


Regional Expansion Implemented

In January 2006, for the first time since 1991, the Supreme Council expanded the number of Pi Kappa Alpha's regions from 16 to 20. This expansion likewise increases the number of regional presidents to 20.

This expansion follows a transformation in the role of the regional president. The core function of the regional president is now to recruit and support alumnus volunteers (chapter advisors, alumni associations and house corporations). Regional presidents serve an especially important function in the chapter/

chapter advisor relationship. Not only do they assist in recruiting advisor prospects, but they are also charged with endorsing advisor elections.



2006 Chapter Executives Conference

Three special guests highlight Pike's premiere program for chapter leaders.

The 2006 Chapter Executives Conference began on Thursday, January 5th at "The South's Grand Hotel" - the Peabody in Memphis, Tennessee. For more than 30 years, the Conference has brought together Pi Kappa Alpha's chapter leaders for a midvear event focusing on leadership, management and personal development. A record crowd of more than 360 students participated in this year's three-day program.

The highlight of the Conference was the Executives Forum on Thursday evening. The Forum featured an all-star lineup of Pi Kappa Alpha leaders from business and higher education. The event was hosted by Neal Patterson (Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '68), co-founder, chief executive officer and chairman of the board of Cerner Corporation, the world's largest independent health care and information technology firm. Joining Brother Patterson were Dr. Andrew Sorensen (Alabama, Gamma Alpha '99), president of the University of South Carolina (and former president of the University of Alabama), and Kevin Turner (East Central, Epsilon Omega '85), chief operating officer of Microsoft Corporation and former president and chief executive officer of Sam's Club, Inc.

For 75 minutes, these accomplished leaders shared their insights on business, leadership and the Fraternity. Brother Turner told attendees that effective leaders model behavior for those around them, or, as he stated, "make sure their video is in sync with their audio". Patterson focused on communication. and how leaders must always consider not only what they want to communicate, but how it should be communicated. Brother Sorensen's remarks centered on the concepts of community and partnership, particularly how fraternities can build effective advocacy networks in

higher education. It was an outstanding presentation and surely a highlight for all who were in attendance.

Officer tracks began the following morning and made up the bulk of the Conference agenda. Presidents, rush chairmen and treasurers each had their own four-part program. These sessions were led by Fraternity staff members and ably assisted by an exceptional guest faculty that included **Justin Buck**

(Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon lota '96), Mark Dziatczak (Wayne State, Delta Nu '91), Mark Robertson (SMU, Beta Zeta '82), and Darius Sidebotham (Florida Tech, Zeta Sigma '94). These intensive workshops focused on tactics and best practices in each leadership area.

Friday and Saturday were also peppered with special sessions for all participants. **Dr. Jerry Reel** (*Tulane*, *Eta* '57) presented on the origins and

meaning of the Fraternity's Ritual; Mark Robertson discussed legal liability and risk awareness; A. Frank Smith (Florida, Alpha Eta '66) facilitated a model initiation ceremony; Mat Forrest (Southern Illinois, Iota Mu'94) shared his experiences in marketing; and Darius Sidebotham presented an energetic and motivational presentation on recruitment. Each of these programs was very well attended and received.

The Chapter Executives Conference concluded on Saturday evening with a keynote from International President Allen Groves (Stetson, Delta Upsilon '79) and the unveiling of Pike University's newest event - The True Pike Challenge (see inset). It was an exciting conclusion to an outstanding weekend. Thanks to those who participated in the Conference, Pi Kappa Alpha is well positioned for continuing excellence.



AE Alpha Epsilon (North Carolina State)

Active chapter size: 56. The chapter sent two men to the Las Vegas Leadership Summit, and three men to the Chapter Executives Conference in Memphis. The chapter maintains the highest fraternity GPA, with twelve men on the university's Dean's List. Alpha Epsilon has a new website, ncsupikes.com, which they hope will keep the past and present members in touch. They hosted an alumni weekend in the fall, and are working to collect a comprehensive list of alumni contact information for future events. In the fall semester the men donated over 400 hours of community service, and several men are also members of other service fraternities on campus. They helped raise over \$1,500 for a NCSU professor who is trying to adopt two children from Kazakhstan, and raised \$1,000 for the victims of Hurricane Katrina. Pike won the President's Cup, distinguishing the chapter as #1 in athletics in the Greek community. The Pike football teams dominated the fraternity and open leagues this year, with both of the football teams meeting to play in the fraternity final. The winning team of Pike Gold went to the national tournament in Florida in December 2005. The members are represented in the student government as well as the baseball and lacrosse teams.

Oregon State University: Pi Kappa Alpha's Newest Colony

The Supreme Council is proud to recognize Pi Kappa Alpha's newest colony at Oregon State University.

Located in Corvallis, Oregon State
University was founded in 1868;
coincidentally, the same year as Pi Kappa
Alpha. The university community includes
over 19,000 students from all 50 states
and 90 countries. Once known as one
of the largest and most thriving Greek
communities west of the Mississippi
River, OSU is striving to regain its position
amongst the top Greek schools in the
nation. Oregon State was a host to Pi
Kappa Alpha's Beta Nu Chapter from 1940
to 1998, and as of November 5, 2005, the
Fraternity and University have renewed
this relationship.

Consultants Matthew Greco (Chapman, Theta Psi '03) and Tom Olsen (Illinois, Beta Eta '02) spent four weeks in Corvallis conducting the referral-based expansion project. OSU sorority women, student leaders, administrators, faculty, and local Pi Kappa Alpha alumni offered the consultants insight and recommendations of candidates who best exemplified the qualities Pi Kappa Alpha represents.

After conducting over 200 student meetings, 46 invitations to become founding fathers were extended and accepted. Within a week of formal colonization, four more men were recruited. This group is the largest Greek colony on campus in the last 10 years and ranks in the top half in fraternity size. The membership includes men from various academic majors and organizations; including athletes from the following sports: the PAC-10 Varsity Beaver football team, lacrosse team, rugby team, polo team and crew teams. Additionally many clubs and national organizations are represented, such as the power lifting club, debate team, College Republicans,

the OSU Barometer school newspaper, Campus Crusades, and the U.S. Coast Guard. The colony also includes two volunteer Oregon firefighters.

Recruitment Report

Pi Kappa Alpha has long recognized the benefit of aggressive recruitment by its chapters. Pike remains dedicated to recruiting the "most best" men on college campuses throughout North America. Delegates at the 2004 International Convention unanimously adopted *The Pi Kappa Alpha Recruitment Philosophy*, which reads, in part, "Pi Kappa Alpha is committed to active recruitment—targeting, reaching out, making friends with, pledging and initiating the top men on campus, men who we believe will uphold the Fraternity's values."

Chapters can no longer rely on formal rush periods to yield a large pledge class full of blue chip recruits, since in recent years registrations for formal rush have been on the decline. Consequently, at no other time has it been more important for our chapters to actively target recruits, seek out the best men on campus, befriend and pledge those men. Pike chapters have seen remarkable success in committing to this philosophy, and reported over 3,400 pledges for 2005 fall semester.

Recruitment education is important to ensure the continued success of every Pike chapter. To address the need for new and innovative recruitment techniques, Pi Kappa Alpha has created a detailed curriculum that is delivered at all Pike University events. Recruitment education is offered at The Academy, six leadership summits held at regional locations throughout the country, and as part of the Chapter Executives Conference held in Memphis, Tennessee each January.








Chapter Advisor Profile

Oren J. Falkowitz

Advisor to Delta Alpha Chapter At George Washington University

Oren J. Falkowitz (Central Florida, Eta Phi '01) serves the Fraternity as an alumnus volunteer, in the capacity of chapter advisor, to Delta Alpha Chapter at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

Falkowitz began his term as chapter advisor in June 2005. In this position, he seeks to provide Delta Alpha Chapter with a strong foundation of values, continuity, and organization. He serves the chapter as a resource on the expectations of a well rounded chapter, meets with the executive leaders, attends weekly chapter meetings, and is available to all members for advice and perspective.

The Shield & Diamond asked Brother Falkowitz to reflect on his experience as a chapter advisor.

What has most impressed you about the undergraduate members of Delta Alpha?

I am continually impressed by the undergraduates' willingness and eagerness to develop themselves and each other as students and men. They crave opportunities that will enhance their lives for years to come, and I am especially impressed with their ability to synergize education and fun. I think it is evident, dealing with the men of Delta Alpha, that Pi Kappa Alpha continues make better men. Our humble purpose is truly a noble and successful one.

What do you think it takes to be a successful volunteer for Pi Kappa Alpha?

BALANCE. When I was chapter president of Eta Phi, our advisor, Dave Myres (Delta State, Zeta Beta '92), was a tremendous resource for me. I often think of Dave and his ability to provide perspective and balance as I advise Delta Alpha. Often, a chapter's expectations are idealistic and ambitious, and it is important to balance them by managing expectations. Sometimes the members' emotions benefit from being balanced by the objective perspective of a volunteer. A good volunteer also needs to find balance in his social interaction and relationship with the undergraduates. This comes

from developing strong relationships that are different from the ones we may have had in our undergraduate days, but still meaningful. Alumnus volunteers need to be engaged, not aloof, and show a great deal of maturity.

Why would you encourage an alumnus to become actively involved with a chapter?

Giving back to the Fraternity continues to be a rewarding experience. I'm always excited to see the advancement of Pikes both personally and professionally. Just as in my undergraduate days, I continue to be impacted by the firmer and more lasting relationships I develop. Finally, I think that the future of our beloved Fraternity is dependent on volunteers and the continuity they provide. There is a great need in the chapter for someone to provide some perspective and reference for the advancement and progress of the chapter, as well as someone who is in touch with the trends and developments of the International Fraternity.

Shield & Diamond Publishing Guidelines & Criteria

CORRESPONDENT

Each chapter is encouraged to appoint a Shield & Diamond Correspondent. His responsibilities include: Writing chapter news for submission to Shield & Diamond; Taking photographs (or arranging to have them taken); Identifying all persons in each photograph; Meeting published deadlines for submission.

A good correspondent may: Be an English, journalism or communications major; Have a good command of the English language; Enjoy writing and do it well; Understand and meet deadlines; Be enthusiastic and want to see your chapter news published.

DEADLINES

The Shield & Diamond accepts submissions from the chapters for three issues annually. The deadlines for chapter news are:

January 15 for the Spring issue April 15 for the Summer issue October 15 for the Winter issue

The Autumn issue of the Shield & Diamond does not contain chapter notes.

WRITING GUIDELINES

Space is limited and your information should be concise. Remember that the facts of the event or activity are the most important items to be included. Your alumni want to read about your accomplishments, achievements and successes (names of individuals are not always important). Please follow these simple guidelines: Avoid long list of names of individuals; Limit articles to 125 words; Deal in facts: the traditional Who, What, Where, When and Why; Do not

speculate or philosophize; Do not be vague; Use short, concise sentences. Example: "The chapter's scholastic chairman worked with the brothers to institute new study hours and an in-house tutoring program. As a result, Omega Delta chapter achieved the highest aggregate grade point average, 3.31, of all 23 fraternities on campus."

PHOTOGRAPHS

The best photographs have action or movement and encourage the reader's interest in the article. Photographs of two men shaking hands while looking at the camera or chapter members lined up in front of the house create very little visual interest. If you are photographing an awards presentation, ask your subjects to look at the award or at each other, ask them to speak to each other. Your photograph will look as if it were taken during the presentation, not arranged afterwards. Be creative. Use close-ups. Avoid the staged look.

Photos taken with digital cameras should be taken at the maximum possible pixel setting (for example: 1200 x 1600 pixels). When scanning photos, the resulting scan must be 300 dpi for printing purposes. Blurry or grainy photos cannot be used. You may send digital images by e-mail. Hard copy photos will be returned only when accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

Please note: The Shield & Diamond does not publish photographs which include alcoholic beverages (cans or bottles); Photographs can only be returned if they are accompanied by a self-addressed, stamped envelope; The Editor reserves all rights regarding publishing of photographs.

Identify brothers with their school and year of initiation. (Attach a separate sheet to the photo.)



Myths and Legends

Murder, Privilege, "Ragtime" and the Thaw Mansion

This installment's tale is the story of heartbreak, affluence, violence, corruption, adultery and murder. A saga so colossal, so fantastic, it could have only been set in the grandest place and time of all – turn of the century New York City. But how does the Beta Sigma Chapter at Carnegie Mellon, some 375 miles from the climax of this legend, have an intimate relationship to such an infamous tale?

The chapter, at then Carnegie Tech, was met with a very unpleasant Christmas gift in 1935. On December 26th their house at 1445 Wightman Street was destroyed by fire. The chapter took quarters temporarily in the old Sigma Nu house at 4921 Forbes Street with full intention of returning to its original home upon restoration. However, it was decided that restoring the devastated structure was improbable, resulting in a search for a new property. In 1936 the purchase of what was to be Carnegie Tech's finest fraternity house was completed. Standing at 5010 Morewood Place, Beta Sigma's new home was in the premier location - a mere 75 yards from the entrance to campus,

no more than 200 yards to any college buildings, and a stone's throw from five of Carnegie's strongest fraternities.

The former owner of the property was Benjamin Thaw. Thaw built the mansion at the turn of the century for what at that time was the very sizable sum of \$135,000. It was a three-and-one-half story building of grey brick with load bearing walls two feet thick. The facility featured 20 rooms and eight baths along with a six car garage.

On the first floor was the entrance hall, two lounging rooms, dining room, butler's pantry, kitchen, a servant's sitting room, and a lavatory. The walls of the first floor were covered with tapestry, as were the walls of the hallways throughout the house. The second floor had six study rooms and five baths. On the third floor were three additional study rooms, two sleeping rooms, two baths, a servant's suite of three rooms, and a game room. The game room consumed the entire front part of the third floor and measured 50 by 20 feet. Its walls were covered with deep red tapestry. It was furnished with a pool table, a ping-pong table, a piano, a radio, and several lounging chairs and sofas.

Concluding a great career was offensive tackle Eric Winston (Gamma Omega '03) of the 9-3 Miami
Peach Bowl squad. One of 12 semifinalists for the Vince Lombardi Award as the nation's top lineman, he bounced back from a 2004 knee injury and was named to the All-American second team, the National Interfraternity Conference All-Fraternity All-American first team and the All-Atlantic Coast Conference first team.

Also earning NIC All-Fraternity first team honors were two **Baylor** standouts. All-Big 12 second team wide receiver Dominique Zeigler (*Theta Nu '04*) led the team with 48 receptions for 563 yards and five touchdowns. His top game was nine catches for 141 yards versus Oklahoma. Running back Brandon Whitaker (*Theta Nu '04*) rushed for 481 yards (4.8 average) and caught 30 passes for 160 yards. His top game was 110 yards on 16 carries against SMU. Also seeing action for Baylor were offensive guard Travis Farst

(Theta Nu '04) and running back Mike Hawkins (Theta Nu '04).

Record-setting kicker Darren McCaleb (Delta Mu '05) of the 7-5 **Southern Mississippi** New Orleans Bowl team was

a semi-finalist for the Lou Groza
Award; received All-American
honorable mention; was a
first team NIC All-Fraternity
first team selection; and was
on the All-Conference USA
second team. He scored 107

points, including a school record 23 field goals (longest of 47 yards) and 38 extra points. The career field goal leader with 53, Darren booted four field goals against East Carolina and Tulane and three FG's versus Central Florida and Alabama-Birmingham.


Nine Pikes helped lead **Arkansas State** to the New Orleans Bowl, led by quarterback Nick Noce (*Delta Theta '05*), who hit 156 of 282 for 2,052 yards and 12 touchdowns. Defensive end Jonathan Najm (Delta Theta '04) had 30 tackles for ASU and forced two fumbles. Key starters on the offensive line were guard Kyle Koets (Delta Theta '04) and tackle Cody Brown (Delta Theta '05). Also playing for the Indians were tight end Brandon Henson (Delta Theta '04) and quarterback Travis Hewitt (Delta Theta '05).

Showing a strong leg as a kickoff specialist for the 11-2 **Virginia Tech** Gator Bowl squad was Jared Develli (*Epsilon '05*), who averaged 62.9 yards on 64 kickoffs, with 29 touchbacks. Defensive end D.J. Norris (*Delta Lambda '04*) was in on 18 tackles for head coach Bobby Bowden (*Samford, Alpha Pi '49*) and the 8-4 **Florida State** Orange Bowl team.

Other NCAA Division I-A players included **Washington State** defensive end Ropati Pitoitua (*Gamma Xi '05*), who had 13 tackles in six games, and teammate Jake McKinney (*Gamma Xi '04*), a tight end; **Mississippi** wide receiver Matt Pierce (*Gamma Iota '04*); the


All-Big 12 second team wide receiver Dominique Zeigler led the Baylor team with 48 receptions for 563 yards and five touchdowns.


Tennessee-Martin co-captain/safety Chad McMahan (Epsilon Sigma '03) was named to the Academic All-American first team, the Division I-AA Academic



Several Pikes competed this winter for Division I wrestling programs: 197-pounder Jake Duke (Gamma Chi '04) of **Oklahoma State**; 149-pounder Steve Wolery (Alpha Rho '03) of **Ohio State**, an Academic All-Big Ten selection; and heavyweight John George (Iota Alpha '03) of **Wyoming**. The Pike colony at **Boston University** includes four men on the wrestling team: 141-pounder Chris Coppolo, 133-pounder Brett Frimer, 133-pounder David Swofford and 174-pounder Chris Tripp.

Competing in volleyball are Eddie Miller (Alpha Upsilon '04) of NYU and five players from California-San Diego: Brenden Bowe (Kappa Phi '04), Tim Dietrich (Kappa Phi '05), Russ Hardy (Kappa Phi '04), Blake Hovsepian (Kappa Phi '05) and Stephen Shaw (Kappa Phi '04). Pikes on rowing or crew teams at their schools include the California-San Diego duo of Andres Onetto (Kappa Phi '04) and J.C. Wick (Kappa Phi '04) and the Trinity duo of Chris Bostock (Epsilon Alpha '04) and Joal Mendosa (Epsilon Alpha '05).

Regulars on the **George Washington** squash team are Jarryd Commerford (*Delta Alpha '05*) and Alexander Popovich (*Delta Alpha '04*) while Edward Beaulac (*Iota Lambda '04*) competes in epee for

the Columbia fencing squad. Playing the prop position for the Lousiana State rugby club is Jacob Chapman (Alpha Gamma '02). Playing in club intercollegiate hockey programs are Missouri-St. Louis center Bryan Bextermueller (Zeta Phi '04) and the Illinois trio of forward Mike Kincaid (Beta Eta '04) and defensemen Mark Myers (Beta Eta '04) and Alex Tauchen (Beta Eta '04).

OLYMPICS

Two of the Fraternity's greatest amateur athletes are continuing their quest to represent the United States again in upcoming winter and summer Olympic Games. Bobsled competitor and 2002 Silver Medalist **Todd Hays** (*Tulsa*, *Gamma Upsilon '90*) competed in several events during 2005 in anticipation of the Winter Olympic Games in Torino, Italy during February. His four man crew represented the U.S. at the World Cup competition in Austria and just missed a medal by .09 seconds. Todd was named to the 2006 U.S. bobsled team in January.

Javelin thrower **Breaux Greer** (Louisiana-Monroe, Eta Omicron '95) was bothered by injuries during much of 2005 but still won his sixth U.S. title with a throw of 259'10". His best throw of the year occurred at the Mt. San Antonio College meet where he reached 287'7", just one inch less than his personal best mark. An injury kept Breaux from competing at the 2005 World Outdoor Championships in Helsinki, Finland. *Track & Field News* rated him as the number one javelin thrower in the U.S. during 2005.

PIKES IN THE PROS

Nine Pikes were active in the National Football League during the 2005 season. New York Giants punter Jeff Feagles (Miami, Gamma Omega '86) became the NFL record holder for consecutive games played with 288. He is also the NFL's leader in career punts (1,437) and punts downed inside the 20 yard line (456). During 2005, he averaged 42.1 for 73 punts and 26 were downed inside the 20. Making his debut as the Kansas City Chiefs' punter was Dustin Colquitt (Tennessee, Zeta '01), who had 65 punts for a 39.4 average. His longest was 62 yards and 27 punts were downed inside the 20.

Twelve year quarterback **Gus Frerotte** (*Tulsa, Gamma '90*) started 15 games for the Miami Dolphins, completing 257 of 494 for 2,996 yards and 18 touchdowns. Quarterback **Kyle Orton** (*Purdue, Beta Phi '02*) started 15 contests for the Chicago

Bears and was named to the NFL All-Rookie Team. He hit 190 of 368 for 1,869 yards and nine scores. Offensive tackle Chad Clifton (Tennessee-Martin, Epsilon Sigma '01) started all 16 games for the Green Bay Packers and linebacker Josh Stamer (South Dakota, Kappa Pi '97) played in every game for the Buffalo Bills.

Offensive guard Rex Tucker (Texas A&M, Theta Theta '97) played in eight games, starting three, for the Los Angeles Rams and was a teammate of offensive tackle Ben Noll (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '01), who got into four contests for the Rams after being released by the Dallas Cowboys. Offensive tackle Chris Myers (Miami, Gamma Omega '03) was activated by the Denver Broncos after the season got underway and played in nine contests.

Center Joel Rodriguez (Miami, Gamma Omega '03) was on the Tennessee Titans' practice squad the entire season. Quarterback Preston Parsons (Northern Arizona, Theta Rho '99) was released by the Houston Texans before the season started but signed with the Denver Broncos for the 2006 season. Running back Joey Harris (Purdue, Beta Phi '01) spent the entire season on the Green Bay Packers' injured reserve list. Offensive tackle Jeff Hatch (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '98) went to training camp with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers but was released in mid-August. Kicker Drew Dunning (Washington State, Gamma Xi '00) played for the Tri-Cities Fever of the National Indoor Football League.

Watching his Denver Broncos have another successful season was Pat Bowlen (Oklahoma, Beta Omicron '63, who completed his 22nd year as president and chief executive officer. Winning plaudits in his first season as Dallas Cowboys vice president of college and pro scouting was Jeff Ireland (Baylor, Theta Nu '89). He oversaw activities on draft day and five of the eight draftees made good contributions. Jeff is also on the NFL's College Advisory Committee, which evaluates and counsels potential draftees. Wide receivers coach Steve Walters (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '67) completed his first season as wide receivers coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars after spending the last six seasons on the Tennessee Titans coaching staff.

Two Pikes played major league baseball during the 2005 season. Eleven year veteran **Matt Whiteside** (*Arkansas State, Delta Theta* '97) pitched briefly for the Toronto Blue Jays and posted 27 saves for Syracuse of the International League. He was signed to a 2006 minor league contract by the Pittsburgh Pirates. Pitcher **Seth Greisinger** (*Virginia, Alpha* '95) appeared in one game for the Atlanta

Braves and pitched in 16 contests for Richmond of the International League.

Pitcher Ben Kozlowski (Central Florida, Eta Phi '99) was on the Cincinnati Reds' 40 man roster all season while appearing in 28 games for Louisville and Chattanooga. In early December, he was assigned to the Louisville roster. Bryce Chamberlin (Washington State, Gamma Xi '03) pitched 18 games in the Baltimore Orioles farm system for the Aberdeen IronBats and Bluefield Orioles. Pitcher Ryan Mottl (Clemson, Eta Alpha '99) spent time with the Atlantic City Surf of the independent Atlantic League.

In new positions as minor league coaches for 2006 are two former Pike major league players. Andy Tomberlin (Western Carolina, Zeta Xi '86), who played six seasons as a big league outfielder, is now the hitting coach for the White Sox's Birmingham Barons club in the Southern League. Seven year big league hurler Richie Lewis (Florida State, Delta Lambda '86) was named pitching coach of the Los Angeles Dodgers' Class A Columbus team of the South Atlantic League.

With the untimely death of Atlanta
Hawks forward Jason Collier (Indiana,
Delta Xi '97) in mid-October and
the disabled status of Minnesota
Timberwolves guard Fred Hoiberg (Iowa
State, Alpha Phi '91) due to an aneurysm,
the only remaining Pike in the National
Basketball Association this season is
center Jake Voskuhl (Connecticut, Iota
Chi '96, now in his sixth pro year and
first with the Charlotte Bobcats. There
is an outside possibility that Fred might
return to the Timberwolves this season
since doctors have cleared him to resume
physical activity.

The Fraternity's two top college seniors last year are now playing professionally overseas. Center Adam Waleskowski (Florida State, Delta Lambda '01) played with the Rosso Alice team in Italy's Treviso Summer League and guard Jay Straight (Wyoming, Iota Alpha '02) was with the Lesob Turismo team in the same league. Adam is now playing with the Erdga Ehingen/Urspringschule team in Germany and Jay is with Galil Elyon in Europe Cup's Israeli Premier League.

Both of the Fraternity's professional golfers improved their earnings totals on the Champions Tour in 2005. **Lonnie Nielsen** (*Iowa, Gamma Nu '72*) won \$693,651 in 24 tournaments (good for 26th place) and had five Top 10 finishes. His best payday of \$140,000 happened after a second place tie at the 3M Championship. **Hubert Green** (*Florida State, Delta Lambda '65*) played in 11 tournaments and earned \$71,067.



Pi Kappa Alpha's Great College Football Coaches

Throughout the last century, Pi Kappa Alpha men have shaped play on the college gridiron.

ince the early 1900s, members of Pi Kappa Alpha have been involved in the success of college football programs at many universities. **Marvin Bridges** (*Cumberland, Rho 1903*) was instrumental in starting the intercollegiate football program at Florida as its first coach. He also helped with the chartering of Alpha Eta Chapter in 1904 and two of his real life brothers were charter members and Gator football players.

The Fraternity's first alumnus to achieve national success as a head coach was Lynn"Pappy" Waldorf (Syracuse, Alpha Chi '21), the first Pike inducted into the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame in 1966. He was head coach at Oklahoma State (1929-33), Kansas State (1934), Northwestern (1935-46) and California-Berkeley (1947-56). Pappy was the first winner of the American Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year Award in 1935 and his 1936, 1938 and 1943 teams were nationally ranked.





After moving west to Berkeley, Pappy's first team in 1947 had a 9-1 record and a number 15 ranking in the polls. The next three seasons saw the Golden Bears rack up a 29-0-1 record and play in three straight Rose Bowl games. Over 24 years as a head coach, Pappy achieved a 157-89-19 record and coached such greats as Otto Graham, Jackie Jensen, Les Richter and Johnny Olszewski. His brother, Paul Waldorf (Kansas '30), also went into

coaching and was head coach at McKendree College (1933-35) and Fort Hays State (1936-41), posting a career mark of 40-33-9.

Jimmy Kitts (SMU, Beta Zeta '29) was head coach at Rice from 1934 to 1939, then held the same post at Virginia Tech (1941, 1946-47). His career record was 46-42-1. Wes Fesler (Ohio State, Alpha Rho '28) skipped pro football to move into the coaching profession. After seven years as an assistant coach at Harvard, he served as head coach at Wesleyan (1941-42); Pittsburgh (1946); Ohio State (1947-50); and Minnesota (1951-53). Over 10 seasons, Wes had a 41-40-8 career record and coached such standouts as Heisman Trophy winner Vic Janowicz and Heisman runner-up Paul Giel.

Lynn "Pappy" Waldorf (Syracuse, Alpha Chi '21) was the first Pike inducted into the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame in 1966.



Frank Sinkwich (Transylvania, Kappa '27) was a Heisman Trophy winner with his own football card before becoming head coach at Tampa.

The Fraternity's next College Hall of Fame coach was Charles "Rip" Engle (Penn State, Beta Alpha '53). A head coach at Brown (1944-49) and Penn State (1950-65), he posted a 132-68-8 record over 22 seasons. Among his star players were Rosey Grier and Lenny Moore. The winningest head coach in Louisville history, Frank Camp (Transylvania, Kappa '27), led the Cardinals program from 1946 to 1968. Over 23 seasons, he had a 118-95-2 record and helped develop the quarterbacking skills of Johnny Unitas. Also a head coach during the 1940's was

Clyde "Howard" Bliss (Purdue, Beta Phi '38), who was at Valley City State (1947) and North Dakota State (1948-49).

Heisman Trophy winner and pro star **Frank Sinkwich** (Georgia, Alpha Mu '41) had a two year stint as head coach at Tampa in 1950-51. Serving as head coach at his alma mater from 1955 to 1960 was **Bobby**

Dobbs (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '42). After a stint as a head coach in the Canadian Football League, he was head coach at Texas-El Paso from

1965 to 1972. Over 14 seasons, Bobby's college career record was 71-63-4. **Keith Doyle** (*Miami*, *Gamma Omega '46*) was head coach at Union College in 1958-59.

The 1959 season saw the head coaching debut of college football's all time winningest head coach: **Bobby Bowden** (Samford, Alpha Pi '49). A two term chapter president, he stayed at Samford after graduation as an assistant before becoming head coach in 1959. In four years at his alma mater (1959-62), he fashioned a 31-6 record before posting a 42-26 mark as head coach at West Virginia from 1970 through 1975. He just concluded his 30th year at Florida State with an appearance in the Orange Bowl, the Seminoles' 24th straight bowl game. In 1980, he participated in the initiation of his son, **Jeff Bowden** (Florida State, Delta Lambda '80), who is the Seminoles' offensive coordinator.

Bobby's FSU career includes two national championships; an unprecedented string of 14 straight Associated Press Top Five finishes; 24 consensus All-Americans; five national Coach of the Year awards; and two Heisman Trophy winners. After 40 years as a head coach, Bobby's record is now 360-106-4. Among his leading players have been Deion Sanders, Charlie Ward, Chris Weinke, Casey Weldon, Terrell Buckley, Scott Warren (Florida State, Delta Lambda '77), Phil Williams (Florida State, Delta Lambda '84), and Steve Gabbard (Florida State, Delta Lambda '87).

After several years as an assistant on the coaching staff at Hampden-Sydney, **Stokeley Fulton** (*Hampden-Sydney, Iota* '53) took over as head coach in 1960. Over the next 25 seasons, he became the winningest coach in school history with a 143-99-5





record. His 1971 squad had a 10-1 season and his 1977 team was 9-1 and earned a trip to the NCAA Division III playoffs. Stokeley won six Mason-Dixon Conference titles and three Old Dominion Athletic Conference crowns. He was named ODAC Coach of the Year in 1977, 1982 and 1983.

Glenn Dobbs (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '40) coached in the CFL before returning to his alma mater to post a 45-37 record as head coach from 1961 through 1968. College Hall of Fame coach Bill Yeoman

(Houston, Epsilon Eta '71) was head man at his alma mater (1962-86) and rang up a 160-108-8 record over 15 seasons. **Gomer Jones** (Ohio State, Alpha Rho '34) was a longtime assistant coach in the college ranks before serving as Oklahoma head coach in 1963-64.

As head coach at Linfield from 1967 through 1991, **Ad Rutschman** (*Linfield*, *Delta Rho '51*) won three NAIA Division II national championships and 15 conference titles while going to the NAIA playoffs 13 times. His 183-48-3 record over 24 seasons earned him election to the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1988 and the College Football Hall of Fame in 1998. The winningest coach in Western Carolina history is **Bobby Waters** (*Presbyterian*, *Mu '58*), who posted a 116-94-6 record between 1969 and 1988.

Three Pikes got their first head coaching jobs in 1973. Former NFL player J.R. Boone (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '45) was head man at Fresno State from 1973 to 1975. Art Baker (Presbyterian, Mu '51) was head coach at Furman (1973-77), The Citadel (1978-82) and East Carolina (1985-88). Tom Dowling (Georgetown, Alpha Lambda '60) took his alma mater to three Top 20 NAIA finishes between 1973 and 1976 before going to Liberty as head coach from 1977 to 1983. In 1978, Bob Mattos (Cal State-Sacramento, Theta Tau '82) became head coach at Sacramento State. Over 15 seasons, he posted an 84-73-2 career mark, including a 10-3 record in 1988.

Current Florida Atlantic head coach Howard Schnellenberger (Miami, Gamma Omega '80) coached in the NFL before moving to the college ranks with the Miami Hurricanes (1979-83). He was named Coach of the Year after his 1983 Miami

team won the national championship and he has since been head coach at Louisville (1985-94); Oklahoma (1995) and Florida Atlantic (2001-05). Howard's 2003 squad had an 11-3 record and went to the NCAA Division I-AA championship finals. His career record is now 128-107-3 and he is undefeated in four bowl game appearances.



Bill McCartney (Missouri, Alpha Nu '61)

Five Pike alumni became head coaches for the first time in the 1982 season, with the most successful being Bill McCartney (Missouri, Alpha Nu '61), the winningest coach in Colorado history. He had a 93-55-5 mark from 1982 to 1994 and his 1990

squad had a 10-1-1 record, ranked first in the AP poll and beat Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl. Bill won national Coach of the Year awards in both 1989 and 1990. Dan Simrell (Toledo, Epsilon Epsilon '83) was head man at Toledo (1982-89) then served West Virginia as an assistant coach from 1991 to 1999. He became head coach at Findlay in 2000 and has a 78-74-2 career mark.



Foge Fazio (Pittsburgh, Gamma Sigma '82)

(Pittsburgh, Gamma Sigma '82) had a long stint as a college assistant, then was head coach at his alma mater from 1982 to 1985. He posted a 25-18-3 record before returning to the NFL as an assistant coach. Clark "Corky" Nelson

(North Texas, Epsilon Delta '86) served as head coach at North Texas from 1982 to 1990, posting a 48-52-1 record. Sammy Weir (Arkansas State, Delta Theta '61) was Central Florida's head coach in 1982.



Woody Widenhofer

Widenhofer (Missouri, Alpha Nu '85) had a lengthy career as an NFL assistant before serving as his alma mater's head coach from 1985 to 1988. He returned to the NFL as defensive coordinator for

two teams, then was head coach at Vanderbilt from 1997 to 2001. Woody has since been a defensive coordinator at Southwestern Louisiana (2002-04) and New Mexico State (2005). Serving as head coaches at Presbyterian were Elliott Poss (Presbyterian, Mu '68) from 1985 to 1990 and John Perry (Presbyterian, Mu '69) from 1991 to 1996.


Bob Pruett, (Marshall, Delta Iota '62) led his alma mater to a 15-0 record and NCAA Division I-AA title in 1996, his first year at the helm and had another undefeated season (13-0) in 1999. His teams had five victories in seven bowl appearances and three of his best known players are NFL standouts Randy Moss, Chad Pennington and Byron Leftwich. Bob won national Coach of the Year awards in 1996, 1997 and 1999. He was named winner of the 1999 Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award by the All-American Football Foundation. Bob's career record over nine seasons was 94-23.

One of the leading coaches in NCAA Division III the last three seasons has been G.A. Mangus (Georgia, Alpha Mu '88). Since becoming head coach at Delaware Valley College in 2002, he has led his teams to a 9-2 record in 2003

and 12-1 marks in 2004-05, reaching the Division III championship quarterfinals both years. G.A. has been named Middle Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year twice and has a record of 35-12 after four seasons. On January 18th, 2006, he resigned his position as head coach at Delaware Valley to become offensive coordinator/quarterback coach at Middle Tennessee State.



Bob Pruett, (Marshall, Delta lota '62) won national Coach of the Year awards in 1996, 1997 and 1999. He was named winner of the 1999 Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

In early February 2006, Steve Englehart (Indiana State, Theta Omicron '98) became the second-youngest head football coach in all divisions of NCAA football. He had been Rose-Hulman's offensive coordinator the last three seasons prior to

Once the scene of some of the city's most glittering social affairs, the Thaw mansion was lavishly furnished with eighteenth-century French and English furniture, Goebin tapestries, priceless rugs and sculptures that were museum pieces. Most of the treasures had been distributed to the family following Benjamin Thaw's death in 1933. The walls of the drawing room were still covered with a deep green tapestry and there hung a lone portrait of steel baron Andrew Carnegie, founder of the university.

The centuries-old stone and marble mantles, the tapestry covered walls, and the rich dark woodwork was all that remained. One of the mantles, purchased for \$15,000 at the time of construction, was imported from Italy and dates back to the year 1500. This work of art still resides today in the finished basement of the current chapter house.

Who Was Benjamin Thaw Anyway?

While Benjamin Thaw may have never been aware of the Fraternity, he did build a wonderful mansion. Thaw belonged to one of Pittsburgh's great steel families. He was a son of William Thaw and Eliza Burd Blair Thaw.

Thaw fancied himself as a "capitalist", as that is how he was listed in the 1930 census. In 1886 he married Elma E. Dows and had five children who enjoyed growing up in the mansion.

On June 25, 1906 a group of wealthy travelers gathered on the roof of the old Madison Square Garden in New York City to watch the premiere of a mediocre musical review. From beneath an overcoat one man produced a pistol and fired three close range shots directly into the face of another. Harry Thaw, Benjamin's brother, had just murdered architect Stanford White on the steps of the greatest building White had designed. The act was committed in a jealous rage.


White and Harry's beautiful socialite wife, Evelyn Nesbit, had been carrying on an extramarital affair. It is believed that it was in the Thaw mansion that Evelyn and Stanford met, as it is thought that Stanford White provided the home's designs for Benjamin Thaw.

The case became known as the "Trial of the Century" and has been rivaled only in recent times by the O.J. Simpson trial. Benjamin was no doubt intimately

involved with the family in these proceedings. Under a cloud of devious circumstances, Harry Thaw avoided conviction. The story was so infamous that many books and movies have been based upon it, most recently was the 1984 motion picture, *Ragtime*.

Pi Kappa Alpha retained the mansion through World War II, but eventually sold it to the university. The mansion was ultimate razed in 1957 to make room for the current fraternity quad, where Beta Sigma still resides to this day, along with the priceless Italian marble mantles. The mantles are cherished by the Pike brothers, and one can only contemplate with wonder where they have been, and to what they lay witness, for the 400 years prior to and during their residency in the Thaw mansion.

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Utah State Pike Continues Family Legacy

CAMP FALLUJAH, Iraq (Oct. 29, 2005) – Growing up, a young boy looked up to his grandfather, a Bronze Star recipient who served in the Army during World War II, and grew up to follow a legacy that he continues today in Iraq.

Corporal Quinnon W.

Duke (Utah State, Gamma
Epsilon '97), 27, said his
grandfather's service in
WWII called him to pursue
a career in the military, and

the nobility of the Corps motivated him to become a Marine.

"My grandfather was a strong man with good morals," he said. "He was successful in life. He fought in many campaigns during WWII, to include Guadalcanal. I knew that I wanted to be a successful person with strong values. Even after he had a stroke that confined him to a wheelchair, he pushed on for another 12 years; this is how he inspired me."

"I joined the Marine Corps because I wanted to be the best," said the Logan, Utah, native.

Duke, a manpower analyst, supports manpower information database software, and teaches administrative Marines how to utilize and operate the crucial software here.

The 1996 Logan High School graduate initially served as a reserve Marine while attending Utah State University, and worked in restaurants during the late 1990s.

In 2001, Duke, who is currently operating with Manpower Information System Support Office 11, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Headquarters Group, II MEF (FWD), decided to transition to active duty because he enjoyed his career in the Marine Corps.

"I liked the Marines, and I decided that is what I wanted to do," he said.

Before deploying to the Middle East in August, Duke served in Chicopee, Massachusetts, assigned to Marine Wing Support Squadron 472, and in Kansas City, Missouri, with MISSO 16-17.

"Massachusetts was a culture shock," he said. "I never really spent time on the East Coast. I reenlisted while I was there."

While serving in Kansas City, Duke was augmented to the II MEF to support Operation Iraqi Freedom here.

"I enjoy the work I do," he said. "I have the pride of being a Marine."



Duke said his job requires him to instruct others on the manpower software, which can be challenging.

"The challenges are introducing new systems, and giving classes," he said. "I'm definitely not a public speaker."

Even though Duke isn't keen on public speaking, he overcomes the anxiety in several ways.

"Practice, study and hard work are the only ways to overcome it," he said.

Duke's superiors have picked up on his attitude for success.

"Cpl. Duke is capable of communicating on any level," said Master Gunnery Sgt. Terry L. Slater, MISSO-11 staff noncommissioned officer-in-charge. "He is an outstanding instructor and truly enjoys passing on the experience he's gained. I would love to work with him any time, anywhere."

Duke said he is glad to be a part of Operation Iraqi Freedom, and looks forward to reading about the events in history books.

"To me, it's good to know I'm a part of a world event; part of freeing a country from oppression," he said. "...part of a big event that will go down in history."

Like many Marines serving in the Corps today, Duke is working to become an expert in his field, and is pursuing a college education in conjunction with his duties in the military.

"My goal is to become proficient enough at what I do to become a warrant officer," he said. "In the meantime, I'm working on an electronic engineering degree."

Pike Alum Brings Civil War History To Life In Compelling Essay

66 Tn May of 1864, as Union Gen. William T. Sherman advanced through northern Georgia to Atlanta, his forces would again meet those of Mai. Gen. Patrick Cleburne, a formidable adversary from the Army of Tennessee, whom Sherman had engaged in previous battles, and the man whom Sherman would later characterize as the ablest division commander of the Confederate army. On May 27 under Cleburne's skilled leadership the Confederate forces would repel the offensive of Union Maj. Gen. Oliver 0. Howard about two miles east of New Hope Church at the small settlement around a grist mill known as Pickett's Mill."

Fred Bohmfalk (San Jose State, Delta Pi '56) is one of nine historians who have contributed to a fascinating look into the life of one of history's outstanding warriors. A Meteor Shining Brightly examines the life of Maj. Gen. Patrick Cleburne, one of the Confederacy's most important officers.

The life of Patrick Cleburne was the stuff of epics and novels. From a teenage runaway to a lowly private in Wellington's Army, he was thrown on his own resources at an early age, while the Ireland of his youth mounted a call for independence. He came to America as impoverished gentry, to seek a new start from the ravages of the Great Famine, and on his own merit he carved a life in the young frontier town of Helena, Arkansas.


Shaped by the harshness of the British Army, and his Irish heritage, his concept of freedom was more political than inalienable. When his adopted country was ripped apart by war, Cleburne followed his conscience, coming from nowhere to gain fame and immortality as the highest ranking Irishman of either army, and the most capable division commander of the Confederate army. From Shiloh to Jonesboro, Cleburne won glory for the Army of Tennessee. His spirit was a meteor shining brightly, whose trail blazed out abruptly at Franklin, Tennessee on November 30, 1864.

In his essay, "Cleburne's Victory At The Pickett Settlement", Bohmfalk tells the story of a war which advanced foot by foot and mile by mile, as opposing forces struggled to gain control of an important crossroads dominated by a little church called New Hope.

A Meteor Shining Brightly is a lesson that moves quickly and is easily read. Editor Mauriel Phillips Joslyn has brought together nine keen minds writing eleven engrossing essays on one intruiging historical figure. Civil War buffs and students of military history and tactics have much to learn from Maj. Gen. Patrick Cleburne.



Columbus, Georgia In Vintage Postcards

Once again, Kenneth H. Thomas Jr. (Emory, Beta Kappa '65), author of Fort Benning (America in Images: Georgia) brings us a beautiful history of his beloved Georgia in images of bygone days.

Founded in 1828 as a planned city by the Georgia Legislature, Columbus prospered due to its location on the Chattahoochee River. Industry sprang up along the shores of the Chattahoochee and shaped Columbus's identity as one of Georgia's premier cities. Today, a thriving metropolis, it is the Columbus of yesteryear that is illuminated within these pages.

Early postcard views reflect the city from around 1905 to 1942, showcasing many of its businesses. neighborhoods, and parks. Historian and genealogist Kenneth H. Thomas Jr., a native of Columbus, has selected over 200 images from his own collection, other private collections, and that of the Historic Columbus Foundation, the co-sponsors of this book. In *Columbus, Georgia in Vintage Postcards*, Thomas offers a lovingly crafted tribute to the people and places of his hometown.

News of Bygone Days

100 Years Ago... Alpha Lambda
Chapter was chartered at Georgetown
College on April 19, 1906. In their first
letter to the Shield & Diamond, the new
brothers wrote: "We have recovered
from the effects of the installation, and
are now busy getting acquainted with
the fraternity life and discipline. ITKA's
prospects in Georgetown College are
very bright indeed, as we have no
competition except the Kappa Alphas
among two hundred students."

The April 1906 Shield & Diamond carried an editorial titled "Should Foot-ball Be Reformed?" During the football season of 1905, 22 deaths had been attributed to the game. University presidents, professors and ministers called for a cleaner and gentler game. The Shield & Diamond replied, "If football must be reformed; if the manliest of our games must be converted into a game fit only for high schools and the youth in their teens, then let those who have felt the disappointment of defeat and those who have felt the pride of victory swelling in their breasts institute such changes as will not prove fatal to the game."

75 Years Ago... Robert Adger Smythe journeyed to the Pacific coast to install Gamma Pi Chapter at the University of Oregon. The charter had been granted on February 11, 1932, but the installation took place on March 28. Forty-four men were initiated by teams from Beta Beta (Washington), Beta Nu (Oregon State), Gamma Xi (Washington State) and Gamma Eta (Southern California) Chapters.

The February 1931 Shield & Diamond announced that the 1930 Memphis Convention had broken all attendance records, and that the 1932 National Convention would be held in Los Angeles, California. (That convention would never take place – the next convention was held in Troutdale in 1933.)

From the April 1931 Shield & Diamond: "Pi Chapter at Washington & Lee returned this year to a beautiful new home that outranks all others on the campus in beauty and size.... Altogether, there are twenty rooms that make up the living quarters for the Fraternity." Also, "'The Dream Girl of IIKA' is keeping pace with 'The Sweetheart of Sigma Chi' as a song and

dance of general popularity, quite apart from the fraternity and college world, more than 100,000 phonograph records of 'The Dream Girl' have been sold."

50 Years Ago... Epsilon Eta Chapter at the University of Houston was chartered on February 4, 1956. Formerly Sigma Alpha Chi, a local fraternity, the group of 23 men were initiated by teams from Beta Mu (*Texas*) and Alpha Omicron (*Southwestern*) Chapters.

The Fraternity was looking southward in 1956, as it made plans to hold the National Convention in Mexico City on September 2-6, immediately preceded by the Leadership School in San Miguel De Allende, Mexico on August 30-September

From the March 1956
Shield & Diamond: "Five years ago, Alpha Gamma Chapter, Louisiana State University, was left stranded with only two members. Consequently, she was forced to give up her house and competition with the other 18 fraternities became increasingly difficult. Thanks to the generous support of alumni, Alpha Gamma has moved into her new chapter house, which is one of the most modern on campus."

25 Years Ago... Spring 1981 saw three chapters come to life. Beta Beta Chapter (Washington) was rechartered after a decade hiatus; Theta Tau Chapter was chartered on April 25 at California State-Sacramento, and Theta Upsilon Chapter was installed on May 16 at Tennessee Tech in Cookeville, Tennessee.

The March 1981 Shield & Diamond featured fiction by Ed Pease (Indiana, Delta Xi'71), and a historical article by Dr. Jerome V. Reel (Tulane, Eta'57) on chapter house mothers. The 1981 Pi Kappa Alpha All-American Basketball Squad was composed of Brian Walker (Purdue, Beta Phi'78), Jim Myers (Georgia College, Theta Gamma'79), Brian Allsmiller (Vanderbilt, Sigma'78), Mike Rhodes (Vanderbilt, Sigma'78) and Kevin Stallings (Purdue, Beta Phi'80).



Bud Canada Joins Alton Baldwin in the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame



More than a half-century after playing for the University of Arkansas Razorbacks, **Eugene"Bud"** Canada (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '45) became one of nine 2003 inductees into the U of A Sports Hall of Fame.

It was obvious at an early age that Bud Canada was a competitor. As a youngster, he hawked newspapers on the streets of his native Hot Springs, winning a new watch in a sales contest.

Little did he know that some of America's top salesmen would later seek a product he was hawking on Friday nights... his athletic talents.

He was a welterweight Golden Gloves boxing champion as well as a football standout. In junior high he won the state scoring title. Playing for Hot Springs High, he racked up enough points to be the state's leading scorer both his junior and senior seasons. Following graduation, twenty midwestern universities sought his athletic skills. Arkansas won out with, Canada enrolling in 1945. He had the distinction of starting at tailback in the first college football game he ever saw. The

feisty Canada quickly worked his way into the line-up, as the Hogs starting left halfback and safety.

In Canada's initial season he led the Southwest Conference in punt returns, and led the U of A in tackles as well as passing. After the U of A changed coaches, Canada went from throwing passes to catching them.

Opposing coaches always knew where he was lining up. Canada and Fraternity brother Alton Baldwin (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '44) anchored a defensive front that guided the Razorbacks to a Southwest Conference championship and a berth opposite LSU in the 1947 Cotton Bowl. Canada was essential as Arkansas won its first bowl game ever in 1948 (Dixie Bowl). Obviously the position change was a good one as Canada ended up playing in the 1949 College All-Star game in Chicago.

Alton Baldwin, also a native of Hot Springs, became an All-SWC end in 1946 at Arkansas and was selected as the most valuable lineman in the Razorback's icy 0-0 tie with LSU in the 1947 Cotton Bowl. He was drafted by the Buffalo Bills of the Old-World Conference. He was one of the league's leading pass receivers and scorers. Baldwin later spent a year with

the Green Bay Packers of the NFL and



finished his career with the Ottawa Roughriders of the Canadian Football League. He was chosen for the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame in 1987. Canada's induction into the Hall of Fame brought the two Pikes back together on a winning team.

A two-sport star, Bud Canada was a member of the record setting University of Arkansas 440 yard relay team which set a record that stood for 25 years. In 2004, he was inducted into the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor.

Canada's talents were also utilized by his country. He served the United States in the Korean War winning a Bronze Star. He entered as a private, and stepped down as a first lieutenant. Canada also served his state as Sheriff of Garland County and was a longtime State Senator.


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Chapter Eternal

Matthew K. Ballard (Morehead State, Eta Eta '04)

Matthew K. Ballard was born on the anniversary of Pi Kappa Alpha's Founders Day, March 1, 1984, and entered Chapter Eternal on July 12, 2005 as the result of a tragic motorcycle accident.

Ballard was riding
his motorcyle on Highway
986 when he collided with a pickup truck
in Olive Hill, Kentucky. A member of the
Morehead State football team, Ballard had
been serving as a student assistant to the
program and is the son of Morehead State
football coach D. Matthew Ballard.

Ballard's brothers in Pi Kappa Alpha reacted quickly to the news of Matt's death to aid and assist his family. They decided, with the consent of the Ballard family, to develop a ceremony to honor Matt. At the Northcutt and Sons Funeral Home, Chapter President Brad Hagen '02 entered the visitation room with a floral tribute wreath of maroon and gold carnations. He was followed by a double file of chapter brothers, each wearing a maroon carnation boutonniere and white dress gloves, who formed a semi-circle facing the casket. Chapter Advisor Rev. Dr. Charles D. Lees offered a recitation and prayer, during which each Pike went to one knee, remaining so for the duration. Chapter President Hagen addressed Ballard's family, conveying the chapter's sympathy and thanks for the honor of having Matt as one of their own. Chapter member James R. Copher '01 and alumnus Eric M. Heck '02 also spoke about the meaning of Pi Kappa Alpha and Matt's commitment to Pike's high ideals. At the end of the ceremony, the Pikes encircled the casket, whispered the Fraternity cheer, and placed flowers on the bier. Offering their condolences once again to the Ballards, the Fraternity brothers then reverently and quietly left the room. A Fraternity flag in a triangular display case was presented to the Ballards. At the request of the family, chapter actives and alumni served as pallbearers for the funeral at Morehead First Church of God. Brother Matthew Ballard was laid to rest at Mountain View Memorial Park in Black Mountain, North Carolina, the family's home state, on July 18, 2006.

Robert O. Blucker

(Wisconsin, Beta Xi'50)

Robert O. Blucker entered Chapter Eternal on April 3, 2003.

Born in 1927 in North Little Rock, Arkansas, Blucker gained international attention while being held hostage in Iran.

An economics officer with the United States Department of State, he was assigned to the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, Iran when it was seized by Iranian militants on November 4, 1979. Sixty-six Americans were held hostage. Thirteen were released on November 20, 1979. One was released due to illness on July 11, 1980. The remaining fifty-two, including Robert Blucker, were held a total of 444 days. They were finally released on January 20, 1981.



Blucker served Beta Xi Chapter as president during 1953; he earned a bachelor of science degree in chemical engineering from the University of Wisconsin in 1954. After serving in the U.S. Navy in the Korean War, he worked for three years as a process engineer for Texaco. His 27-year foreign service career included consular and economic officer assignments in Argentina, West Germany, East Germany, Nigeria, Libya and Iran. His last assignment was as consular general in West Berlin, Germany.

Blucker is fondly remembered by one of his chapter brothers:

"Brother Blucker was a graduate student when I rushed PiKA. He was finishing his advanced degree in international relations. He became an American hero, but not by his own choice.

'Bluck' was one of the hostages taken in the American Embassy in Iran in 1979. When I saw his name on the hostage list I said to myself, 'The Iranians are in for trouble!' For 444 days Brother Bob slept on a concrete floor. I knew he'd give the hostage-takers a rough time, and indeed he did.

When someone insisted that the American hostages be photographed, Blucker refused, turning his back, and then lying face down on the bed. He angered the guards, but evidently suffered no physical punishment for refusing to cooperate. The Iranians had equal success – none – in getting Bluck to record statements reflecting negatively on the United States.

Eventually, through diplomatic channels, the Carter administration was able to work the release of the hostages, although the exact moment of freedom came seconds after Ronald Reagan took the oath of office.

Robert Blucker, Beta Xi, American Hero! And, as we say, "Phi Phi Kappa Alpha, Brother!" Brother Robert Blucker was living example of what 'Alpha' means in our motto! Our new brothers in Beta Xi would do well to read as much as they can find about Robert Blucker. He is worth remembering!"

His personal hands-on approach to chapter operations influenced the lives of many young men.

At a special chapter meeting at the Kennedy residence on Friday, October 21, 2005, chapter members and alumni proudly initiated Steve & Allarsha Kennedy's son, Sean Michael Kennedy, into Gamma Upsilon Chapter.

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
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
