy (Southern Methodist, Beta Mu '49), who for 22 years opened Dallas Cowboys home games with a solo trumpet rendition of the national anthem, died on October 17, 2002 at his Plano, Texas home. He was 72.

Loy started a Tom Landry-era Cowboys tradition when he played before the start of the nationally televised game on Thanksgiving Day 1966. He became so well known that his last name was once used as the answer to a *New York Times* crossword puzzle clue: Cowboys trumpeter.

A household name to a generation of Cowboys fans, Loy was nationally known for his work as a recording engineer, said his daughter, Lisa Loy Laughlin. He also made voice-over recordings for commercials, but his passion was playing the trumpet and French horn.

Born in Denison, Texas, Loy received his first trumpet when he was nine years old. He began playing in the Dallas area in 1947 as a freshman at Southern Methodist University, where he studied music. He graduated in 1965 after serving in the Air Force.

He was the featured trumpeter with various bands, playing Dixieland, jazz and classical music. From 1961 to 1974, Loy was a featured performer with Ed Bernet and the Dixieland 7 at The Levee, a Dallas nightspot near the SMU campus.

But it was the Thanksgiving Day game that made Loy famous. The team owner at the time, Clint Murchison, wanted something different for the Cowboys' first color broadcast at the Cotton Bowl.

The day before the game, a friend tipped him off about the tryouts, being held five hours before kickoff.

Loy played his solo, competing against a high school band. He thought the students were a lock and decided the audition wasn't a total loss because he'd get to see the game. He hadn't been able to get a a ticket.

Five minutes before game time, he learned that he had the job.

"I didn't have time to get nervous, so I just marched out to the 50-yard line and played it," he once said.

Loy's crisp style was the hallmark of his pre-game solo.

"I play it pretty brightly, which is the way it's meant to be played," he said. "The Star Spangled Banner is not a ballad."

In a fitting tribute to the team's former coach, Loy played at Tom Landry's funeral in February 2000.

His favorite performance, according to his family, was Super Bowl V in Miami, where Dallas lost to Baltimore.

### David C. Cross

### (Pennsylvania State, Beta Alpha '89)

On January 22, 2003, a military helicopter collision in Falcon State Park in South Texas, along the Mexican border, took the life of Penn State alumnus David Cross.

The 34-year-old Cross was also a State College Area High School graduate. He and three other Marine reservists were aiding the Border Patrol in a drug case when the two AH1W Super Cobra helicopters crashed. There were no survivors.

Cross grew up in Alexandria, Virginia before his family moved to State College in 1985. After high school, he became a communications major at Penn State, his father said, and spent a lot of time at Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity, 417 E. Prospect Ave., where he was a member.

Cross enlisted in the Marines while still a college student. After he graduated in 1991, he became one of ten to be admitted to the Naval Air Station in Pensacola, Florida. As of last week he was based in Camp Pendleton, California, where he had learned to fly the Cobra helicopters.

"He was very determined to become a pilot, and he did do that," said Cross' father. "It was a hard thing to accomplish from the position he started out at."

Cross' younger brother, Dan, is a student at Columbia University in New York City.

"If he had a goal, he would do anything to achieve that goal," said Dan Cross of his brother. "He was also the guy who would quite literally give you the shirt off his back."

Cross' college roommate and best friend, Joe Renda (Beta Alpha '89) of Washington, New Jersey, remembers Cross as one of the most honest men he'd ever known, a loyal person who would do anything for his friends. He was also very determined, Renda said.

"We lived together, and one morning I got up and Dave wasn't around," Renda said. "I got ready for class, and as I was going out the door he came in completely drenched in sweat. He said, 'I decided to do the Marine Corps Marathon and so I just ran 15 miles.' And just a few weeks later he completed the Marine Corps Marathon," he said.

Around that time, Cross' goals shifted to becoming a Marine, and then a pilot.

"If I'm not mistaken, he was one of the top-rated pilots in his class. After he completed his requirements to become a pilot, he was working at the base, training younger pilots," Renda said. "I can't stress enough what a kind, generous person he was ... a great representative of our country."

"We've lost not only a great Marine but also someone who was a great friend to many people," Renda said.

Dan Cross said he regretted not having more opportunities to see his brother in the last few years.

"One always thinks you have tomorrow to call someone, especially with a sibling you have around you your entire life," he said.

Cross was given a graveside, full honors military funeral at Arlington National Cemetary on February 5, 2003. Members of his squadron marched behind the Marine honor guard as they followed the caisson that carried his flag-draped casket to his final resting place: Plot 7188 in section 66, near the corner of Eisenhower and Bradley Drives. A military brass band played the Marine Corps Hymn as the pall bearers picked up the flag draping Cross' coffin and pulled it taught between them. A religious service was given by the Navy chaplain, and the guard fired a 21-round rifle volley in Cross' honor. A memorial service was held at Camp Pendleton for all four of the reservists who died.

"He was probably the best man I knew," Renda said.
