In a grand sesquicentennial celebration of the Fraternity, nearly 800 undergraduates, alumni, and guests gathered in Richmond, Virginia, just an hour away from our founding site at the University of Virginia, for the 71st International Convention.

The historic four-day event was filled with celebration, education, and camaraderie as Pikes from all around North America worked together in the name of our great Fraternity.

One: The first day of the long-awaited celebratory Convention kicked off with a first-timers orientation led by Chief Real Estate Officer Dan Corah (Colorado State, Epsilon Theta '83). A room full of first-time attendees left knowing what to expect from Convention, from the legislative process to the resources available to them during the event, and how to make the most of their time as members of the Convention body. Legislative committee meetings ran

simultaneously with alternate programming for noncommittee members that included sessions on accountability, recruitment, health and safety, and maintaining a dynamic alumni advisory board. Concluding the day's business, attendees met their regional presidents and new chapter consultants.

"Richmond has played host to Pi Kappa Alpha in the past for some very important and momentous occasions: 1871, our very first Convention; 1874 at the Ford Hotel; 1907, our first biennial Convention at the Jefferson Hotel; and in 1968, a couple of blocks from here, the 100th anniversary at the John Marshall. I am confident that at the conclusion of this week, just like those very historic and prominent dates in our history, we will look back and future brothers will look back on this very Convention as having a tremendous impact of the future direction of our Fraternity," Executive Vice President Justin A. Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96) said, officially kicking off Convention, welcoming attendees to Richmond and setting the tone for the rest of the week.

The opening ceremony ended with the presentation of 46 Raymond L. Orians Chapter Excellence Awards to the chapters in contention for the highly coveted Robert Adger Smythe Awards. The night concluded with a welcome reception hosted at the Hippodrome Theater, a revival entertainment venue in downtown Richmond.

Two: The day started with the first legislative session. Delegation members certainly felt their place in history as they sat in front of their gold chapter placards signed by delegates from their respective chapters from many years prior. Reports were presented by international officers, including the State of the Fraternity report. Executive Vice President Buck shared the highlights from the year as well as the challenges that both PIKE and the Greek community have faced

since the last Convention.

The International Awards Luncheon soon followed where over 100 different chapters were recognized, and 40 different awards were presented including: 25-Man Commitment, Recruitment, Finance, and the Scholarship Cup. Another historic moment followed the luncheon, when Henry Waller Tazewell (Virginia, Alpha '18), great great grandson of Pi Kappa Alpha Founder Littleton Waller Tazewell, became an initiated member of our Fraternity. The ceremony was a very appropriate and special acknowledgement of our founding and the Ritual we still maintain 150 years after our founding.

The last event of the day, the International President's Banquet, kicked off with the presentation of the 2018 Loyalty Award. Foundation Trustee Mark A. Robertson (Southern Methodist, Beta Zeta '82) took the podium to recognize the 2018 Loyalty Award recipient Bruce A. Wolfson (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '71) who accepted his award and was met with choirs of praise and a standing ovation. The presentation of charters followed, recognizing our newly installed chapters: Theta Lambda Chapter (Creighton), Mu Sigma Chapter (Arkansas Tech), Gamma Pi Chapter (Oregon), Delta Psi Chapter (Maryland), Beta Upsilon Chapter (Colorado), Zeta Tau Chapter (Eastern Kentucky), Mu Tau Chapter (Northern Colorado) and Zeta Chapter (Tennessee). The evening concluded with a keynote by immediate Past International President Shad D. Williams (Oklahoma State, Gamma Chi '90).

2018 Model Initiate

Henry Waller Tazewell Joins his Great-Great-Grandfather's Fraternity

On the 150th anniversary of the Fraternity's founding, the Convention did something very special.

In March 1868, four men gathered in 47 West Range at UVA to form Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity.

They immediately voted in two close friends, and the founding is attributed to all six men

One of the two actual residents of 47 West Range, among those original four, was Littleton Waller Tazewell, a student from eastern Virginia. Over 100 years later in 1981, Epsilon Chapter at Virginia Tech discovered that the great-grandson of Tazewell, and also his namesake, was among the students. He was invited to be a special initiate of Alpha Chapter, which his ancestor had founded.

This year, another of Tazewell's descendants, Henry Waller Tazewell, the great-great-grandson of Littleton Waller Tazewell, was also initiated into Alpha Chapter. He is a recent graduate of William and Mary.

It is customary at Pi Kappa Alpha Conventions to have a "model initiation" ceremony so that all brothers can see this historic ceremony repeated for an honorary initiate. In this particular case, it was THE ceremony actually created by the great great grandfather of the initiate.

Henry Tazewell was named in honor of Littleton Waller Tazewell's grandfather who, in the 1770s, was a member of the Continental Congress in Philadelphia.

Tazewell remarked, "It is an honor to join the brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha here in Richmond at this historic Convention, celebrating 150 years of the exceptional work of this outstanding Fraternity.

One hundred and fifty years ago, my great-greatgrandfather, Littleton Waller Tazewell, lived in 47 West Range at the University of Virginia. Together with his roommate and four other classmates, these Virginia gentlemen

pursued an idea and created something unique on that campus.

He would be so proud today to see that thousands of young men have participated and built upon his legacy.

The Founders set a high bar for Pi Kappa Alpha, and their values underpin the culture of this organization – setting a standard that generations of PIKE men have upheld since 1868.

My family has a strong legacy in the state of Virginia. We stand on the shoulders of dedicated public servants and noble military leaders. The celebration of tradition remains a core of our family values which could not be better demonstrated than by joining the brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha at this important milestone. For a century and a half this Fraternity has brought together influential and forward-thinking men of their time, upholding the legacy of my ancestors and your founders alike. My father was honored to be initiated by Alpha Chapter in 1981. And I am proud to have the same honor bestowed upon me.

This Fraternity is an undisputed leader in the Greek world, and thousands of upstanding gentlemen are responsible for that.

What was a dream among those original Founders is as strong today as in 1868. I attribute that to everyone in this room and to the universe of Pikes everywhere.

Congratulations from the Tazewell family on 150 years of sustained brotherhood throughout North America. We Tazewells share your pride. My descendants will look forward to the success you will achieve in the next 150 years."

2018 Loyalty Award

Established in 1969, the Loyalty Award was created to annually recognize an alumnus who has displayed significant support to the Fraternity at either the local or international level.

2018 Loyalty Award presented to **Bruce A. Wolfson**

During the 2018 International Convention, Bruce A. Wolfson (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '71) was recognized with Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity's Loyalty Award for his service to the Fraternity and his community.

Wolfson has served as Foundation president, Fraternity international vice president, Fraternity assistant grand treasurer, and chapter advisor to Beta Pi, Iota Lambda (Columbia), and Gamma Rho (Northwestern) Chapters. He was the founding president of the Chicago Area Alumni Association and a founding member of the New York City and Beta Pi Alumni Associations. He currently serves as a Foundation Trustee.

Professionally, Wolfson serves as general counsel for Jaquar Growth Partners in New York and as an adjunct assistant professor of international relations at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs. He and his wife reside in Dobbs Ferry, New York, and have two adult children.



Three: After the second legislative session, Convention attendees had the opportunity to board buses for an hour-long trip to visit the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. The historic tour of campus began with a group photo on the steps of the Rotunda, a piece of Jeffersonian architecture that shares structural significance with Monticello and the Fraternity Memorial Headquarters in Memphis. Tennessee. After a quick lunch on the grounds, attendees were led through different stops including the Rotunda, Kappa Sigma's founding room, the Edgar Allen Poe room, 47 West Range (Pi Kappa Alpha's founding room), and the UVA Chapel where International Historian F. Anderson Morse (William & Mary, Gamma '76) taught attendees more about the background of our Founders. After a full afternoon of history and remembrance, some attendees returned to Richmond to attend a Richmond Flying Squirrels baseball game, while some members of the PIKE Foundation's President's Council made a trip to Thomas Jefferson's Monticello.

Four: The final day of Convention had an out-of-this-world beginning with the feature presentation by 2018 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient Air Force Colonel Michael S. Hopkins (Illinois, Beta Eta '88). Brother Hopkins chronicled his journey from growing up on a small farm to his time as a football player at the University of Illinois to becoming an astronaut and launching to the International Space Station in 2013. "Not everyone gets to be an astronaut," Hopkins said. "Find something you're passionate about and do that as well as you can". In addition to talking about his journey, he shared some of his experiences in space and credited the Fraternity with giving him a foundational approach to relationship building.

"The relationships that you build with your brothers are huge," he said. "That same kind of relationship is what you have to build at NASA. That commitment to each other is the same. You have to learn that sense of trust." The Fraternity would later find out that Astronaut Hopkins will be among the nine astronauts assigned to SpaceX's first operational mission to the Space Station - the first launch from American soil since 2011.

2018 Distinguished Achievement Award

Established in 1936, the Distinguished Achievement Award is presented annually to the alumnus member who has compiled the most distinguished resume in his vocation, profession, or field of public service. It is named after Elbert P. Tuttle (Cornell, Beta Theta 1917), a veteran who served in both World Wars, as Chief Justice of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals from 1961-68, and as a Senior Justice until his death in 1996. Under Tuttle's leadership, the Fifth Circuit became recognized as a leader in the fight against segregation.

Michael S. Hopkins Selected for 2018 **Distinguished Achievement Award**

At the 2018 International Convention, Air Force Colonel Michael S. Hopkins (Illinois, Beta Eta '88) was awarded the Judge Elbert P. Tuttle Distinguished Achievement Award.

Colonel Hopkins was selected by NASA to be an astronaut candidate in June 2009 as one of 14 members of the 20th NASA astronaut class and started training at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. He graduated from Astronaut Candidate Training in 2011 and launched from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan to the International Space Station in September 2013 as a member of the Expedition 37/38 crew.

During his 166 days aboard the International Space Station, he conducted two spacewalks, including one on Christmas Eve, and spent a total of 12 hours and 58 minutes outside of the spacecraft. He is currently assigned as a crewmember on the first operational mission of the new SpaceX Crew Dragon capsule which will launch to the International Space Station following an extensive test program.

Hopkins received a bachelor of science degree in aerospace engineering from the University of Illinois where he played defensive back for the university's football team, serving as team captain during his senior year, and was a member of Air Force ROTC. He was recognized as an ROTC distinguished graduate and commissioned as a second lieutenant before

receiving his master of science degree in aerospace engineering from Stanford University.

Before his NASA career, Hopkins was assigned as a space-based research officer, a space technology program manager, chief for C-130 operations engineering, and flight test

engineer for a U.S. Air Force-Canadian Forces Personnel Exchange Program.

In 2002, he was selected as an Olmsted Scholar by the George and Carol Olmsted Foundation and completed six months of language training at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California. As part of the program, he moved to Parma, Italy, following completion of the language training in 2003, where he studied political science at the Università degli Studi di Parma.

> Upon his return, he received an assignment to the Pentagon where his roles included project engineer and program manager for the United States Air Force Rapid Capabilities Office. In 2008, Hopkins was selected as a special assistant to the Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, where he worked until he commenced astronaut training.

> Hopkins' personal decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Aerial Achievement Medal, two Air Force Commendation Medals. and three Air Force Achievement Medals. ❖

Brother Hopkins would receive his Distinguished Achievement Award later that day.

The morning continued with more legislative committee meetings and the volunteer awards reception honoring the Fraternity's top volunteers. This reception featured the presentation of Alumni Advisory Boards of the Year, William R. Nester Alumni Association of the Year, Volunteer Service Milestones, the Outstanding Young Alumnus Awards, and the Chapter Advisor of the Year Award.

Later, undergraduates had their second consultant portfolio meeting, leading into the PIKE University Leadership Luncheon. This luncheon included remarks from 2018 Distinguished Achievement Award Recipient Col. Mike Hopkins following a presentation of the 2018 Robertson Most Outstanding Undergraduate recipient Jon A. Reesman Jr., (Tennessee, Zeta '18) (see story on page 43), Order of West Range inductees



(see story on page 40), and φφκα Club recognitions.

Later that afternoon, attendees filled the room for the final legislative session, bringing the rigorous legislative process that had taken course over the entirety of the event to a close. The nominating committee ended the meeting with the presentation of our new Supreme Council including the appointment of new International President Mark C. Dziatczak (Wayne State, Delta Nu '91). The room exploded in applause, all in support of the newest era of leadership championing another 150 years of our beloved Fraternity.

The final general session ended the programming of the Convention with a PIKE Health & Safety presentation led by Director of Health & Safety Kim Novak. In this session, Novak engaged participants in dialogue about the three strategies for establishing health & safety in chapter operations: ensuring our

members understand expectations, the development of interventions to make it easier for members to meet those expectations, and the capacity to enact accountability protocols when needed.

A fitting Convention farewell, all international officers once again traded their suits and ties for white dinner jackets, bow ties, and sashes of garnet and old gold for the traditional Duck Walk. Attendees waved their commemorative rally-towels as each officer made his way to the head table, and the new Supreme Council was announced for the first time. The highly-anticipated presentation of the 2018 Robert Adger Smythe awards followed dinner, accompanied by roaring applause as each recipient chapter cemented its new or continuing legacy among the premier chapters of Pi Kappa Alpha.

As a culmination of this historic event, Immediate Past International President Shad Williams took the pleasure of introducing and pinning Mark Dziatczak as the newly elected Pi Kappa Alpha international president.

International President Dziatczak took the podium to deliver his address making remarks reminiscent of the family we have in Fraternity. "In this Fraternity, your brothers believe in you so much that you start to believe in yourself, in

Most Outstanding Young Alumni Awards

The Most Outstanding Young Alumnus of the Year Award recognizes alumnus members under the age of 35, and awards up to nine young alumni for their professional accomplishments, contributions to their communities, and involvement as volunteers for Pi Kappa Alpha.

RYAN C. COLLETT (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04)



Rvan Collett has made his commitment to PIKE a significant aspect of his life. In his final year of college, he served on the Fraternity's Supreme Council as an undergraduate vice president. He then spent the

next four years in Memphis, Tennessee, working as a member of the International Fraternity staff as the director of expansion, establishing over 30 new colonies and chapters and initiating over 2,000 men.

For the past seven years, he has worked for Cerner Corporation in Kansas City, Missouri, as a strategic client executive, selling electronic medical records to large health systems. In his top performance year, he eclipsed \$40 million in sales.

While in Kansas City, Collett has actively continued his involvement with PIKE. He currently serves as president of the Kansas City PIKE Area Alumni Association as well as the recruitment advisor for both Alpha Omega Chapter and Beta Gamma Chapter (Kansas). He recently served on the PIKE 150th Anniversary Planning Committee, has been an advisor to the International Fraternity's directors of expansion, and has presented at PIKE University leadership training events. In addition, while traveling across the country for Cerner, he regularly visits local chapters and provides recruitment presentations and Fraternity best-practice consulting.

TIMOTHY M. HARRIS (Arizona State, Delta Tau '06)



Tim Harris is CEO & Creative Director of Insight Public Relations, a Sacramento-based communications agency focused on leveraging strategic communication strategies to grow new business, position

companies to attract talent and align teams.

Since founding the agency in 2012, Harris has worked with clients ranging from regionally-based startups and established organizations to national brands. In 2015, he was recognized as a 40 Under 40 Award Recipient by the Sacramento Business Journal. His experience ranges from consulting to the hands-on design and implementation of communication strategies built to unlock growth opportunities and strategically position the products, services, thought leaders and companies he serves.

Over the last two years, Harris has focused his approach to specialize in the complex needs

and issues surrounding the construction, professional services and technology industries. Through his work, both as a consultant and marketing lead with D. Brown Management, he has worked to better understand the complexities and value associated with unlocking the talent challenges that currently face contractors.

BOBBY BROOKE HERRERA (New Mexico State, Kappa Eta '09)



In addition to his bachelor's degree, Bobby Brooke Herrera holds a master's degree in theology from Harvard Divinity School and is currently a Ph.D. candidate at Harvard University's T.H. School of

Public Health. He is on schedule to complete his doctoral work in three years, the fastest ever for Harvard's immunology and infectious disease program.

As part of his dissertation research, he has made substantial and lasting contributions to the field of virology. His work focuses on developing diagnostics of two viruses, Zika and Dengue, that are threats to human health. There is a lack of quality diagnostic tools for these two viruses, and the current methods are costly and slow which can hinder efforts to control and treat these diseases. Herrea developed a novel diagnostic that not only detects both viruses within an hour, but can be done efficiently and for low cost. In addition, his test can distinguish which disease is infecting someone.

Herrera has also greatly improved the medical community's knowledge of Zika virus epidemiology, with studies that show transmission of the virus in Africa, which was previously unknown. He has published five academic papers with another two submitted for publication. After his Ph.D. is complete, he will complete a postdoctoral fellowship to further study Zika and Dengue.

ANDREW HORN (Virginia Tech, Epsilon '06)



Andrew Horn is a Brooklyn-based social entrepreneur, writer, and activist. He is a Global Shaper at the World Economic Forum, was selected for Startup-Boost's 33 Under 33 list in 2017 and received the

Washington D.C. Mayor's Community Service award at the age of 23.

One year after graduating from Virginia Tech, he started an award-winning children's nonprofit, Dreams for Kids DC. In three years, he established the organization as one of the premiere adaptive athletic providers in Washington, D.C. He was able to build a succession plan and stepped down in 2011 to start another nonprofit venture, AbilityList, which FastCompany called a "Craigslist for people with disabilities." Both organizations are still operating. and he serves as an honorary chairman.

In 2014, Horn launched Tribute.co, which The New Yorker recently called "Hallmark 2.0." Tribute makes it easy to create a collaborative video montage you can give as a gift on any important occasion. He is on a mission to spread gratitude and meaningful connection in the world and is responsible for 100,000+ Tributes since launching. Tribute closed a \$1.2 million seed round in 2016 and is planning large-scale expansion.

He writes and speaks frequently on communication, finding purpose through service, and meaningful human connection. He has been interviewed, quoted, and profiled on the Today Show, CNN, Fast Company, CBS, Fox News, US News, The Washington Post, DailyWorth, and is a frequent columnist for MindBodyGreen, Huffington Post and TheMuse.

BO M. MACHAYO (Wake Forest, Gamma Phi '10)



Upon graduation, Bo Machayo moved to Washington, D.C. to work on human rights issues for Congressman Frank Wolf. He then became a fellow for Organizing for Action, President Barack Obama's

Political Action Committee. Following his tenure with Organizing for Action, he was selected as a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Policy. In December 2013, he became a legislative correspondent for Senator Kristen Gillibrand. There, his work focused on foreign policy, education, labor, and health care. Recognized for his outstanding work, he began working for the Department of Homeland Security. In this role, Machayo assisted the Chief of Staff in coordinating efforts to advance collaboration between DHS departments/agencies, the White House, the news media, members of Congress, industry executives, labor organizations, local governments, foreign embassies, and missions. His assignment at the Department of Homeland Security caught the eye of President Obama and in May 2016, Machayo joined the White House as the principal deputy associate director of public engagement. In this role, he managed President Obama's environmental policy initiatives and was tasked with engaging with diverse stakeholders across government agencies to enhance and establish domestic and international climate change, energy, and environment framework.

After leaving the White House in January 2017, Machayo briefly served as a strategic advisor of external engagement at the U.S. African Development Foundation where he supported African-led, African-driven development solutions via catalytic financial investments and local technical assistance to African grassroots communities and local enterprises. Today he serves as chief of staff to Loudoun County Board of Supervisors Chair, Phyllis Randall.

He received the distinction of a Global Shaper by the World Economic Forum and is currently the curator for Washington D.C. Hub I. He graduated from Wake Forest University with two bachelors degrees in economics and international politics & affairs, and speaks three languages. Inspired by his background as a first-generation African American with parents from Uganda and Kenya, he has remained involved, serving in organizations including a nonprofit organization he co-founded, Global Inheritance. For the past four years, he has enjoyed coaching elementary and middle school girls' basketball. He also serves as a mentor to youth throughout Loudoun and Fairfax counties.

PARKER L. RAMSDELL (Texas, Beta Mu '04)



Following graduation, Parker Ramsdell turned down lucrative job offers and instead moved to Glendale, Arizona, to teach social studies and reading to underprivileged middle-school children

through Teach for America. After a two-year tenure with Teach for America, he went to Capitol Hill where he served as a legislative correspondent for Congressman Tom Perriello. In 2011, he was a Regional Field Director for soon-to-be President Obama's campaign. Simultaneously, Ramsdell coordinated the first-ever Unified Sports Experience, 23 athletic competitions providing over 900 opportunities for people with and without intellectual disabilities to compete together as teammates, which generated over \$127,000 in donations.

Today, he continues working with children through a youth-oriented golf organization, The First Tee, and coaching swimming at a swim club and a high school. Professionally, Ramsdell works at Perfect Sense, full-service product company, and leads their mission projects supporting a variety of different non-profit organizations.

JOSHUA RONK (Virginia Commonwealth, Lambda Chi'10)



Joshua Ronk started volunteering with Lambda Chi Chapter in 2011 as chairman of the alumni advisory board and as the education advisor. Although he lives in northern Virginia,

nearly an hour and a half away from the university, he attends chapter events several times a month. He was also a founding member of the Lambda Chi Chapter Alumni Association and currently serves as its director of communications and secretary, and he transitioned into the role of chapter advisor last fall. In addition to his own involvement with the chapter, he has been able to consistently recruit other engaged alumni.

Shortly after taking on the roles of chairman and education advisor, Ronk enlisted as vice president of the house corporation, serving alongside the board as they have navigated the process of acquiring chapter housing. His support has ensured a successful relationship between the chapter, property owner, and the house corporation.

Outside of Lambda Chi Chapter, Ronk has served on initiation teams for various other chapters and serves on Mu Rho Chapter's (Christopher Newport) alumni advisory board as education advisor. He was also a founding member of Mu Rho Chapter's alumni association and currently serves as alumni association director. He is the vice president of communications and the secretary for the National Capital Area Alumni Association (NCAAA).

Professionally, Ronk works as a legislative assistant in Washington, D.C. for Congressman Mike Rogers, a senior Republican member serving on the House Armed Services, Homeland Security, and Agriculture Committees.

JONATHAN A. SAPERSTEIN (Texas, Beta Mu '07)



Jonathan Saperstein is the CEO and owner of Tree Town USA, the country's largest tree producer and one of its biggest nurseries. The company employs over 1,500 people and grows 4 million trees and 18 million

shrubs and perennials in 16 growing facilities in California, Texas, and Florida with clients including landscapers and retailers like Home Depot.

During college, he spent summers and other breaks working at the company. He started working at Tree Town USA full time after graduating in 2010, and by age 27, purchased the company from his father. He immediately started executing a strategic plan which called for \$10 million in improvements. He also hired a new chief financial officer and human resources director and implemented a system of merit-based bonuses for his employees. Acquisitions and improving the company's manufacturing process were next on his list. In addition, he leads the company's philanthropic efforts, continuously promoting community outreach and offering support during disasters such as Hurricane Harvey and Irma.

In 2017, Saperstein was named to Forbes' 30 Under 30 list for manufacturing and industry. He also received Ernst & Young's Entrepreneur of the Year 2018 Gulf Coast Area Award this lune.

DAVID D. SOETEKOUW (Alabama-Huntsville, Theta Pi '06)



As vice president of the Huntsville Area Alumni Association, David Soetekouw played a critical role in ensuring the success of the association's Sesquicentennial Founders Day celebration at the U.S.

Space and Rocket Center. He built the event website, developed the logos and other promotional materials, managed registrations, arranged the Founders Day luncheon, ordered and distributed commemorative items, and developed the banquet slide show. He also solicited applications and convened a scholarship selection board. Soetekouw's preparations culminated in a banquet with 300 guests in attendance.

In addition to his contributions to the Huntsville Area Alumni Association, he serves as the Chapter Advisor to Theta Alpha Chapter (North Alabama) and attended a PIKE University Leadership Summit with the undergraduate members. Prior to entering his current role, he was a three-time appointee of California Governor Jerry Brown and previously served as legislative affairs director for DGS, legislative and intergovernmental affairs deputy director for the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz), and senior permit assistance specialist at GO-Biz. He also served in several capacities at the California Department of Toxic Substances Control. Prior to entering public service, Sturmfels worked in several leadership positions in the hospitality industry for both Marriott International and Larkspur Hotels and Restaurants.

In addition to his public-sector roles, he currently teaches for the California State University's Master's in Public Policy and Administration program. Sturmfels also serves as chair

CONTRASTING NARRATIVES: A TALE OF TWO FRATER NITIES

As Pi Kappa Alpha celebrates its sesquicentennial, Fraternity and chapter leadership will be critical in charting the course for the next 150 years.

Over the past 12 months, Pi Kappa Alpha hosted over 75 chapter, regional, and national events with over 7,000 attendees celebrating 150 years of Friendship on a firmer and more lasting basis. Over time, the Fraternity has persevered and grown

through world wars, generational and cultural changes, depressions, recessions, and pressures on college campuses that have threatened its existence from the very beginning. An organization which pre-dates 93 percent of the Fortune 500 companies, 68 percent of its host institutions, 70 percent of fellow Greek organizations, and all four major professional sports leagues did not get to where it is today without recommitting over time to its core principles; benefiting from its tremendous undergraduate and alumni leadership; and understanding the need to evolve in order to become better and meet the needs of its current membership and reaffirm its place in the broader society.

As Pi Kappa Alpha embarks on its next 150 years, it sits squarely in one of its most harrowing times, and the need to evolve will be critical.

Over the past year, and more broadly the past Convention cycle, Pi Kappa Alpha

and the Greek industry at large have seen increasing challenges to single-sex standings; cost prohibitive Greek "taxes" imposed by host institutions; increased federal and state legislative efforts; campus-wide suspensions/moratoriums (over 30 in the past year); an increase in deferred recruitment (now affecting 20 percent of chapters); zoning challenges posed by local municipalities; and increasingly aggressive negative publicity. Specifically, Pi Kappa Alpha has experienced its share of disciplinary challenges including 11 suspended chapters in the past academic year (an all-time high) - nine of which were brought on by hazing; its lowest undergraduate count since 2009; over \$850,000 in out-of-pocket legal and liability costs - six times the trailing 10-year average; and its first-ever criminal indictment brought on by the former members of the now suspended chapter at the University of Houston.

These factors might cause one to question whether Pi Kappa Alpha is positioned to survive the rest of this decade, much less the next 150 years. However, it is important to provide the other side of the story, a contrasting narrative, which far too often goes unreported.

• PIKE HAD ITS THIRD HIGHEST YEAR IN INITIATIONS in the Fraternity's history, and installed eight new chapters along with seven new colonies. PIKE's total undergraduate count remains the

fourth highest of over 70 inter/national men's organizations.

- OVER 2,800 MEN ATTENDED VALU-ABLE LEADERSHIP PROGRAMMING through PIKE University and over 40 chapters have successfully piloted the Fraternity's comprehensive membership development program, The True PIKE Experience.
- OVERALL FINANCIAL OPERATIONS REMAIN STRONG, with 99 percent of chapters meeting financial commitments this past year with some nominal budget surpluses being directed to the digitization of *The Garnet & Gold; The Oak;* and the initial steps in digitizing individual chapter histories for all Pikes to enjoy.
- 87 PERCENT OF CHAPTERS CONTINUE TO BENEFIT from an accredited chapter advisor while over 81 percent maintain a full alumni advisory board.
- PI KAPPA ALPHA WAS RECOGNIZED
 with five first-place recognitions via
 the Fraternity Communications Association for excellence in fraternal
 communication.

Four Notable Alumni Inducted at 2018 International Convention







Col. Frederick A. Crow Jr. (USAF, Ret.)

James J. Chaffin Jr.

Dr. Daniel F. Mahony

The Order of West Range was established in 1986 to recognize outstanding alumni for achievements in their careers, service to society, and/or service to Pi Kappa Alpha.

Alumni representing military service, business, sports and many other fields have been selected for induction into this special Order. Pi Kappa Alpha was honored to welcome these four gentlemen into the Order of West Range at the 2018 International Convention in Richmond, Virginia. Two more will be honored at the 2019 Chapter Executives Conference.

COL. FREDERICK A. CROW JR. (USAF, RET.) (Cornell, Beta Theta '48)

Col. Crow is the most highly decorated Cornell University alumnus of the Vietnam era. His service began at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on December 7, 1941. His father was an officer aboard the USS Oglala. After witnessing the Japanese attack, Crow served as bicycle messenger on the naval base before enlisting in the United States Army Air Force in 1944. Following the war, he completed high school and matriculated at Cornell. He graduated in 1951 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force, earning his pilot wings in June 1952. Crow was a leader throughout his military career and was chosen for cutting edge assignments in fighter squadrons and a joint assignment with the Army's 82d Airborne Division. During his 30 years of service, he deployed in support of the Bay of Pigs Invasion, the Berlin Crisis and the Cuban Missile Crisis. He is most remembered for his service in the Vietnam War. From 1967-73, Crow was held as an American POW in the Hanoi Hilton. While he was leading a squadron attack into heavy anti-aircraft

fire his F-4C Phantom was shot down by a missile near Hanoi on Easter Sunday 1967. He was captured, tortured, and imprisoned in solitary confinement for three of his six years in captivity. He was one of the most senior officers in captivity and renowned for his daring efforts to maintain communications between prisoners. He was awarded two Silver Stars for gallantry in action, a Legion of Merit for his resistance to the enemy, and two Purple Hearts for wounds received. Prior to being shot down, he was awarded two Distinguished Flying Crosses and 22 Air Medals. Upon his repatriation in March 1973. Crow continued to serve until his retirement in October 1981. At the time of his retirement, he was the most highly decorated officer on active duty in the Air Force. Crow was married to the late Mary Morrison Crow for 65 years. They had four children, the late Cathryn Gilmore and sons Frederick III, Jeffery and Patrick. He resides in Annapolis, Maryland.



JAMES J. CHAFFIN JR. (Virginia, Alpha '63)

Brother Chaffin is one of the most accomplished real estate and land development professionals in the United States. As president and co-founder of Chaffin/Light Associates his leadership has resulted in a number of high profile projects throughout the U.S., including Snowmass Village and the Roaring Fork Club in Colorado; Balsam Mountain Preserve in North Carolina; and Callawassie Island and Spring Island in South Carolina. His work on Spring Island has won many awards for sustainable development. Chaffin is still involved with real estate, with more focus on consulting and investments. Much of his time is spent volunteering for the University of Virginia, the Urban Land Institute (past chairman), and the Heritage Classic Foundation. His volunteer resume at the University of Virginia includes serving as chairman of the Arts and Sciences Foundation and a six-year term on the Alumni Council. Most recently, Chaffin served as president of the Thomas Jefferson Society. Chaffin and his wife, Betsy, live on Spring Island in Okatie. South Carolina and have two grown children.

DR. DANIEL F. MAHONY (Virginia Tech, Epsilon '84)

Dr. Mahony became Winthrop University's 11th president on July 1, 2015. His first major accomplishment was the establishment of the Winthrop Plan, Winthrop's strategy to become a national model for a student-centered university experience. Prior to Winthrop, Dr. Mahony served for seven years as dean of the College of Education, Health, and Human Services at Kent State University. He also spent 13 years as a sport management faculty member and administrator at the University of Louisville. He is an active researcher in the areas of sport consumer behavior and intercollegiate athletics and has published more than 60 articles in various reference journals, several book chapters, and one book. He has won national awards for his research and work as an administrator. Additionally, he is a member of West Virginia University's Hall of Fame at West Virginia University and received a diversity award at Kent State University. which is now named for him. Dr. Mahony earned a bachelor's degree in accounting from Virginia Tech, a master's degree in sport management from West Virginia, and a Ph.D. in sport management from

Ohio State. He and his wife, Laura, and children Gavin and Elena live in Rock Hill, South Carolina.

THOMAS J. TURNER* (Texas Tech, Epsilon Gamma '67)

Brother Turner unremittingly served Pi Kappa Alpha for 50 years. His commitment included service as a chapter advisor to Epsilon Gamma Chapter. long-term service to the chapter's house corporation, and appointment as Lone Star regional president from 1977-80. Turner applied his legal talents to assist the Fraternity from 1980-84, serving two terms as legal counsel to the Supreme

Council. He was elected national vice president in 1984 and again in 1988. At the conclusion of his second term as vice president, he became a trustee of the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation, serving two terms from 1988-92 and 1998-99. In 1992, Turner was elected national president and served in that position until 1994. He was appointed to three convention nominating committees, acting as chairman for two. He also served on the International Alumni Commission for nearly 10 years. He received his law degree from Baylor University, and practiced as a partner with Turner and Jordan, P.C. until his retirement in 2015. He found a passion as a trial lawyer, representing those in need. Turner had 37 years of trial experience, upholding his mantra to represent injured and aggrieved persons one case at a time. He reveled in helping people who had suffered a wrong and in representing individuals who had disputes with bigger, more powerful opposition. Turner possessed a true servant's heart, giving to his family, friends, church, clients, and numerous other organizations and communities. Locally, Turner volunteered on several nonprofit charitable organizations, including the Lions Club, the Rotary Club, Family Outreach, Meals on Wheels, United Way, and CASA of the South Plains.

Saver won the Kentucky Derby in 2010 and Always Dreaming won in 2017. Three of his horses, Rags to Riches (2007), Palace Malice (2013), and Tapwrit (2017) are Belmont Stakes winners.

Following graduation from the University of Arizona in 1989, Pletcher officially began his career with Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas in New York as a foreman. He worked with Lukas until taking out his trainer's license in December 1995

and saddled his first winner, Majestic Number, in February 1996.

He lives in Garden City, New York, with his wife, Tracy, and their three children.



MICHAEL P. WHAN (Miami University, Delta Gamma '84)

Whan is the eighth commissioner of the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA). He

is credited with both revolutionizing and globalizing the sport of women's golf and is currently guiding the LPGA through a period of unprecedented growth in both scheduling and tournament purses.

He developed a passion for golf at a young age, cutting greens and caddying to earn money. Before committing to

pursue his passion for sports, he started his business career at Procter & Gamble rising through the ranks. After Procter & Gamble, he worked at the Wilson Sporting Goods Company. He then served as vice president of marketing at TaylorMade Golf Company. What is the φφκα Club?

The φφκα Club is a donor giving club for student members of Pi Kappa Alpha; annual recognition for this donor club coincides with the academic year - July 1 to June 30. Student members of PIKE can join the φφκα Club by donating \$25 to the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation annually. The donor receives a donor lapel pin, embossed sport band and certificate; as well as recognition in the Shield & Diamond and on the Fraternity's website. Each member of the φφκα Club will receive a φφκα Club ribbon to wear with his nametag at PIKE University events.

What is φφκα Club 100% Recognition?

PIKE chapters can receive discounted recognition as a $\phi\phi\kappa\alpha$ Club 100% Participating Chapter when all members of the chapter donate \$20 to the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation annually. In addition to the recognition items received by the individual donors, the chapter receives recognition in the *Shield & Diamond* and on the Fraternity's website. The chapter also receives an annual award presented at the International Convention or Academy.

How are donations to the φφκα Club used?

Contributions to the $\phi\phi\kappa\alpha$ Club are restricted donations to benefit the donor's chapter. The Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation has established a Chapter Endowment Fund for each chapter. Donations to the $\phi\phi\kappa\alpha$ Club are deposited into the endowment fund of the donor's chapter. When the Chapter Endowment Fund is fully funded (\$10,000), the endowment will provide grants to the chapter's PIKE *University* Scholarship Fund to assist with registration for PIKE *University* events. A \$10,000 endowment typically generates an annual award of \$300-\$500, or 3-5 percent of the fund balance.

How are Chapter Endowment Fund scholarships disbursed?

The PIKE Foundation transfers awards generated from Chapter Endowment Funds to the chapter's PIKE *University* Scholarship Fund annually on July 1st. PIKE *University* available funds are posted at www.pikes.org.

OVERCOMING ALL OBSTACLES

Meeting challenges head-on is just Todd Ballard's style.

Tn the heart of the Mississippi Delta lives **L** Todd Ballard (Delta State, Zeta Beta '97), an avid supporter of the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation's mission to educate and empower principled leaders. On paper, Ballard's life and Fraternal experience read similarly to any other alumnus. By spending time with him, you immediately know that his story is different - that he overcomes challenges on a daily basis.

Ballard was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy before his first birthday, a diagnosis that was shocking and frightening for his parents. For any parent, the realization of a unique path with a disabled son is a challenge. This was an even bigger challenge for the Ballards, who adopted him at birth. The advice they were receiving from medical professionals? Return him; as if he were a defective product.



At age 5, Ballard received assistance from the Crippled Children's Hospital and the women of the Madonna Circle in Greenville, Mississippi.

Ballard recalls his dad telling him that God has placed him in their care, and care for him is exactly what they planned to do. Under the supervision of his unrelenting parents, he had overcome his first major challenge.

With supportive and loving parents, he was able to tackle years of physical therapy, learn to pick himself up after a fall, and to care for himself. He never allowed the word "can't" to enter his vocabulary. During high school, Ballard stayed busy with extracurricular activities and succeeded academically while becoming a skilled writer.

Due to his physical limitations, no one expected him to leave his hometown to attend college. Challenge accepted. He

was fiercely determined to be as independent and as active as his peers, which included leaving home to attend Delta State.

Ballard's determination to not be handicapped by his physical limitations caught the attention of his hometown friend. Dr. Trey Labella (Delta State, Zeta Beta '94). "I remember seeing Todd at Delta State in 1994 and was captivated by seeing him persevere in the college setting despite his challenges. I already watched him conquer limitations while in high school and church, but this was different. I knew who Todd was, but I had not gotten to know the personality behind

his walking-sticks; which is unfortunately what many see when first meeting him."

LaBella helped Ballard with one of his campus challenges. "I was asked by my varsity swimming coach, Ronnie Mayers (Delta State, Zeta Beta '71) to help a student fulfill a PE requirement for graduation." As it turned out, Ballard wanted to learn how to swim. "I had taught many children and adults in the past, but Todd's physical challenges made this a unique undertaking. Over the semester, Todd didn't quite master the butterfly stroke, but he was able to overcome his fears and learned to navigate the water independently at his own pace. At the same time, our personal relationship blossomed, and he began to meet several of my Fraternity brothers and learn about Pi Kappa Alpha."

"Anyone who takes more than a few minutes to talk with Todd instantly knows how intelligent he is, and is drawn to his infectious humor, smile, and fun-loving personality. The brothers of Zeta Beta Chapter recruited him without question. At the same time, we had to recruit Todd's parents because they weren't sure he was cut out for a fraternity. I'm glad we won them over."

When recalling his undergraduate experience, Ballard said, "I didn't simply join a fraternity, I became a member of a

family bonded together by principles of commitment, trust, and faith. For that reason, I want to ensure the roadway is paved for others to have the same experience I've had." William C. "Bill" Chapman (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '63), who held the title of Boswell Professor of Business and chair of the Oscar Parker Ethics Center, was honored with East Central University's Distinguished Former Faculty Award on May 11, 2018 at ECU's Evening of Honors and Recognition.

Frank the Fighter Foundation Gets Assistance from SEMO Pikes

Over the past three years, members of Epsilon Iota Chapter at Southeast Missouri State University have donated over \$4,000 and completed more than 1,000 community service hours to benefit a local charity.

The Frank the Fighter Foundation was founded in memory of the son of Frank "Trae" Bertrand (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '98). On October 13, 2014, Frank Charles Bertrand, V entered the world. Born with a known heart defect and several other surprise health issues, he immediately went to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at St. Louis Children's Hospital, where he spent the next 15 days fighting hard to live. He started improving and doing better each day until October 29, 2014, when he unexpectedly passed away. The Bertrand family was blessed to have him in their life for those 15 days, but they were also the most difficult days of their lives.

"When we were in the NICU with Frank, we were very well taken care of by family, friends, and people we didn't even know," said Frank's mother, Rachel. "Gift cards, gift baskets, and cash were regularly being gifted to us. A fund was created to pay for our stay at the hotel connected to the hospital. Many people contributed to the fund, and I still don't know everyone who donated because they wanted to remain anonymous. It was important to them that I got to be near our baby. Had I not been at that hotel, I don't believe I would have been able to be by Frank's side the night he took his last few breaths."

The Frank the Fighter Foundation fundraises throughout the year to help shine a light on other families in similar situations. All proceeds are used for gifts that are given directly to babies and families in NICUs in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, where the Bertrands live, as well as St. Louis, Missouri. Gifts to the families consist of gift cards, checks/cash, gift baskets, and baby items. In addition, gift bags are taken to all families with babies in the NICU at both hospitals in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, on Christmas and Mother's Day. These items and monetary gifts never fail to bring a smile to the faces of mothers and fathers during what may be the darkest hours they've had to face.

Each October, Epsilon Iota Chapter provides 30-40 members to assist with Frank's Birthday Bash Carnival where the men each spend approximately eight hours working carnival games, cooking and serving food, and assisting with set up and clean up. The chapter hosts its own benefit for the Frank the Fighter Foundation, Franks for Frank, and also donates the proceeds from its annual Pike Spike philanthropy event to the foundation.

Dr. Frederick Raymon "Ray" Jenkins Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on August 8, 2018. At the University of Texas, he was initiated into Beta Mu Chapter and met the love of his life, Patricia Ludwig Jenkins. He finished his degree as an M.D. from Baylor School of Medicine, then opened a general practice in Austin, Texas. Jenkins decided to specialize in radiology, and returned to residency at Scott & White Hospital in Temple, Texas.

Ray Jenkins' service to Pi Kappa Alpha began during his undergraduate years when he served Beta Mu Chapter as treasurer and pledge educator. As an alumnus, Jenkins served as chapter advisor for 15 years, first to Beta Mu Chapter from 1963-69 and then to Eta Upsilon Chapter (Texas-Arlington) from

1984-92. He was honored as the International Chapter Advisor of the Year at the 1988 Convention.

Brother Jenkins served on two local house corporations spanning a 50-year period. He first became involved with the Beta Mu Building Corporation shortly after graduation, which included terms as secretary and president. He was elected to the Eta Upsilon Corporation in 1992.

On the international level, Jenkins served Pi Kappa Alpha as Lone Star Regional President from 1992-97. He was appointed to

ALBERTO J. CHAMORRO (Pennsylvania, Beta Pi '47)

Alberto Chamorro entered Chapter Eternal on October 24, 2017. Brother Chamorro was initiated into Beta Pi Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha on February 22, 1947. A descendant of one of the oldest families in Nicaragua, Chamorro followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather by attending University of Pennsylvania where he graduated with a degree from the school engineering in 1950. Following graduation, Alberto joined his family's business, E. Chamorro Enterprises, S.A., a highly successful commercial leader of diverse industries in Nicaragua which was founded by his grandfather in 1896. Chamorro would eventually serve as the company's chief executive. His love for UPenn and PiKA was passed on to his son, Alberto J. Chamorro Jr. '75, who is currently a member of the University of Pennsylvania's Board of Trustees. "If you would ask me to describe my father in one word, I would tell you that he was an 'original'." Despite the long distance between Nicaragua and Philadelphia, Alberto supported the chapter and maintained a life-long friendship with Beta Pi brother, Don Schreiber '47. "Prominently displayed side by side in his formal living room were his Pi Kappa Alpha membership certificate and UPenn diploma. Alberto was a proud Pike and will be missed by many," Brother Schreiber remarked. His outstanding reputation, wealth of friends and distinguished family stand as an exemplary legacy. In addition to his son, Brother Chamorro was a proud grandfather of five UPenn graduates: Alberto III, Carolina, Valeria, Denise, and Daniela.

BRADFORD "BRAD" JOHNSON DYE JR. (Mississippi, Gamma lota '53)



Bradford J. Dye Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on July 1, 2018. After three terms as lieutenant governor of Mississippi, Dye was an attorney with Pyle, Mills, Dye and Pittman in Ridgeland until retiring in 2017.

Dye obtained his bachelor of business administration in January 1957. While at Ole Miss, Dye was active in the Associated Student Body, having first been elected treasurer and later president of the Student Body. As an undergraduate, Dye was named to the Ole Miss Student Hall of Fame. He served two terms as president of Gamma lota Chapter, and was inducted in the 1980s into the chapter's Hall of Fame. In 1970, he served as chairman of Pi Kappa Alpha's Convention in Biloxi, Mississippi. During 1970-72, he served as a vice president on the Fraternity's Supreme Council. Dye then received his J.D. degree from the University of Mississippi Law School.

After graduation from law school, he practiced law in Grenada with his father, Bradford J. Dye, Sr. (Mississippi, Gamma lota '26), under the firm name of Dye & Dye. In 1959, he was elected to the Mississippi House of Representatives. Senator James O. Eastland appointed Dye as

an attorney on the staff of the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee in Washington, D.C., where he worked from 1961 through 1964. Dye was able to fulfill legislative responsibilities by taking a leave of absence from his federal job during the legislative sessions. In 1963, he was elected to the Mississippi State Senate. In 1965, he resigned from the Senate to accept an appointment by Governor Paul B. Johnson as a commissioner on the Workmen's Compensation Commission. In 1968, Governor John Bell Williams named Dye the executive director of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, now the Mississippi Development Authority. During his tenure at the A&I Board, the "Shipyard of the Future" was built on the west bank at Ingalls Shipyard; Dye also oversaw the rebuilding of the State Port at Gulfport following Hurricane Camille.

In 1971, Dye resigned as director of the A&I Board to enter the race for state treasurer; he was elected and served in that position until 1976. As state treasurer, Dye was a member of the State Bond Commission, the Board of the Savings and Loan Association, the State Tag Commission, and the Public Employees Retirement System, serving one term as chairman. Following an unsuccessful race for lieutenant governor, Dye became president of Jackson Savings and Loan Association, a position he held from January 1976 through March 1979, when he resigned to run again for the office of lieutenant governor, this time successfully. In January 1980, Dye was sworn in as the 35th lieutenant governor of Mississippi, was twice re-elected, and served until 1992, the only person in state history to hold that position for twelve consecutive years. During that historic tenure, he presided over the passage of legislation of immense importance. The single piece of legislation which Dye found most gratifying was the 1987 comprehensive four-lane highway program, which is the basis of Mississippi's modern transportation system and provided an essential component of economic and industrial development. Dye's role was critical in the 1982 passage of Governor William F. Winter's comprehensive education reform package.

Dye's additional impact on education included the creation of the Institute of Technology Development, the founding of the Mississippi School for Mathematics and Science at Columbus, and his demonstrated strong support of the University Medical Center, the Department of Mental Health, vocational-technical education, and universities and community colleges. He was the charter president of the University of Mississippi Business Alumni Chapter. A life member of the Alumni Association, in 2006 he was inducted into the Ole Miss Alumni Hall of Fame and in 2014 into the Ole Miss Law Alumni Hall of Fame. In 2009 the Political Science Department of the University named him the first recipient of its Distinguished Alumni Award and established a public service scholarship in his name; he also was a member of the Political Science Advisory Board. In 2010, Governor Haley Barbour presented Dye the Mississippi Medal of Service.

Dve's volunteer activities were varied. As a long time Red Cross water safety instructor, he taught life saving and swimming to hundreds of young people in Grenada and Tallahatchie counties. He was the Charter vice president of the Grenada Jaycees and served as the chairman of the Grenada County Cancer Society Fund Drive. After moving to Jackson in 1965, he was a member of the Executive Board of the Andrew Jackson Council, Boy Scouts of America; the Board of the United Way of the Capital Area; the Board of Directors of Jackson Junior Achievement; the Advisory Council on Programs and Research for the College of Business and Industry, Mississippi State University; and the Beauvoir Development Foundation, Inc. He was state fund chairman in 1972 for the Mississippi Chapter, American Red Cross, and served in 1973 and 1974 as Mississippi Heart Fund Chairman. For a number of years he coached youth sports teams in basketball, baseball, and football organized by the YMCA. Dye and his wife were involved with the Governor's School Parent's Association for several years as co-chairmen. Most recently, he served on the advisory board of the Mid-South Housing

He served over eleven years until 2015 as director, public finance, Duncan Williams, Inc., investment bankers based in Memphis. Beginning in 1993, he was a director of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board of Dallas for eleven years.

Dye, a life-long Methodist, was an active member of three metro Jackson churches: Galloway Memorial United Methodist Church, Christ United Methodist Church, and First United Methodist Church of Ridgeland. Brad Dye considered his most valuable legacy to be his family. He is survived by his wife of almost 55 years, Donna; his three sons: Hamp, Ford, and Rick; five grandchildren; and one greatgranddaughter.

HUBERT M. GREEN (Florida State, Delta Lambda '65)



Hubert M. Green entered Chapter Eternal on June 19, 2018. His chapter brother, Charlie Barnes '65, fondly remembers him:

The death threat in the middle of a major PGA

tournament shocked the world of professional golf. But Hubert Green's response to it did not surprise PIKE alumni who were his contemporaries in Delta Lambda Chapter. "Let's just say Hubert wasn't one to rattle easily," one of Green's brothers from back in the day laughed. "And that's an understatement. He was a pretty hard-core guy; very intense."

Another alumnus agreed, "They had no idea who they were dealing with. The death threat probably made him double down."

Hubert Green came to Florida State in 1964 from Birmingham on a golf scholarship and he intended from the first day to make his living as a professional. His older brother, Maurice, had

been initiated into Gamma Alpha Chapter the year before at the University of Alabama, so Green naturally gravitated toward the PIKE house.

He grew to be ferociously loyal to Pi Kappa Alpha. In his undergraduate days, men routinely wore jeweled fraternity pins and the most common PIKE badges were the relatively inexpensive ones with alternating pearls and garnets. However, Hubert had one made of white gold, the bezel covered all around with green emeralds.

Hubert's affection for his PIKE brothers continued throughout life. Former Chapter President Matt Raulerson '84 writes, "One day when I was hanging out back of the Wildwood house, Hubert Green came strolling up unannounced. He could not have been more personable and down to earth. How proud he made me to be a Pike!"

Sports columnists described him as 'straightforward' and 'plain spoken'. His PIKE brothers would probably use the word 'blunt' when it came to golf. Hubert was always gracious and willing to take brothers onto the course with him and offer them tips on their game, but his assessments were never couched in false praise. To anyone who felt he was too critical, he'd say, "If you don't want to know, then don't ask."

In the summer of 1966, the 150-pound 19-yearold won the Southern Amateur Championship on his home course at the Country Club of Birmingham. Temperatures broke 100 degrees with no breeze during the four-day tournament, and players were required to take salt pills and receive oxygen from a mobile unit.

Green was a rock, stunning observers with his long distance shots. He told the media, "I'm playing better golf because I played with longer hitters at FSU... and if I can't hit the long ball I'll just have to start caddying for better players."

Back in his undergraduate days, Hubert Green was a legend as a new member educator. He also served a turn as kitchen manager. He was a good salesman too, and a member of the recruitment committee. Later on, he was responsible for bringing more FSU varsity golfers into the Fraternity.

Green was named the PGA Rookie-of-the-Year in 1971, and then won 11 championships in the next seven seasons.

The legendary death threat and all the drama that surrounded it took place at the U.S. Open in 1977. Sportswriter Todd Miller noted that "Green was the wire-to-wire winner on those steamy fairways."

The FBI received a message that three men were on their way to Southern Hills Country to kill Hubert Green. Specifically, the assassination was to happen on the 15th hole.

It was the first time that all 18 holes of the final round of the U.S. Open were televised.

Tournament officials informed Green and offered him the option of stopping play. Police with long guns and crash helmets surrounded the green. FBI agents infiltrated the gallery.

It will not surprise any of his Delta Lambda contemporaries that after no attempt made on his life on #15, he scored par on #15 without a hitch. His final round 70 gave him the 1977 Open Championship.

Hubert Green's 26 seasons on Tour amassed 19 tour victories including both the U.S. Open and the PGA Championship, three Ryder Cup wins, two championships in Japan and another in Furone.

He was inducted into the prestigious World Golf Hall of Fame in 2008.

As proud as he was of his golf skills, he was just as reticent to publically reveal the true depth of his philanthropic heart. He participated in hundreds of charity tournaments and community fund-raising initiatives for a wide range of causes, especially childhood diseases.

ROBERT D. HALES (Utah, Alpha Tau '51)



Robert D. Hales entered Chapter Eternal on October 1, 2017. Brother Hales was a member of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, ordained in 1994 and served in this capacity for the Church of Jesus Christ of

Latter-day Saints until his death. As a member of the second-highest governing body of the LDS Church, Brother Hales was accepted by the church a prophet and was the fifth most senior apostle in the church.

Hales received degrees from the University of Utah and Harvard Business School. He was also a pilot in the U.S. Air Force.

Prior to beginning his service with the church, Hales served in executive positions with for major national companies. After joining the Gillette Co., he became president of Papermate, a division of Gillette. He joined Max Factor as a vice president, and later headed the Hughes Television Network. Prior to his call to be a general authority, Hales was president of Chesebrough-Pond's.

RONALD W. LOLLAR (Austin Peay State, Eta Tau '73)



Tennessee State Representative Ron Lollar (R-Bartlett), ntered Chapter Eternal on July 6, 2018. Upon graduation from high school, he joined the U.S. Marine Corps, receiving numerous military awards, including the Viet-

namese Cross of Gallantry and the Navy Commendation Medal. After serving in the Marines, Lollar went on to earn his associate's degree in history from Jackson State Community College and a B.S. in political science from Austin Peay State University. He continued to serve in the Army National Guard and was a member of the Ceremonial White House Guard during the Reagan Administration. He was a member of the Shelby County School Board, a Lifetime PTA member, and a charter member of the Arlington Kiwanis Club. His other affiliations included Memphis Jaycees, Pi Kappa Alpha, F. & A.M. Masonic Lodge, V.F.W., and American Legion

Lollar was elected to the Tennessee House of Representatives in 2006 and continued to serve in that capacity for the remainder of his life. He was a tireless advocate for Shelby County and will be remembered for his work to strengthen education. A member of the Veterans Caucus, he was an outspoken champion of Veterans issues.

He is survived by his wife, Brenda; daughters, Kelly and Shelby; son, Matthew; mother, sister, and brother.

I really did not become acquainted with Al until he was in his sixties. But in the last 20 years, I have heard (or relived) tales of his younger days. As an example, Al could have been a basketball star for the Edwardsville Tigers. But the coach told him he would have to give up smoking, drinking beer, and hanging out at the pool hall. This was too much for Al to sacrifice. I believe Al's lifelong friends, the Dirty Dozen, came from that pool hall and that group had a far more reaching effect than the high school basketball team did in those years.

I rise early in the morning. Because of Al, I've become accustomed to carrying my cell with me during the early hours. It was not uncommon for him to call me before 6:30. His voice was booming and distinct.

"Jim, this is Al Wentz. I have a hundred walnut trees to plant; would you have time to assist me?"

"Jim, this is Al Wentz. I have 200 tomatoes to plant, I would appreciate it if you could help me."

"Jim, this is Al Wentz. I have 75 people coming over for a barbeque, you said you might help me get ready."

"Jim, this is Al Wentz. Are you ready to go out and prune the trees at the church?"

Or, "Jim, this is Al Wentz. What chapter are we on in our Sunday School class?"

I always felt special that I was a go-to friend.

Al was blessed, and he always shared his blessings. Education was very important to him and he was financially able to assist many youths in furthering their education. But there was always a stipulation that they maintain a certain grade point average to get the scholarship. One thing that always impressed me was his program that helped students in Edwardsville and East St. Louis prepare for the ACT. His programs with the business and engineering schools at Southern Illinois-Edwardsville were something I admired too, as well as his work with Lessie Bates Davis Neighborhood house and the NAACP.

Pi Kappa Alpha was important to Al. Our Fraternity became a connection between the two of us. Al was a member of the Fraternity at Rolla and I was a member at Illinois. When I went to see him last month in ICU they asked if I was a relative. I said "Yes, I am his brother." I don't remember saying I was a Fraternity brother. He will be greatly missed by the chapter at Rolla and the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. He was truly a super-alum.

My wife and I joke that Al adopted our family. My kids became his kids. When we celebrated special events, like my daughter getting her doctorate, Al and his wife Joan were part of the celebration. When we took a family picture of the occasion; over Joan's objections, Al insisted on being in the picture. This photo is still the wallpaper on my cell phone.

Al and I are fortunate that our wives maintained a similar friendship, which was very important to him. On a recent trip, Al and I were walking behind Jodi and Joan. I made the comment that the two of them were like sisters. But Al, in his dry wit said, "They can't be sisters because they never argue."

We cannot forget about 'Chef Al'. I wonder how many dinners he fixed for people in our community. Barbeques for his scholarship students, his Fraternity, and dinners he fixed as a charitable contribution. Once Jodi ask him for a recipe at a meal and he told her she could buy his cookbook. I believe money from his cookbooks went to charity.

It is ironic that Al Wentz and political columnist Charles Krauthammer died on the same day. Intellectually, they were two individuals I always respected. It is impossible to get ahead of either other of them. They both would have a comeback that tops any comment you made.

St. Johns United Methodist will miss Al. He was always the organizer and made everyone he dealt with bring their 'A' game on a committee. Al was the driving force to start our mission garden at that has produced tons of fresh vegetable that are donated to individuals and food pantries. He was instrumental in encouraging individuals to start endowments which grew rapidly through his leadership. He was always present in church services and his addition to a Bible study or Sunday school class was always interesting. He sponsored scholarships to St. Johns senior students as well as to other area church seniors attending EHS.

As I grew up, I read of Johnny Appleseed. I think Al could have been called 'Al Walnut Tree' or maybe just 'Al Tree'. I helped him plant hundreds of walnut, peach, apple, rosebud, and pine trees; as well as burn bushes. He realized he might never see the fruit of his labors, but he has left behind his legacy.

I will miss my friend. I will miss his energy. I will miss his laughter, his jokes, his wit, his wisdom, his caring for others. I will miss his barbeques, his dinners, and a glass of wine from time to time. I will miss his organization, holding me accountable for my commitments. I will miss our talks. But most of all I will miss his friendship. Al was a person I could always count on, he had my back.

Al's Pi Kappa Alpha legacy will live on through the Charles Alvin Wentz Jr. Alpha Kappa Academic Endowment Fund with the PIKE Foundation.




