I was speaking recently with the CEO of one of North America's largest health systems. This CEO is a prominent leader in my community and is widely regarded as the kind of person who makes you want to work hard for him. He has an uncommon ability to inspire by example, by humble service, in a way that drives people to perform better. True leadership.

Our conversation started with the usual pleasantries, and then moved to more serious topics: healthcare, technology and the changing economics of healthcare. Totally expected interaction. Then I took a left turn and talked about my Fraternity. Now, I had a goal in mind. Knowing his leadership style, I asked if he'd be willing to speak at an upcoming Pike University event. I mentioned that business leaders Kevin Turner, COO of Microsoft, Neal Patterson, Chairman of Cerner and Jeff Taylor, founder of Monster.com have all participated in the past.

I suggested to him that our Fraternity would benefit from hearing first-hand the story of a servant leader. Without hesitation, he accepted the invitation. Easiest sale I've made in some time. He went on to say that he's not a member of a fraternity, so I had the opportunity to talk more about Pi Kappa Alpha, about what we believe. I talked about the things we teach at Pike University and the idea that we are so much more than bricks and mortar, or simply an undergraduate social experience. It was an easy enough conversation, but there was a shared understanding that what we are doing as a fraternity is important. Best recruitment conversation I've had since college.

Every interaction we have is an opportunity to represent Pi Kappa Alpha and we have an amazing story to tell. For nearly 150 years, Pi Kappa Alpha has organized itself around the principle that truth is the foundation of any lasting association, and in seeking the inherent value in every person. Our Fraternity has witnessed the turn of two centuries, economic crises and booms, world wars and an evershifting political landscape, and our growing membership is a positive affirmation of our values and contribution to society.

We take for granted the things we believe are shared by everyone. Sure enough, many others believe as we do, but so few are organized to make a difference. We are organized to make a difference and we should be proud of our heritage and the things we've accomplished.

But we're not finished. Any organization, if it is to achieve its aim, must have a clear description of its mission and a plan to achieve. PIKE's Regions Realigned; **New Regional Presidents Appointed**

In early 2012, the Supreme Council commissioned a task force consisting of regional presidents, local volunteers and Fraternity staff to address the support to the Fraternity's larger regions. The task force's recommendations to the Supreme Council included the option to split larger regions into new regions, increasing chapter and volunteer support.

The following changes are effective as of October 1, 2012.

DIXIE REGION SPLIT INTO MAGNOLIA AND DIXIE REGIONS

The Supreme Council of the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity is proud to announce the reorganization of the Dixie region into two new regions and the appointment of a new regional president, effective October 1, 2012.

The former Dixie Region encompassed the states of Alabama and Georgia. Over the past decade, this region had grown to include seventeen chapters. Due to this size, the Supreme Council has decided to split the region along state lines, forming two new regions: the Dixie Region, covering the state of Alabama and the Magnolia Region, representing the state of Georgia.

As a result of this realignment, the Supreme Council has appointed Marc Grunden (Winthrop, Theta Sigma '90) as Magnolia regional president and Brandon Barnhill (Montevallo, Theta Beta '93) will continue to serve as Dixie regional president.

Leadership in 1999. Waltz received a degree in business from Southeast Missouri State with majors in marketing and accounting.



Cince the Kappa Pi Chapter house Owas purchased in 2002, alumni and undergraduates have spent countless hours making the house a top tier facility on the University of South Dakota campus. The house is located on the southeast corner of campus, one of the closest properties to the main buildings at the University. Over the last two years the chapter modified existing square footage to create a multi-purpose chapter room, a workout room, and a study lounge. In the chapter room they included a secure closet for Ritual regalia. The study room provides an atmosphere conducive to studying and includes a computer and printer. Also, the entire house now has wireless access to the internet. The workout room is a convenient way for members to exercise without leaving the house, and has persuaded many of them to participate in intramurals and athletics. The landscape around the house was also leveled and new sod was laid along with new sidewalks, creating safer walkways

and an improved appearance to the outside of the property. Along with all of these improvements, they also added a 42" LCD TV and Wii with Netflix to their living room. This

provides a gathering place for all members to watch their favorite shows and view recordings of events such as their annual philanthropic sketch-comedy show called "Thursday Night Live".

One thing that distinguishes Kappa Pi from the other fraternities on campus is the fact that they are a strictly enforced dry house; no alcohol is permitted on the premises. The chapter says this decision was made to reinforce the principles of "Scholars, Leaders, Athletes, & Gentlemen" (SLAG) and separate their academic and leadership pursuits from the plentiful social life that college provides. They believe this has facilitated their rise in becoming the best fraternity on campus.

In addition to achieving all of the International Fraternity's recommended Operation & Condition Standards, their maintenance program is a process they call housing duties. All live-in brothers are assigned to a variety of housing duties each week. These range from addressing yard work to shower, kitchen, and bathroom maintenance. Upon completion of each housing duty, \$5.00 is awarded to the member. This is made possible by a "house duty deposit" of \$175.00 paid by each brother, which they can earn back by completing their weekly duties. These housing duties must be completed twice a week. If a brother fails to complete a housing duty, that specific job can be done by another brother, allowing another individual to earn the \$5.00 reward. This system has served the chapter very well. In fact, other houses on campus have replicated this practice.

The chapter and house corporation are to be commended for their beautiful home and are well deserving of the 2012 House of the Year.



ALPHA PHI CHAPTER (IOWA STATE UNIVERSITY)

Improvement Project of the Year

nce the rechartering of Alpha Phi in 2000, the Pi Kappa Alpha Union (House Corporation) has strived to provide competitive student housing and the most admired Greek housing experience at Iowa State. With two capital campaigns under their belt in the past decade, a shift to focusing on maintenance and regular updates has taken place. This past year, the main accomplishment was the complete renovation of the library and women's powder room, which included a new slate floor. In addition, the final phase of living quarter updates and the scheduled replacement of the commercial water heater and furnace were conducted. With the chapter eclipsing the 100 man mark, more dining room furniture was also purchased.

The chapter has a fully functioning house management program. Building reserves is a two part program; the chapter budgets money and carries it over annually in order to have funds for maintenance issues and projects addressing wear-and-tear on the house. The chapter conducts an annual work week prior to fall classes, and also participates in International Work Day every spring. The second part of this reserve program is funded by the House Corporation for larger projects such as the improvements made this past year.

The ongoing renovations and scheduled maintenance, including this year's projects, has allowed the Pike House to remain the top house on campus. These projects not only helped update the facility aesthetically, but provided important attention to the preservation of a property that is over 80 years old. Although old properties like this are beautiful, they require a lot of upkeep. The chapter and house corporation have proven they have the ability to effectively tackle these issues, giving today's student the living experience he desires.

S PI KAPPA ALPHA CHAPTERS HAVE BEGUN ANOTHER ACADEMIC year filled with raised expectations, Pikes across North America have set their sights on great achievements. The excitement of the 2012 International Convention brought new ideas and innovations for chapters to continue to impress their campus communities and pursue the goal of winning the prestigious Smythe Award. The goal of a Smythe guides chapter leaders throughout the year, and acts as a source of motivation in all chapter activities. The question is simple, and serves as an exciting inspiration for Pikes everywhere:

How are we going to contend to be a Smythe winning chapter this year?

There is no better way to answer that question than to see what fellow brothers have accomplished at their chapters. Your brothers must be inspired to achieve the highest level of excellence as a chapter. The motivation to win a Smythe is constant with the chapters that have achieved Dynasty Level. The values that we live by being True Pikes drive Smythe chapters to continue their dominance, as well as their efforts to become better each year.

Chapter excellence is measured through four different areas of performance: membership, operations, brotherhood, and leadership. The

statistics of a Smythe chapter will give you an understanding of what these chapters achieve throughout the academic year. These statistics can guide you in challenging your men to become part of one of Pi Kappa Alpha's best chapters.

We asked our Smythe chapter leaders to share some insight into how their chapters achieved top status, what the chapter's motivation is to compete at the highest level, and how they have maintained that winning edge for years.

continued their Dynasty Level dominance with their 14th consecutive Smythe. Asked how his chapter sets goals and expectations,

Chapter President Phillip Hebert '08 remarked, "Our expectations are to be the best we can be as individuals, then as Pikes, then as Pikes at ULM, then within Pi Kappa Alpha internationally. We are blessed to have won 14 Smythes in a row (19 in the last 21 years), so our expectations are to be a Smythe winner every year. We host multiple retreats during the summer and up until the beginning of the fall semester. Each committee chair meets with the members of his committee and they review last year's goals and then set goals for the coming year."

Hebert comments on the motivation of continuing to win a Smythe since the first one. He says "the feeling was one of immense pride - we had set a goal and accomplished it and the next question was can we do it again? Could we sustain the effort and intensity it takes to have won that first Smythe? And we did. We are extremely competitive and we never compete to place, we compete to be champions. Finishing second just means you're first in the losers' line. We have a lot of pride, a LOT of pride. We know what we are capable of... we want others to see what we're capable of. And finally, we have a responsibility to maintain Eta Omicron Chapter at or above the level in which [the chapter] was entrusted to us... all we have known is that we're winners."

Pike University plays an important role in helping chapters improve, but also to continue at such a high level of performance. Hebert says, "Each time a new brother attends his first Pike University event, the comments are the same: 'I never knew Pike was so much bigger than just our chapter, I never knew how many people actually knew about us winning all of those awards, and I really understand things so much better now.' Pike University allows our members to grow beyond the confines of our chapter and it amplifies our accomplishments while making us hungry for more. It allows us to share our successes, to learn from the successes of others, and to bring back different perspectives on chapter operations. Pike University allows our members to expand the definition of PIKE and that just makes us better."





Dynasty Level **Epsilon** Chapter at Virginia Tech won its 13th consecutive

Chapter President Dan Stevens '10 believes in the importance of recruitment and how that translates into a high performing chapter. "When recruited, Epsilon Pikes expect to become a part of an organization that develops men of integrity, intellect and high moral character. This expectation creates an environment of continuous individual and chapter development as we strive to improve ourselves and Epsilon Chapter. When the chapter won our 13th consecutive Smythe in Denver, that was one of the proudest moments of my life. The pride I felt was for my entire

Pike University also allows members to collaborate with other chapters. We receive many good ideas as well as criticisms that help us improve ourselves on campus."

Thomas Shihadeh '09 President Lambda Nu Chapter Boston Champion Level Second Consecutive Smythe chapter, and for every man who lived up to his own expectations, those of the chapter and those of the alumni who have come before us. The continued success of Epsilon Chapter can be summed up in one word: recruitment. Recruiting the most, best men on campus is the life-blood of our organization. Finding the Scholars, Leaders, Athletes, and Gentlemen who will accept the challenge of holding themselves to a higher standard than the typical "Greek" stereotype is a difficult task. Yet our chapter continues to face this task and get the men who go above and beyond in the classroom, on the athletic field, and in other organizations while maintaining the social reputation of our chapter on campus. The dedication to recruitment by every man in the chapter, and not just the recruitment chairman, is what maintains Epsilon's winning edge."

Stevens explains that "the motivation for Epsilon Chapter to win awards on campus and at the international level comes from the group's continuous commitment to self-improvement. The chapter strives to achieve the goals it sets not to win awards, but to develop ourselves into better men. Being recognized for our accomplishments is always humbling, but the chapter is diligent not to forget that awards aren't given to just anyone. They are earned through hard work and dedication to reaching the higher standard set by the chapter and its alumni."

Pike University participation also plays a key role in the success of Epsilon Chapter. Stevens says "Pike University has contributed greatly to Epsilon Chapter's success. We send men to any event that we can because we realize the tools it gives our brothers. Perhaps the greatest resource at Pike University is the interaction our members have with members of other chapters. These interactions not only provide an opportunity for our members to discover the deeper, common bonds that connect us internationally, but also to learn innovative ways to turn our identified weaknesses into strengths."



Delta Lambda Chapter at Florida State brought home its 11th consecutive Smythe award this year, and Chapter President Austin Cole '08 explains the goals and expectations

of the chapter. "The executive officers hold

a retreat away from the Pike house at the beginning of every semester. We don't start out with the goal of winning a Smythe. It's assumed that if we are efficient in all areas of chapter management, the hardware will come. The alumni and undergraduate brothers feel that if we don't win a Smythe, if our record of achievement won't support it, then that means something has gone wrong. Many years ago our alumni established a template for the way Delta Lambda is supposed to operate. The goals are very specific and measurable. We are supposed to always be the largest fraternity at FSU and recruit the highest quality members. We are supposed to be superior athletically, and the most familiar names and faces of campus leaders are supposed to be Pikes. The top sororities are supposed to prefer the Pikes. None of this comes without hard work. Florida State is home to 24 competing IFC fraternity chapters. Our internal management must depend on the leadership strengths of the officers in order to handle a very large chapter. Finances, new member programs, philanthropies and risk management receive serious attention. Our fraternity house, the largest in the nation under one roof, is supposed to be a clean and inviting fraternal home for more than 2,000 Delta Lambda undergraduates and supportive alumni."

Cole believes that "our motivation comes from sharing in the great tradition of our chapter, in being part of the identity that brings generations of Delta Lambda brothers together. We undergraduates are caretakers of this tradition; bringing home the Smythe Award shows that we have been good stewards. In recruitment, we look for men who are motivated to succeed, men who want to be on the winning team. And the chapter advances as the brothers are driven to achieve individually."

A key to Delta Lambda's success is the awareness of "advances in information technology and methods of interpersonal communication," which Cole says "hardly compare to the days when the blueprints for Delta Lambda's success were drawn decades ago. Those fundamental principles of fraternity competition are still relevant, but to be successful today a chapter has to be aware of how the most current issues in society impact the entire fraternity system. One of Delta Lambda's most valuable and beneficial experiences is attending Pike University with our officers and alumnus advisors. The International Fraternity provides experts in all

relevant areas pertaining to how fraternities interact with university administrations and society at large. We are also exposed to dynamic instruction in every key area of chapter management."



Lambda Zeta Chapter at Drexel continued their impressive run as a high performing and young chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha by winning

their ninth consecutive Smythe. External Vice President Richard Cohen '10 explains the importance of setting goals and expectations as a Dynasty Level Smythe chapter. "When we come together as a brotherhood during our annual goal setting chapter retreat, we come together with the mindset of "how can we improve upon the previous year?" To put the goals from pen to paper, we look at the facts - where we've been, where we are, and where we want to be. By doing this, we are able to raise the bar in realistic increments year after year. Coming up with the goals is the easy part, it's coming up with the action plan to make sure those goals are not only reached but surpassed that's the hard part. We proudly display our lofty goals on a framed poster in our chapter room where everyone sees it every day. Having just celebrated our tenth year on Drexel University's campus, while at the same time bringing home our ninth consecutive Smythe, we understand the meaning behind 'work hard, play hard'. At the end of the day, we're not thinking about what we need to do to bring home the hardware, we're thinking about making a legacy that every Pike can be proud of, and everyone else can envy."

Maintaining a winning edge can be explained by the phrase "the most, best men", which Cohen says "really speaks to Lambda Zeta Chapter, and every recruitment season we look for exactly that. Each year we look to initiate a new member class that is better than the last, and by doing so we ensure that our impact on each other and the community is always improving. Our guys are hungry. There's a reason why we are all Pikes, it's because we're the best. Yes, it is a constant uphill battle, and the second you sit down to take a little break, you're giving another chapter the chance to take your spot at the top. Our chapter learned that the hard way and now that hunger, that desire, that want is more than it has ever been. Scholars, Leaders, Athletes, and Gentlemen

have been climbing the ladder of Greek Life across the map since 1868, and we love the feeling of being a part of that."

Cohen says that the motivation to win awards is summed up by one word: improvement. "We constantly strive to improve ourselves. This creates an environment that is not focused on winning awards; instead we focus on the future and what we can do to make that future better for ourselves and others. By doing this, we don't get lost in the semantics of the award rubrics and requirements. Don't misunderstand this by thinking we don't look at them, of course we do! We just view them as guidelines for the improvement we are so fiercely working towards."

On the international level, "there's no question, Pike U is intrinsic to this international brotherhood. The educational programming offered teaches us so much more than how to be the best we can be; they teach us how to be the best we can be by living as True Pikes. Lessons taught at Pike University are so fundamental in nature that we tend not to think about them every day, but they're always in the back of our minds. By breaking things down into the simplest form, we are able to understand more effectively how to accomplish the most complicated of tasks. My personal key take away from every event I have attended isn't something you can learn in a break out session, it's not something you can take home in the binder, it's witnessing hundreds of my brothers, living the ritual, living phi phi kappa alpha, and knowing I'm a part of something awe inspiring."

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"Our chapter emphasizes examining the culture of Lehigh University to see where we can differentiate ourselves. In a single rush period we had a 30 man rush class (the highest the school has seen in recent years) and contributed to over 40% of Greek life's community service. These successes came from utilizing recruitment tactics taught to us at Pike University and actively looking for community service opportunities. Our brothers understand that this level of achievement takes the effort of every member of the chapter and we still have a long way to the top."

"Succeeding to plan is, in essence, planning to succeed. Without the retreats and transitions we hold, our chapter would not have achieved its current status as a consecutive Smythe winner. Each successive leader has made it his goal to take the chapter one step further, while keeping an eye on the prize. Each past leader has made it his goal to mentor the newly elected officers and committee chairmen, understanding that their success depends on the success of the next man up. It is this mentality of never surrendering to complacency that gives our chapter a winning edge on campus."

Charles Eisner '10 President Gamma Delta Chapter Arizona Champion Level Second Consecutive Smythe Sneed explains, "the motivation comes from the drive of each individual member. Alpha Kappa knows that it is crucial to recruit young men who embody Pike values. From this initial inspiration, Alpha Kappa utilizes an excellent organizational system to tap into each member's potential and then help them develop into the True Pike. The chapter believes that by pursuing and winning these awards we ourselves become closer as brothers and better ourselves."

"Pike University has served as a critical resource for our brothers in their personal and professional development. It provides the framework upon which brothers can learn and develop amidst themselves. The informational sessions allow brothers to absorb the Pike brand and further realize how to tap into their potential. Pike University strengthens the bond between different chapters by fostering an environment of networking and brotherhood."



Another Dynasty Level chapter, **Beta Eta Chapter at Illinois**, received its eighth consecutive Smythe Award. Chapter President Michael Cunningham '11 remarks, "one of the

most important resources that the chapter uses when setting goals and expectations for winning another Smythe are the past members of the executive board. We strive to mentor and improve each other as individuals, and also as a collective group. Dedication, participation, and contribution to the Chapter by its members are minimal expectations. With recently winning our eighth consecutive Smythe, every year we focus on additional areas of improvement, however small or large they may be, in order to continue the tradition of excellence that past members have bestowed upon us. None of this would be possible without the continued dedication and service of the chapter members, officers, alumni advisory board, and house corporation."

Cunningham believes in the importance of Pike University, and says that "Pike University has a quality about it that instills pride and motivation in every young man who attends."

away from becoming Dynasty Level. Chapter President Logan Seger '09 believes retreats are important for setting chapter goals and expectations. Seger explains, "Theta Omicron holds executive council, chairmen, and chapter retreats at the beginning of each semester. During these retreats, we assess where we ended the previous year and how we can get to the next level. We complete chapter assessments, SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunitues and threats) analyses, and set goals during these retreats to ensure that all our members are on the same page and that everyone is buying into the goals. As we do this, we set our goals according to the expectations and requirements for winning a Smythe."

"A winning mentality is an important aspect of Theta Omicron, and Seger says "our desire to win fuels our work ethic in all areas whether it be in philanthropy, social, management or Homecoming. Winning has become a tradition

for Pike at Indiana State with 22 Smythes, 31 out of 33 overall intramural championships since our colonization, and numerous Homecoming championships."

Seger also explains that "Pike University gives our members the skills necessary to become leaders not just in the Fraternity, but on campus and in the community as well. The current SGA president at Indiana State University is also a Pike. He claims that the skills he needs to function as the student body president were learned through Pi Kappa Alpha and Pike University. Pike University covers a multitude of programming areas designed to help chapters succeed. We have followed these programs closely throughout our years, which has greatly contributed to the success of the chapter."

"We also find it very important to be our brother's keeper in order to fully develop fraternally, professionally, and personally. With our history of winning, one might anticipate that complacency would enter the scene. Not at Theta Omicron. We do not feel entitled to win or receive a trophy. We continue to work hard year after year."



John Cowgill '11, Chapter President of **Gamma Rho Chapter at Northwestern** explains that this Legacy Level chapter "believes in mutual accountability. We set very clear expectations for

every brother in recruitment, philanthropy, community service and brotherhood, and try to instill a sense of commitment to our program in every brother."

"Complacency and apathy are the two things that kill any chapter, and they can happen very quickly. It's critical for any winning chapter to have a strong executive council that doesn't merely manage the chapter but truly leads it to the next level, establishing a vision of how the chapter can become even better. At Gamma Rho we have managed to avoid complacency by continuing to set higher goals and by observing other fraternities on our campus that decline every year. We remind younger members that they are the ones who have to live with the chapter for the next three to four years, and that their

fraternity and collegiate experience will suffer if they do not continue to lead the chapter to an even higher level."

"Winning campus and international awards is great, but we try to remember that these awards should only be a reflection of what we are already striving to achieve for our own purposes. We want to be a Smythe chapter because we want to have a great fraternity experience, not because we only want to win a Smythe. This being said, winning these awards is undoubtedly extremely valuable. Pike has done a great job giving chapters a very clear understanding of what it takes to become a Smythe chapter, and has given chapters all the resources they need to make it to this level. Winning these awards immediately boosts brother buy-in, alumni involvement, and campus standing."

received its third consecutive Smythe, promoting the chapter to Legacy Level. External Vice President Aaron Phillips '08 says

"We always push the bar compared to the previous year with at least a 10% increase, or improvement with innovation. The goal setting process at Zeta Omega always begins with the executive council reviewing its previous Year End Summary statistics and Chapter Consultant Visitation Analysis to find areas for improvement. We build on the previous year and implement new programs to strengthen areas that need improvement. As we set goals we strive to meet and exceed the previous year's Smythe winning chapters' statistics. Realistic goal setting by our executive council, combined with positive reinforcement and resources for our chairmen, result in the achievement of excellence."

"At Zeta Omega, we understand the influence that Pike University events have on chapter excellence. We strongly encourage, and offer partial to full scholarships to our emerging leaders for Pike University events. The members come back with a fire that spreads through the entire chapter."





Two Brothers Stand Out in Scholastic Excellence

Alpha Xi Chapter (Cincinnati)



Kyle Quinn '09 received the 2012 Boren Scholar Award for \$20,000 to study abroad at Fundacao Getulio Vargas

(FGV) in Sao Paulo, Brazil for the 2012-2013 academic year. He was nominated for the Boren Scholarship by the University of Cincinnati where he is entering his senior year of studies in accounting. The Boren Awards are established through the US Federal Government to fund collegiate studies in areas of the world that are deemed critical to U.S. national security. It also requires that the student become fluent in the host country language as well. As a result of accepting the scholarship, scholars agree to a service requirement of one year working

for the Federal government in a national security role. Primary agencies include the Department of Defense, Homeland Security, State and Intelligence.

As an accounting student, Quinn's essays focused on U.S. financial and economic security and the SEC's proposal to shift US Generally Accepted Accounting Principles to International Financial Reporting Standards, He detailed why Brazil is such a critical piece of world economics and how studying Portuguese would help develop his career. At FGV, Quinn will complete a one-year diploma in International Management by taking classes in international law and finance. Quinn's intentions are to fulfill the service requirements by pursuing a position at the State Department in economic diplomacy or in financial intelligence.



- Orientation give new members a copy of the Garnet & Gold new member handbook and any other need-to-know basics of being a PIKE new member.
- Excitement Get the new members pumped up! Tell them about all the fun things the chapter has planned for the coming weeks. Excitement is contagious and is key for recruitment.
- Training Train the new members in the basics of PIKE recruitment (see "New Member Education – Week 1" in the officer resources section at www.pikes.org).
- Assignment Give new members their only assignment for the week – plan and execute a recruitment event.

PIKE is the recruitment leader among the fraternity world because we continually push ourselves to recruit "the most, best men." The Post-Game Rush is a technique that, if applied properly, guarantees a larger, higher-quality new member class.

- Purpose: Provide new members with knowledge and experience in PIKE recruitment while boosting new member class and/or green book size.
- Objectives: New members execute a successful recruitment event. Chapter adds additional new members to class or adds significantly to its green book.

Executing the Post-Game Rush is simple. During your *first* new member meeting this spring, do *only* the four things in the box to the left.



NOTES:

The new members likely don't know anything about event planning and they are going to need significant guidance.

Advise the new members that all members are expected to recruit. It is their *responsibility* as a future brother to bring quality men to the event.

There must be a high attendance of brothers at the event in order to be successful.

Once the potential recruits are at the event, it becomes the responsibility of the recruitment chair/committee and the initiated members to interview and bid them. Do not rely on your new members to actually recruit and/or bid men.

When properly executed, some of the best PIKE chapters have consistently increased their new member class size by upwards of 50% in the week immediately following their primary recruitment period. You can too! Recruitment is the lifeblood of the Fraternity, so educate your new members on best practices from day one.






They're not done though.

A CONVENT FOR MEN

Pi Kappa Alpha's Oldest Chapter House

In Troy, New York, Gamma Tau Chapter at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute has occupied just three homes since chartering in 1935, and they've lived in their current home for the last 37 years. The chapter's first house was old, and they later built a brand new one, but they ended up in the oldest house of all. After surveying all Pike house corporations and examining the Fraternity's archives, Gamma Tau's present home at 2228 12th Street in Troy, New York has been declared the oldest structure owned and occupied by a Pi Kappa Alpha group.

Gamma Tau's new member handbook contains a history of the house, but its full story has yet to be told. Like all chapters residing in a Pike owned house, to fully appreciate how it became theirs, one must understand the journey taken to get there. In 1938, three years after being chartered, Gamma Tau acquired a house they called "The Big White House" at 2256 Burdett Avenue, which sat on a large parcel of ground and was locally known as the Cluett Summer Mansion, named after a prominent family in the area. That house was originally built by a man named George Arrow, the founder of the Arrow Shirt Company. By the start of the 1957-58 school year, Gamma Tau had built a new house, next to the old one, in a "modern" style indicative of the era, now known as Mid-Century Modernism. The Big White House was kept as an annex. By 1974, their combined 3.2 acres had grown too valuable and the house corporation decided to cash-in. It was sold to an entrepreneur who converted the property to the Eddy Memorial Geriatric Center that is still there today.

In February 1975, Gamma Tau learned that Saint Paul's Catholic Convent on 12th Street was for sale and quickly put in an offer. However, closing the sale was not easy. Neighbors protested their acquisition, saying "the fraternity wouldn't fit into their quiet area..." This resistance caused the house corporation to present to Troy's Zoning Board of Appeals three times. They were finally granted fraternity use, conditioned upon them limiting access to their parking lot, and installing shrubbery and a new fence to create



a barrier. The chapter moved into 2228 12th in the fall of 1975.

Two brothers, Nathan and Esaias Warren, bought the land and built the structure in 1831. Moving a bunch of rambunctious college men into a 144 year old house may seem a bit harsh; but, with an understanding of its past, it undoubtedly breathed life back into the heart of this old structure. It had been built to be more than just a place to hang a hat, it was designed to serve people, and each group that cast a shadow across its floor had their own mission. The Warrens were very well-known family, native to Troy, New York. Through the 1800s, the family generated many community leaders, bank presidents, city officials, a mayor,

and a member of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Being an established wealthy family, the Warrens eventually amassed significant real estate holdings. However, the origin of this property starts with Phoebe Warren, mother of Nathan and Esaias, who started a sewing class for poor girls in 1815 to help them learn a marketable skill. Nathan and Esaias built the structure to assist their mother with her mission. Nathan's wife, Mary had presumably assisted her mother-in-law, as she took over the work after Phoebe's death in 1835. The scope of the mission had expanded and the facility became a free school for underprivileged girls to learn reading, writing, sewing, knitting, and quilting. On weekends, Sunday school lessons, catechism, and church music filled the building. In 1844, seeing even greater capabilities, Mary Warren moved the operation to a new location at 136 8th Street in Troy, and founded The Warren Free Institute (now more commonly known as The Mary Warren Free Institute of the City of Troy). That subsequent site was later placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

2228 12th Street was sold to Liberty Gilbert, an entrepreneur, in 1860. He saw an opportunity to provide lodging for workers in the nearby business district who needed affordable housing. Liberty's daughter, Mary, inherited the property. In July 1918, Mary sold it to St. Paul's Catholic Church, next door, when her husband, David H. Montony, became deathly ill. While Mr. Montony was infirmed, The Sisters of Mercy, a group of Catholic nuns, visited Mary to lift her spirits and to do what they

could, which may have paved the way for friendly business relations.

St. Paul's Catholic Church, presided over by Father Thomas Early, was home to the four Sisters of Mercy who were teaching in St. Paul's small grade school. When Father Early heard rumor of plans for a new Catholic Central High School, he saw a greater demand for nuns to teach on the horizon, and, living up to his name, he acquired the 2228 12th Street from the Montony family to house nuns who could then teach in both the new high school and his grade school. Not having the funds required to modify the facility to accommodate the growing convent, the Father recruited students at RPI to occupy the building from 1918 to June 1923. It was the Rensselaer Society of Engineers Fraternity, which still exists at RPI today. In lieu of rent, tenants worked for their housing by modifying the floor plan, laying hardwood floors throughout the ground floor and installing an electric lighting system. For the next five years, Father Early completed minor renovations, putting the finishing touches on the building he always wanted to be a convent. In June 1928, the convent became the property of Catholic Central High School at a purchase price of \$8,000.

At the time of the sale, the very large front parlor of the building was also the ballroom. The house was the largest on the hill and had some pretensions to elegance, including a beautiful marble fireplace in the community room over the parlor, French windows opening to Juliet balconies, and an unusually large oil painting over the fireplace.

An early extension added a dining room and kitchen to accommodate twenty-six nuns. The second and last addition toward Eagle Street supplied a larger chapel, library, and sacristy. The house was always flooded with visitors and weekend guests. In 1974, the Sisters of Mercy reluctantly, withdrew from the school because of a vocation shortage.

St. Paul's Church next door is now closed, as it had been combined with St. Peter's and St. Augustine's to form a larger church. As you might imagine, the dormitory nature of a convent was actually a wonderful retrofit for fraternity use. As a classroom to assist less fortunate girls to learn a marketable skill, as a home for workers to live affordably near their employment, as home to nuns who have devoted their life to service, and as a fraternity house where students live during a formidable time of their lives; this, the oldest house in Pi Kappa Alpha, was built to serve in a manner that helped bring out the best in people. A place to grow and become better prepared for the next steps in life. How appropriate that it is home to a fraternity of young men doing just that.



Brother Cox was one of the most distinguished and dedicated alumni the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity has been blessed to have served the organization. He graciously gave of his time as Heartland regional president for over 20 years and also served on the Foundation's audit committee until his passing. Robert N. Cox entered Chapter Eternal on Saturday, August 11, 2012, in Cape Girardeau, Missouri.

Born on July 6, 1944, he was the beloved husband of Margaret A. Lewis Cox, and a great friend and mentor to many Fraternity brothers.

Brother Cox was treasurer emeritus of the American Red Cross and was honored by the Red Cross for his years of dedication and contributions of outstanding efforts. He was a member of Choral Union of SEMO for 20 years, where he and Margaret were very active members. Cox always had a song in his heart and loved to sing.

Cox was a past president and member of the Southeast Missouri State University Foundation board, and had served as alumni association president of SEMO.

He was a prominent businessman for more than 35 years as the owner of his accounting firm, Cox and Associates. Cox served as vice chairman of the Cape Girardeau Planning and Zoning Commission, having served on that board for over 20 years. He was a member of Centenary United Methodist Church

Within Pi Kappa Alpha, Brother Cox achieved a most distinguished record. Since his initiation in 1964, he was a perennial attendee at conventions, academies, leadership summits, and all Fraternity events. He served as chapter advisor for Epsilon Iota Chapter (Southeast Missouri State) from 1989 through 2001. In 1984, he received the Fraternity's Chapter Advisor of Year Award. He was president of the Midwest Region from 1986 through

1990, and when that region was split, he continued as president of the Heartland Region until 2007. Brother Cox personally underwrote the expenses of many undergraduate brothers to attend Fraternity leadership events.

In 1989, Cox became a member of the Epsilon Iota Alumni Advisory Board, and in 2012 he became president of that group. He had also served on the House Corporation, Epsilon Iota of Pi Kappa Alpha, Inc. Cox also served on the Alpha Kappa Chapter (*Missouri S&T*) Alumni Advisory Board as president and financial advisor.

In 1968, Cox became a Diamond Life Member of Pi Kappa Alpha; and in 1994 became a member of the Foundation's planned giving society, the Oak Trust. He joined the President's Council in 2004. He was a member of the Junior Founders giving society.

In 2002, Cox received Pi Kappa Alpha's Loyalty Award, and was inducted into the Order of West Range in 2010. The Order of West Range recognizes those Pi Kappa Alpha alumnus members who have gained distinction through career accomplishments, service to society and/or service to the Fraternity.

Robert Cox never met a stranger and always had a smile and a joke for everyone. His nickname of "JB" for "Jolly Bob" (given to him by his Fraternity brothers years ago), certainly fit his personality.

Brother Cox was laid to rest at Russell Heights Cemetery in Jackson, Missouri.

The Campaign for PIKE University.



PIKE CHAPLAIN NAMED MILITARY CHAPLAINS ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Decorated Veteran, Former POW and Longtime Chaplain Brings Lifetime of Experience to Position

haplain Robert Certain (Emory, *Beta Kappa '67*) has been named *■* executive director of the Military Chaplains Association. Brother Certain came to national attention in early 2007 when he officiated the funeral services for President Gerald R. Ford. Since then he has served as an advisor to the Secretary of Defense while a member of the Defense Health Board and the DoD's Task Force for the Prevention of Suicide: and to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs on the Advisory Committee on Former POWs In this new capacity, he will be the organizational leader and primary spokesman for the "Voice of the Chaplaincy."

Chaplain Certain laid out his plans to the MCA executive committee during the selection process. "All of us - active duty, reserve component, Veterans Affairs, Civil Air Patrol, former and retired - simply must lead this nation to develop better care for warriors and families. Even though the scars of two wars and deployments have left their mark this past decade, the present and real challenges of suicide, sexual assault and poor resilience have little correlation to extended trips to the theater of operations. Our chaplains in uniform are active in addressing these issues head on as they serve

our men and women in the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard. Those of us no longer in uniform need to mobilize our civilian faith communities to receive veterans into their congregations, to utilize their strengths and gifts, and to heal their unseen wounds. We have a crisis in our Military family and the Chaplaincy must lead the charge on addressing this crisis," said Certain.

Chaplain Certain is no stranger to the seen and unseen wounds of war. As a young Air Force officer he flew 100 combat missions over Vietnam as a B-52 navigator, was shot down over Hanoi. He spent the waning months of the war as a POW. Upon repatriation, he attended seminary and was ordained by the Episcopal Church. He served on active duty and in the reserves as a chaplain in the Air Force before retiring in 1999 at the rank of colonel. After a brief recall during Desert Storm, he was assigned as the senior reserve chaplain at the Strategic Air Command, then at the Air Mobility Command, and finally at the Air Force Academy. Wearing his civilian attire, he served parishes in Texas, Mississippi, Tennessee, Arizona, California, and Georgia, and has retired from that work to accept the challenging leadership of the MCA. Brother Certain is a 2008

recipient of the Order of the West Range for his lifetime of achievement, bringing honor to himself and to the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.

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ED PEASE HONORED WITH LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Order of the Arrow Presents Honor to Distinguished Pike.

Edward A. Pease (Indiana, Delta Xi '71) was recognized with the Legacy of Servant Leadership Lifetime Achievement Award during the 2012 National Order of the Arrow Conference recognition show at Michigan State University.

National OA Committee Chairman Ray Capp presented Pease, an Eagle Scout and Vigil Honor member of Jaccos Towne Lodge, with the award in recognition of his lifetime of servant leadership to the Order of the Arrow and Scouting.

During the recognition show, Pease accepted the award and unveiled the Order's centennial celebration painting, which was crafted by Scouting artist Joseph Csatari. Pease expressed his gratitude for the honor, and said he was humbled by the opportunity to be a part of the Order of the Arrow. He explained that "in linear terms, there is a line that began with Dr. Goodman running through the years to the present day. Each of us finds himself somewhere on that continuum." He said that all Arrowmen are "privileged" to have a place on the continuum, "to be part of a movement bigger than any of us - to share in the common experiences of a tradition we received and who understand that we are simply their stewards." The continuum is not simply a "linear progression," he said, "but an embrace of the spirit that wraps itself around each of us, making us stronger as the beliefs we share are magnified through the bonds of brotherhood." Pease is the fifth to be recognized for his significant contributions to the furthering of the Order's continuum, joining the ranks of the notable group of Arrowmen who have received the Lifetime Achievement Award since its creation in 2002. The national OA committee developed the award to "recognize only those extraordinary Arrowmen who have deeply influenced and significantly contributed to the vision, direction, and growth of the Order of the Arrow, faithfully demonstrated a lifetime of servant leadership, and, through their daily example, illuminated and reinforced the significance of the values found in the Scout Oath and Scout Law." The recipients must be approved by 75 percent of the national OA committee members and must meet the award requirements: a Vigil Honor member; Distinguished Service Award (DSA) recipient; continue to render service to the Order of


the Arrow on a section, regional, or national level since the presentation of their DSA; and an Order of the Arrow member for at least 25 years. The award is only presented at the national OA conference.

Pease has continually distinguished himself since he began his involvement in the Order of the Arrow as a youth. He began in a very active troop and local Scouting program. Pease worked camp staff for nine years and attributes some of his most memorable experiences to his time there. His work in the Order of the Arrow began when he was elected lodge secretary, and then lodge chief at the age of 15. Pease attended the Region 7 Area G conference, and was elected secretary, followed by area chief at the age of 17. "The Area Conference is where my view of Scouting and its possibilities was opened," Pease said. "I was fortunate enough to be elected at a time when youth were beginning to take a bigger role in the Order."

As a youth, Pease was selected to be a Report to the Nation delegate and attended the 1967 World Scout Jamboree. 1969 National Conference Chief Tom Fielder appointed Pease to be the deputy national conference chief. At the 1971 and 1973 conferences, Pease had

the opportunity to escort E. Urner Goodman and Carrol A. Edson.

In 1984, Carl Marchetti, then national OA committee chairman, appointed Pease to the national committee. Nine years later, Pease was appointed chairman of the national Order of the Arrow committee and resolved to expand youth involvement in all aspects of the Order. During his tenure, the OA Philmont Trail Crew program was developed by a youth. The Trail Crew program has led to the creation of two more high adventure programs, OA Ocean Adventure and OA Wilderness Voyage, and several national programs of emphasis, including SummitCorps and ArrowCorps5. "One of the biggest accomplishments while I was national chairman was ensuring that young people were involved in the leadership structure at all levels," Pease said. The

youth's voice expanded dramatically during Pease's term, and it has remained that way ever since he said, stating "A lot more young people can be involved in the Order in different ways."

Pease has also distinguished himself in his workplace and community. Pease practiced law as an attorney, served in the Indiana State Senate for twelve years, and remains actively involved in Indiana State University, where he served as vice president and general counsel. Pease's commitment to his community continued after his election to the United States House of Representatives, where he served two terms. He is currently the senior vice president of government relations at Rolls-Royce North America.

In Scouting, Pease is a member of the Crossroads of America Council executive board, the BSA national advisory board, and the national OA committee. He was recently appointed to serve as the chairman of the national Scouting Alumni Association and plans to remain active in Scouting for a long time. He said, "Scouting has been a big part of my life since my childhood, and I hope that I will always be involved in some way."


Joe Quade '42 attended Rutgers University, but left to enter the army in 1943. After basic training

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News of BYGONE DAYS

125 YEARS AGO - 1887

Although there were only a handful of chapters at this time in history the men were forward thinkers with a desire to ensure the future of Pi Kappa Alpha. They came together to amend the constitution, establish alumni clubs, discuss the need for regular conventions and lay out plans for expansion.

100 YEARS AGO - 1912

In their chapter letter published in the Shield & Diamond, Alpha Tau at the University of Utah wrote: "For the first time in the history of the school the Rocky Mountain championship honors were conferred on Utah. As a result the entire student body went out on 'strike', and a celebration of a week's duration ensued.... We have not yet decided whether there is to be any more school this year at the University of Utah.

75 YEARS AGO - 1937

In the unveiling ceremony for the new bronze plaque commemorating the names of the six founders of Pi Kappa Alpha on the wall of the famous Room 31 of West Range, University President John Newcomb (Gamma and Alpha) said, "Thousands upon thousands of future students and visitors will pause here to read the names of this small group and, after reading, they will reflect upon the fact that ties of friendship and devotion are remembered and persist long after material ties have been broken and discarded. It is right and proper that this tablet should be placed here to perpetuate in enduring bronze the names of the six students of the university who in 1868 somehow succeeded in forming a small band of brothers, whose ties of loyalty and devotion have had a persistent appeal."

50 YEARS AGO - 1962

Charterings in the winter of 1962 included Epsilon Tau at Eastern New Mexico State on November 17 and Epsilon Upsilon at Gannon on December 1.

25 YEARS AGO - 1987

The December 1987 Shield & Diamond reported in the Expansion Update that Pi Kappa Alpha currently had eight colonies, a number unparalleled in the past fifteen years and surpassed only once during ПКА's 119 year history. Director of Expansion Kevin G. Knaus remarks, "The future success of the program will depend to a great extent on the alumni and their willingness to step forward to become involved with the colonies and the chapters. The alumni are a major key to success." The eight colonies included Colorado (Beta Upsilon), Florida Southern (Delta Delta), Michigan State, Randolph Macon, California State-Long Beach, Rose Hulman, Nevada-Reno and California Polytechnic State-San Luis Obispo.

I first met James Brian Reilly in the fall of 1994, a few weeks into our freshman year at the College of William and Mary. Both high school athletes from Long Island, New York, Jim and I hit it off immediately and never looked back. We initiated into the Gamma chapter during the Spring of 1995, and eager to etch our names into the history books like so many brothers before us, we would both serve as executive officers during our collegiate tenure.

Jim was truly one of a kind. His infectious laugh, charisma and quick wit were stuff of legend within the house. When Jim entered a room, he could light it up like no other. Despite being blessed with many talents, there was not a single pretentious bone in his body. It was impossible not to like Jimmy Reilly.

Jim was killed in the terrorist attacks of September 11th, 2001. A bond trader for Keefe, Bruyette & Woods, his office resided on the 89th floor of the South Tower within the World Trade Center. He was 25 years old.

In the months following the events of 9/11, I rekindled my relationship with writing. Although subconsciously at the time, putting pen to paper initially provided both a necessary distraction and outlet for my struggle with a wide range of conflicting emotions. What transpired was a ten-year journey, an experience which was completely unpredictable, filled with many highs and lows, victories and mistakes, taking many different forms and traversing many different roads. Throughout this long voyage, my memories of Jim and his warm smile served as trusted companion and motivation to keep pushing.

About ten years ago, I created the idea and framework for a fictional story inspired by true events. I eventually developed this story into a screenplay which was later optioned by a production company based out of LA. After many years of getting close but falling short of securing a studio deal, momentum behind the movie project began to slow down considerably. At or around 2010 was when I first began to seriously contemplate converting the screenplay into a novel. Unfortunately, I had no idea where to start.

In May of 2010, I attended a thought leadership conference in Washington D.C. On day 1 of the conference, during a 'speed networking' orientation activity, I was seated opposite a speaker's agent who was just finishing up his first book. Letting my guard down a little, I informed him that I had been working on a passion project for many years. Ice now broken, we begin to share some

experiences and then exchange contact information. As our 'meet and greet' time elapses, signaled by the room lights flickering on and off, I quickly glanced at his name tag which stopped me in my tracks and sent goosebumps down my spine: James Reilly.


Three or four months after the conference, I reached out to James with specific details regarding the project I had alluded to in addition to my thoughts of converting the screenplay into a book. I told him about the story and characters, how they were inspired by my town and dedicated to my friend who ironically shared the same name as he. After a few days, he contacted me back and told me that while he had never done this before with a relative,

he thought that his father, Tom Reilly, a published writer, might be somebody that could help. James introduced me to his father, whom upon meeting, told me he would be honored to help convert the story into a novel.

Last month, I was finally able to honor my friend and our fellow PiKA brother. Dedicated to Jim, *Utopia* is a personal story of a high school soccer team from New York coming together as champions in the wake of 9/11 to capture the hope and imagination of a small, heartbroken community.

The end of any long journey provides a great time for reflection. In a small yet intimate way, the book keeps us connected to Jim forever. I have been thinking a lot about my college days at Pika with Jim. Initiation night sticks out amongst many great memories. A group of 18-year old boys, lined up in formation, staring up at a dark, starry night sky, brimming with both excitement and curiosity to what would shortly unfold. I can see Jim's big smile and hear the enthusiasm and conviction of his voice echoing into my ear, 'For the establishment of friendship on a firmer and more lasting basis...'"


THE BROTHERHOOD



He was particularly proud of the conservation efforts he oversaw as executive director of the American Friends of the Game Conservancy and the Cullman Wildlife Project in Africa. Some of his past civic responsibilities include serving as president of the Shreveport Advertising Club, board of directors of the 10th District of the American Advertising Federation, chairman of the Military Affairs Committee for the Shreveport Chamber of Commerce, president of the Red River Chapter of the Naval Reserve Association, president of the Shreveport Chapter of the Texas Exes, publicity chairman for a United Fund Drive, fund raising captain for the Norwela Council of the Boy Scouts of America, committee chairman of the capital fund campaign for Centenary College and various chairmanships for Ducks Unlimited including area chairman, state publicity chairman and N.W. area chairman. Evans' naval awards include the Navy Expedition medal, the Armed Forces Reserve medal, the National Defense medal and Expert medals for pistol and rifle shooting. His hobbies included waterfowl and upland game hunting, travel and reading. He loved the study of history and taught U.S. Naval history to reservists and active duty sailors. He traveled and worked in Cuba as a young man, and later enjoyed trips to Africa, Mexico, Honduras, Canada, Europe and Asia. Evans is survived by his wife, Margaret Roberts Evans, his children and grandchildren.

JAMES R. FAVOR (Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '67)



James R. Favor entered Chapter Eternal on October 23, 2012 after a short illness.

He graduated with distinction from

Colorado State University in 1969 with a bachelor of science degree. While at Colorado State, he played football, baseball, and was on the wrestling team. After college, Favor was a catcher in the Chicago Cubs organization for a year, was briefly called up to the major league, and was always an avid Cubs fan. He was an enthusiastic supporter of the Denver professional sports teams and liked individual sports too, especially skiing and golf. In the winter he frequented the slopes of Winter Park and other ski resorts, and never turned down a round of golf with his friends and business associates.

After spending several years with a major insurance agency, in June 1979 he founded James R. Favor and Company. Soon thereafter, he found his niche. He was a staunch supporter of fraternal organizations and soon dedicated himself to creating the first risk management and insurance program for college-based fraternities and sororities. Favor devoted the rest of his professional career to serving the insurance and risk management needs of his valued customers in the Greek community.

He earned his certified insurance counselor designation in 1991, and his certified risk manager designation in 2006. He was granted coverholder authority on behalf of certain underwriters at Lloyd's London and was personally thanked by the Lloyd's chairman in September 2010. The occasion celebrated the 25 year anniversary of the Lloyd's/JRFavor and Co. relationship. Favor authored much of the current Lloyd's fraternity insurance program which has been tested and upheld in a number of federal courts. Because of his expertise, he was frequently called to be a professional witness in insurance related cases.

"Jim was a pioneer in group fraternal insurance programs, providing proper protection to national fraternities and their chapters when markets were very limited. He was very knowledgeable of underwriting, dedicated to his mission, and loyal to his clients," remarked Pi Kappa Alpha's Executive Vice President Emeritus Raymond L. Orians (Memphis, Delta Zeta '66).

A strong supporter of The Campaign for Pike University, Favor made a \$100,000 gift to the Campaign, which is structured to support risk awareness via Pike University.

Favor's lifelong passion was helping to protect the interests of his clients. He was recognized for his efforts with various awards including Pi Kappa Alpha's distinguished Order of West Range Award, Sigma Alpha Mu's Sidney H. Guller Interfraternal Service Award, Phi Delta Theta's Order of the Sword & Shield, and Triangle Fraternity's Richard H. Sudheimer Interfraternal Leadership Award.

Jim Favor will be remembered for his loyalty to his companies, his clients, and his employees as well as for his professionalism, integrity, and philanthropy.

THOMAS W. GRAHAM, JR. (Western Carolina, Zeta Xi '67)

Thomas Wilkerson Graham, Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on September 10, 2012. He received his B.A. degree in music from Western Carolina University. While at Western, Graham was a charter member of Zeta Xi Chapter. After graduating, he began a distinguished career as a band director in the Burlington, Alamance County and High Point City Schools. He was a member of ASBDA and other music related organizations. He left the teaching profession and continued his career with educational music sales, working first for Pearson Music Company and later, Music and Arts, from which he retired in 2010. Graham was an active member of Jamestown United Methodist Church. He enjoyed using his musical talents in various ways, especially singing in the adult choir. He enjoyed being a Jamestown Civitan. Graham will be remembered as a very kind, gentle, and loving man. He always went the extra mile to make life better for his friends and colleagues. He has touched many lives through his gift of music and love for teaching. He is survived by his wife, Nancy, daughters, Karen and Lauren, and grandson, Dylan.

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DONALD P. GWARJANSKI (Auburn, Upsilon '08)



Donald P. Gwarjanski entered Chapter Eternal on August 18, 2012. He was a 2008 graduate of Oak Mountain High School and a senior at

Auburn University. At Oak Mountain, he lettered four years in football and was team captain in 2007-2008. At Auburn, Gwarjanski was a business major and was scheduled to graduate in December 2012 with a degree in supply chain management. He served Upsilon Chapter as vice president in 2010. Don was a happy, friendly person with numerous friends. He enjoyed life, loved his family and sports, and was an avid Auburn fan. He also enjoyed attending Atlanta Braves games with his father. Gwarjanski enjoyed all types of outdoor activities, especially golf, fishing, hunting and snow skiing; and spent many vacations at the mountains, lake, or the beach. An active Christian, he was baptized at Indian Spring First Baptist Church in 1999.

WILLIAM MCGUIRE (Davidson, Beta '29)



William McGuire entered Chapter Eternal on August 15, 2012. He was 102.

McGuire's name marks one of Duke Energy's most familiar landmarks

– the McGuire Nuclear Station on Lake Norman in North Carolina. He joined Duke's legal department after graduating from Davidson College and earning a law degree at Duke University. McGuire was groomed for management and named president in 1959.

McGuire is remembered for his intellectual curiosity, appetite for work and a management style that expected performance rather than dictated tasks. As a young corporate president, McGuire redid Duke Energy's compensation program and rebuilt its public affairs and marketing functions. He made the decision to guide Duke

into nuclear power; the company has since run some of the most efficient plants in the nation.

During his 12-year tenure, Duke filled Lake Norman, its last and biggest impoundment on the Catawba River. In 1965, McGuire reported to shareholders "by far the biggest year of industrial expansion in the company's history," breaking records for revenue, energy sales, generating capacity and other measures.

Duke announced plans in 1965 for its first commercial nuclear plant and an innovative pumped-storage hydroelectric plant in the northwestern corner of South Carolina. The Oconee nuclear plant's first unit began operating in 1973, two years after McGuire retired. The McGuire plant started up in 1981.

McGuire served as a trustee of the Duke Endowment from 1965 to 1988 and as a board member of the Charlotte branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond. He was a founder, in 1968, of the National Electric Reliability Council, which sets electric-industry standards.

JAMES RILEY (Oklahoma, Beta Omicron '47)



James Riley entered Chapter Eternal on August 31, 2012. As a student at Classen High School, he left school early because he wanted to join the Navy. Before

leaving for basic training in January 1943, he stopped to watch a Classen basketball game in which he should have been playing. Riley served in the Navy from 1943 to 1946 and was stationed in Jacksonville, Florida; San Diego, California; Guam and Saipan. After an honorable discharge, he attended the University of Oklahoma. He met and married Mary Ann Eldred on December 18, 1948. Riley graduated from OU in August 1950 and worked in sales until his retirement from Mosler Safe Company in 1986. One of his favorite activities in retirement was his involvement at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, where he was an active docent for 25 years. Riley also volunteered his time at the

Guild of St. George at St. Paul's Cathedral. He and Mary Ann enjoyed OU football and basketball. They also enjoyed extensive travels around the world. Riley is survived by his wife, a daughter and son-in-law, granddaughters and many friends at Statesman Retirement Community, where he and Mary Ann lived the past year.

JAMES P. SHEELY (Arizona, Gamma Delta '76)



James P. Sheely (Jim, Jimbo, Tio Fabio) entered Chapter Eternal on September 19th, 2012. Sheely attended the University of Arizona, his father's alma

mater, where he joined the Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity, a life long devotion. Following college, he was accepted into a training program of PCA/Land Bank, which took him to Yuma, Napa Valley and Stockton; and along the way he became interested in oenology. However, a position with First Interstate Bank in Benson opened for him, and he spent enough time there to establish treasured friendships. From there he moved to Tucson where his great love of dogs took hold. Still interested in winemaking, he decided to enroll in the the viticulture/oenology program at Fresno State and was excited to start his own business but the timing was not favorable, forcing him to delay his dream. Sheely continued to farm in the Lemoore area, growing cotton and grain crops. A life long passionate sports fan, he also enjoyed scuba diving, white water rafting, rock climbing, cooking and other avocations, always with great enthusiasm.

Rockies Regional President Brent A. Seebohm (Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '96) remarked, "He was always engaging with Gamma Delta Chapter matters and named an endowed scholarship."

In 2001 James P. Sheely established the Gamma Delta Chapter President's Scholarship at the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation. This scholarship is awarded annually to the duly elected president of Gamma Delta Chapter.

It recognizes leadership, service and sacrifice of the undergraduate brother who annually serves Gamma Delta Chapter as president.

IRVING CHARLES STILES (Rensselaer, Gamma Tau '40)



Charlie Stiles entered Chapter Eternal on June 29, 2012. He joined the Navy 8 days after Pearl Harbor. After completing a degree in

Aeronautical Engineering at RPI and post graduate studies at MIT for the Navy, he was assigned to duty supplying weather data to patrol aircraft searching for enemy subs along the northeast coast. He served on the aircraft carrier Thetis Bay until the end of World War II providing support for battles such as Iwo Jima.

After World War II, Stiles served in the Pacific including Kwajalein and Eniwetok, then as assistant operations officer on the flagship aircraft carrier USS Wright. He later served as a lieutenant commander under the the commander, Eastern Sea Frontier: and next as the chief staff officer on the flagship destroyer USS Braine, DESCOM 18. During the Korean Conflict, Stiles was the executive officer on the destroyer USS Wadleigh.

Following 13 years of active duty, Stiles transferred to the Naval Reserves where he served throughout the Cold War and until his retirement from Grumman Aerospace in 1986. As an aeronautical engineer at Grumman, he was involved in projects that included the Apollo moon missions, Space Shuttle and the F-14 Tom Cat fighter

RICHARD O. STUCKER (Ohio State, Alpha Rho '43)



Richard O. Stucker entered Chapter **Eternal on September** 3, 2012. He was an Eagle Scout, and graduated from Ohio State University, where

he received a degree in chemical engineering. Stucker was one of three men who hold the patent for the

process of making the fuel in solid rocket fuel for NASA under the Minuteman Program.

After completing two semesters at Ohio State, Stucker decided to enlist in the Marines rather than be drafted by the Army. In March 1943, he arrived at Parris Island, South Carolina for basic training.

He was assigned to Parris Island as a rifle instructor for 11 months and was promoted from PFC to corporal. Later, he was transferred to Camp Lejuene, where he spent his first two weeks guarding President Roosevelt at Hobcaw Barony near Georgetown (a plantation owned by Bernard Baruch, war advisor to Wilson and Roosevelt).

Stucker was then assigned to the 29th Marines in Guadalcanal, where he trained for 11 months. The 29th from Guadalcanal, 22nd from Guam, and 4th from China (before the war) joined to become the 6th Division which only saw one engagement at Okinawa.

The 6th Division, 29th Marines, 3rd Platoon, Company I (Igloo) landed on Okinawa on April 1, 1945 in the middle of the island near Yontan Airfield. It was quiet and there was little fighting, so the men started moving north. In the north, Stucker could see Le Shima and battle going on there. The army then moved south, and Stucker was wounded 52 days into the battle in the south by mortar to the leg on May 15, 1945 and then again May 24, 1945 with a blast concussion to his head and contusions on both knees. Flown out of Okinawa to Guam, he then departed to Seattle to the Naval Hospital via ship on May 31, 1945.

He was then sent to Asheville, North Carolina, then to Great Lakes Naval Training for one and a half months before he was discharged on December 22, 1945. Only six men in his platoon finished the entire battle. Stucker was awarded the Purple Heart.

In 2001, he tried to convince the Marine Recruiter to allow him to reenlist because "Once a Marine, always a Marine" and he was positive he could be used somehow.

Stucker retired in civilian life as a chemical engineer with the Dupont Plant in Camden, South Carolina. While in Camden, he was a member and deacon of First Baptist Church, where he also was a member of the choir, Sunday school teacher, and served in various other positions. He also assisted in the beginning of a church sponsored by the First Baptist Church. He served in the Gideon Ministry in various positions. Stucker was an artist and a member of the Art League. He moved to Pageland, South Carolina, where he was a member of Providence Baptist Church. He continued in the Gideon Ministry, where he served in all the camp offices at various times, as well as serving in the state positions. Stucker was also member of the Smith Graves American Legion Post #92. Continuing with his art, he joined the Monroe, North Carolina art league where he won various ribbons and Best in Show Painting. He is survived by his wife, Rachel, one brother, three children, 11 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

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

Raised on a small farm in Oklahoma, I know what hard work looks like. I credit the ideals, programs and men of Pi Kappa Alpha for instilling in me the skills necessary to become successful in the professional world. Realizing the profound impact my Fraternity has had on my life, I volunteer because I believe it is my duty to help ensure the longevity of this great institution. Alumni are stewards of a great treasure that must not only be preserved, but also enhanced so that in the future others can enjoy and profit from the PIKE fraternity experience as I have.

In regards to volunteering with Gamma Chi – for decades, a core group of alumni kept an eye out for the chapter. We build on their success by adding structure and a clear direction to our alumni entities.

A group of PIKE alumni from my era started by contacting alumni we knew and saw fairly regularly in our lives after college. We held a handful of events, and encouraged all who attended to bring five more alumni to the next event. Over time, our numbers expanded across several generations. The initial dialogue focused on nothing more than reliving the good old days. Eventually, the question would come up as to how the chapter was doing. With that question, the group began discussing how to form an alumni association, from which we would have a steady stream of alumni to help support the chapter. After forming our alumni association and promoting

its programs for a year, we generated enough interest to form an alumni advisory board.

As a result, two accomplishments come to mind. First, there is a renewed excitement in the Fraternity among our alumni spanning several generations. Second, Gamma Chi now has a force of stability in the chapter. The chapter membership is constantly changing with recruitment and graduation. The leadership also changes annually. A strong alumni presence among new leadership has made the chapter officer transition process more effective and efficient.

My advice to a chapter trying to re-engage their alumni – start out by drawing them in with what drew them to the Fraternity in the first place: fellowship. Invite your alumni to a guys' night, out for a day of golf, or an informal BBO. It's important to remind alumni why they loved the Fraternity in the first place. For alumni to make a meaningful contribution to the chapter, assign individual alumni to specific tasks consistent with their interests and expertise, and always provide each alumnus a job description for his role. Finally, you have to take advantage of the technology out there to connect with alumni and keep them engaged with the Fraternity through social media, emails, websites, and newsletters. Also, do not forget to use snail mail and phone chains for those older alumni who aren't as comfortable using modern media.
