

From the Supreme Council

Being Your Chapter's Keeper

As many of you know, the theme of Pi Kappa Alpha's risk awareness program emphasizes "being your brother's keeper." Being your brother's keeper is the heart and soul of our risk awareness program because of the very serious consequences

which may result when we don't do this, sometimes very tragic consequences, such as the death or serious injury of one of our brothers. The concept of being your brother's keeper is rooted in our ritual and in the fundamental values of Pi Kappa Alpha. The commitment we have made to be faithful and true to each other means looking out after each other, even when it's inconvenient or difficult to do so.

Being your brother's keeper, however, is not just looking out for an individual brother. It also means looking out for and protecting your entire chapter. Whether you are an undergraduate or an alumnus, think for a moment about what is important to you about Pike. I'll bet most of you respond by thinking about your chapter. First and foremost, our fraternity experience is our chapter. That's where everything begins for us, where our interests converge, where we become brothers and begin a commitment to share our lives with each other. Although our perspectives about the fraternity change when we graduate and leave the chapter house, this commitment continues throughout our lives.

Any commitment of this depth and importance is worth fighting for and protecting. Today, more so than at any time in our Fraternity's history, our chapters are at risk. The "animal house" stereotype, universities with zero tolerance for inappropriate behavior by fraternities, prohibitive costs of liability insurance and many other factors make it more and more difficult for our chapters to be successful. Pi Kappa Alpha is the most successful fraternity in the Greek world today, but despite our many successes, our chapters are no less at risk. We have 61 silent chapters. Translated, this means that 61 of our chapters are "dead". Just as the life of a brother can be snuffed out by poor risk awareness, the life of a chapter can also come to an end. We also have 30-plus chapters that are

"challenged," meaning that although they remain open, they are at risk or in trouble in some way. Some of these chapters are facing lawsuits, and others are suffering from some type of disciplinary action, probation, suspension or other restrictions on their normal activities imposed by their host universities.

To give our chapters a fighting chance to be successful, we must insure that risk awareness is effective in each of our chapters. In our risk awareness program, we stress these five risk awareness "success factors" which you should implement in your chapter:

- Effective risk awareness begins with recruitment — recruit the right kind of men, men of values, men of integrity and men of high moral character;
- The leaders in your chapter should lead by example and live the values of Pi Kappa Alpha in their daily lives;
- Have a working risk management committee, composed of respected leaders in your chapter, and implement a proper risk awareness policy;
- Actually observe and enforce your risk management policies and hold chapter members accountable;
- And finally, when you make a mistake, don't ignore it or sweep it under the rug, or look for someone else to blame; take responsibility, identify what went wrong and fix it.

More than ever, it is important for all of us to understand our duty and obligation to each other and to our chapter. Whether you are an undergraduate or alumnus, the bottom line is do everything that you can do to protect your chapter and be your chapter's keeper. The success of each of our chapters depends on effective risk awareness. In your chapter, make risk awareness a top priority and get the help that you need from the staff at Memorial Headquarters to insure that an effective risk awareness program is in place and working in your chapter. By "being your chapter's keeper", we can ensure that our chapters will be strong and that we will continue to be the most successful fraternity in the Greek world today.



The chapter is hosting the third annual Pike Dream Girl, a week long sorority pageant that raises thousands of dollars that will be donated to a fellow brother of Theta Chi Fraternity who is battling cancer. as six other brothers who sit on various ASUW committees. The chapter has made changes to their house to make it more secure by adding motion-sensor flood lights, installing new locks, and taking precautions to secure the house each night. The chapter is leading in intramural sports points.

Rush Tips

How to Recruit Varsity Athletes

Varsity athletes make life loyal brothers.

They are dynamic men who are leaders both on and off the playing field; they complement and add to the diversity in any chapter.

While the benefits of recruiting varsity athletes are obvious; sometimes a perception exists that it is not possible – and so sometimes not emphasized in our recruitment.

Pi Kappa Alpha's recruitment philosophy is to recruit the most best men – by recruiting the most outstanding men we will create the ideal fraternity.

We have had great success with our specific, concrete, and proven recruitment practices; which emphasize targeting the best men in every area: men of ambition, men of integrity and men of accomplishment.

You should look for outstanding men in all areas of the university, and should be in a position to recruit these outstanding men, specifically varsity athletes. Resistance to recruiting varsity athletes is often born of fear, which itself is a mistake we must avoid.

Suggestions for Varsity Athlete Recruitment

1. Expand Your Market!

Remember 'varsity athletes' is not a synonym for football players. Lacrosse, track, swimming, water polo, golf, etc. are all varsity sports, in addition to football, basketball, and baseball. All are potential target markets where you can find quality men.

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Six Common Recruitment Mistakes

- 1. Having a Weak Recruitment Chairman
- 2. Recruiting Whoever Shows Up
- 3. Fear of the Recruit
- 4. Lack of Organization
- 5. Failure to Close the Deal
- 6. Failure to Educate and Motivate the Chapter

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Delta Nu Chapter Will Celebrate 55 Years of PiKA

Right: Donald Miller '50 (center) spoke at ingress during the fall semester. The Delta Nu founding father was instrumental in connecting the local DN fraternity to Pi Kappa Alpha in 1950 at Wayne State. When the chapter was chartered, it received the same Greek designation as its local name.

In November 1946, Robert Duff and John Penner were inspired



to create a league of gentleman of similar beliefs on the campus of Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan. Scholarship, service and brotherhood was the foundation upon which their fraternity would be built. Local fraternities Delta Upsilon and Sigma Nu strongly coincided with these beliefs, so the name Delta Nu was born.

In spring 1947, Delta Nu Fraternity was recognized by Wayne State as a local fraternity. Due to quick successes on campus these gentlemen dreamt of becoming part of something larger and so they set out to find an international fraternity that matched the ideals set forth. Pi Kappa Alpha closely matched the ideals of these men so on January 1, 1950 a petition to charter a chapter was filed with the Fraternity's Supreme Council. Pi Kappa Alpha honored the petition and was preparing to charter the chapter.

Pi Kappa Alpha chapter names are generated on the Greek alphabet and Delta Mu was the next chapter name to be used. The men of Delta Nu realized that, coincidentally, if they waited until one more chapter was chartered, they would receive the Delta Nu designation. After a three-week wait, the University of Southern Mississippi chapter was chartered as Delta Mu Chapter, and on February 4, 1950 a dynasty was born at Wayne State as Delta Nu Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha.

2. Target Freshmen!

The demands of the team are not as great on freshmen. It is natural that as the demands of the team become greater upon the players the more unlikely it is they will make time for Pi Kappa Alpha. If you can show them the value early, you can gain their commitment for life.

3. Utilize the Summer!

The demands of sports are not as great during the summer season. Freshman members of a varsity team may be more receptive to a fraternity during the summer. This is a time when school may be in session but there are significantly less students on campus – thus PIKE offers an expansion of the friendships they desire outside of their teams.

4. Impress Individuality!

As with every other recruit, it is personality and attitude that makes an athlete PIKE material, not their ability on the playing field. Treat him as a person, not an athlete. A varsity athlete will want to get outside of the sport he plays. He needs friends who are not athletes and he needs time to express himself in other ways. Be careful not to focus your conversation on athletics, but rather on the person.

5. Recognize Special Needs!

Particularly during the sports season, make sure your potential recruit understands what is expected and that you understand the extent to which he can commit. Varsity athletes contribute to the chapter in ways that no other brothers can. You want these men because of who and what they are, but you should realize that they have extraordinary demands placed upon them. You should do your best to accommodate them – but when they come to Pi Kappa Alpha they should leave their equipment behind and concentrate on being a brother.

6. Be Flexible!

Offer an accelerated new member education program to accommodate demanding schedules.

Devin Morrison: Advisor to Delta Psi Chapter

Phi '92) has given to Delta Psi Chapter (Maryland). "Devin has provided Delta Psi with a strong foundation of values, tradition and organization. He has served as the primary resource for the chapter leaders on the expectations of a well rounded chapter and what makes a successful organization. His military background, coupled with his extensive commitment to Pi Kappa Alpha, has provided Delta Psi with the necessary tools to make it one of the most committed and well rounded chapters in Maryland's Greek community."

Current Delta Psi Chapter President Michael Friss '03 reflects on how influential Brother Morrison has been to him personally: "Devin is my constant reminder never to become complacent. He allows me to enjoy the success of my chapter, but reminds me that there is always more to accomplish. His die-hard love for Pi Kappa Alpha can be matched only by a few. We are constantly in communication about every aspect of the chapter and always thinking about what changes and improvements we can make. Before Devin came to Delta Psi, we hadn't won an international award in nearly ten years. We hadn't completed our University requirements and were rarely in good standing with either the University or International Fraternity. However, since he has become our chapter advisor, we have eliminated our debt with the International Fraternity and won both a Chapter Excellence Award and the Most Improved Chapter Award at the University of Maryland. He has given our chapter a complete resurgence in almost every aspect. From utilizing the Ritual to becoming more involved in community service, our chapter has been completely redefined. He is at every executive board meeting and is in constant communication with our entire executive board. It truly is hard to put into words the changes and positive effects Devin has had on the Delta Psi Chapter."

The Shield & Diamond recently asked Brother Morrison to reflect on his personal experience and the impact volunteering for Pi Kappa Alpha has had on him.

What is the most important lesson you have learned through your involvement with the Fraternity?

I learned as an undergrad, and it is what I try to instill in today's brothers as a chapter advisor, the importance of getting past an attitude centered on self and developing a vision centered on what is best for the group. It is getting past the simple notion of being a brother and understanding the power of brotherhood. Too often, when a problem originates within a chapter it is the result of an individual thinking of himself first and failing to realize he is part of a larger group. For me the sense and power of brotherhood is very important and it is something I try to pass along to today's brothers.



How have the lessons you learned through your involvement with the Fraternity benefited you in your professional career?

Working with the Fraternity as a chapter advisor provides me an excellent opportunity to hone my communication and motivational skills. The skills utilized in motivating a chapter executive board during a weekend meeting are the same skills utilized to motivate coworkers on Monday. Likewise, just as a chapter must set goals, establish timelines for completion, and monitor progress, so too must the organization for which I work. The operating environment and players involved differ, but chapter advising runs parallel to working in nearly any business setting.

What do you think it takes to be a successful alumnus advisor/volunteer in Pi Kappa Alpha?

I would define it as patient perseverance. I often tell folks that you have to care enough about the chapter to give of yourself, but never care so much that you take the actions of the brothers personally. It is important to

remember that the timeline and priorities of a twenty-year-old are not necessarily your own, so it can be frustrating when the undergrads do not follow your direction or exercise sound judgment. But with patience and perseverance the undergrads do come around and I would like to think in the end they appreciate your keeping them out of trouble and focused on the path to success.

Why would you encourage an alumnus to become actively involved with a chapter?

Today's undergrads are the stewards of Pi Kappa Alpha. However, they should not be burdened with navigating today's complex university environment without some form of assistance. Alumni have an obligation to assist our undergrad brothers through active mentorship and involvement. By lending a hand, alumni provide the guidance, support, and yes, sometimes reproof that all of us needed when we were twenty. If the legacy of Pi Kappa Alpha is to continue, our alumnus members must reach out a helping hand.

What has been your greatest satisfaction working with the undergraduate members of Pi Kappa Alpha?

By far, watching the undergrads succeed. When you begin to interact with the chapter you learn very quickly the chapter's strengths and weaknesses. While shoring up the strengths, you begin to make recommendations on how the chapter can improve its weak areas. It certainly does not happen overnight and the undergrads' sense of urgency is not always your own, but the greatest reward comes when you can stand back and watch the chapter receive an award or accolade for what was previously a weak area of chapter programming. If a chapter is excited and has energy, providing it direction and ideas for improvement is easy.

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7. Get Involved!

Show up to athletic events, including practices, with the chapter. Show that Pi Kappa Alpha sets the standard at our host institutions and supports all brothers in any endeavors they undertake. This will impress the coach as well.

8. Meet the coach!

Be courteous, dress sharp, explain that Pi Kappa Alpha is a different type of organization, that it is a life-long commitment. Learn from him what

the coach demands of his players, and explain how you can work together to create the best student athletes. Emphasize you are not going to impact the team's performance. He will likely offer you

recommendations of athletes he thinks will make good fraternity men. If he is not receptive to giving you recommendations, he will still appreciate your courtesy and will look more favorably upon PIKE than those who do not make personal contact.

9. Be Sincere!

Do not ask players to recruit other players. Do not imply that the reason they have become a member is so that the chapter can use them to recruit more players. All men should be made to feel that they are being recruited for themselves. If you have a brother on a team, he should bring other athletes around and introduce them to the active chapter; however, the actual recruiting should be done by the recruitment chairmen or designated athletic recruiter. Having other varsity athletes in the chapter will undoubtedly make the recruit more comfortable, but he should be exposed to the entire chapter rather than isolated into one category.

10. Do Not Fear The Recruit!

They are the ones who are nervous and potentially even scared. Approach with confidence; a positive attitude sells itself.

Remember: The essence of recruiting anyone is making a friend!

Answering Common Hesitations

Below are some answers to commonly posed hesitations regarding the recruitment of varsity athletes.

"They don't make good brothers."

Men who have discipline to succeed in varsity athletics thrive in other areas as well, and will make a life long commitment to Pi Kappa Alpha once we show them that life outside the locker room door can be enhanced by making firmer and more lasting friendships, developing group dynamic leadership skills, opening networking opportunities and creating the best possible college experience.

"They don't come around."

This is a common response from chapters that have included varsity athletes in the past, but have had those brothers drift away. More likely than not, those athletes were recruited in a group of athletes at one time, were all similar in age, and made the same friends within a specific group of the chapter. When that group within the chapter graduates, so do the athletes.

The solution is to recruit varsity athletes continuously, making sure the chapter consistently brings in this type of man, and to ensure that our new member education exposes all our members to the strengths of every man in the chapter. This way we can see that each member offers something unique, from which we all can benefit.

"The coach won't let them pledge."

This is an excuse to avoid having to recruit varsity athletes. Many head coaches themselves, such as Brother Bobby Bowden (Samford, Alpha Pi

'49), head football coach at Florida State University, are fraternity men; Pete Carrol, head football coach for the Southern

California Trojans, is a Sigma
Alpha Epsilon. Meet the coach and see for yourself. Do not accept failure.

An objection from an athletic coach stems from his desire to ensure that his players are not involving themselves in activities that hinder their performance. Recognize that there is a relationship between the success of players and

the career stability of coaches. As a practical matter, being a member of Pi Kappa Alpha should never interfere with athletics, academics, work, or family and thus coaches will not directly inhibit their players.

"Athletes don't pledge fraternities

The fact is that at least a few players are pledging somewhere on campus and it is not at the weaker houses. Success in one area will parallel successes in others; thus chapters who succeed in recruiting the most outstanding men in the areas of academics, leadership, and well rounded gentlemanly behavior will also be successful in recruiting the most outstanding varsity athletes. The nature of the highly competitive athlete dictates that he will join the best chapter he can find where he believes he has the most friends. A lack of varsity athletes may signify that chapters should evaluate themselves more closely and whether they are truly competitive.



In Conclusion

Naturally, the recruitment of varsity athletes is not the solution to any problems nor should it become an overwhelming focus of our recruitment process, but the idea of getting the "most best men" surely includes the recruitment of outstanding athletes.

Just as the great chapter boasts student government leaders who open doors on campus, the varsity athlete can take PIKE places it otherwise might not go. Just the sight of a varsity athlete wearing a TIKA jersey raises the exposure of both the chapter and the Fraternity to more wide spread opportunity.

NEW PROGRAM EDUCATES CHAPTER PRESIDENTS, TREASURERS AND RUSH CHAIRMEN

The newest addition to the Pike
University roster of events had a
very familiar feel. The first Chapter
Executives Conference, held January 6-9,
2005 in Memphis, Tennessee was in fact
an expansion of the highly successful
Chapter Presidents Conference. First
hosted in 1974, when it was attended by 13
chapter presidents, this year's Conference
drew more than 340 chapter presidents,
rush chairmen and treasurers. By all
accounts and measures, the event was an
overwhelming success.


The Conference has long been considered one of Pi Kappa Alpha's most special experiences. The Fraternity is regularly queried by other fraternities that wish to replicate the program for their members. The Conference is so successful due to three primary reasons: its focus, its setting and its curriculum.

The focus of the Chapter Executives Conference is Pi Kappa Alpha's three most important chapter officers. The Fraternity has recognized that serving as a chapter president or treasurer, for example, is in many regards similar to serving as the chief executive officer or chief financial officer of a corporation. Accordingly, the Conference has the feel of a corporate training program, and those who attend are serious about bettering themselves, their chapters and their Fraternity.

Fortunately again for 2005, the setting of the Conference was the beautiful Peabody Hotel in Memphis, Tennessee. The Peabody, a historic landmark and the



jewel of downtown Memphis, has been the Conference's host since the early 1990s. The Peabody also served as the setting for the 1988 National Convention. The hotel originally opened in 1919, just 28 years before Pi Kappa Alpha relocated its headquarters from Atlanta to Memphis. Today the Peabody is the focal point of a downtown resurgence. In just the last several years, downtown Memphis has added a Triple A baseball stadium that rivals most Major League facilities, built a new mall and entertainment center



(connecting the Peabody to nearby legendary Beale Street) and constructed the new FedExForum for the NBA's Memphis Grizzlies. The hotel features more than 70,000 square feet of first-class meeting space and one of the most famous lobbies in America – home to several ducks which call the prominent centerpiece fountain their home. The ducks are paraded to and from the fountain twice daily from their home on the rooftop of the hotel.

In addition to new programs for chapter treasurers, the Conference's overall curriculum was significantly enhanced. The program began with a presentation from North Atlantic Regional President Mark Robertson

(Southern Methodist, Beta Zeta '82) on the importance of protecting Pi Kappa Alpha's brand and image. Robertson, an attorney by trade with a perfect record (1-0) in the United States Supreme Court, provided

several examples of how the Fraternity's image on a particular campus – whether justified or not – can affect a chapter's ability to become a positive contributor

Reel (Tulane, Eta '57) led attendees in the first of three sessions focusing on the Fraternity's ritual. After Dr. Reel's popular analysis of the development of the Fraternity's ritual, alumnus A. Frank Smith (Florida, Alpha Eta '66),

with the help of the Fraternity's staff, led a perfectly executed model initiation ceremony. Brother Smith has personally been involved in more Pi Kappa Alpha initiations than any other man in the Fraternity's history. His demonstration was as inspiring as it was educational. Following that program, breakout discussions – including one led by Past International President and Assistant International Historian F. Anderson Morse (William and Mary, Gamma '76)

- offered everyone the opportunity to ask questions about the ritual's application and origins. 


had attended at least three and five Pike University events. As the attendees left that final banquet to journey back to their respective campuses, Pi Kappa Alpha

During the 2004-2005 season, over 105 colleges and universities were represented on the athletic fields by over 375 brothers of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. We are proud to present this sampling of the best of the best:

FOOTBALL

Leading 7-5 Purdue was recordsetting All-Big Ten quarterback Kyle Orton (Beta Phi '02), who ranked among NCAA Division I-A's top passers with 236 completions in 389 attempts for 3,090 yards and 31 touchdowns (including a 97-yarder). Among his top games were 33 of 54 for 522 yards, six TDs against Indiana (which earned him National Back of the Week honors); 21 of 31 for 385 yards, four scores versus Notre Dame; 35 of 50 for 366 yards, four TDs against Illinois; and 23 of 26 for 329 yards, five TDs in the Ball State game. Kyle played in the Sun Bowl and East-West Shrine Game and gained All-American recognition. He was a finalist for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and a semi-finalist for the Maxwell and


Davey O'Brien Awards. Teammate David Owen (*Beta Phi '02*) started every game at offensive tackle for the Boilermakers.

Chris Myers (Gamma Omega '03) of the 9-3 Miami Peach Bowl team played both offensive tackle and guard on the way to All-Atlantic Coast Conference second team honors and the team's Leadership Award. Tackle Eric Winston (Gamma Omega '03), projected as one of the nation's top offensive linemen, started the first four games then missed the rest of the season with a knee injury. Starting at center for the Hurricanes was Joel Rodriguez (Gamma Omega '03), who won the team Offensive Lineman of the Year Award. Punter Dustin Colquitt (Zeta '01) of 10-3 Tennessee played in the Cotton Bowl and ended his career as the school's leader in punts (229) and yardage (9,804). In 2004, he averaged 41.3 for 52 punts and had 16 downed inside the 20 yard line. Dustin was named to the All-SEC second team and played in the Senior Bowl.

Earning All-Big 12 honorable mention for **Baylor** was Dominique Zeigler (*Theta Nu '04*), the top receiver with 55 receptions for 536 yards and five TDs. Against Texas A&M, he had 12 catches for 121 yards; caught the game-tying TD pass; and grabbed the game-winning two point conversion. Also seeing action for the Bears were safety Nick Fellows (Theta Nu '04), who had 17 tackles; offensive tackle Travis Farst (Theta Nu '04), who started three games; and defensive back Brannon Moton (Theta Nu '04). 

Remembering "Handy" Andy

After reading the Spring 2004 All-Time Football Greats review, Bill Lynch (George Washington, Delta Alpha '47) wrote in to suggest that we include his friend "Handy" Andy Davis (George Washington, Delta Alpha '49). Davis was a triple threat for the Colonials, playing as passing tailback, defensive back and on the special teams. He lettered all four years at GW ('48-'51). Each year, he was also named to the All-Southern Conference team and as an honorable mention to the All-America team. (The Southern Conference is a precursor to today's Atlantic Coast Conference.) In 1949, he was named to the Shield & Diamond's All ΠΚΑFootball Team.

Davis held the Southern Conference career total offensive yardage record (5,003 yards) for many years and threw the longest passing play from scrimmage (94 yards) in college football in the 1949 season. He was named as the outstanding defensive back in the 1951 Blue-Gray all-star game. Davis was drafted by the Washington Redskins in the second round in 1952 and continued to play for them in the 1953 season, and played three exhibition games for the New York Giants, before his career was ended by injuries. Ed McKee, GW's unofficial athletics historian, says Davis was probably the second best football player in the history of the school's program. (GW last played football in the 1966 season.)

must earn a 3.3 GPA.



Greco serves the International Fraternity as a vice president on the Supreme Council. He was elected in 2004 at the St. Louis Convention.



Having a standout year for the 9-7-4 William & Mary team was forward Patrick Scherder (Gamma '03), who was named





events, including eighth place finishes in the 50 freestyle and 100 butterfly.

Emory co-captain Dan Weissman (Beta Kappa '01) won All-American status by placing sixth in the 1650 freestyle; eighth in the 500 freestyle; and eighth with the 800 medley relay. Jimmy McGee (Beta Kappa '02) was an All-American on the second place 200 freestyle relay and third place 400 freestyle relay. Andrew Schapiro (Beta Kappa '03) earned his All-American status with a fifth place 200 butterfly finish. Other Pike swimmers at Emory include Tory Rooney (Beta Kappa '02), Justin Eaton (Beta Kappa '04), Matt Shack (Beta Kappa '04) and Sean Spencer (Beta Kappa '04).

A top returnee for **Rennselaer** is Mike Scibelli (*Gamma Tau '03*), who set a school record in the 400 IM (4:15.66) at the 2004 Liberty League meet. He also placed second in the 200 breaststroke and fifth in the 100 breaststroke. Joe Sandrini (*Kappa Omega '04*) competes in freestyle and breaststroke events for **Wisconsin-Whitewater** and David Hammond (*Theta '03*) is a leading diver for **Rhodes**. 




Keeping Pace With Florida International

At Florida International University, Eddie Davis '04 placed in the top five in the triple jump at the Hurricane Invitational with a season-best 43', 0.25" performance. He finished in the top 10 in the long jump at the Sun Belt Conference Championships with a season-best leap of 21', 8¹/₄". In indoor events, Davis leapt a season-best 43', 10¹/₂" in the triple jump at the Gator Invitational, and also competed in the long jump, finishing among the top-10 collegians at the Florida Intercollegiate.

Rene Rodriguez '04 competed in all five cross country meets for FIU, posting the team's fastest 8,000-meter time of the season, 27:10.84, to place 28th among collegians at the Gator Invitational. He was the third Golden Panther across the line in 28:24.54 at the Disney Classic, and placed 15th among collegians at the FIU/Lourdes Invitational with a 5,000-meter time of 17:28.14. 

OLYMPICS





PIKES IN THE PROS

The Fraternity's current alumni in pro basketball are covered in this issue's story on Pike's Basketball Pros (see page 33). The 2004 NFL season saw eight Pikes seeing action on the field. New York Giants punter Jeff Feagles (Miami, Gamma Omega '86) finished his 17th pro season with 74 punts for a 41.5 average. He is now the alltime NFL leader with 430 punts downed inside the 20 yard line. Quarterback Gus Frerotte (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon

'90) completed his 10th NFL year with the Minnesota Vikings but threw just one pass all season. Starting every game at offensive tackle for the Green Bay Packers was Chad Clifton (Tennessee-Martin, Epsilon Sigma '01). Offensive guard Cameron Spikes (Texas A&M, Theta Theta '97) spent his sixth pro year with the Arizona Cardinals and had nine starts.

After missing the 2003 season and first part 2004 with injuries, offensive tackle Rex Tucker (Texas A&M, Theta Theta '97) returned to action with the Chicago Bears and started five games. Linebacker Josh Stamer (South Dakota, Kappa Pi '97) played in every game for the Buffalo Bills and made 24 tackles. Rookie running back Joey Harris (Purdue, Beta Phi '01) played four games for the Carolina Panthers before a leg injury put him out for the season.

Seeing brief action for the Dallas Cowboys was rookie offensive guard **Ben Noll** (*Pennsylvania*, *Beta Pi '01*). Atlanta Falcons defensive end **Will Overstreet** (*Tennessee*, *Zeta '99*) was placed on injured reserve for the third straight year in mid-August. Quarterback **Preston Parsons** (*Northern Arizona, Theta Rho '99*) was released by the Arizona Cardinals in June and was inactive during the 2004 season. In mid-January, he signed with the Houston Texans and will go to training camp with them.

Pitcher **Seth Greisinger** (Virginia, Alpha '95) returned to the major leagues in 2004, pitching 12 games for the Minnesota Twins before returning to the Rochester Red Wings of the International League. He signed a minor league contract for 2005 with the Washington Nationals. Fourteen year pro **Matt Whiteside** (Arkansas State, Delta Theta '87) pitched for the Richmond Braves of the International League and tied for the minor league lead with 38 saves. He signed with the Toronto Blue Jays in mid-November.

Former big league lefty **Ben Kozlowski** (Central Florida, Eta Phi '99) recovered from arm surgery and pitched for Stockton of the California League and Frisco of the Texas League. Following the season, the Texas Rangers traded him to the Cincinnati Reds. Pitcher **Ryan Mottl** (Clemson, Eta Alpha '99) was released by the Reds in spring training and signed with the Pittsburgh Pirates organization. He spent part of 2004 with Lynchburg

of the Carolina League before being promoted to Nashville of the PCL.

Also pitching in the minors were **Chad Clark** (Southern California, Gamma Eta
'01) of the Yakima Bears of the Northwest
League and **Ben Krantz** (Pennsylvania,
Beta Pi '00) of the Missoula Osprey of
the Pioneer League. **Bryce Chamberlin**(Washington State, Gamma Xi '03), was
drafted by the Baltimore Orioles in the
sixth round of the summer draft. He first
pitched for Aberdeen of the NY-P League
before being promoted to Delmarva of
the South Atlantic League.

In his first year on the Champions Tour, golfer Lonnie Nielsen (Iowa, Gamma Nu '72) made a big splash and won \$529,262 at 26 events. His highest finish was a fifth place tie at the SAS championship. Veteran Hubert Green (Florida State, Delta Lambda '65) played just 16 events on the Champions Tour and earned \$57,359.

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Pikes have played in the National Basketball Association, Basketball Association of America, National Basketball League, American Basketball Association, Continental Basketball Association, United States Basketball League, National Basketball Development League, International Basketball Association and in numerous foreign

countries. The Fraternity's first known pro players appeared in the **Basketball Association** of America during the 1947 season: forward Fred Jacobs (Denver, Gamma Gamma '41) with the St. Louis Bombers and forward Fred Sheffield (Utah, Alpha Tau '43) with the Philadelphia Warriors. The first Pike pro head coach was Glen Rose (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '27), a longtime college coach, who joined the Professional Basketball League of America in 1947 as head coach of Oklahoma City for a month before the league folded.

Guard-forward John "Shotgun" Hargis (Texas, Beta Mu '41) joined the National Basketball League's Anderson Duffey Packers during the 1947-48 season and was the second-leading scorer as a

rookie (642 points, 10.9 average). He was with the club again the next two seasons, scoring 448 points (7.8) in 1949 and 643 points (10.7) in 1950. John's final year (1951) was split between the NBA Fort Wayne Zollner Pistons and the Tri-Cities Blackhawks, Forward Bob Peterson (Oregon, Gamma Pi '51) appeared in 103 games over three NBA seasons with the Baltimore Bullets (1954). Milwaukee Hawks (1954)

and New York Knicks

(1955-56). Playing briefly

for the Cincinnati Royals in 1960 was forward **Wayne Stevens** (Cincinnati, Alpha Xi'56).

The Fraternity's first player with a lengthy pro career was forward **Jackie Moreland** (Louisiana Tech, Gamma Psi '58), who broke in with the Detroit Pistons in 1961 (468 points, 7.3). After injuries limited him to seven games in 1962, he scored 687 points (8.8) in 78 games during 1963. Jackie was a key player for the Pistons again in 1964, scoring 708 points

Pike's Basketball Pros

SINCE THE 1940s, PI KAPPA ALPHA BROTHERS HAVE MADE THEIR MARK IN PROFESSIONAL BASKETBALL LEAGUES IN THE UNITED STATES AND OVERSEAS.

(9.1), and concluded his NBA career with 54 games in 1965. When the American Basketball Association began in 1967-68. Jackie was a stellar player for the New Orleans Buccaneers over three seasons. He scored 1,112 points (14.6) with 619 rebounds (8.1) in 1968; had career-bests of 1,159 points (14.9) and 633 rebounds (8.1) in 1969; and added 775 points (9.7) and 386 rebounds (4.6) in 1970.

During its

season, the ABA signed a top college star who bypassed the NBA to play with the Kentucky Colonels: guard **Louie Dampier** (Kentucky, Omega '65). Over the ABA's nine years, he was the career leader in points (13,726), games played (728), minutes

Louie Dampier

played (27,770), assists (4,044) and three point goals (794). Louie scored over 1,000 points every season and was named to the All-ABA second team three times (1968-70). During 1969, he was ABA leader in four categories while ranking third in scoring (1,933 points, 24.8) and assists (456, 3.8). The following season,

he led the ABA with 198 three pointers and ranked fourth in scoring (2,131 points,

26.0). After the ABA's demise, Louie spent his final three pro years (1977-79) with the San Antonio Spurs and later was an assistant coach with the Denver Nuggets (1999-2002).

In 1968, the two year old Chicago Bulls franchise hired **Dick Motta** (*Utah State*, *Gamma Epsilon '50*), a college head coach at Weber State for six years. During eight seasons as Bulls head coach, he was 1971 NBA Coach of the Year after a 51 win season and led the club to a division title and conference finals in 1975. He guided the Washington Bullets in 1977 then led them to the 1978 NBA championship. Dick was with the Bullets through 1980 then became the Dallas Mavericks first head coach in 1981. He led the club to a division title and 55 wins in 1987 but resigned after the season.

After three years as a Detroit Pistons color analyst, Dick became Sacramento Kings head coach at mid-season of the 1990 season and stayed until December 24, 1992. His last head coaching


stints were with Dallas (1995-96) and the Denver Nuggets in 1997. Dick's 935 career wins ranked him sixth among all coaches as the 2004-05 season got underway.

The Fraternity's greatest player, forward **Dan Issel** (*Kentucky*, *Omega '68*) joined the Kentucky Colonels in the 1971-72 season and put together

a 15 year pro career that, along with a great college career, led to his induction into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993. As ABA Rookie of the Year, he scored 2,480 points (29.9) and grabbed 1,093 rebounds (13.2). During the 1972 season, Dan had a career best 2,538 points (30.6) while pulling down 931 rebounds (11.2). The next two seasons, he surpassed 2,000 points and was a five-time ABA All-Star (one first team selection, four second team awards).

Dan joined the Denver

Nuggets for the
ABA's final year and
was an NBA All-Star
in 1977 when the
Nuggets joined the
NBA. Dan continued
as a player until the
end of the 1985 season,
playing in seven AllStar Games, and his
combined ABA/NBA
point total of 27,482
(22.6) ranks seventh. As
an ABA player, he was
second in career scoring



(12,923, 25.6) behind Louie Dampier. His career totals of 1,218 regular season games, 11.133 rebounds (9.14) and 2,907 assists also rank high. In his last season, he received the NBA J. Walter Kennedy Citizenship Award for outstanding community service or charitable work. Dan later was Nuggets head coach in 1993-95 and 2000-02, winning 180 games, and also served as team president, general manager and broadcaster.

Two other Pikes played in the ABA in the 1970s. Guard-forward Mike Pratt (Kentucky, Omega '67) appeared in 143 games for the Kentucky Colonels

during the 1971-1972 seasons and scored 806 career points (5.6). Guard **Barry Parkhill** (Virginia, Alpha '70) was with the Virginia Squires in 1974-75 and

the Spirits of St. Louis in 1976. His best year was 1975, as he scored 607 points (7.8) and handed out 226 assists. One of the

top collegiate

players, center Rich Yunkus (Georgia Tech, Alpha Delta '68), who is still Tech's career scoring leader with 2,232 points, was selected by the Cincinnati Royals in the third round of the 1971 NBA draft but

decided to skip pro ball.

The 1980s saw four more Pikes play

professionally. Center Jeff Pehl (Richmond, Omicron '81) was drafted fifth by the San Antonio Spurs in 1983 and later played with the New Jersey Jammers of the USBL. > a season with the Seattle Supersonics in 2000, he was traded to the Los Angeles Lakers in 2001 and earned another NBA championship ring in 2002. During his career, Horace played 1,165 regular season games; scored 12,996 points (11.5); pulled down 9,443 rebounds (8.3) and blocked 1,136 shots.



(11.3 average) with the Atlanta Hawks in the spring of 2004, he is seeing significant







Easter Monday and the PiKA Ball

SHIELD & DIAMOND REVISITS SPRINGTIME, BASEBALL AND GENTILITY

or most of the history of North $oldsymbol{\Gamma}$ Carolina, its citizens have taken two days to celebrate Easter. Unlike the extended weekend of current times, the traditional holiday started on Sunday and ended on Monday. For several centuries North Carolinians kept Monday as a day for recreation and contests, and from 1935 until 1997, Easter Monday was an official state holiday, with government offices, banks, and schools closed for the day. North Carolina State University had a central role in making Easter Monday official, for the activities on the State campus so engrossed the state legislature that it gave everyone it could the day off.

Easter Monday was truly the day of spring frolics for students, faculty, and staff at State, from the turn of the twentieth century to the decade after the Second World War. State students played hard ball and danced the night away for more than 50 years. For many students including the women of Meredith, St. Mary's, and Peace College, one of the highlights of the school year was the State-Wake game on Monday afternoon and the fabled PiKA Ball on Monday night. Those two events made for a full day away from classes and a chance to blend social and athletic enthusiasm. As one Raleigh resident observed, Easter Monday's game and dance in the spring rivaled Fair Week and the Carolina game in the fall, giving State a true celebration each equinox every year.

The timing of both the game and the dance coincided with an era when trains more than cars got most North Carolinians around. The dance remained popular until the 1960s when the ready access to automobiles meant that college students could do what they wanted just about whenever they wanted. Until then, the ballgame was part of State's long heritage in the Southern Conference, the series ending when Wake was moved to Winston-Salem, about the time the Atlantic Coast Conference was founded.

The holiday, incidentally, lingered across the state until 1987, when the state legislature switched to Good Friday, to accommodate the computerized needs of the state's growing banks.

The State-Wake Series

Baseball games had been a traditional part of North Carolina's Easter Monday celebration since the 1880s and 1890s. Originally, town teams played one another. Concord, for example, would go to Salisbury for a game, and residents of both towns would crowd the field. When baseball became a part of college life, those teams assumed the same role in their home towns. North Carolina Agricultural and Mechanical College's first recorded Easter Monday game was in 1899, when "the Farmers" beat the Bingham School of Mebane, 5-4. The contest provided the "christening for the

new A&M diamond," and more than 700 fans attended the game.

The idea of a college rivalry for Wake County caught on very quickly in Raleigh. The A&M team hosted Wake Forest College for Easter Monday games in 1900, 1901, and 1902. The game was popular from the start. A fan at the 1901 game noted that "an extremely large crowd" watched Wake win 12-6, including "young ladies from all three Raleigh schools," Baptist Female Seminary [later Meredith College], Peace, and St. Mary's.

A&M College continued "the semi-holiday of Easter Monday" into the new century, but had other opponents for several years, including the University at Chapel Hill and Trinity College in Durham. The holiday game with Wake Forest was resumed in 1907, to great anticipation. The Seaboard Airline Railroad offered a "shoofly" train for Baptist supporters to come to Raleigh from Wake Forest itself, as well as Henderson, Kittrell, Louisburg, Franklinton, and Youngsville. Wake won the game 8-7, despite a "December breeze" and "soggy grounds" at the State Fairgrounds.

From press reports, it appears the resumed series was a highly anticipated event. The stands were divided up into blocs. As one early attendee recalled, "The Baptists sat in the left wing and sang ominous songs, and the Farmers on the right uttered their guttural rahs." Again, in 1908, the shoofly train was held until the end of a game "witnessed by both student bodies" and "everyone in Raleigh." More than 2,500 people saw A&M win 4-3. As The News and Observer noted in a special front-page coverage, the game was already a "notable holiday attracting hundreds of visitors to this city" and the "largest baseball crowd" of the A&M season. By 1910, the contest had a regional appeal. All schools in the area were closed, and people came "from Fayetteville and Fuquay."

Many spectators came to see the girls as much as the guys. One spectator observed in 1911 that "the young ladies of Peace and St. Mary's will overrun the bleachers, presenting a solid mass of white, and those Easter bonnets so dear to their hearts." In 1915 "a fair bevy of St. Mary's girls divided their enthusiasm" between the teams, but always, it was asserted in 1911, Meredith students would "be there en masse to cheer on the Wake Forest brothers."

The first on-field celebrity of the series was A&M catcher Frank Thompson. Thompson, who graduated in 1909, drove in the winning run in the 1908 game, then returned in 1913 as the Wake Forest coach, "Good humor prevailed among rival rooters," it was said that year, when Thompson engineered a defeat of his old team. The A&M nine rebounded in 1914, the year they won their first "state championship" at the college ranks. Thompson then went on to service in the First World War and was killed on the Western Front as a member of the 15th Machine Gun Battalion. To honor his memory, State College named the new gymnasium after him in 1926.

After a skip in 1916, the series resumed, with Wake winning three of the four games played during the World War One years. By then the boosters had bestowed "annual eastern North Carolina classic" status to the game, the players becoming "ancient athletic rivals" with "the city celebrating a half holiday" along with "record breaking crowds from nearby cities." In the aftermath of the war, crowds exceeded 4,000, and lines of automobiles "for the first time" ringed the outfield.

Sports writers of the 1920s claimed that "the big game" was "a holiday habit" and "a cynosure for fans" that rivaled any autumn gridiron contest "from the standpoint of tradition." Indeed, said one in 1925, "Easter Monday is to college baseball what Fair Week is to football." The crowd, enabled by the growing presence of the automobile, swelled to 8,000 that year, when Wake won for the first time in the decade. More than 10,000 watched in 1926, when Wake won again. In 1927, "alumni [of both schools] came from all sections of the state" to see the game "according to the ancient custom." State College won 4-3 in 1928 on its way to another state championship.

The 1920s State fans had accumulated a treasure trove of Easter Monday memories that would rival a later generation's devotion to the Atlantic Coast Conference basketball tournament. The 1921 game, tied after twelve innings, was postponed because of darkness, then when resumed a week later lasted another eleven innings. During the second half of the game, the respective coaches did the umpiring. In 1924 the wind "won the game." The smoke from a train passing campus hung over Riddick Field, and a Wake outfielder lost a fly ball, letting State get the lead. Both schools disputed the eligibility of some key players in the next several years, until World War II caused a curtailment in athletics generally. During the interim, State played the Navy Preflight team from UNC.

Although there was a "rivalry renewed" after the war - when Wake won five in a row - enthusiasm for the holiday game waned. As work habits changed and family patterns evolved after the war. Easter Monday began to be used in other ways. Crowds dwindled, and with the advent of the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1953. scheduling needs changed. Most of all, the basis for the rivalry ended when Wake Forest College was moved to Winston-Salem. Ironically, the last Easter Monday game was set in Raleigh the same day as "open house at the magnificent new plant" at the Wake campus in Winston-Salem. And, the game was rained out. The next year State played Clemson on the date.

The PiKA Ball

The annual baseball game was just one part of Easter Monday tradition for many students at N.C. State. One of the high

points of social life on the west Raleigh campus for almost a half century was the Pi Kappa Alpha dance on Monday night. "The PiKA Ball" reached across North Carolina in its appeal and popularity. As much as the game, the ball became part of a statewide celebration of the Easter season. Pi Kappa Alpha's role in establishing a State tradition actually started as happenstance. Alpha Epsilon Chapter had been established in 1904, one of a half dozen fraternities at what was then A&M College.

The dawn of a progressive period at the start of the twentieth century allowed "the college set" to widen their social sphere, and formal dances quickly became a custom. To keep from competing for space and sponsored the A&M fraternities divided up the social year, and the ΠΚAs drew "the Easter German", as it was first called.

The German, a derivative of the cotillion popular throughout the South, involved the periodic performance of "figures", where often the organizers performed in front of the guests. The concept drew upon the European origins of the waltz, where the aristocrats "got the first dance" as a sign of respect and deference. In the case of public college campuses, where the students were generally male, in many ways the German figure was a way to "introduce my girl", a sort of reversal of the standard debutante ritual.

The first "German" was held on Easter Monday night in 1906, and the fraternity invited about fifty couples to the event. The organizers were C.A. Steadman '07, St. Julian Springs '06, and John Park '04. Some of the first "patronesses" – a fancy term for chaperones at the time – included Mrs. D.H. Hill, Mrs. W.C. Riddick, and Mrs. James McKimmon. George F. Bason '05 of Charlotte led the second dance, with the help of D.H. Hill, Jr. '05.

The event proved a success from the start. In 1908 Raleigh residents learned that "a large number of out of town college men will present", necessitated in part by the fact that the ITKA chapter only had thirteen members that year. In addition, the five other A&M fraternities were invited. Young women from Raleigh, along with sisters and girlfriends from the hometown of frat brothers, filled the dance floor. C.A. Steadman, for example, at an early ball "led the dance with Miss Ernestine Nuttall of Rockingham." In the early years "the German patterns [were] well planned and executed" every third dance.

The ΠKAs quickly made the dance one of their significant activities. The chapter members were said to have "done a great deal to make the dance a success." In addition, by 1913, alumni returned to help lead the German figures.

Just as North Carolina grew and modernized after the First World War, so did the PiKA Ball. The setting was moved from one of the auditoriums on campus to Raleigh's Country Club, and hundreds were invited. ΠΚΑs from other campuses within the state were invited, and the ball continued to be held "in honor of the other fraternities at the college." When the Frank Thompson Gymnasium was completed in 1926, the ΠΚΑs used the gym floor for the next two decades. By 1928 more than 2,000 invitations were sent out, and that number remained the size of the ball for most of the rest of its history.

The growth of the PiKA Ball coincided with an increase of social activities at N.C. State College in the 1920s. A German Club

on campus began to have a second dance, sometimes on Easter Monday morning, later on Tuesday nights, some years on both days.

Several times that decade the Panhellenic Council held a banquet on Monday nights. What went on at State had a counterpart throughout the more affluent areas of Raleigh, as more than a half dozen "clubs" formed to hold their own dances, as the entire city "celebrated the end of Lent."

Alpha Epsilon Chapter itself grew in size and scope. It rented a 10-room house in the early 1920s in anticipation of building its own house on Hillsborough Street. Once the house was complete, the ΠKAs extended the Easter celebration back into the holiday weekend. The brothers vacated the house each Saturday before Easter, and their dates took over the rooms. There would be a "house party" on Saturdays, and the ΠKAs and guests would attend Easter services together at a nearby church. After the game on Monday, there would often be a banquet somewhere like the Sir Walter Hotel downtown. In between, the brothers and their guests would decorate the gym.

The ball, however, remained "the fore of entertainment" and in the 1920s and 1930s became as anticipated and regularized as Christmas. A News and Observer writer noted that the event was "heralded far and wide by the younger set." The steady size of the dance necessitated that just one German be performed by four of the Fraternity organizers and their dates just before the intermission. In 1929, for example, "the fraternity figure" included John Dunn '25 of Enfield (and an unnamed date), Paul Elam '26 and Fay Foster of Statesville, Ed Speir '26 of Charlotte and Marion Dunn of Enfield, and Walter Clement '28 of Enfield and Martha Galloway of Raleigh. Thompson gym looked pretty much the same each Easter. An electrically-lit symbol of the Fraternity hung above the band, and garnet and gold streamers obscured the gym ceiling. Longleaf pine boughs adored the walls, often in frames that allowed "strollers" to take walks.

The ball survived "the stress of the times" during the Great Depression, when most clubs were dissolved. In 1931, the PiKA Ball proved to be "the only survivor of the popular custom." But even the ITKAs went into hiatus until better times returned, the dance being resumed in 1935, more popular than ever. The ball had such status by the 1930s that at least

three governors – O. Max Gardner, J.C.B. Eringhaus, and Clyde Hoey – served as honorary chaperones. The ball also got regional attention in 1937 when WPTF radio began to broadcast the performance of the two bands engaged that year, led by Earl Mellon and Jimmy Poyner. In 1938 N.C. Davis '34 of Elizabeth City and Frances Peppendick of Raleigh led the dance to the accompaniment of the Johnny Long Band, which was then regularly picked up by CBS Radio at the Arcadia Hotel in Philadelphia.

World War II did as much damage to the PiKA Ball as it did the State-Wake baseball classic. After the War the dance was resumed, and it enjoyed about a decade of fame and popularity that imitated the excitement of the 1920s. Photographs of the young women who did the "fraternity figure" continued to be published in the *News and Observer*. Like the ball game, however, widespread interest in the dance waned as times changed, and interests were channeled into other activities. The last formal PiKA Ball was held in 1961.

Alpha Eta Chapter Celebrates 100th Anniversary

On November 13, 2004, Alpha Eta Chapter at the University of Florida held its Centennial Anniversary banquet at the University Hilton Hotel and Conference Center in Gainesville. Alumni and spouses, chapter members and dates, friends, family and university officials joined together for this historic event, to honor the founders of the chapter and to look forward to another 100 years.

Alpha Eta Chapter was founded on November 17, 1904, at the Blue Goose Inn in Lake City, Florida. The sponsor of the new chapter was the new University of Florida Football Coach, Marvin O. Bridges 1903, an initiate of Rho Chapter at Cumberland University. Gator football historian and long time Tampa Tribune columnist Tom McEwen credits Coach Bridges as the man who established the foundation of the University of Florida as a legitimate southern football power. On that night of November 17, 1904, Coach Bridges organized and inspired the eleven undergraduates who were to form the core of Alpha Eta Chapter. The fellowship included Bridges' two younger brothers Bernard 1904 and Benjamin 1904. Bernard was captain of Florida's football team.

Throughout its history, Alpha Eta Chapter has been an integral part of the University community. Pikes built the first fraternity house in Gainesville in 1924 at the corner of University Avenue and 13th street, before moving to the most prominent location just across the street from Ben Hill Griffin Stadium at Florida Field.

More than 3,000 men have been initiated across ten decades, including alumni who have influenced much of the commercial, political and social history of the State of Florida.


the world of theology. The most important thing we learn is how to think and speak about God.

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"Few male writers could write so convincingly from inside the skin of a New Jersey housewife. Gordon manages to turn Mary Nolan's 'uneventful' life into something not only believable but deliciously entertaining, and her wry, streetwise voice should stay with the reader a long time, "said Sigrid Nunez, author of Naked Sleeper, about Bill Gordon's debut novel Mary After All, published as a Dial Press Hardcover on January 4, 2005.

In Mary After All, Bill Gordon (Syracuse, Alpha Chi '83) unleashes a fresh voice in literary fiction with his feisty, unforgettable heroine and narrator Mary Nolan (nee Marelli). Growing up in working class Jersey City in the fifties and early sixties, Mary does what all good girls do to escape: she marries young. But soon she finds herself with two kids, and stands guard as her family and marriage slowly unravel.

What separates Mary from the other Jersey girls is that through it all, she is able to muster the strength to emerge from-her life not only triumphant but heroic

Gordon did not set out to write a novel, but a memoir about his own years growing up in Jersey City that, according to the author, "would include the actual history of the town as well as its rich urban lore-the stories I'd heard about local hoods, loan sharks and hit men (only some of whom were relatives) as well as a long line of crooked politicians who everybody seemed to miss." The writing process spanned nearly a decade, and in that time Gordon amassed a wealth of material that gradually inspired him to write this story as fiction. "During my research I conducted many interviews, either formally or informally, and invariably it was the voices (my mother, father, aunts, uncles, and friends) that interested, outright amused me, as much as the material I was gathering. So I decided to try writing in that collective voice, an amalgamation and creation, if you will. And out of that voice, grew Mary, my narrator. Then came the story, the eventual time frame, the surrounding characters and ... this book.'

From beginning to end, Bill Gordon's fiction folds the reader into a time and a place both familiar and surprising, and in Mary Nolan he has created a character who, as *Kirkus Reviews* has said, "Is simply irresistible."

Bill Gordon's work has appeared in *The New York Times Magazine, The Mississippi Review, New York Press, Christopher Street,* and *Downtown*.

It was surprising when a black and white photo over half a century old appeared in the day's mail. In it, three college students were seen in bizarre costumes appearing in a stage show. These apparent idiots were The Three Mistakes, a product of Pi Kappa Alpha's chapter at Kansas

State University.

It all started in 1949 as a pledge skit. Don Hassebroek '50, Dan Hurley '50 and I were drafted to put together a pantomime of a song originally parodied by Spike Jones And The City Slickers. The popular novelty orchestra's comedy forté was a cheerfully deranged world of gunshots, cowbell solos, screams, bangs, booms, slams, thuds, bells, gargling and a myriad of other demented sound effects in perfect time to the music. This unlikely musical group

was distributed worldwide on the RCA recording label.

Even though none of the three of

us had any prior experience in the performing arts, our act was hilarious enough that we were asked to expand our repertoire. So, we rehearsed and performed more songs and showcased them at our fraternity's parties and dances. Then we were asked to appear during intermission at a sorority

dance and figured it was as good a place as any to meet girls.

From those humble beginnings, we were booked at University dances and shows and a gaggle of civic clubs. By then we had developed a spirited 20-minute show. It was obvious that we had fun

doing it. Our zany chemistry seemed to work for almost any audience of any age. We even had the audacity to ask for a fee of \$30 for a performance and some of the groups actually paid it.

While never famous, the Three Mistakes were, at least, notorious on our campus. Fate intervened in 1951 when Don lost his life in a car accident. The tragic event was a major loss for Dan and I. We were asked several times if we would select another Fraternity member and recreate our trio but that was

unthinkable. Don had left us and The Three Mistakes went away forever at the same time.

In this new century occasionally a radio station will, as nostalgia, play a song by Spike Jones. Inevitably I think of the many times when three Pikes provided hearty laughter for a lot of people, a legacy more valuable than many current entertainers can generate.

Patrick M. Rapicault (Delta State, Zeta Beta '90)

Captain Patrick M. Rapicault, 34, of St. Augustine, Florida died November 15, 2004 in the line of duty, as a result of enemy action in Al Anbar Province, Iraq. Rapicault was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton, California. The 34-year-old officer was among Marines killed in enemy fighting in Iraq. Military officials said Rapicault died as the result of a suicide bombing attack in Ramadi. He led the Whiskey Platoon, Second Battalion.

Close friends of the family say the family has a strong military background dating back to Napoleon.

Rapicault, born in France, always dreamed of being in the United States military. He came to the United States as a foreign exchange student, attended Delta State University in Mississippi and joined the Marine Corps Reserve. Upon graduating with a bachelor of science degree in business management, he converted to active duty. Rapicault became a citizen of the United States. In 1997, he completed Officer Candidate School and reported to Camp Pendleton in California. The following year, he graduated first in his class from Army Ranger School.

During his deployment to Iraq he had been quoted in papers and in magazines across the world. In *Time Magazine* on Oct. 25th, Rapicault told a reporter, "When we get sent out it's to defend, deter and detect against any kind of terrorist threat."

The U.S. Marine Corps Ceremonial and Guard Company rendered honors during Capt. Rapicault's burial at Arlington Cemetery.

More than 100 family, friends and fellow service members had gathered to mourn the 34-year-old Marine. He was the 97th service member killed in Iraq to be buried at Arlington.

Rapicault had been awarded the Purple Heart, the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal, Sea Service Deployment Ribbon and National Defense Service Medal.

At his grave, a Marine band played the hymn "Eternal Father Strong to Save." Captain Daniel Hench presented a U.S. flag to Rapicault's wife, Vera, and Staff Sergeant Charles Dorsey presented another to his mother, Nicole Rapicault.

"Even though I knew he loved me and loved life, he was willing to put down his life for our country," said his wife. "It puts him in a totally different category ... He was fearless."

In addition to his wife and mother, Rapicault is survived by his father, Gabriel Rapicault, and a sister, Christine Cappillino.

Kermit J. Silverwood, 97, Colonel, U.S. Army retired, entered Chapter Eternal on January 30, 2005. He is survived by his loving wife of 59 years, Carroll. Children: K. Colonel Silverwood was born in Newton, Kansas. He was a graduate of Kansas State University, where he received a B.S. degree in journalism, lettered three years in basketball and tennis. He later received his MBA at the University of Oregon. Silverwood participated in athletics throughout his life. He traveled the U.S. in the 1930s playing professional basketball for Olson's Terrible Swedes. He played 16 years on the U.S. Army tennis team, twice winning the U.S. Army doubles championship and he played in many Florida senior tennis tournaments.

At Kansas State University, Silverwood joined the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.



He was a member for 77 years and, in 1996, he received Pi Kappa Alpha's highest alumni award, The Order of West Range, for service to his fraternity and his country. He was also instrumental in establishing the Pi Kappa Alpha's Zeta Pi Chapter and other fraternities at the University of South Florida. As an avid supporter of college fraternities, he encouraged fraternity housing on campus.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army, graduated from Officers Candidate School, and was commissioned second lieutenant at Ft. Francis E. Warren, Wyoming. His assignments included: the Quartermaster Depot at Mira Loma, California; Graves Registration Unit in Liege, Belgium; professor of military science at UCLA; quartermaster of the 7th Infantry Division in Korea; and the Office of the Quartermaster General in Washington D.C. He was also commander of the Quartermaster School Regiment at Ft. Lee, Virginia.

Silverwood headed the combined Armed Forces Unit responsible for laying the petroleum pipeline across central Europe and was later the Petroleum Officer at the U.S. Army Strike Command, Mac Dill AFB. He was decorated with many awards, among them, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star and Korean Service Commendation Medal.

Paul B. Shepard entered Chapter Eternal on January 19, 2005 in New London, new Hampshire. In 1929, at the University of New Hampshire in Durham, 39 young men, members of the local Gamma Gamma Gamma Fraternity, became charter members of Gamma Mu Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha. One of these men was Paul B. Shepard. He graduated from Colby Academy in 1925 and the University of New Hampshire in 1930.
