The time I have spent with brothers in Memphis, Kansas City, and in the deserts of southern Utah have impacted me in ways that I could never describe with words. Pike University provides the training, inspiration, and means for success that will send you and your brothers places in life that before would have been unimaginable. All it takes is one man to be the difference maker in a chapter...one man to leave a legacy of greatness.





- · Explain the importance of meeting brothers from other chapters
- Encourage them to sit at separate tables at meals and in sessions
- Emphasize the responsibility to attend all sessions (consider billing them for their hotel room if they skip a session)

The event is finally here. Take your experience to the next level. It's time to find out what your chapter is capable of.

IFC Academy a Success



Pike brothers at the IFC Academy

The North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) recently hosted 160 Interfraternity Council (IFC) officers and advisors for the 2009 IFC Academy. Held at the Hilton Downtown Indianapolis, the Academy brought student leaders together from across the country. Thirty-five fraternity communities were represented at the day long conference.

The Academy is a one day, fourteen hour program which takes participants through curriculum pieces focused on how they can become high performing IFCs, aligned with the NIC Standards, and serving the needs of their member fraternities. Participants leave the Academy with a task list for their return to campus, a renewed sense of commitment to the interfraternal community and a personalized assessment of their own council effectiveness. Attendees also learned how to identify restrictive clauses in their own policies and, along with NIC professional staff, discussed ways to work with campus advisors and administrators to remove these restrictive policies.

NIC President & CEO, Peter Smithhisler commented on the IFC Academy, "The NIC's commitment to Advocacy, Collaboration, and Education comes through with great clarity at IFC Academy. We are able to impress upon these men the importance and relevance of complete standards implementation. Our member fraternities depend on us to do this work and we are excited about its continued evolution."

The 2009 IFC Academy featured special guest Josh Orendi, CEO of Phired Up Productions. Phired Up and Josh specialize in values based recruitment programming. Their Academy program reiterated to the IFC officers the important role they play in removing restrictions and ensuring that fraternities can operate in environments that are conducive to their success.

The NIC does not formally recognize Interfraternity Councils. The member fraternities which comprise campus IFCs are part of national organizations that are NIC members. The NIC Standards are the agreed upon requirements for membership in the inter/national trade association. Supreme Council Chooses Justin A. Buck As Fraternity's Next Executive Vice President

Following the announcement made by Raymond L. Orians (Memphis, Delta Zeta '66) that he would be retiring as the Fraternity's executive vice president effective April 1, 2009, the Supreme Council appointed a search committee to fill the executive vice president position. The Executive Vice President Search Committee consisted of International President Patrick A. Talley, Jr. (Armstrong Atlantic State University, Eta Mu '74), Chairman; Past International President Joseph J. Turner, Jr. (Clemson, Eta Alpha '70), Past International President John Michael Williams (Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '68), International Vice President John A. Bobango (Arkansas State, Delta Theta '74) and Northwest Regional President Brian R. Mann (Washington, Beta Beta '91). This committee was charged with the responsibility of conducting a full, open and national search with respect to the Fraternity's executive vice president position.

In September 2008, a national search for a new executive vice president was officially launched. A letter was sent from International President Talley to all international officers, chapter advisors, chapter house corporation contacts, alumni association contacts and chapter presidents, advising of the executive vice president job opening and requesting recipients to apply, or to recommend to the committee any potential candidates they wished to be considered. Approximately 1,100 letters were sent via email, and another 130 letters sent via regular mail. The committee then publicly advertised the position by placing this information and the job description on the Fraternity's website. The announcement was also put on the American Society of Associations Executives Career Center, and shared with the Fraternity Executives Association, the North-American Interfraternity Conference and the Association of Fraternity Advisors.

The search committee received 21 formal applications. In addition, the search committee formulated a broader list of potential candidates based on recommendations received from numerous sources. In this regard, the committee cast a wide net and formulated a list of 22 potential candidates, all of whom are well known within the Fraternity family, including several past international presidents and many past and current international officers. The committee then set about the task of conducting in-person and phone interviews with potential candidates. All totaled, the search committee held 14 telephone and in-person meetings over a six month period.

As a result of the extensive search process described above, it was the unanimous recommendation of the search committee that the Supreme Council offer the executive vice president position to Justin A. Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon lota '96), and this recommendation was unanimously accepted by the Supreme Council at its meeting in Atlanta, Georgia on February 28, 2009. The announcement was officially made by

President Talley in a meeting with the Memorial Headquarters staff in Memphis, Tennessee on March 2, 2009.

Justin Buck is, of course, well known to the Fraternity, having served in numerous positions on the Memorial Headquarters staff, most recently as the Fraternity's executive director. It should be particularly emphasized that Justin was not simply promoted from within as the most likely inside candidate. To the contrary, during the interview process Justin was critically and rigorously examined in every respect, and the Council found him to be highly qualified both in terms of impressive academic credentials as well as broad-based experience within the Fraternity. Moreover, the Supreme Council believes that Justin meets or exceeds its expectations with respect to values, visionary leadership, management acumen, understanding of policy governance, and ability to be a consensus-builder.

Justin brings impressive credentials and experience to the executive vice president job, including an MBA degree, and has many years of staff experience during which he has exhibited strategic and financial leadership that has helped make this organization successful over the past decade.

In his years of working with the Fraternity, he has held positions as consultant, director of expansion, director of housing, resident advisor at Miami, and executive director. As recruitment and real estate comprise most of our major asset bases, the Council believes that his fundamental understanding of these areas, as well as his relationships with the people who carry out these functions, is of highest benefit to the Fraternity. As the Fraternity's executive director for the past two and a half years, Justin has been involved in every area of Fraternity operations and board interactions. The Council also recognizes his trait of being flexible and ability to "grow with the job" into the future.

As the new executive vice president, he will certainly have to lean heavily on our talented international officers and volunteer corps. Fortunately, Justin has worked with many of them and knows them well. He also has a solid relationship with current and past staff members of the Memorial Headquarters. Whether it is among our seasoned veterans or those who he has personally recruited or promoted, we believe that he has instituted a strong feeling of identity and teamwork within the organization, which will serve the Fraternity well in the future.

The Supreme Council was particularly impressed with the passion and energy which Justin brings to our Fraternity every day. Since we have known him, he has been in perfect alignment with the goals and objectives of Pi Kappa Alpha's Strategic Plan and overall goal of being the best organization in the fraternal world. We believe that he has served to fulfill these goals in every way possible through his various job capacities in the past. We have also seen that his passion and energy have been





RAYMOND L. ORIANS (MEMPHIS, DELTA ZETA '66) HAS DEDICATED OVER 40 YEARS TO THE FRATERNITY'S PROFESSIONAL STAFF, BECOMING PI KAPPA ALPHA'S EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT IN 1984. WITH HIS DECISION TO RETIRE IN 2009, HE LEAVES THE FRATERNITY A LEGACY OF WISDOM, FORESIGHT, BROTHERHOOD AND A TIRELESS DRIVE TO FXCFL.

Q. When and how did you start your career with the Fraternity?

A. It was actually by coincidence. I started part-time in the spring of 1967 in the mailroom of the old Headquarters at 577 University Boulevard when I was a sophomore in college. I needed a job to continue school. Our chapter at the University of Memphis (then Memphis State) had been placed on probation the year before I pledged, so while we learned about the Fraternity's history, we had little knowledge of the Headquarters' operation. At the 1968 Centennial Convention in Richmond, Virginia, our chapter won the only Smythe Award granted plus eight other national awards. That was when I realized that the Fraternity was much larger than the local chapter experience.

Q. What position did you hold after graduating?

A. Chief Executive Patrick W. Halloran was hired shortly before the annual summer meeting (now The Academy) in 1969. The Fraternity was on the verge of financial collapse. I had one semester left with just a few hours to graduate. Pat asked a few staff members to stay on and fortunately I was one of them. In January 1970, he gave me my first full-time job as Director of Housing and Finance. Pat and the staff he hired proceeded to take the Fraternity to new heights both in terms of growth and financial stability over the next decade. It was a very challenging time since students were going through some significant experimentation on campus while our country saw some very radical changes. But it was also very rewarding and fun to be a part of such a successful venture.

Q. What led you to accept the chief executive position of Executive Vice President?

A. Pat Halloran left in 1980. Although overtures were made to me then about the job, I liked what I was doing and thought I was too young. Plus I had a young family including a daughter in grade school and a son less than two years old, and I didn't think I could commit to the travel required in those years. But the opportunity came again in 1984. At that time, the Supreme Council was composed of members many of whom, along with other national officers, had become some of my closest friends. Several I had met during my chapter visits when they were student leaders. Although I was still somewhat reluctant, with the support of my family and with a deep confidence and comfort in our volunteer leaders, I decided to give it a shot. It was the best decision I ever



Q. How has the Fraternity changed in your 40 plus years on staff?

A. That question covers considerable ground. I would say the most important accomplishment of the organization was its climb from being an also-ran fraternity to one of the premier fraternities in the Greek movement. The Fraternity seized every opportunity by expanding to campuses, increasing recruitment efforts, developing new and relevant educational programming, and acquiring competitive chapter housing when others were not nearly as aggressive. Our volunteers at both the local level and the national level responded, especially in the last three decades, with both their time and treasure. Everyone wants to be associated with a winner. The end result was that within the last decade, the Fraternity had reached the 200 chapter mark, expanded to more campuses and averaged more members per chapter than any other national or international fraternity.

These were just a few highlights. By any measure, Pi Kappa Alpha had established a position of dominance in the fraternity world.


Q. What significant programs have been initiated since 1984 when you became **Executive Vice President?**

A. We immediately established longterm goals in 1984 and then changed the staff structure and policies to accomplish those, as well as to provide for an on-going professional and tenured staff. This made a significant difference, as we now have the most professional and tenured staff of any of the over 100 national or international fraternal organizations.

Thanks to a creative and aggressive staff, we then completely overhauled our expansion program. Instead of waiting for interested student groups to contact us, we targeted campuses where we believed the Fraternity could be strong and successful. Then we sent staff to those schools for extended periods to recruit the best and brightest students we could find. Our expansion program was the envy of the fraternity world and still is today.

Unfortunately the early 1980s was the advent of the "legal liabilities" era in the Greek world, probably because the drinking age had changed from 18 years old to age 21, but being a legal adult in all other aspects remained at 18. In other words, parents were no longer legally responsible for the acts of their sons from the time most entered college. This prompted injured parties to look for deeper pockets, and a rash of claims and lawsuits against chapters and the Fraternity began. In response, the Fraternity established a comprehensive risk awareness program which included extensive education. Also, we established the first national self-insured fund with a group excess general liability policy in the Greek world. This program has been acknowledged as one of the best of its kind.

As he looks back on over 40 years of service to the Fraternity, Ray Orians can be assured that he will remain forever in the hearts and minds of Pi Kappa Alpha's members.

Another critical initiative was the enhancement of our chapter awards program. We adopted the philosophy that the more recognition, the better. Several of our chapters had improved and had experienced many significant accomplishments. We expanded the Smythe Awards to as many as 18 chapters rewarding overall proficiency, established the Chapter Excellence Award which over 40 chapters received last year, and created many new awards for specialty areas while adding runnerups and honorable mentions to others.

Our next important initiative was the creation of Pike University, the educational arm of the Fraternity. As one student member summarized recently, it teaches you about "real world stuff", things you don't learn in the classroom. Sessions on leadership development, financial management, risk awareness and health issues, recruitment and salesmanship, and a host of other personal development topics became a part of the curriculum. Pi Kappa Alpha now has more educational conferences and attendees than any other fraternity.

The most recent major initiative was to modernize the structure of the Fraternity. The Constitution of the Fraternity was completely overhauled and new Chapter Codes were adopted at the 2004 Convention to allow for more authority and flexibility to act in a timely manner at both the international and the chapter level. Thanks to then International

President Allen Groves, who was elected at that Convention, the Fraternity proceeded to establish and to modernize its corporate structure, leading to three additional corporate entities (PKA Corporation - the overall servicing corporation, RAF, Inc. - our risk awareness affiliate, and Pike University - the educational affiliate) being established. These entities, along with White Horse Holding Corporation, the housing lending affiliate, and the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation, the fund raising affiliate, allowed the organization to become more focused and to operate more efficiently.

Q. The Fraternity constructed a new headquarters building during your tenure. What led to that move?

A. Fraternity leaders recognized the need for more space to house both the expanded staff and additional archives when I was still in college. Architectural renderings were drafted as early as 1968 for a new wing to the 577 University Boulevard headquarters, but the necessary funding could not be obtained. When I assumed the chief staff position in 1984, the building was 30 years old, and we desperately needed more space. We became serious about constructing a major addition. As fortune would have it, Rhodes College, our neighbor and home to Theta Chapter, also needed additional land and buildings to accommodate a growing student enrollment and future programming. The College

also desired a main entrance to its campus from a major thoroughfare, and our property was the key to that goal. After almost a year of some intense negotiations, we struck a somewhat complex agreement. We sold the property to the College at a very substantial price which included cash and land on which to build. We then leased the property back for a nominal sum during the construction of the new headquarters and received a low interest loan commitment from the College in case we needed more funds to finish the building.

The result was a new headquarters building at 8347 West Range Cove, completed in 1988 with twice the square footage and twice the land as the old property. The building was state of the art, allowing for a very conducive staff operation including modern computer equipment and a spacious museum displaying precious artifacts of our history. It was also designed to allow for as many as three future additions. And the headquarters was built in the prestigious Southwind office area park of Memphis, Tennessee which was and is still very attractive. Federal Express eventually built its world headquarters there. And two large and respected national sororities, Kappa Delta and Chi Omega, built their first free-standing national headquarters close by in 1991 and 1994 respectively.

Q. Talking about other fraternal organizations, Pi Kappa Alpha became very involved in the Greek movement during your tenure. What precipitated that policy?

A. Under the leadership of then National President Ed Pease in 1988-90, we recognized the need to become an important player in the Greek movement. Certain broader goals such as better university, public, and government relations could only be achieved with our full commitment and participation in the greater movement. We became active participants and leaders in the two major interfraternal associations, the Fraternity Executives Association (FEA), an association of the chief executives of most national fraternities and sororities, and the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC), of which 73 national men's fraternities are members. I became president of FEA in 1995 after serving as chairman of several FEA committees, including one that recommended accepting

sorority executives into membership after over 60 years of being restricted solely to male fraternity executives. After amending the NIC by-laws, Ed Pease was elected as president of NIC and was the only man ever to serve two different terms as its president during its 100 year history. Ed brought new reforms to the NIC including a comprehensive strategic plan, a national public relations campaign and a federal government relations initiative which led to support from many of our nation's leaders in Congress. The prestige and reputation of Pi Kappa Alpha in university circles, with our fellow fraternal organizations and with the public in general, has improved tremendously since that time.

Q. What enticed you to make NKA your career and stay with it these 40-plus years?

A. As I stated earlier, one of the main reasons was the lifelong friendships established with our leaders and members, whose only motivation was to make our Fraternity the best it could be. And there were some very selfish reasons. My philosophy was always to recruit volunteers and staff from across North America from different backgrounds who were smarter and perhaps more dedicated than I was. That way I could constantly learn not only how to make the Fraternity better, but perhaps make my personal life more meaningful and successful. And it worked.

My years of involvement with our housing operations led to two close friendships in Richard Ralph and Jamie Wolff, both of whom served as chairman of our housing arm for respective terms of over 20 years. Then there were the 14 Fraternity presidents with whom I served as the chief executive - Joe Turner, Bill LaForge, Gary Menchhofer, Ed Pease, Jerry Askew, Tommy Turner, Andy Morse, John Michael Williams, Tom Handler, King Buttermore, Mark Anderson, Allen Groves, Kevin Knaus and current president Pat Talley. They and the Supreme Council members with whom they served were great mentors to me.

The dedication and support from the staff, those who do the heavy lifting, was just as important. Pat Haynes, Dan Corah, Sandra Newsom, Sherry Walker and Gwen DeShazo Irwin have been there since the beginning of my tenure

Raymond L. Orians: Fast Facts

Ray Orians was initiated into the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity on February 13, 1966 at Delta Zeta Chapter, University of Memphis. His brothers Richard '68, Michael '81, Steven '81 and Robert '83, as well as his son, Jeffrey '97, are also members of Delta Zeta Chapter.


He was appointed executive vice president and CEO of the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity in June 1984. He served Pi Kappa Alpha as director of housing for 15 years prior to assuming the position as the Fraternity's chief executive officer. Upon his retirement in April 2009, Orians was named executive vice president emeritus.

He has extensive experience in real estate. insurance and finance operations, and established the first self-insured retention program in the fraternity industry. Pi Kappa Alpha bestowed its prestigious Loyalty Award on him at its 2004 Convention. At the 2008 Convention, his Fraternity recognized him with its top award, the Distinguished Achievement Award, given annually to an alumnus who has distinguished himself in his chosen vocation or profession.

On the local level, he served as president of his chapter's house corporation, and president of the Memphis Area Alumni Association. He has served as a director and officer of several local fraternal house corporations. The University of Memphis recognized Orians as its Outstanding Greek Alumnus of 1994.

He is also a past president of the Fraternity Executives Association, elected by chief executives of all national fraternity and sorority organizations. He has also served as president of the Coalition for Freedom of Association, an action group of several national fraternities and sororities and other student organizations, which attained federal legislation for the right of students to freely associate. He and his wife Paige have two grown children, Aileen and Jeff, and two grandsons.

Orians is a member of the Educational Foundation's Garnet & Gold Donor Society, the Oak Trust and the President's Council.

A. More so now than ever. In this technological age of instant communication, very few institutions provide the environment for face-toface interaction. Chapter members have the opportunity to not only run a small business, but to debate the issues of the day, whether those are world affairs, politics, religion, the various professions, community or family life or whatever. They support each other in good times and bad times, participate in their community, plan for the future and enjoy life to its fullest. Lifelong friendships are established. And all this they can do with little fear of repercussions or consequences which might exist in a

workplace or the outside world. It is truly a learning laboratory. There is no doubt in my mind that every chapter member who takes advantage of this opportunity in the right way will enjoy a happy and successful life.

The same is true for our alumnus members. When alumni return for homecoming, Founders Day or a reunion, or attend a fellow brother's wedding and even a brother's funeral, they quickly reunite, not only reminiscing about the good old days, but also bringing each other up to

date on their professional challenges and rewards, and their health and family. Where else could that happen in such a brotherly way?

- Q. Your family obviously means a lot to you. What role did they play in your success?
- A. Behind every good man there is a loving spouse, and that could not be truer in my case. My wife Paige has not only been supportive, but she became very active in my career, attending all of our conventions and

many other Fraternity events. She went out of her way to make both our volunteers and staff, and their spouses, feel comfortable in every setting. She often made it a point to sit with student members at luncheons and banquets to hear what they were thinking. Paige has been a true confidant, helping me decide very critical matters, and a real supporter of both me and the Fraternity. In two words, she is a "class act" which has been corroborated by everyone who has had the pleasure to encounter her.

Mr. SESSIONS. Madam Speaker, I am honored and privileged to recognize Raymond L. Orians in tribute to his lifelong dedication to the collegiate and interfraternal movement, as well as his 25 years of service as the Executive Vice President and Chief Executive Officer of the Pi Kappa International Fraternity, Pi Kappa Alpha is a values-based college fraternity, with more than 200 chapters, 13,000 undergraduate members, and over 235,000 lifetime members.

Mr. Orians has spent his entire professional career, which spans more than 40 years, helping to educate college undergraduates and working to advance the North American Interfraternal movement. Most notable has been his involvement with the Fraternity Executives Association, as its president in 1994-1995, and as a mentor to countless other executives and staff members throughout the collegiate world.

He was also actively involved as president of the Coalition for Freedom of Association, an action group consisting of several fraternities and sororities and other student organizations, which was successful in helping to secure federal legislation for the right of students to associate freely. This legislation became federal law and remains a source of law vital to the success of all student organizations today in their most critical area of operation, membership recruitment.

Mr. Orians has also been a strong advocate within Pi Kappa Alpha for the benefits of membership in the North American college fraternity. He has attended countless meetings as an advocate for their membership and is frequently consulted for his expertise in the field. He has also been a key point-person on the efforts to lobby

Congress to pass the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act, personally walking the halls each year and also making certain that Pi Kappa Alpha is well represented.

At Pi Kappa Alpha's 2008 International Convention, Mr. Orians announced that he would be retiring from his post as Executive Vice President & CEO, a position he has held for 25 years. Prior to that, he also served as the chief housing officer for Pi Kappa Alpha for 15 years. In tribute to his service to Pi Kappa Alpha, Mr. Orians was honored with his Fraternity's Loyalty Award in 2004 and Distinguished Achievement Award in 2008. In recognition that he is a true source of inspiration in the pursuit of excellence by undergraduate members and chapters, he will forevermore be the namesake of Pi Kappa Alpha s Chapter Excellence Award. It is awarded annually to the top 10-15% of Pi Kappa Alpha chapters.

Mr. Orians' personal and professional achievements throughout his career have been outstanding by every measurement. He presided over the establishment of 67 new Pi Kappa Alpha chapters at institutions of higher learning throughout North America which included more than 100,000 new

members being brought into its ranks. Under his leadership, a new Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters was constructed and dedicated in 1988, with a new Gold Star Memorial dedicated on August 1, 2008 recognizing those fraternity members who have made the ultimate sacrifice in military service to their country. In addition, the highly successful True Pike program, a values-based educational and leadership program, was created, and the innovative Pike University was established during his tenure, benefiting thousands of undergraduate young men each year.

Throughout his career, Mr. Orians has been a tremendous ambassador and advocate for all fraternities. Given his involvement, achievement, and tenure within the Greek movement and within Pi Kappa Alpha, it is an honor for me, as one of his Fraternity brothers and a colleague in the collegiate Greek movement, to acknowledge with gratitude the distinguished career and service of Raymond L. Orians, on this, his final day as Executive Vice President of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.

And my two grown children, Aileen and Jeff, were always at my side. I recall stating in an interview some 15 years ago that the true test of raising children is whether they are still your best friends once they fully matured. I am happy to report that they are. Both of them recently verified this with statements to the effect that they enjoy Paige's and my company and counsel often more than their own friends. What a compliment! Aileen has brought us two wonderful grandsons, Chase who is 10 and Cole who is 6. Hopefully both are future Pikes. We now have more time to spend with them in Chicago. And one of the highlights of my career was witnessing the initiation of Jeff into Pi Kappa Alpha as well as his marriage to Andrea, a fellow member of Paige's sorority, Pi Beta Phi.

Our extended family, which includes my eight younger brothers and sisters (four of whom are Pikes), and Paige's six brothers and sisters, our 14 brothers and sisters-in-law and our 34 nephews and nieces have also been very supportive. Many are still preparing for college and hopefully Greek life. A vast majority of the adults are already Greek members.

Q. What advice would you give to your successor and future Supreme Councils?

A. Under then International President Mark Anderson's leadership, the Fraternity developed its first comprehensive long-range strategic plan in the late 1990s. The plan has been revised and amended by each succeeding Supreme Council. A solid strategic plan is now in place, but it still needs constant review to meet today's and tomorrow's challenges and objectives. Staff structure will need to change and more resources will need to be developed. Growth should always be a priority, and financial stability is critical. A more tactical approach

might be in order whereby adaptation and improvement can be achieved even more timely in these quickly changing times. The opportunities are boundless and improvements can always be achieved.

One tremendous opportunity is major fund raising from our alumni. Our Foundation was not very active prior to 1980 and in fact did not have its own staff until then. Since that time, many loyal and supportive alumni have become involved as trustees and committee members of the Foundation and/or as significant contributors to the causes of the Fraternity. The Foundation now has the volunteer leaders and the staff to take it to the next level. I'm biased. but I cannot think of a more worthy organization which helps shape the lives of our current and future college student members both academically and personally. After all, these are future leaders and what better way to ensure a high standard of life, happiness and integrity for all in our brotherhood.

Q. What legacy do you believe you have left the Fraternity?

A. I hope I have left one of being a True Pike who only desired a better Fraternity than I originally joined. What makes me the proudest is when I see a student member or chapter leader become the best he can be, or when I experience a struggling chapter turn things around in a few years to become a Smythe winner. But my proudest moment is the sheer enjoyment of being associated with brothers of all ages and all walks of life who truly believe in friendship, love and truth. The Fraternity has been my life and I its humble servant, and the rewards have been more than I ever dreamed or ever will be able to repay.


Pike University: Past, Present, Future

As Pike University enters its sixth year, the University has experienced a host of changes; attendance growth, first class name recognition, an enhanced curriculum, new recognition initiatives as well as the improved quality of the event venues. But, what is next for this specialized leadership development program of Pi Kappa Alpha?

Since its beginning at the 2003 Academy, Pike University has continued to blaze a trail for personal and organizational leadership development of Pi Kappa Alpha chapters and members. This past year, Pike University once again set a new attendance record with more than 2,661 undergraduates from over 211 chapters and colonies participating in at least one event, compared to 1,719 undergraduates from 194 chapters and colonies during its inaugural year. The 2008-09 event attendance reflects a 14.21% increase over the 2007-08 event attendance. The impact of the level of involvement is apparent, as over the past three years, the number of near excellence chapters has increased from 36% to over 45% this year.* The True Pike Challenge, June 20, 2009, marks the close of another Pike University year!

One year ago, Pike University introduced the principles of Servant Leadership (a concept coined by Robert K. Greenleaf) as its foundation for

leadership education. This approach to leadership development has been well received by both Fraternity members, as well as outside observers of the University. Sean Cody (Rose-Hulman, Iota Delta '07) explains the impact of the leadership model:

in brothers, but they instill a higher degree of brotherhood in our chapters..."

The simple, yet thought provoking principles of Servant Leadership teach that the process of Leadership is earned when a leader gains Authority as a result of experiencing Service and Sacrifice, displays Love (as a verb) and ultimately having the WILL to act producing results. In The Servant, James C. Hunter eloquently describes how this leadership philosophy is impactful for not only an individual's personal growth, but for an organization's growth as well.

Pike University's other notable accomplishments this past year include a new record attendance of 459 undergraduates at the Chapter Executives Conference as well as over \$100,000 awarded in undergraduate scholarships to subsidize the cost



n Saturday April 4, 2009, 45 men were initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity with the help of initiation teams from Iota Psi Chapter (Appalachian State), Epsilon Mu Chapter (East Carolina), and Delta Omega Chapter (High Point). This ceremony took place in the newly renovated university Alumni House. Following the initiations, International President Pat Talley (Armstrong Atlantic State, Eta Mu '74) installed the newest chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha: Lambda Rho Chapter at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro (UNCG). 
As a colony, the men made their presence

Their biggest accomplishment at that point was winning Greek Week in their first year of competition, winning over a fraternity that was riding an almost 20-year winning streak.

These accomplishments are just mere blips on the radar. The Lambda Rho Pikes have continued to set new goals for themselves and continue to work hard to excel in every facet of being True Pikes. Some main goals are to become number one in GPA, and to be the number one fraternity in athletics.

Lambda Rho's largest goal is to become the first 100 man chapter in university history. At UNCG the Greek community is not as dominant as it is on other campuses, but the Pikes aim to change that. Greeks make up 4% of UNCG's population. Not including Pike there is an average of 20 members in each of the other six IFC fraternities. Other fraternities struggle due to the large ratio of male to female students, 30 percent to 70 percent respectively. UNCG was founded in 1891 as an all women's





college and has only been co-educational for roughly 45 years. However, the men of Lambda Rho plan to seek out every single person in that 30 percent of the University's population to find "the most best men". They have set their sights on becoming the UNCG's 2009 Chapter of the Year, as well as becoming a Smythe Award winning chapter within two years of chartering. The men of the Lambda Rho Chapter are extremely passionate, energetic, and enthusiastic to strive for excellence. The Fraternity can expect big things to come from the young men of Lambda Rho Chapter now and in years to come.

arkness enveloped her. Where was she? When Jessica came to, she could barely make out the ceiling of a room above her. By now it must be sunset she thought as she saw the last rays of dim sunlight cascade across the rafters above her. Within minutes it was completely dark, and she was alone sitting on a pile of coal with four cold metal walls holding her captive.

The Mark Twain Society, a literary organization at Southeast Missouri State, had a tough decision to make. It was 1957 and the fate of their organization was in the balance. Should they do what many organizations such as theirs had done and convert to a Greek fraternity? One can almost imagine debates going well into the night as the brothers weighed their choices. Ultimately, the men decided to convert to a fraternity, and chose to seek membership in Pi Kappa Alpha. Soon after, on May 3, 1958 the International Fraternity chartered the Epsilon Iota Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha. To this day, in honor of the Mark Twain Society, each pledge class can be seen carrying a cane across campus.

Traditionally, Greek housing at Southeast has always been on-campus. and University owned. Despite that fact, Epsilon Iota Chapter had been looking for a place of its own since its chartering. After a 15 year search for an off-campus building to host its various social functions, chapter meetings, and initiations, they found their prize. In the fall of '73 the Epsilon Iota housing corporation purchased the Marquette School house on South Sprigg Street, which would soon be known as the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Lodge.

Is this Jessica?

The Lodge was originally built in the early 1900's to serve as a school house for families in the area. It was a large two-story building, that served as a place of learning for children until they were old enough to begin working the nearby fields themselves.

Undoubtedly there are many former students of the school house who look back on their experience there fondly. Perhaps they played kick the can, or tag in the school yard. For others it provided a way to escape a lifetime of toil through a good education. While there were no doubt many students who prospered at Marquette, tragedy befell one little girl whose life came to an untimely end.

Little Jessica was a young student at Marquette, close to eight years old. One Friday afternoon Jessica was late getting home from school. What started as concern quickly turned to despair when minutes turned into hours. Her parents were quick to notify others in their community, and soon a search was started for Jessica in the surrounding areas. Just across the road from the school house is a busy railway, and no more than a quarter mile past the train tracks is the Mississippi River. It was thought that maybe Jessica was kidnapped by somebody riding the trains or possibly got lost in the wetlands surrounding the river. All through the weekend Jessica's parents and friends looked for her, but she couldn't be found anywhere.

The next Monday morning the principal of Marquette school arrived to start the week. Doubtless as he entered the school house Jessica's disappearance must have been weighing on his mind. When he opened his office door, situated toward the back of the top floor in the school house, in what is today known as the "Pikes Only" room, he noticed a hole in the floor near the corner of his desk. His office was directly over the boiler room and coal furnace that provided heat to the school. As he was examining the hole the principal could just barely make out a small shape deep down in the coal chute. In a rush the principal and other staff ran down to the basement boiler room. With axes and shovels they began to tear apart the coal chute that fed the boiler. After breaking through they found the body of Little Jessica still holding her jump rope and covered in soot.

It was determined that she must have fallen through the floor boards Friday afternoon while all the other children were outside playing at the end of the day. They found scrape marks all along the inside of the coal chute and Jessica's fingers were all torn up. They also discovered that her lungs were full of soot leading them to believe that she was alive for quite some time after she fell into the chute. Maybe she initially knocked herself out and that was why the staff and other children didn't hear her screaming.

Eventually the Marquette school house closed down and the haunted building sat empty for decades. The Pi Kappa Alpha chapter at Southeast Missouri State University has owned the old school house for the last 36 years. The chapter has made many renovations to


A Special Night for Father and Son



several alumni already, they anticipate the colony to have strong support from this great group of gentlemen. The men are committed to community service and have set a minimum of 10 hours per semester, per man. They are already seeing double that figure out of many of the men in the short time they have been back on campus. They are taking this opportunity to let the campus officials and community leaders see their commitment as they work on campus projects as well as projects around the San Marcos area. The colony encourages members to be involved in campus organizations in addition to the Pike colony, and they are currently represented in over forty different clubs and organizations.

colony has an impressive reputation on campus as the members boast a strong GPA with 24 brothers at 3.5+ and nine men achieving a 4.0. The men represent over 50 recognized student organizations on campus, and they are active in the SGA and have members serving as athletic department interns. The colony has a weekly referral-based recruitment process, plus events such as the Pike dodgeball tournament, Pikeathlon and twelve regionalized summer rush events at major league baseball games provide them with an opportunity to meet potential colony members. Athletically, the colony has a total of 17 club sport athletes, including golf, baseball, lacrosse, rugby, water polo and three past Division 1 NCAA athletes in tennis and swimming. In November, the group ventured out to a popular mountain pass about 10 miles east of Tucson at an elevation of 4,300 feet for a campout. Temperatures dipped below 38 degrees, so a large bonfire was constructed. Pike chants could be heard echoing off the mountain side as some settled in front of the fire and others ventured out to explore. The campsite was left spotless and the memories created were priceless. Other brotherhood events have included a Catalina mountains hiking trip, poolside barbecues and a Phoenix Suns game as well as baseball spring training games. To enhance colony membership communication and events attendance, the colony leaders have launched a virtual chapter house online. This daily tool allows member chat forums, recruitment information, community service hours tracking, a master roster and an event calendar. The men participated in over 3,000 hours of community service, including the annual UA CatWalk, providing the most volunteers of any fraternity for the event. The colony funded several entrants into the 5K, and many other brothers paid for their own entries. The Pike colony hosted dozens of Little Brothers and Little Sisters for pizza and games on the UA football practice fields prior to a home football game, raising hundreds of dollars for BBBS. More than twenty brothers participated in the Eller College philanthropy providing manpower for improvement projects throughout Tucson. At the January goal-setting retreat, the colony voted to support Juvenile Diabetes and the Relay for Life event as its official 2009 philanthropic charities. The colony created teams for every intramural sport offered on campus and won second place in basketball and volleyball.

the old school house, but the boiler room has remained much the same as it was that fateful Friday. The old boiler has been replaced with a central HVAC system but you can still see the hole in the old coal chute where they had to pull Jessica out.

Through the years there have been numerous sightings of Jessica and mysterious events that can't be explained. Eyewitness accounts and various legends can be found online and report that neighbors have seen the spirit of a little girl through the windows playing jump rope inside or just standing at the front windows watching when a train passes on the nearby tracks. Another story tells of a young neighbor boy who came over when the brothers were having a meeting asking if it was okay for him to be in there when they were all gone. When the brothers of the Lodge told him no and that it was too dangerous, the boy told them he came over many times in the past to play with the little girl there.

Other accounts include strange noises, the lights swaying excessively on their own, open windows slamming shut or shaking, strange sounds, the sound of running feet, the unexplainable malfunctioning of electrical equipment and laughs emanating from where the boilers once were.

I was the Lodge Lord in 1995-96 and was in charge of maintenance and clean up of the facility. I personally never saw an actual ghost at the Lodge, but I have had a few experiences that I just couldn't explain. Throughout the many times that I was in the building by myself, I always had the feeling that somebody was watching me: you know that feeling you get when somebody walks up right behind you, when the hairs on the back of your neck stand up. I also heard what sounded like someone running or skipping upstairs, when I know there was nobody else in the building. Several brothers I know have had strange experiences with ouija boards at the Lodge. The people that I know that have said they have seen Jessica usually see her while they are in very small groups of two to four brothers. Many believe this is because she was a very shy girl which might have been why she was inside that terrible Friday afternoon when the rest of the children were playing outside.





Since 1990 about 82,000 wildlife strikes have been reported to the Federal Aviation Administration, and DeVault said the number of strikes grows steadily each year. In 1997, 3,458 strikes were reported while in 2007 that number had risen to 7,666. To combat the problem, Devault said airports must use an integrated approach with habitat modification such as fencing or maintaining a consistent grass height as well as using noisemakers and other scare devices. In Ohio, DeVault along with other research biologists and field technicians try to develop methods to reduce strikes. The work includes testing turf grasses to see which ones are preferred by wildlife, studying storm water management techniques that could reduce use by waterfowl and other wildlife, using satellite technology to study the movement of large birds and finding ways to prevent earthworms from moving onto runways where gulls settle to snack. DeVault noted that every airport and every region has a unique set of problems. One wildlife management plan doesn't work for every airport, so different methods must be developed to work in individual situations.

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT

The Many-Dimensional Man

John Brooks Walton (Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '52) celebrated his 80th birthday in April 2009, but he still has creative projects in the works, just as he has since earning his degree in architecture in 1953 from Oklahoma A&M College (now Oklahoma State University). He well remembers those days of pulling all-nighters to complete designs and battling through tough engineering courses.

He is an accomplished architect, but John also is a writer, historian, and talented artist. Along the way, John and his wife, Mag (the former Margaret Stanley of Tulsa), have raised four daughters (Ann, Jane, Sue, and Jean) and two sons (Brooks and Stan). They have seven grandchildren.

Raised in Ponca City – a community he loves and that figures heavily in his books —John worked in Shawnee the year after graduation. Moving to Tulsa in 1954, he completed his apprenticeships, including a year with the noted architect John Duncan Forsyth.

Walton worked a few years as a partner in a local firm and then opened his own office in 1965. He has had a solo practice since then.

Examples of Walton's fine work are featured in, "The Architecture of John Brooks Walton," published last year. Among them are the Stable House in Muskogee, designed for Charles Faudree, Tulsa's nationally-recognized interior designer, as well as the Beckman House in that city. In Tulsa, the Charles Thornton house on East 26th Street is impressive, featuring the Country French style, as is the Dickman house on South Quebec.

Also included is a small house in the 3500 block on South Urbana, the only Walton-designed home in which his family lived.

Columbariums that were designed for Trinity Episcopal Church and St. John Episcopal Church are shown in the book, along with the clock tower at Southern Hill Country Club, which was the logo for the 2007 PGA Championship.

Home restorations and remodeling have been specialties. His office at 1717 S. Baltimore was moved there from 107 E. 11th St. It was once the manager's cottage for the Manhattan Court Apartments, built in 1913.

In 1978, John and Mag purchased the W.G. Skelly Mansion, a Tulsa landmark at 2101 S. Madison. They restored the historic home and lived there until 1995. Two of their children had already left the nest, but the remaining four and a parade of girls from Mexico helped fill the house (the youngsters from Mexico came for one-year stays to attend Monte Casino).

The Skelly Mansion, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, was often opened for meetings, social events, and tours.

Walton wrote and published his first book, "100 Historic Tulsa Homes," in 1999; it evolved from a series of articles in Tulsa People magazine. He followed this with "100 More Historic Tulsa Homes," and "Many More Tulsa Historic Homes."

John also wrote books about noted architects John Stevens Dilbeck, who was raised in Tulsa, and John Duncan Forsyth, who is well known in both Tulsa and Ponca City.

Since he was from that part of the state, it was logical that Walton would write, "The Historic Homes of Ponca City and Kay County," and "More Historic Homes of Ponca City and Kay County." Kathy Adams was a co-author on these books.

A grant from the Oklahoma
Centennial Commission helped make
possible the fascinating book, "The
Artwork of Tulsa," published during the
2007 celebration of our state's 100th
anniversary. John's favorite in the book
is a ten-foot-tall version of Robert
Alexander Weinman's "Morning Mission,"
located on a mall at the arrival terminal
of Tulsa International Airport. The book
features many examples of art that
Tulsans will recognize.





John Brooks Walton and Rusty

Walton began creating terra cotta (clay) busts in 2003 and took up acrylic painting at the encouragement of his teacher, Ruth Armstrong. His only previous art instruction had been courses in water colors during college. His busts and impressionistic landscapes are remarkable, and they have been exhibited at the Tulsa Performing Arts Center. One of his paintings of scallions is available on aprons, tote bags, and coffee mugs.

Throughout their life, Mag and John have traveled extensively, visiting England and most of the countries in Europe, plus Japan, China and Thailand.

John plans to keep on working. Keeping him company in his office is his miniature poodle, Rusty, who was a Christmas present. He, too, thinks that John is very special, even though he knows nothing about architecture, writing, or art. He's content to sit in his master's lap whenever possible.



News of **BYGONE DAYS**

125 YEARS AGO 1884

During this early time in the Fraternity, the development of the ideals was the slow emergence of unwritten standards for life. The Founders themselves led exemplary lives in college. During this time period, few members were expelled for bad conduct; inattention to meetings was the cause in a few cases.

100 YEARS AGO 1909

In Beta's chapter letter in the Shield & Diamond, the Davidson College chapter wrote: "The session of 1908-09 is fast drawing to a close. At present we are in the midst of examinations, and all the worries and trouble attendant upon them. But commencement, with its long list of pleasurable events will soon be upon us. Though the thought of home is a very welcome one to us still it is with a feeling of profound regret that we think of leaving our circle of brothers and friends here at old Davidson College, some of us for the last time."

75 YEARS AGO 1934

Omega Delta (local fraternity) became Gamma Sigma Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha at the University of Pittsburgh on Saturday afternoon, March 3, 1934. It became the seventy-seventh chapter on the active roll and it takes its place with Alpha Delta, Beta Alpha and Beta Sigma in the third district under the watchful eye of District President John L. Packer. The charter was granted on March 1, the sixty-sixth anniversary date of ΠKA's founding and shortly before the tenth anniversary of the founding of Omega Delta itself.

50 YEARS AGO 1959

From the Shield & Diamond: "Over the past fifteen years, in the lives of thousands of young and older men in every corner of our country, Robert D. Lynn has provided new meaning for the words 'Pi Kappa Alpha'. His name in the fraternity world is synonymous with capable administration, sound judgement, understanding, and the embodiment of the ideals of fraternalism. He has been around Pi Kappa Alpha for such a long time that many seemed to regard him as a part of the permanent structure of the fraternity: for when they have thought of the fraternity, they have thought of him. It was, therefore, with something of shock and a deep feeling of regret that the members of the fraternity recently received the announcement that Robert D. Lynn has resigned as its Executive Director, effective September 1, 1959, to assume a new position as President of Hutchinson's School for Girls in Memphis, Tennessee."

25 YEARS AGO 1984

From the Shield & Diamond: The 1984 Distinguished Achievement Award recipient, Dr. Jim van Hoften (Berkeley, Alpha Sigma '63) had an occupation that no other member of the Fraternity had previously held, and probably reached greater heights than any other member. In fact when this magazine first appeared in 1890, and for many decades to follow, Jim's occupation was one that you only read about in a science fiction novel. Jim is an astronaut, and for six days in April 1984 he was a member aboard the space shuttle Challenger.

William J. Furlick (Carnegie Mellon, Beta Sigma '41)

Test pilot, engineer, aerial photographer and World War II vet, William J. Furlick entered Chapter Eternal on January 6, 2009. He was a test pilot and aeronautical engineer at Curtiss-Wright in Fairfield, New Jersey for many years. Upon retiring, he worked as a freelance aerial photographer. Furlick served in the Army Air Force as a captain during World War II and graduated from Carnegie Mellon in Pennsylvania and Stevens Institute of Technology in New Jersey. He greatly valued his friends and relationships, was a lover of animals and was interested in all things of a scientific nature. He was the beloved husband of Eileen, and devoted father of Kathleen M. Furlick.

Howard B. Hurt (Tennessee, Zeta '42)

Howard B. "Doc" Hurt entered Chapter Eternal on January 29, 2009. He was originally initiated at Theta Chapter at Southwestern College (now Rhodes College), and his college career was interrupted by his draft into the US Army in 1943.


As reported in the Knoxville Sentinel in June 2003, on the morning of December 16, 1944, the 106th Infantry Division had relieved the 2nd Infantry Division at the Siegfried Line, and it was stretched thinly across 27 miles of the front along the the Belgium-German border. Hurt was a messenger assigned to deliver communications from regimental headquarters to units on the line. Watching a nearby valley, he saw the guns of the German 5th SS Panzer Division moved toward his outfit's position. Hurt and his jeep driver raced back to his unit to deliver the news. This was the beginning of the Battle of the Bulge. In a couple of days of intense fighting, thirty divisions of German troops broke through the American lines, and Hurt and 7,000 other members of the 106th were captured. Hurt was first taken to Stalag 9B, a prisoner of war camp northwest of Frankfort, Germany. In February 1945, he was sent to Berga in

eastern Germany, a satellite of the notorious Buchenwald concentration camp. Hurt was injured when he tried to help a Jewish prisoner, and a Gestapo guard fractured his skull with an axe handle. In the hospital, he came under a German civilian doctor's care, who got Hurt and twelve other seriously ill GIs transferred to Obermansfeld, where they were treated by British doctors who had volunteered to enter Germany to care for Allied wounded, Later, a train took the prisoners to a British hospital near Meiningen, Germany. On April 7, the U.S. 11th Armored Division liberated Hurt and the others and sent them to Paris. He arrived in New York on V-E Day, May 8, 1945.

After the war he returned to Southwestern and obtained his Ph.D. in clinical psychology from the University of Tennessee in 1951. He led the clinical psychology program at Oak Ridge National Laboratory until he retired in 1979. Brother Hurt served as head of the Zeta housing corporation for several years, and requested that his ashes be spread on Rocky Top in the Smokies. He is survived by his nephew, Richard Hurt; niece, Anna Hurt; great nephew, William Hurt; extended family and close friends.

Leo P. Rock, Jr. (Florida, Alpha Eta '56)

Alpha Eta and Pi Kappa Alpha lost a giant on March 8, 2009, as Brother Leo P. Rock, Jr. joined Chapter Eternal after a long battle with cancer. Born in Baltimore, Maryland, Leo's family moved to Melbourne.



Leo was a gregarious and outgoing PiKA, earning the honor of "King Ugly" in 1957 for raising the most money in a campus-wide charity event - friends and family alike were led by Leo over the years to see that trophy in the Pike House. Leo served in ROTC and held many campus leadership positions, including chapter president of Alpha Eta Chapter. After graduation, Leo attended law school at the University of Florida, and there helped to recruit more law students to Pi Kappa Alpha.

Leo practiced labor law in Orlando throughout a long and successful career, retiring as a partner from the Gray Robinson firm in 2002. At the services attended by hundreds of family members, friends and fraternity brothers at the Saint James Catholic Cathedral in Orlando, chairman of the law firm and fraternity brother Charlie Gray (Alpha Eta '51) recalled Leo's length of service to the community, the legal profession and our Fraternity, noting that Leo carried Pi Kappa Alpha through some rough times and some good times. Through thick and thin, Leo was always there.

At the Pike House at 1904 West University Avenue in Gainesville, many legendary stories from the late 50's involved brother Leo. Throughout the decades that followed, Leo could be counted on to attend Homecoming each year, to meet the new pledge classes and renew friendships with actives and alumni. Leo served Alpha Eta as House Corporation President from 1980 through 1991, and during that time put the Fraternity on solid financial ground. Leo led a successful \$140,000 fundraising campaign for house renovations and endowed scholarships before turning over the reins to C. Richard Nail (Alpha Eta '66). Although retired from the House Corporation shortly thereafter, Leo could still be counted on for insight, guidance and financial support. In honor of his service, the library and museum in the chapter house bear his name.

Most of all, Leo was a brother and friend, a mentor and leader, and a principled man who helped countless Pikes make the transition to adulthood. With a booming voice and his no nonsense, honest approach to the world. Leo was a person whom one could count on. Summed up by current Alpha Eta House Corporation President Ernie Cox (Alpha Eta '81), "Leo was one of the most influential people in my life. His counsel has served me well, in college, in law school and outside those wicket gates, as I have grown older and hopefully wiser. I speak for all Alpha Eta's when I say that am glad to have known Leo Rock and will always cherish the time we had together."

every game his freshman season. He was described as an outstanding student and strong player who put the team first. A candlelight vigil for Bryce was held on Tuesday, March 17, on the Attallah Piazza at Chapman University, where students, faculty, and staff joined Bryce's Fraternity brothers, teammates, and friends to share their memories of him.

Thomas R. Wilson Jr. (Memphis, Delta Zeta '49)

The Reverend Dr. Thomas "Tom" R. Wilson, Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on March 3, 2009, after continued on page 46

a two year battle with cancer. He is survived by his wife and greatest friend, Mary Lou; his daughter, Susan; his son, Dan; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. He passed away in his own bed in his own home, surrounded by family, just like he always wanted. His education included bachelor's and master's degrees from Memphis State, a master of divinity degree from Vanderbilt, and a doctor of ministry degree from Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Missouri. He also received certification as a professional counselor. Tom served as a United Methodist minister for over 60 years. While serving as associate minister at St. Luke's UMC, he was assigned to found Grace UMC under the church's sponsorship, and then later also served at Mullins and Piperton in Tennessee. His most challenging call was First United Methodist Church, where he served for 18 years and was honored with the title of pastor emeritus. He introduced the hospice concept into the Memphis area, and later served as president of the first board of hospice of Memphis. He also started the Final Net Organization (now called FirstWorks), which has fed, clothed, counseled, and tutored thousands of homeless adults and children. He was recognized for his efforts with countless awards, but his family especially remembers the Memphis Key to the City Award, and also a similar award from Shelby County, both of which he received in 1995. While at Memphis State University (now the University of Memphis), he was president of Delta Zeta Chapter. He wore his Pi Kappa Alpha ring for his entire life, having made some lifelong friends

Plaque at Southern Methodist University Dedicated in Honor of Gold Star Pike

On November 9, 2008, a plaque was dedicated at Southern Methodist University in honor of Lt. Col.Eric J. Kruger, a 1985 initiate of Beta Zeta Chapter. He entered Chapter Eternal on November 2, 2006 in Iraq, while in service to the United States of America. Below are excerpts of the address given by Lawrence Kruger, Eric's father, at the dedication.

We are invited here today by SMU to pay homage to my son, Lieutenant Colonel Eric John Kruger, United States Army. I feel it is very fitting and relevant that we have this ceremony during this homecoming year

which marks the 20th anniversary of his graduation and his entry into the Army as a commissioned officer.

The point of today's ceremony is not to mourn for Eric but instead to welcome home his spirit to this campus that he loved so much; for while his final resting place is in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia, his spirit belongs here at SMU.

Twenty years ago I was a very proud father watching Eric take the oath of office as a commissioned officer in the United States Army. And as they pinned his gold second lieutenant bars on his shoulder my mind wandered back to the previous four years that bought us to that point.

Immediately, I thought of the old Pike house and Thelma the house mother, who would always say, when I came to visit the house, "Oh, these boys, oh,

these boys, what am I ever going to do with them? I used to call them the "Pranksterous Pikes" because they were always involved in something.


I always thought of SMU in those days as a training ground of Davids that were being molded to go out and slay the Goliaths of the world. And it is that spirit that was indelibly imprinted on Eric when he came here. He had a wonderful spirit when he arrived here, but SMU poured gasoline on that fire.

It wasn't long after Eric left for the army that his favorite expression became "hooah"! Hooah is a U.S. Army battle cry, used by U.S. Army soldiers "referring to or meaning anything and everything except no." It comes from an acronym of the letters H, U, and A standing for heard, understood and acknowledged. For example, when a superior gives an order or asks a question of a subordinate, a proper response would be an enthusiastic "hooah". This term exemplifies the spirit of Eric. The spirit of perseverance, diligence, honoring one's duty and finishing the job no matter how difficult the obstacles.

An area in the Gold Star Heroes
Museum at the Pi Kappa Alpha
International Headquarters in Memphis
has been offered for the display of Eric's
numerous awards and decorations, and
a permanent endowment, to be awarded
through the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational
Foundation to the Beta Zeta Chapter
at SMU for leadership training is under
discussion. At Fort Hood, Texas, Eric's
name appears prominently on the wall
of honor at the War on Terror Monument
in Patton Park. And on Veterans Day, his
name is being carved into the College
Station, Texas Veterans Memorial.

In Baghdad, Iraq there is a helicopter landing zone called "HLZ Kruger" in Eric's honor and every time a flight takes off or lands at this area his name is called out with pride.

Eric's memorials are not only of this earth. In the heavens, a place of honor has been set aside for him and the soldiers of the 2d Infantry Division. In the bow of the constellation Orion, a star which is the third star from Belatrix has

been named "Eric's Brigade".

Eric's sister Kristy, upon learning of his death, made a vow to conduct a memorial concert in every state in the union. Along with that pledge she donates 20% of the proceeds to the Fisher House in Eric's honor. The Fisher House is a charitable organization similar to Ronald McDonald House, except it provides shelter for family members of wounded soldiers. When a wounded soldier returns home the government does not pay for any of the transportation or housing costs for the immediate family members to visit that soldier at his or her greatest time of need.

Eric was always worried about the welfare of his soldiers. During the holidays, I would call and ask if he was coming home and he would reply, "No Dad, I volunteered for duty officer so the men could go home and be with their families."

Then, I would ask if he needed anything and he would reply, "For me nothing, but if you could send up a care package for the troops, they would greatly appreciate it." As a result of Kristy's concert efforts, the Cain Foundation in Austin, Texas has generously donated \$25,000.00 to the Fisher House in Dallas in honor of Eric. At the opening, Secretary of Veterans Affairs James B. Peake said something that really touched me to the quick. I guess in this day of quick fixes and positive attitudes we all assume that our wounded come home, get fixed up and then move on with their lives. But I was told there by Mr. Peake there are some who come home only to spend their lasts days on this earth in the hospital. And I thought what more fitting way is there for us to honor the memory of Eric than to help the family members of our wounded heroes so that they can be near them when they need it most. Therefore, our family has chosen to support the Fisher House here in Dallas as our way of keeping Eric's spirit actively alive.
