By leveraging the latest research and trends and incorporating multiple evidence-based learning theories, GreekLifeEDU helps achieve behavior change objectives, helps students practice safe decision-making, and empowers students to make well-informed decisions by providing simple strategies to help keep them and their friends safe.



GreekLifeEDU offers a confidential, personalized experience for each student.

GreekLifeEDU has two parts.

- Part 1 includes a pre-survey in addition to the training.
- Part 2 becomes available after a 15-day wait period.

Part 1 includes:

Five modules of content featuring videos, scenarios, interactive activities, and more.

- 1. Introduction with pre-course survey
- Have a Plan Alcohol Module covering areas such as BAC, risky behaviors, protective strategies, alcohol poisoning, and refusal skills

Continuing her loyal run of 35 plus years of service to Pi Kappa Alpha, Sandra Newsom assumed the role of project manager effective January 16, 2018. The project manager position will combine the duties of a data specialist, focusing on data accuracy and integrity, as well as those of Memorial Headquarters archivist. Both of these operational areas are ones in which Sandra has developed specialized expertise and interest over the past several years.

In particular, she has established a special passion for Pi Kappa Alpha's history, having worked closely with International Historian Dr. Jerome V. 🗖 ric Winston (Miami, Gamma • Omega '03) is the current president of the National Football League Players Association. Winston was a standout offensive tackle at the University of Miami drafted in the third-round by the Houston Texans in 2006. He graduated college in three years with an above 3.5 grade point average and double majors in finance and marketing. Winston has played 141 games for five NFL football clubs and started in 123 games. He got involved in the Players Association as a team representative, eventually ascending to his current leadership role. Pi Kappa Alpha's Executive Vice President Justin A. Buck (Southeastern Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96) spoke with Winston on leadership and his career.

Eric, it's been tremendous watching you in your role as president of the NFL Players Association. Representing your fellow players as you do and interacting with the owners and the league must be both rewarding and challenging.

It's extremely challenging, but it's fun from the standpoint that I get to do something I'm extremely passionate about. I get to help my fellow players – in some cases in their day-to-day lives. This job is at the intersection of sports, and business, and sometimes politics, all things I'm interested in. I follow what's going on and how those areas affect us. It's time consuming and tough at times, but it's very rewarding.

I've learned a lot and been able to help people.

How did you take the first step to getting involved with the NFL Players **Association?**

It was like a lot of other people's first steps. I expressed my opinions to somebody who was involved in the NFLPA. He took me to my first meeting. We would talk, and I'd ask questions and offer ideas. He said I should come to the meeting and offer my thoughts. Each team has an elected representative who comes up with ideas and votes on issues to make things better for the players. Having the chance to shape some of the policies that are impacting us now and in the long-term is great.



How was the transition of going from a players' representative to more of a leadership role within the NFLPA?

Leadership sometimes finds you. I've always taken the "I am who I am, and I'm going to speak my mind" approach. Sometimes it rubs people the wrong way, but I'm going to share what I think is right and what I'm passionate about. That was the approach I took at the NFLPA as a rep or an associate rep. I spoke up about what I heard in the locker room, the players' wants, and what I thought we should do. For whatever reason, that resonated with a lot of guys - not just for the opinions, but because I was willing to the put the work in. In any business there are people with great ideas, but they don't want to put the time in to make them work. I was willing to go over policies and be a part of committees, and I think that was recognized at some point. Some older guys were cycling out of the league and asked me to run

for a leadership position. It's been a fun ride and I've been excited to do it.



In your role, you work with many different personalities - can you share two or three useful skills to represent them effectively?

There are a lot of personalities and ways of thinking represented in the league. Having effective communication skills - not just interpersonal. one-on-one, but mass communication skills, too - is the best advantage. How do you communicate to a group of 100 guys or to a group of 20 guys? We work with groups of different sizes and ages, trying to communicate to them and make sure they all come away with the same message. We try to find out how people process and internalize information. You don't have enough time in the day to talk to one person at a time so it's important to use mass communication effectively.

The second biggest skill is staying true to yourself. You can get your point across without being nasty or difficult. When you get into a leadership position, there is a tendency to not put yourself out on a limb by saying what you want to say, or taking or not taking certain actions. But when you do that, you aren't expressing who you are or what led you to the position you're in. Sometimes I think maybe I shouldn't have said something in a particular way - but that's who I've always been and I always try to revert to that person. This is what people elected me for and I have to go out there and speak my mind. Staying true to my beliefs has been a big help to me.

Tell us about your leadership of the NFL PA.

There are 10 vice presidents who represent the diversity of the NFL.

High draft picks, low draft picks, high and low salaries, different races, positions; they were all voted in by their reps, and their opinions matter. In leading this group I try to do a lot of listening instead of telling. One of the great things that drew me to the NFLPA was the people who get together to represent the union – they seem to be a team within a team.

You deal with player health and safety, workplace conditions, and other issues; what are some of the other things you've faced?

We started to see this year that we are stronger and carry much more sway than we realize. We saw it with some guys protesting, and that started to move the conversation. It wasn't always a positive one about the right topic – but we started seeing guys like J.J. Watt or Greg Olsen using social media platforms to make real differences in their communities and speak out on things they are passionate about off the field. So many guys around the league are using their platforms and saying they want to make a difference. They don't want to just throw touchdowns, catch touchdowns, or sack quarterbacks. They want to make a real difference. It's something I've always tried to get guys to understand, both in a union context and outside of football. Together we can be powerful, and you also have power alone. Social media helps because you can talk directly to fans. But the light is creeping in and we can move the needle, we can make a difference.

The 2018 college football season will now feature two Pi Kappa Alpha alumni as the highest-paid head coaches: **Dabo Swinney** (Alabama, Gamma Alpha '89) at **Clemson** and **Jimbo Fisher** (Florida State, Delta



Lambda '10) at **Texas A&M**. Swinney took his 12-2 team to the Sugar Bowl but lost to Alabama in January. His career record is now 101-30 with the Tigers, who ranked fourth in the final polls. Fisher resigned at Florida State and signed a 10-year contract as head coach of the Texas A&M Aggies. During his eight seasons at FSU, he won the BCS National



Championship in 2013 and finished with an 83-23 career mark. The Fraternity's other active college head football coach is **Steve Englehart** (Indiana State, Theta Omicron '88) who led his **Florida Tech** squad for the fourth season in NCAA Division II.

Thether you're watching a comedy or a drama, reading a work of fiction or nonfiction, or listening to a song that references high school football, the odds are the team is from a small town where the game of football and the success of the hometown team are both pertinent to the town's morale.

Union City, Tennessee is no different. Located in northwest Tennessee, Union City has a population of just under 11,000 and is home to the Union City Tornadoes. Under the leadership of Head Coach Darren Bowling (Louisiana-Monroe, Eta Omicron '87), the Tornadoes have brought home the coveted "gold ball" four times-the only four times in school history.



The last time a state championship trophy made its way back to Union City was December 1, 2017, following a 27-21 doubleovertime win. For the class of 2018, their high school football careers began with a state championship win, so it was only fitting that their senior season end with another state title.

From Saturday morning peewee games to finally playing underneath the Friday night lights, these 13 seniors have developed both on and off the field with the guidance of three different Pikes.

After graduating high school in 1987, Dan Faulkner (Murray State, Epsilon Lambda '88) decided he wanted to coach football. Halfway through college, he changed majors to pursue a different route, but he never lost his desire to coach.



football for 10 years. Of the teams that he coached, one went on to win the high school state championship – the class of 2018.

Bobby Williams (Tennessee-Martin, Epsilon Sigma '77) was 17 years old when his father died, and his high school football coach became a father figure in his life. The impact his coach made was so profound that he decided he wanted to coach. too.

Williams served as an assistant coach at the high school level for 25 years. During that time, he experienced one losing season, coached in two state

In 2002, he became the head coach at Union City Middle School. As the feeder school for Union City High School, Williams coached the boys who would go on to win Union City's state championships in 2009, 2013, 2014, and 2017.

championship games, and coached at three different schools.

Although a middle school coach's main objective is to help players refine their skills and further their knowledge of the game, Coach Williams used his first team meetings to offer his players a different perspective.

This year, Coach Williams will complete his 41st year as a teacher and a coach, with plans to retire and work for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Darren Bowling started playing sports as a 6-year-old, falling in love with the competition. After his parents' divorce, sports became his escape, and his teams became part of his family. Bowling played every sport offered for both the love of sport and team.

"When I was in the 8th grade, my coaches started taking me under their wing, trying to guide me not just on the field or court, but in life. At that moment, I knew I wanted to be a coach and help young men like me who needed guidance and caring."

He attended Northeast Louisiana University (now the University of Louisiana at Monroe) on a track scholarship. Because of injuries, his track career was more short-lived than expected, but he found the family atmosphere he craved in Fraternity, meeting men he keeps in contact with today.

After college, Bowling started his own team - his family. He and his wife, Dawn, married in 1990. Three years later, at the age of 25, he became a head coach in Clarksdale, Mississippi, with the aspirations of coaching in college.

In 1996, his daughter, Meri-Morgan, was born with 1p36 deletion syndrome and would require every free moment he could give her. She does not walk or talk and has to be fed every meal, but Meri-Morgan is a source of inspiration to the Bowling family, teaching them about compassion and the importance of helping and caring for others.

Following the Tornadoes' second Class 1A State Championship in 2013, Coach Bowling was recognized as the 2013 [Tennessee] Titans High School Football Coach of the Year, an award for which he was nominated again in 2017.

"Each team I have coached has its own special story, but I thought it was interesting that this team was led by a group of seniors who have been coached from third grade up by Pikes. Their success was defined by team work, determination, and consistency, playing every minute as if it were their last – all the way down to the final play of the second overtime in their state 2A championship victory." ❖

A union's primary job is wages, hours, health and safety, and these will always be the core tenets of what we're doing. I think the challenging aspect is getting guys to buy into things and expecting that we can make changes and make a difference.

Some challenges come with technology. People expect things to happen much more quickly now and it doesn't always work that way. For example, wearable technology - it's an exciting topic and will be an interesting part of players' lives. It's a challenge to stay on top of the things that will affect our players.

We talk about the ripple effects of bad social media posts – is that something the league tries to educate players about?

100 percent. While our core tenets are typical, we're working with atypical people, so we talk about how "you are a brand." Social media posts are the same as answering an interview question from a media outlet. If you wouldn't say it in the interview, you shouldn't say it on Twitter. If you don't want it on SportsCenter, then reread it before you choose to post.

You're working with a group of your peers; but imagine the 18-year-old version of yourself, tasked with leading a group of his peers. Can you give him any leadership advice?

Don't undersell yourself. You were tapped and you were put in that position. The responsibilities of an organization can be perceived as overwhelming, but a lot of people believed you could accomplish those things. Write out and be comprehensive about what you want - what your goals are and what you believe is important. Then go out and talk about those things. That's what I've always tried to do. And say, "Okay, if I think this is important then I need to make sure everybody else at least knows about it and thinks it's important as well." There are always issues you may be looking at in a way that someone else isn't. Your personality drew people in, so be yourself. Sometimes we have a caricature in our mind of what a leader should look like or what a leader should be, and I don't think any of that is set in stone. People will base what they say, think, and do based on your words and actions. Like I tell my guys all the time - we have to lead from the front. There's no sticking your finger up to see which way the wind is blowing. We have to lead. You know you're going to make some mistakes, but you make them for the right reasons. Learn from them and move on. *

STEVE DETWILER

The Story of a Wonderdog

In the heart of California's Central Valley lies a regional school formally known as California State University-Fresno (colloquially, Fresno State), home to Iota Beta Chapter. Fresno State recently gained national notoriety for its three All-Star professional athletes who were voted by fans as the NCAA's top alumni trio of current NFL, NBA, and MLB stars: Derek Carr of the NFL's Oakland Raiders, Paul George of the NBA's Oklahoma City Thunder, and Aaron Judge of MLB's New York Yankees.

Before those athletes' rise to stardom, Steven Detwiler '10 and his Bulldog teammates put a little-known school from the Central Valley on the map by becoming the lowest seeded team in any major NCAA tournament to win a national championship at the 2008 College World Series (CWS) in Omaha, Nebraska. Not only was this the first national title for the Fresno State baseball team, it was the first national title won by any men's team in university history.



The Bulldogs entered the tournament as a number four seed, the equivalent to a 15 or 16 seed in the NCAA basketball tournament, in the Long Beach regional. On the path to the title, the team overcame six elimination games, stunning four national seeds (#3 Arizona State, #6 Rice, and #2 North Carolina).

The team started their championship run at 8-12 and finished the 2008 season as the number one team in the nation. Because of their underdog victory, the team was nicknamed the Wonderdogs.

Before the championship series, Detwiler was in the middle of a slump, hitting just four of 39 pitches in the NCAA tournament. But if you look back at any ESPN highlight from the championship, it's obvious that he was single-handedly responsible for Fresno State's final win against Georgia. He was 4-4 from the plate, had two home runs, batted in all six R.B.I.s, and caught the final out to win the game. And he accomplished all of this with a torn tendon in his thumb.

He was so instrumental in Fresno State's victory that when the 2008 CWS National Champions visited the White House, President George W. Bush gave Detwiler a shoutout during the champions' day ceremony, mentioning Detwiler's post-win quote, "It's mind over matter. The pain is temporary, the pride is forever."

He would get initiated into Iota Beta Chapter two years after his College World Series win, and his competitive drive was put to great use in the chapter as he participated in intramurals, philanthropy events, and held the fundraising chairman role-all before graduating in the spring of 2011.

It's been almost 10 years since Detwiler and his Bulldog teammates' big win, and he recently took some time to reflect on his championship memories and his time as an undergraduate member of PIKE.





Take us back to June 25, 2008. What was that like for you?

"Our goal the whole season was to win a regional title. Once we won the regional, we felt that our goal was accomplished. Then we had an opportunity to make a run at something special. When we actually got to the final game of the College World Series, we were just happy to be out there having fun. One memory that sticks out happened during the during the pregame batting practice. We were throwing balls to fans in the stands and talking to all of them. It was one of the biggest moments of all of our lives, and it was so free, loose, and fun. Everyone talks about how big games can tighten you up, but our group was laid back that the day felt like just another day that we were out there having a good time with the exception being we were allowed to give away some souvenirs before."

What helped you and your teammates become successful?

"We were having fun, and our group was close. The team had a lot of good guys, and the older guys were good role models by keeping it fun while maintaining a strong work ethic. The coaching staff was another contributing factor. They had faith in the team and wanted us to enjoy playing the game."



During your visit to the White House, President George W. Bush talked about your quote: "It's mind over matter, the pain is temporary, the pride is forever." Can you tell us about what that quote means to you and how it is a guiding principle in your life?

"That's something my dad always said. He had a rough childhood, and he overcame a lot. He was always a hard worker and sacrificed for my sister and me, and I knew that growing up. We didn't really have much - we grew up in Section 8 housing. He was 23 and my mom was 20 when I was born. My dad dropped everything he was doing to get a job. He always told me whenever something is rough, either physically or mentally, the pain is temporary. The pride is forever. You've got to get through the situation, grind, and bear down. When something's rough you dig in and get after it. I've applied that mentality to my entire life, including my decision to play during the College World Series. A tendon in my thumb was completely torn. Once my doctor told me that there was no way I could possibly do any more damage, I knew I had to finish the season. It was just pain, and pain goes away. I had the opportunity to do something special, and I wanted to do whatever I possibly could to give it a shot. To have President Bush say my name and my personal mantra was a surreal moment."

What or who influenced you to join Pi Kappa Alpha?

"I didn't join PIKE until my junior year, but I remember seeing a bunch of guys hanging out and having a good time. I ended up running into two guys in particular - one who is now my big, Josh Jackson '07, saw me from afar and introduced himself. The other guy, Miguel Paniagua '07, ended up being my new member educator. I had a great bond with both. Josh and I talked for two hours after he introduced himself. He was one of the most down-to-earth guys, and even though we had different upbringings, we were able to talk to each other, and I found a great relationship with him. I still talk to him once a week - he's one of my best friends."

How did the Fraternity help you along your path to success/get to where you are currently?

"When I was in the chapter, I was philanthropy chair. I always tried to find creative ways to make more money. I loved going out and talking to people, shaking hands, and getting to know others. The fundraising aspect of the role helped me get into what I'm doing now. I'm currently in sales, selling cargo blankets to help transport wine across the country. When I first graduated. I worked in sales for a minor league baseball team. I would say my position in the chapter impacted my career. I never had a job during college, and [serving in] that [position] was the first time I was doing something other than baseball that I truly enjoyed."



What advice do you have for current **PIKE undergrads?**

"Leadership positions create great opportunities. By holding a position, you get to learn about yourself while serving your brothers. I wish I could have offered more of my time to help the chapter. The friendships that you're making now will last forever if you commit fully to the experience. Fraternity life is much more than just having fun. It can teach a young man what he wants in life and help him learn about himself."

What part of your Fraternity experience do you carry forward in life?

"My favorite part of Fraternity life was seeing how men from different backgrounds could come together. There were times during meetings that we would have disagreements, but at the end of the meeting, we would always join together in a PIKE chant. We were able to have tough conversations and walk away still respecting

one another. I know I won't always see eve-to-eve with others, but I learned to appreciate other peoples' perspectives. Surrounding yourself with a diverse group of individuals, loving them for who they are, is something we should all get better about. It's a good practice for humanity."

What PIKE values do you still hold

"The four pillars. Study, educate yourself, and you'll be happier. Leadership - everybody needs a leader, and I try to lead in everything I do. Leaders don't lead by making people do things, they lead by example. Athlete – I think everyone should work to better themselves and maintain a competitive drive. Being a gentleman couldn't be more important. Respecting others creates a culture for younger generations to follow."

What is your favorite memory from your time as an undergraduate member of **Iota Beta Chapter?**

"All of the philanthropy events. I loved Kappa Kappa Gamma's softball event. We played 10 games against other fraternities, and the final game got pushed to a different day because it was too dark for us to play. Phi Mu's kickball tournament was the same day as the Kappa softball championship game. We won Phi Mu's tournament then went home, showered, changed, and went out and won the softball championship. It was a great day, and I will never forget it. It's right up there with Omaha in my books. I felt that same feeling of fullness. We took two trophies back to the house that night, and everyone was there celebrating. I was hesitant about joining at first, but rushing PIKE was one of the best things I've ever done for myself."



Detwiler currently resides in San Rafael, California, with his wife, Emma, and son, Easton. He works in sales at Protek Cargo and is currently the head varsity baseball coach at San Rafael High School. *



Leadership Lecturer

Jerry Corless (Memphis, Delta Zeta '12), President, Capital Financial Group

The Leadership Lecture Series highlights a prominent alumnus or community leader and gives them the opportunity to share some insight into what has led to their personal and professional success. Whether it is based in leadership principle and theory or acquired through trial and error, many of these experiences trace back to lessons learned as an undergraduate.

Brother Jerry Corless was born in St. Louis, Missouri and found his way to the Mid-South upon entering college at the University of Mississippi with a full academic scholarship. During his college tenure, Corless was invited to play football for Ole Miss as a walk-on for two consecutive years, during which time he received the University's Athletic Association Scholar Athlete Award. Additionally, he competed in the national powerlifting championship and achieved the AAU record for deadlifting. Corless was also invited to play for the Zurich Renegades American Football team in Switzerland – ultimately becoming team captain.

Even with all those accolades, academics were Corless' main priority in college. He tracked to earn four degrees in just seven semesters before channeling his focus on wealth management and graduating with a business degree in 1988.

Upon graduation, Corless joined New England Financial in Memphis, Tennessee as a financial advisor. In 2000, just two

years after graduation, he was named managing associate, participating in the growth and development of new advisors. Corless earned the coveted certified financial planner certificate in 2003, and later became managing partner of the firm in 2006. By the time Corless left New England Financial, he was credited with the much-increased growth of assets under management and the expansion from 10 advisors to 60.

In 2010, Corless formed Independent Planning Group, a privately-owned wealth management firm. In 2012, he accepted the managing partner role with the Partners Group, a general agency of Mass Mutual. From 2012 to 2016, the Partners Group grew from 25 advisors to 60, and revenue had increased by approximately 400 percent. Just this past summer, Corless' firm merged with Capital Financial Group, naming Corless 50 percent owner and managing principal. The firm, now co-headquartered out of Memphis and Nashville, has 140 financial advisors providing services in five states with just at \$2B in assets under management.

He is married to Cassie Corless, and they have four children: Manny, Gunnar, Paige and Bo. Corless enjoys time with his family, exercising, the outdoors and is huge fan of local high school Briarcrest and Ole Miss Football. He is an active member of Grace Evangelical Church, where he serves on the men's board.

A NEW HOME FOR EPSILON IOTA CHAPTER

■ psilon Iota Chapter at Southeast Missouri State ■ University has initiated nearly 2,000 members ■ since its founding on May 3, 1958. Five years later, in 1963, the chapter moved into its residence, the K Building.

Since that time, the chapter has gone on to receive numerous awards from the International Fraternity, including two Smythe Awards and a Raymond L. Orians Excellence Award.

In fall 2013, Greek student leaders on the university's campus worked together to increase student participation in Greek Life and an idea for a Greek Village was introduced. The university's Board of Regents approved the conceptual design for phase one in May 2015, calling for four houses to be move-in ready by fall 2017.

Sigma Nu and Sigma Chi moved in to their new houses in August 2016, while members of Epsilon Iota Chapter moved into their new home at 1436 Show Me Drive this fall. The official dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony took place during Homecoming weekend.

The house contains a beautiful parlor, a chapter room, and accommodations for 22 members, with expansion plans and financing secured to board an additional 10 members.



Epsilon Iota Chapter's House Corporation enlisted Pennington and Company for a feasibility study before launching the first capital campaign in chapter history, Building on Tradition: Foundation for Our Future. The campaign's \$600,000 goal will fund the construction of the new chapter house by repaying a construction loan and provide for the chapter's future by establishing scholarships for undergraduate members and a long-term maintenance program for the new facility.

The Traditions Campaign and construction of the new house have given brothers an opportunity to rekindle friendships across many eras. The chapter's alumni program has also taken this opportunity to improve the quality of its alumni communication, events, and record keeping.

Thanks to the generosity of 75 brothers, over \$500,000 has been raised. The house corporation is now focusing on increasing the number of participants in the campaign.

THETA LAMBDA CHAPTER RETURNS TO CREIGHTON

n Saturday, October 7, 2017, Theta Lambda Chapter was officially reinstalled at Creighton University.

Theta Lambda Chapter is located in the Great Plains Region and has over 1,100 lifetime initiates. The chapter was originally chartered on April 16, 1977, then fell silent in 2012.

The recolonization at Creighton University began on January 29, 2016 with the arrival of Expansion Consultants Zachary Leibold (California State-Sacramento, Theta Tau '10) and Joshua L. Atkins (Indiana-Southeast, Theta Kappa '11). Leibold and Atkins spent their first several weeks on campus meeting with faculty, staff, administration, campus leaders, and coaches, ultimately recruiting 80 men.

The colony faced adversity in the first deferred recruitment period, ranking third out of five fraternities during during formal recruitment. After submitting their petition to charter and receiving a recruitment visit from the International Fraternity staff, the colony recruited 21 new members in fall 2017, four times that of the next highest fraternity recruitment class. Theta Lambda Chapter was rechartered with over 100 members, making it the third largest fraternity on campus.

Teams from Gamma Beta Chapter (Nebraska), Iota Gamma Chapter (Nebraska-Kearney), along with Theta Lambda alumni and members of the International Fraternity staff took part in the initiation of the colony members.

Following the initiations, Theta Lambda Chapter was reinstalled by International Vice President Devang Desai (Miami, Gamma Omega '03), Director of Expansion Graham Jewell (Rockhurst, Kappa Epsilon '13), Colony Advisor Kenneth Westernburg (Nebraska-Omaha, Delta Chi '85), Director of Membership Growth Eduardo Maciel (California State-Fullerton, Mu Epsilon, '12) and Alumni Association President Rod Jewell (Creighton, Theta Lambda '77). The chartering ceremonies were followed by a banquet at the Hilton Hotel in Omaha. Nebraska. The event was attended by chapter members and their dates, parents, nearly 20 alumni of the chapter, and members of the university staff. Margaret Zimmer, assistant director of the university's Student Leadership and Involvement Center, spoke about her experiences working with the colony and their growth over the past year.

In his closing remarks, Chapter President Sam Garrett praised his brothers for their efforts and expressed his gratitude to the university and alumni for their support in the return of Theta Lambda Chapter to Creighton University.

COLORADO WELCOMES THE RETURN OF BETA UPSILON CHAPTER

n Saturday, January 20, 2018, Beta Upsilon Chapter was reinstalled at the University of Colorado.

The Colony at the University of Colorado began in fall 2016 with the arrival of Expansion Consultants Eduardo Maciel (California State-Fullerton, Mu Epsilon '13) and Jarrett Way (North Texas, Epsilon Delta '13). Maciel and Way spent seven weeks on campus recruiting leaders to become refounding fathers.

For the last 14 years, the University of Colorado IFC has operated independently of the university. With few resources, no university support, and a short list of potential members, Maciel and Way recruited over 110 men who finished their first semester with a 2.9 cumulative GPA. In their first semester as a colony. the group finished second overall in football intramurals and continued to implement programming as they assembled their petition to charter.

In fall 2017, the colony was approved for rechartering as Beta Upsilon Chapter after ranking in the top six in both GPA and membership size. The colony successfully implemented the True PIKE Experience member development program and recruited over 25 men during its first fall formal recruitment period.

The 110 colony members were initiated on January 19, 2018 in Boulder, Colorado by teams from Alpha Tau (Utah), Iota Alpha (Wyoming), Iota Gamma (Nebraska-Kearney), the Denver Area Alumni Association, the International Fraternity staff, and volunteers.

Following initiation, Beta Upsilon Chapter was installed by International President Shad D. Williams (Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '90), Chapter Advisor Brandon Kuhl (Eastern Illinois, Zeta Gamma '93), Director of Membership Growth Eduardo Maciel, and Director

of Educational Content & Strategy Jarrett Way. The chartering ceremonies were followed by a banquet at the Byron White Club at Folsom Field. The event was attended by chapter members, their dates, parents, alumni of the chapter, representatives of the IFC, and International Vice President Mike Riley (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '84).

The keynote speech was delivered by International President Williams. During his remarks. he pinned a Beta Upsilon president's badge on Chapter President Will Fagan. The badge was originally worn by Richard Dolberg (Colorado, Beta Upsilon '43), who entered Chapter Eternal in September 1997. Brother Fagan closed the evening with remarks about the relentless drive for improvement shown by the colony and his vision of continued growth for the new chapter. *

GAMMA THETA DOUBLES CHAPTER SIZE

Mississippi State Chapter Uses Revolutionary Recruitment Software ChapterBuilder

In summer 2017, all active chapters and colonies of Pi Kappa Alpha were given full access to ChapterBuilder, a \$500 value, at no cost to them. The Customer Relationship Management (CRM) software is designed to replace the traditional greenbook and Microsoft Excel spreadsheets for recruitment. Simply put, this software makes recruitment easy and is an important part of every chapter's recruitment program.

Less than three hours from Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters sits Mississippi State University, home of Gamma Theta Chapter. Founded in 1878 in Starkville, Mississippi, the university was originally named Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College. Two years later, the first university president was elected, and the university's doors opened on October 6, 1880, to 350 students.

Gamma Theta Chapter has enjoyed a long and resilient history at Mississippi State University. Chartered in 1927, Gamma Theta Chapter was the first national fraternity back on the university grounds after statewide anti-fraternity legislation was implemented in 1912 and lasted until 1926. As the pioneers of national fraternities in the state of Mississippi, the newly



installed men of Gamma Theta Chapter traveled to Oxford, Mississippi, only one day after their own initiation to initiate the men of Gamma Iota Chapter at the University of Mississippi.

Today, the chapter has enjoyed a 91-year partnership with Mississippi State University and recently experienced one of its best recruitment periods in chapter history. Led by chapter president Cody Conway '15 and their recruitment team, the men recruited 56 new members in just one semester, doubling the size of their membership. Most of their success is attributed to PIKE University education, help from alumnus Jay Fisher '88, and especially to ChapterBuilder technology.



Gamma Theta's recruitment team consists of the recruitment chairman and 17 committee members. In the end, the real recruitment team is the entire chapter since the 18-man committee cannot keep up with all potential new members and have a successful recruitment event without help from the entire chapter.


DOUBLING in membership size

Of course, Gamma Theta's recruitment success didn't happen overnight. They made numerous upgrades to their strategy including more preparation and the utilization of ChapterBuilder. "One of the most important improvements

was the ability to use ChapterBuilder to have members leave notes or comments on potential new members and use this additional information to pair them with chapter members who had similar interests," Conway said. "We were also able to keep our potential new member's information - phone numbers, hometowns, notes and comments from chapter brothers, and last known time of contact - well-organized and easily accessible. It was really easy for us to see who was interested in the Fraternity and who needed to be contacted again."

Because ChapterBuilder's software is compatible with the recruitment signup software used by most universitys' IFC,

the men of Gamma Theta Chapter were able to invite men to their house and their events before other fraternities could even get in contact with the potential new members.

The chapter also utilized the mass communication features available through ChapterBuilder which allowed them to send out hundreds of event invitations at one time.

"This was a great tool because we sent over 200 texts before school or formal recruitment even started. ChapterBuilder gave us the opportunity to leave a good first impression with everyone we wanted to recruit."

"If your chapter isn't utilizing Chapter-Builder, I recommend you start using it as soon as possible to see great success in recruitment."

All recruitment chairmen or chapter presidents (as reported on their roster) have been provided instructions to create their own personal chapter account. Once signed up, they can add members of their recruitment team, assign tasks, and add information on potential new members. If a chapter already has a standard ChapterBuilder account, their login and password remain the same. ❖

What was your most successful recruitment event?

"We had two extremely successful events over the past semester. The first event was over the summer in Memphis, Tennessee. We enjoyed a Redbirds baseball game and explored downtown with potential new members. Many of those potential new members ended up signing with PIKE because of the great time they had with us.

The second event was on the last night of formal recruitment. We invited potential new members to a formal dinner with the chapter and alumni. Our speaker, Jay Fisher (Mississippi State, Gamma Theta '88), made an amazing speech about the Fraternity and his life. The atmosphere was perfect and we had alumni of all ages present at the event."





Eta Omicron Chapter Pikes Reach Out to Help Houston

Hurricane Harvey inflicted at least \$125 billion in damage, primarily from catastrophic rainfall-triggered flooding in the Houston metropolitan area in late August 2017.

I attend North Monroe College Ministry and learned that they were hosting a disaster relief team in Houston during the university's fall break. I knew people in Houston needed help in their recovery efforts - I had seen that same need in close friends who had their homes flooded in Monroe. I reached out to Cody Albritton, the college minister at North Monroe Baptist Church. After speaking with chapter alumnus advisors, we decided to partner with the ministry in their efforts for disaster relief. Eta Omicron Alumni Association paid the registration for any members who wanted to attend.

I brought the project before the executive council and then to the chapter at a weekly meeting. Two brothers signed up with me: Chase Murphy '14 and Scott Coons '14.

I asked ULM's Student Government Association if we could take all the supplies raised from a hurricane relief drive with us. Chase would haul the supplies and other materials to Houston. We acquired sledgehammers, safety glasses, and gloves from a PIKE fundraiser. Items from the SGA included bleach, gloves, brooms, masks, shovels, paper towels, trash bags, and box cutters. Chase, Scott, and I brought other tools such as drills, saws, hammers, and crowbars for the team.

While there, we bought and cooked breakfast for the rest of the 18-person team. We stayed at Clear Lake Baptist Church on air mattresses and showered in a disaster relief trailer. On the first day, we worked at the home of an elderly man. We removed a low hanging ceiling, sheetrock, old water pipes, a bathtub, wallpaper, and nails from the studs. We replaced rotten window frame headers to allow installation of new windows. At another home, we built additional attic storage space.



On the second day, we worked with an active military man. Jason, his wife, daughter, and son lost their house in the flood to 50 inches of water. They were living in an RV in the front yard. While there, we finished half of the flooring in his home. Afterward, I assisted the other team in landscaping a yard at another house.

The trip was a huge success, and we built new relationships with families, friends, and the church at Clear Lake. It helped me remember that we are blessed with what we have and should not take it for granted. One man told us, "I always tell people to pass on kindness when I do them a favor. I thank you guys a million times." It was a remarkable achievement to see students working together to help change lives. I would love to do it again. *

Lambda Upsilon Brothers Aid In Hurricane Harvey

In less than a month, three Category 4 hurricanes made landfall during the historic 2017 Atlantic hurricane season. In the midst of devastation, Pikes nationwide have upheld their commitment to the True PIKE ideals. Many assisted in clean-up efforts, hosted food and clothing drives, and answered the call to serve wherever needed.

When Hurricane Harvey made landfall on the Texas Gulf Coast on August 25, 2017, with winds exceeding 130 mph, it became the first major hurricane to make landfall in the United States since 2005. By the time the storm had moved through. it made three landfalls and produced the largest rainfall total from a single storm in U.S. history.

Kyle Delino (McNeese State, Lambda Upsilon '16) was one of the many members located along the hurricane's path of destruction, but that didn't stop him from helping those around him.

"My family and I had already prepared for the storm, and we live in an area that drains really well. But, the city of Lake Charles, Louisiana, where I attend McNeese State University has a drainage problem. This caused an influx of people who were seeking sand to be bagged, but only a limited amount could be transported per vehicle. There was an abundant amount of sand in my town, so whenever I heard of a family whose home was at risk of flood, I headed to the local filling station and began to start bagging sand."

"The weather was rough during the process. There was already significant flooding, and I was rained on almost the entire time. It wasn't until the next morning that I realized the significance of what we had done the day before. We had saved a family's home from flooding. It was only one home, but it meant a lot to me because I grew up with this family. There was no better feeling than knowing how much the efforts of my family and me had positively impacted them. The physical pain and soreness from all of the hard work didn't compare to the feeling that came from the smiles and the family's gratitude."

"I helped them because it was something that needed to be done - not to advertise PIKE. But I feel honored to be a part of

a Fraternity and a chapter that strives to give back to the community out of the goodness of their heart. It really does show how important character is to Pi Kappa Alpha."

Two other members of Lambda Upsilon Chapter, Kory Kyle '16 and Brennan Taylor '16, volunteered in the community as well. The men knew their house was not in danger of the storm, and they had plenty of supplies to make a difference.

"We knew we were heading into a very dangerous situation, but it was an unforgettable experience," Kyle said. "We went to fire stations and police departments and helped transport people and equipment, and at one point we even met up with the National Guard. I'm glad we were able to help, and it really made me appreciate joining PIKE and the lifelong friendships I'm making." *



Survivor of deadly Minnesota bus crash wins \$100K scholarship during Big Ten title game halftime

South Dakota college student said what doctors did for him many years ago has inspired him to pursue being a neurosurgeon.

A college student from Minnesota, who years ago nearly lost his ability to walk because of a deadly highway crash, threw enough footballs into a giant soda can during halftime of the Big Ten Championship football game to win a \$100,000 scholarship.

Sawyer Stevens (South Dakota, Kappa Pi '16), a junior at the University of South Dakota, outdueled another contestant during the Dr Pepper 30-second showdown on December 2, 2017, inside Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis.

Stevens, who is studying medical biology and physics, was seriously injured in a school bus crash nearly 10 years ago in Cottonwood, Minnesota.

Four children on the bus did not survive. One of them was Stevens' 12-year-old brother, Reed. The driver of a van that hit the bus, Olga Franco, was convicted and given a 12½-year sentence.


In making his pitch for a chance to compete for the scholarship, Stevens wrote to contest organizers, "I believe that true happiness lies in a life devoted to helping others. I am ... working towards becoming a neurosurgeon. As a child, I was severely wounded in a motor collision and saw firsthand how



my surgeons gave me back the ability to walk and to live life again. My personal goal is to do the same for many others."...

The same competition was staged at the other four major conference championship games this season. ❖






WENTZ FUND SUPPORTS ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

 $B^{\prime\prime}$ Tother Charles "Al" Wentz, Jr. (Missouri S&T, Alpha Kappa $^{\prime\prime}$ Visited the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters this past January while in town to observe the 2018 Chapter Executives Conference. This visit followed up on his attendance at the 2016 New Orleans Convention where he established the Charles Alvin Wentz, Jr. Alpha Kappa Academic Endowment Fund through the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation.

This fund will make its first of many grants in 2018 to chapter members who excel academically at Missouri S&T. Brother Wentz chose the PIKE Foundation as his vehicle to create a legacy and tribute to his alma mater and his chapter by establishing a designated scholarship fund which will grant tuition-based scholarships to undergraduate brothers who perform at the highest academic level at the elite engineering school located in Rolla, Missouri.

Wentz received both his bachelor of science and master of science degrees in chemical engineering from Missouri S&T, formerly the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy. He later earned a Ph.D. in chemical engineering from Northwestern University and eventually a master of business administration from Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.

Professionally, he served as the associate dean of the Petroleum and Petrochemical College at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand. During his time in academia, Wentz wrote the books on both Occupational & Environmental Safety Engineering and Hazardous Waste Management. While in Memphis, he donated copies of both, along with solutions manuals, to the Harvey T. Newell Memorial Library. Brother Wentz went on to found and later retired as president of International Scientific Management, Inc. (ISM), a worldwide consulting firm.



Dr. Wentz attributes the success he has experienced to his education and feels strongly about giving back and furthering the educational experiences of students. His long-term commitment to Pi Kappa Alpha and his desire to see the men of Alpha Kappa Chapter thrive led him to establish this scholarship opportunity.





Work & Play With Dr. Brad Vickers

Founder, Owner & CEO of Southern Tradition Tailgating

uring football season, rivalries are all part of the fun. There is, however, one tradition that brings everybody together: tailgating. Brad Vickers (Delta State, Zeta Beta '94) is one of the many football fans for whom tailgating is a fundamental part of the game day experience.

"The buildup in excitement as people come on to campus to cheer for their favorite team is unbeatable," said Vickers.

Vickers fell in love with the experience after his first tailgate in 1994, his sophomore year. "Jeff Horn (Delta State, Zeta Beta '94) got us tickets to the University of Georgia at Ole Miss game. We had a blast in the Grove and the Circle, but that's when tailgating consisted of just a tent, a few tables, and chairs," Vickers said.

After completing his undergraduate and master's degrees at Delta State, he attended the University of Georgia to pursue his doctorate. "My time in Athens fully immersed me into the UGA culture and further strengthened my love of sport, mainly football and tailgating," he said.

Vickers, a professor at Mississippi State University, spends many a fall Saturday tailgating, and that is exactly what he was doing when inspiration struck. "I went to a game, and I was looking all over the Junction to find a TV so I could watch UGA play South Carolina," said Vickers. "I just started thinking there must be a better way to tailgate."

Enter Southern Tradition Tailgating, a convenient twist on a classic event. "I decided to purchase everything I would need for a top of the line tailgating experience and turn it into a tailgating company," Vickers said.

Vickers offers tailgating packages that include everything from chairs to tablecloths to TVs and music. The setup and take down is taken care of, giving football fans more time to get to the fun stuff—enjoying the game day.

It's not just the amenities that attract customers to Southern Tradition Tailgating, it's also the customer service. "We try to develop a personal relationship with all our customers," Vickers said. "It's more than a customer base, it's closer to family. My wife and I went to Nashville, Tennessee, and wound up seeing a couple of our tailgaters. We ended up hanging

out with them for several hours that night. You start to appreciate little things like that when you own a small business."

Though his company has been growing each year, it was not always smooth sailing. Southern Tradition Tailgating's first year was a rough one. "Our first season in 2009 was full of rainy weather. I think we only had two games that season where it didn't storm," said Vickers.

In fact, at Mississippi State's first SEC game during the 2009 season, a thunderstorm destroyed almost 70 percent of his equipment. "We were a brand-new company, a new concept in tailgating, and a thunderstorm about wiped us out," Vickers said.

The thunderstorm was not enough to stop him, though, and today Southern Tradition Tailgating serves football fans from Atlanta, Georgia, to Austin, Texas.

Vickers runs his business while maintaining his job as a professor at Mississippi State. Working two full-time jobs requires a lot of hard work, the value of which he learned during his time at Delta State.

Vickers, a swimmer, grew up going to swim meets in Cleveland, Mississippi. He caught swim coach Ronnie Mayers' (Delta State, Zeta Beta '71) eye, and Mayers began recruiting him. "As Ronnie was recruiting me, my mom was the one that really talked me into going to Delta State. It was the best decision she ever helped me make," he said.

"It was during college years that I truly learned that hard work pays off," Vickers said, and he has the awards to prove it. "I ended up being inducted into the Hall of Fame and named All-American for the Statesmen."

Vickers' time in he chapter also left an impression on him. "During PIKE initiation, I learned to never give up and the true meaning of integrity: doing what's right because it's right, regardless of who's watching," he said.

Delta State was not just hard work and lessons learned.

"At first glance, running the equivalent of three times around the globe sounds daunting, even bizarre," said LaForge. "But when you break it down over 41 years of running, it's a bit more comprehensible - a little more than 1,800 miles a year. I hit the 75,000 mark this fall."

LaForge began running seriously in the mid-1970s, but it was not with the intention of accumulating such high mileage. The running started when he moved to the Washington, D.C. area for his political career.

The so-called "running boom" was underway after elite runners like Bill Rogers and Frank Shorter captured the attention of Americans with their stellar performances in the Olympics and Boston Marathon. LaForge said he just got caught up in the running movement.

"The miles just accumulated as I trained and raced," he said. "I've kept a log since 1978, so I know where and how much I ran each day for four decades. Recently, my daughter Caroline and I were trying to recall what year our family took a certain trip. All I had to do was to consult my running log for the answer."

In his peak racing years, LaForge sometimes ran more than 3,000 miles annually, with the highest total of 3,300. Occasionally, he would put in 80-100 mile weeks in training leading up to a marathon. His marathon personal best of 2 hours and 40 minutes was set at the Mardi Gras Marathon in New Orleans in 1982.

And his commitment to running has allowed LaForge to test his physical fitness around the globe. A few of his favorite runs include the Great Wall and the Forbidden City in China, Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe, Marrakesh, Bermuda, Moscow, Hong Kong's Victoria Peak, Berlin, the Golden Gate Bridge, Baghdad, along the Seine in Paris, and all around the trails and parks of Washington, D.C.

"At 67, I don't race any longer, but I still run everyday, wherever I happen to be just not as fast or far," said LaForge. "The exceptions have been times when I was ill or under doctor's orders to refrain. I had a couple of streaks when I went eight years without missing a day. Since the late 1970s, I've missed only 159 days running."

Remaining physically active has always been at LaForge's forefront.

"Early on, I bought into the idea of a healthy lifestyle," he said. "Running is convenient, efficient and rewarding in many ways. It's a great physical activity, and it also serves to clear your mind and make your day more productive. It's good for the body and the mind, and provides both energy and relaxation."

And LaForge believes it's important for everyone, including college students, to include these health and wellness factors in their daily lives.

"College is a great time to establish healthy life-long interests and habits," said LaForge. "Whether it's intercollegiate sports, intramurals, occasional gym or pool workouts, or casual walks around campus and town — I encourage all students to make time for an activity of their liking."

"Running happens to be one activity I enjoy. It's not for everyone, but there is a healthy lifestyle fitness or recreational activity to suit everyone's interest and need. Staying active, including frequent aerobic activity, is a key to a healthy life, especially as one ages. And it is a priority that can and should start early in life. College is a great time to make the commitment. Even a small investment of time and effort to exercise can yield great dividends over a lifetime."

LaForge continues to show his dedication as a runner and as the tireless leader of Delta State University.

"Friends have sometimes joked that I'll go the distance or the extra mile," he said. "Perhaps I owe that to running."

It's not hard to imagine Phil Bennett (Rockhurst, Kappa Epsilon '08) on TV.

"I tried to pick up on some of the best practices of the best players and became more and more familiar with the pace of play," he said.

And he had to do it all while keeping his upcoming appearance a secret to friends, family and his employers, at least at first.

The filming itself, Bennett said, was a whirlwind – starting at 7 a.m., he said six episodes were shot in one sitting. It was a long day on set, but provided ample opportunities to prepare further.

"The entire morning was spent preparing for the filming of our episodes. We got to practice spinning the wheel, speaking into the microphones that we would be using, and did a few practice rounds on stage. During the afternoon, we began filming episodes back-to-back," he said. "It was great to see others on stage before I filmed – it helped calm my nerves a bit."

Bennett said all the time spent on set also afforded the chance to meet the show's two iconic hosts, Vanna White and Pat Sajak.

"Vanna stopped by while we were prepping to film our episodes. She was extremely sweet and offered several tips and words of encouragement to us all," he said. "My interactions with Pat were limited to those on stage while we filmed. We had



a few side conversations between commercial breaks, but nothing too major. He seemed like a kid at heart, and truly loved interacting with the contestants."

Contestants can't share the results of the show before it airs, but Bennett did say the experience was unforgettable – from knowing that his wife was supporting him in the audience, to realizing how small the studio feels, to getting his 15 minutes of fame, this time sans costume. And for any Hawks with buying a vowel on their bucket list, he said he's happy to offer advice where he can.

"I 10 out of 10 would recommend the experience to anyone and everyone that has ever thought about auditioning," he said. "It was an experience that I'll never forget. I hope to see lots of Hawks on the show in the future."



Rise and Decline: Where We are and What We Can Do About It examines six republics from Ancient Athens to the United States to show that the life of a nation depends upon the degree to which its citizens accept the nation's founding principles – its raison d'etre. The United States is in decline, but we can change things... if we will.

This is the third book from **Bruce Thatcher** (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '56). Thatcher and his wife, Carol, retired from their successful consulting firm and moved to the Texas hill country in 2007. He started History Speaks Today (www.historyspeakstoday. com), a project dedicated to bringing history's practical lessons to the attention of Americans and our leaders. The first two HST books are Adamant Aggressors: How to Identify and Deal With Them and Immigration: How To Avoid Its Perils and Make It Work.

Thatcher's mantra is "understanding history's lessons may not ensure making the best choices today or in the future... but it will make us better able to reject demonstrated bad choices and, thus, more likely arrive at better choices.


Pi Kappa Alpha was founded at the University of Virginia on March 1 in Room 47 West Range.

Gino Torretta (Miami, Gamma Omega '91) led Pi Kappa Alpha's achievements in sports during 1992 by winning the Heisman Trophy.



Titan of Real Estate, Ultimate Loyal Pike Joseph R. Brown Enters Chapter Eternal

Joseph Roy "Joe" Brown (Kansas, Beta Gamma '50) entered Chapter Eternal on December 19, 2017. He is survived by his loving wife of 63 years, Betty; niece Nancy Griffin; cousin Carol Woodward Healy; and thousands of brothers in Pi Kappa Alpha who have forever benefited from his wisdom and leadership.

He was born on May 20, 1930, in St. Louis, Missouri. His family later moved to Kansas City, where he graduated from Westport High School. His parents were Canadian, and Brown had dual citizenship until the age of 21. His father was employed with the Canadian Pacific Railway. By age five, he had been all over North America. Brown's worldly perspective was a lifelong attribute.

Brother Brown was initiated into Beta Gamma Chapter at the University of Kansas in 1950 and ultimately served the chapter as president. He continued his involvement with the Fraternity on a local level as president of the Kansas City Pi Kappa Alpha Alumni Club from 1959-61. He was on the board of his chapter's house corporation for over 25 years, serving as its president for over 10 of those years.

After Brown's graduation in 1954, he married Betty Jean Tudor, an Alpha Chi Omega from KU, whom he met in his senior year. One day short of being exactly four years younger, Betty ultimately received her degree in business administration while married. They had one son, Ronald Roy Brown (Kansas, Beta Gamma '79), who passed away in 1986.

Brown was an architect by education; but professionally he specialized in public utility financing, and the organization and management of major, public utility projects. He had a 41-year career with the Kansas City based firm, Black & Veatch, a worldwide provider of comprehensive services related to the design, engineering, economic analysis, and general consulting of all types of mining and public utility projects. Brown began with Black & Veatch when he was still an undergraduate in 1953. Ultimately, he started Black & Veatch Architects and

was president and CEO of that division when he retired in 1994. Brown oversaw projects on four of the seven continents, mostly in underdeveloped countries. He and Betty loved to explore the world. Later in life, their preferred method of travel was by ship, visiting all corners of the globe, often taking multiple cruises in a single year. Professionally, Brown was a member of the American Institute of Architects, the Kansas City Engineers Club, Construction Users Council of Kansas City, Water Pollution Control Federation, and the American Public Works Association.

For many years, he and Betty summered in the Kansas City area and wintered in Hillsboro Beach, Florida. From an extracurricular standpoint, Brown was a member of the Saddle & Sirloin Club for over 50 years, Rotary International, the Board of Governors of the American Royal (a major livestock show, horse show, and rodeo, held each

fall in Kansas City), and served on the local board of directors of the March of Dimes.

In 2013, the couple sold their home in Kansas to live full time in Florida. Brown became president of the Deerfield Country Club and ultimately became an officer and then president of their condo association. He also volunteered at Boca Rotan Regional Hospital and was a member of Lighthouse Point Yacht Club.

Brother Brown was extensively involved as a national officer of the Fraternity and Foundation. He served two stints on the Pi Kappa Alpha Housing Commission, now called International Real Estate Advisors, who are also the governing board of White Horse Holding Corporation (Pi Kappa Alpha's real estate division). His first term was from 1978-84 and the second was from 1997-2009. Brown was a Foundation trustee from 1986-97 and was the Foundation president from 1993-96.

Embracing the architect in him, Brown proclaimed that his true love was in chapter housing. After 2009, as real estate advisor emeritus, he attended many more White Horse meetings, almost always accompanied by his beautiful wife, Betty, who was, and still is, a Pike Dream Girl to us all. Brown's expertise played a significant role in the development of Pi Kappa Alpha's Model Facilities Program, which promotes smart fraternity house design that is in tune with the modern student housing market.

In recognition of his love for and service to Pi Kappa Alpha, he received the Fraternity's Loyalty Award in 1996. In 2004, the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation selected Brother Brown for induction into the Order of West Range. The Order of West Range recognizes advanced accomplishment and service to Pi Kappa Alpha; the induction ceremony, which takes place at International Conventions, allows undergraduates to rub elbows with the greats and envision the achievements to which they themselves may aspire. Brown was also recognized by the PIKE Foundation's Sabre and Key Society, a cumulative giving designation. He was a regular member of the President's Council, and established a significant bequest that will benefit PIKE University in perpetuity.

There are few Pi Kappa Alpha Conventions that the Browns did not attend. Past International President. Kevin Virta (Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83) said, "He and Betty were always a delight to see at Convention. The two of them had such a great relationship - something I always admired about Joe was the way he adored Betty (just as she adored him)."

Betty, too, had served on her chapter's house corporation, was president of her sorority's Kansas City alumni chapter, was their province [region] president, and also ultimately served on Alpha Chi Omega's national housing board for many years. Simultaneous with Brown's service on the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation board of trustees, Betty was on her foundation's board and had become its treasurer. It is rare for both spouses to serve their national organizations at the highest level, especially at the same time.

Brown's contributions to the Fraternity's work in the field of real estate is unparalleled and will be sorely missed. Chief Real Estate Officer Dan Corah (Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '83) said, "I keep hearing Joe's distinctive voice and picturing his big smile... My heart aches to think I will not see him again in this world."



MARCUS CLAY ALSPAUGH

(Vanderbilt, Sigma '64)



Marcus Alspaugh entered Chapter Eternal on October 27, 2017, after a distinguished career as a trial lawyer, advocate and friend of Pi Kappa Alpha.

He graduated from Cumberland Law School in 1971 and stood out unselfishly as an attorney and advocate for the poor and underrepresented, arguing successfully before the United States

Supreme Court (Erwin v. Westfall), numerous trial courts, and courts of appeal during his illustrious career. Brother Alspaugh served as president of the Birmingham Bar Association, president of the Alabama Trial Lawyers Association, and on many committees of the Birmingham Bar. His first love was always his family, his Fraternity and the land on which he celebrated life. 

Joining PIKE at Michigan State opened doors that, as a freshman college student, I couldn't have imagined opening for me. I formed bonds with brothers that have stood the test of time and are always growing stronger. I learned how to have a shared vision with over 100 chapter members and how to build and lead toward that vision. Not only that, but I saw how our chapter was able to positively impact the community, the university, and ourselves. That ultimately paid off in the form of two Smythe Awards; and the flame from those years continues to burn in me as a volunteer, business professional, husband, and father.

My PIKE experience has been so wonderful that it's the main reason I volunteer today: I want to provide an environment where today's college students can have similar experience and growth to what I had in the chapter. It also allows both entities, the AAB and the chapter, to hold each other accountable. This has been extremely important because communication between the chapter and volunteers is a two-way street. As far as working with the undergraduate men, it's important to try and build rapport and a relationship first. More than ever, it's also imperative that today's generation understand the core values of our Fraternity and how these values will shape them into better men.

I try to mentor them and each of their experiences, good or bad, into real world applications outside of the college environment. I spend time with the chapter president and executive board discussing how the Fraternity experience is a microcosm of life. Whether that means holding a friend accountable, leading a group of your peers, or developing new chapter programming, those skills are immediately transferrable to real life.

Fraternities at their core instill values in young men that aren't taught in today's education system. PIKE provides an opportunity for college men to become adult men, ready to take on the real world and deal with life with a broader perspective. I believe college men need volunteers and role models. Even though they won't say it, they are thirsty for knowledge and guidance in their lives. That's why I encourage anyone who is on the fence about volunteering to jump in and commit to it.
