Pike Goes To San Antonio

Lambda Sigma Chapter Chartered at Trinity University

n Friday December 4, 2009, 59 men of the colony at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas, were initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha as Lambda Sigma Chapter. Epsilon Delta (North Texas), Epsilon Pi (Sam Houston State), Epsilon Kappa (Lamar), Eta Epsilon (Angelo State), Alpha Omicron (Southwestern), and Theta Xi (Texas A&M-Commerce) Chapters joined local alumni, Director of Expansion Ryan Collett (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04), Chapter Consultant Aaron Smith (Purdue, Beta Phi '05), and Lone Star Regional President Blake Monroe (Texas-Arlington, Eta Upsilon '93) in San Antonio to initiate the men. The initiations took place in a series of secluded classrooms on the campus, guarded against intrusion.

The following day, International President Patrick A. Talley Jr. (Armstrong Atlantic State, Eta Mu '74) flew into San Antonio and conducted the installation in another secure auditorium. The new chapter hosted a banquet that evening at the San Antonio Garden Center. Brothers attended with dates and were joined by the international officers, local alumni, and many parents. President Talley gave the keynote address, emphasizing personal responsibility and the honorable legacy of the Fraternity. Daniel Davidson received the honor of Pike of the Year for his commitment to the Fraternity and service to his brothers.

One year younger than Pi Kappa Alpha, Trinity University was founded in 1869 and eventually settled in San Antonio. From its inception, the school has maintained a strong, local Greek tradition, with no national social fraternities or sororities. For almost one hundred and fifty years, the school forbade the presence of national organizations. 27% of the student body is Greek and proud of its local heritage. These were waters unrippled until the fall of 2007, when the Pi Kappa Alpha interest group first appeared.

Current president David McFarlane began gathering a group of men to found a new, local



fraternity, desiring to improve the standards of the current organizations around campus. As the group expanded, school officials recommended that the interest group contact national fraternities, and after meeting with multiple expansion officers, it decided that Pi Kappa Alpha best represented its standards and supported its goals. Expansion Consultants John Whalen (Rensselaer, Gamma Tau '05) and Kyle Beulke (Rockhurst, Kappa Epsilon '05) flew to San Antonio in fall 2008 and recruited additional men, raising the colony's number to 40 men.

Trinity's local fraternities and sororities provided names and recommendations to assist in recruitment. In February 2009, the colony brought in an additional 25 men – the largest pledge class of any Trinity fraternity in recent school history. Sororities quickly aligned themselves with Pikes in various social and service events. Choreographing a dance with one of the women's groups, the Pike colony won the school-wide talent show. Weeks later, they held a 48-hour seesaw marathon and raised over \$3,000 for the San Antonio Children Center.






Two Pike standouts on the 9-4 Miami Florida Citrus Bowl squad had great seasons and were named to the North-American Interfraternity Conference All-Fraternity All-American first team. Offensive tackle Jason Fox (Gamma Omega '07) was also named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference first team, had 47 career starts and was named as the Hurricanes' Co-Most Valuable Player. Linebacker Colin McCarthy (Gamma Omega '07) was chosen for the All-ACC second team and ranked second with 95 tackles, including 10.5 for losses. He was also chosen as the team's Co-Comeback Player of the Year. Baylor punter Derek

Epperson (Theta Nu'08) was named to the NIC All-Fraternity All-American first team and the All-Big 12 first team. He ranked sixth in NCAA final stats with a 44.81 average on 54 punts with13 downed inside the 20 yard line. He was a Big 12 All-Academic first teamer and a Ray Guy Award nominee.

The Florida State Seminoles helped Head Coach Bobby Bowden (Samford, Alpha Pi '49) go out on a winning note with a Gator Bowl victory over West Virginia to cap 33 consecutive winning seasons. He ended his head coaching career with a 389-129-4 record. Running back Lonnie Pryor (Delta Lambda '09) started the last five games, running for 156 yards, catching 10 passes and scoring five touchdowns. Linebacker Recardo Wright (Delta Lambda '07) had 16 tackles and linebacker Vincent Zann (Delta Lambda '08) was in 11 contests. Other Pikes on the Seminoles squad were kicker James Esco (Delta Lambda '09), deep snapper Phillip Doumar









(Delta Lambda '09) and defensive back Justin Bright (Delta Lambda '09). Linebacker Ross Conner (Kappa Eta '07) of New Mexico State



was second in tackles with 102 while attending graduate school.

Several other Pike players and coaches went to bowl games. Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney (Alabama, Gamma Alpha '89) had a successful first full season, posting a 9-5 record, highlighted by a victory over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl, and a number 24 ranking in the final Associated Press poll. The Kentucky roster included wide receivers Alex Dutton (Omega '08) and Nathan Dutton (Omega '08). Defensive end Garrett Ryan (Gamma Iota '07) played for the 9-4 Mississippi Cotton Bowl squad and offensive lineman Stephen Gibbons (Upsilon '05) saw action for the 8-5 Auburn squad which won the Outback Bowl. Seeing playing time for the 8-5 SMU squad, which won the Hawaii Bowl, were linebacker Cameron Rogers (Beta Zeta '09) and defensive back Chase Courtney (Beta Zeta '06). Playing every game for the 10-3 Virginia Tech squad, which won the Chick-fil-A Bowl, was fullback Kenny Younger (Epsilon '07). Also seeing action for Tech were deep snapper Matt



Chenier (Delta Omicron '08), who made 44 tackles; tackle Sean Kitts (Delta Omicron '07), with 25 stops; linebacker Jeff Grovak (Delta Omicron '08); and back Jim Nelson (Delta Omicron '08). Running the Drake offense was quarterback Mike Piatkowski (Delta Omicron '08), who completed 203 of 323 for 2,139 yards and 14 touchdowns. Back Pat Cashmore (Delta Omicron '08) gained 251 yards and scored five TDs. Backup QBs seeing action were Mitch Rasmussen (Delta Omicron '08) and Pawel Zurkowski (Delta Omicron '08). Fullback Joe Tronzo (Kappa Zeta '06) started 10 games for Louisville and offensive guard Zach Reckman (Beta Phi '06) saw starting duty for Purdue.

Earning All-Ohio Valley Conference first team honors for Austin Peay was offensive guard Stanley Brooks (Eta Tau '07), who was also named to the DI Championship Subdivision Academic All-Star Team. Teammate Ben Collins (Eta Tau '07) posted 14 tackles from his defensive end post. Named Most Improved Player for the 9-2 Dayton Flyers was running back Brian Mack (Lambda Theta '09) who was second with 486 rushing yards in 124 attempts while scoring four TDs. Punter Mike Capparelli (Epsilon Pi '09) of Sam Houston State gained All-Southland Conference honorable mention, booting 54 punts for a 40.0 average, with a best of 63 yards and 14 downed inside the 20 yard line. Wide receiver Josh Flores (Gamma Epsilon '08) of Utah State played on special teams in all 12 games and was a nominee for the national Rudy Award. Quarterback Casey Brockman (Epsilon Lambda '09) started the final three games for Murray State and hit 50 of 91 for 543 yards and three scores. Also playing was his older brother, tight end Tyler Brockman (Epsilon Lambda '06).


Five Pikes saw action for Florida
International and were led by All-Sun Belt
Conference second team center Brad Serini
(Kappa Gamma '08). Tight end Colt Anderson
(Kappa Gamma '08) played 12 games and
had 12 receptions for 154 yards. Linebacker
Toronto Smith (Kappa Gamma '08) ranked fifth
with 50 tackles, including 9.5 for losses. Also
seeing defensive action were lineman Cody
Pellicer (Kappa Gamma '08) and back Marquis
Rolle (Kappa Gamma '09). Injuries hampered
Arkansas State quarterback Corey Leonard
(Delta Theta '06) who just played nine games.
He completed 114 of 211 for 1,416 yards
and seven TDs. His best game was 23 of 41

versus Louisville and he rushed for a career-best 120 yards (on 15 carries) against Florida International. Leonard became ASU's all-time career total offense leader with 8,887 yards and completions with 569. Tight end Trevor Gillott (Delta Theta '07) ranked third with 24 catches for 283 yards. Seeing defensive action were backs Graham Bates (Delta Theta '09) and Evan Van Dolah (Delta Theta '06).

Seven Pikes on the Central Arkansas squad were led by two-time All-Southland Conference first team offensive tackle Lane Freiwald (Epsilon Phi '08). Jonathan Beard (Epsilon Phi '08) was a standout punter with 51 for a 40.0 average. His long punt was 70 yards and 18 were downed inside the 20. A key player for the defensive platoon was lineman Taylor Scott (Epsilon Phi '07), who was in on 44 tackles and gained All-SLC honorable mention. Other defenders seeing action were linebacker Brett Orr (Epsilon Phi '07) and lineman Hutton Andrew (Epsilon Phi '07).

Playing every game for Louisiana-Monroe were defensive lineman Jameson Jordan (Eta Omicron '06) and deep snapper Alex Chace (Eta Omicron '07). Kicker Trevor Charlston (Beta Pi '08) of Pennsylvania had 10 kickoffs for a 48.9 average and defensive back Mike Salvatico (Delta Psi '07) was a member of the Maryland squad. Offensive tackle Matt James (Epsilon Iota '06) played in eight contests for Southeast Missouri State. Kickers Marshal Bond (Gamma Upsilon '09) and Brice Otto (Gamma Upsilon '09) were members of the Tulsa squad and Collin Granger (Gamma Phi '08) was a deep snapper for Wake Forest.

The Presbyterian squad, led by head coach Harold Nichols (Presbyterian, Mu'88) in his first year at the helm, featured 18 Pike players. Earning All-Big South Conference second team honors as a long snapper was Matt Quinn (Mu '09) who was also second in receiving with 20 catches for 300 yards. Other key players on offense included 11 game starting tackle Nic Lanzo (Mu 08), 10 game starting guard Michael Butler (Mu '08), eight game starting tight end Robert Bumgarner (Mu, 07), seven game starting center Jared Tavener (Mu '08) and tight end Sam Wilson (Mu '08). Defensive tackle Matt Freeman (Mu '07) started every game, posted 24 stops and was named to ESPN The Magazine's Academic All-District Team and the Big South All-Academic Team. End Brian Leonardi (Mu '09) ranked fourth with 51



tackles, including a team-high eight for losses. Other defenders were back Jarrod Watts (Mu, '08) and lineman Connor Hawkins (Mu '09).

The 6-4 Texas A&M-Commerce squad was led by NIC All-Fraternity All-American and All-Lone Star Conference first team running back Marcus Graham (Theta Xi '09). He was the top ground gainer with 677 yards and seven TDs on 184 attempts. He also caught 27 passes for 144 yards and returned seven kickoffs for a 23.6 average. Defensive back Laronzo Bursey (Theta Xi '09) was seventh with 42 tackles and returned 11 kickoffs for a 19.3 average. Also solid on defense were back Ameer Ali (Theta Xi '09), who had 26 tackles, and linebacker Ramon Jackson (Theta Xi '09), who made 22 stops. Starting several games for Missouri S&T was offensive tackle Colin Douthit

Linfield. Kurtis Wong (Delta Rho '07) was coscoring leader with 16 points (seven goals, two




TENNIS

2010 Chapter Executives Conference

Pike University presented the Chapter Executives Conference in January 2010. This educational event brought chapter presidents, treasurers, and recruitment chairmen from across North America together to learn and share ideas.

uring the weekend of Elvis Presley's birthday, it seems only appropriate to quote his declaration, "I'll stay in Memphis!" The wisdom of the King's statement might have been questioned by many of the men attending the 2010 Chapter Executives Conference, given the recent tradition of inclement weather during recent Pike University events held in the Birthplace of Rock n' Roll. Following the tornadic storms that surrounded this summer's 2009 Academy, many undergraduate members, volunteers, distinguished faculty, and staff again made an arduous trek to Memphis during a time of undesirable weather. On January 7-10, 2010, icy roads and snow plagued travel from across the country. However, with both resolve and careful driving, attendees managed to arrive with excitement and enthusiasm for another successful conference.



The Chapter Executives Conference (CEC), has continued to sustain its level as one of the premiere events of Pi Kappa Alpha's educational programming. Offering training and resources specific to chapter presidents, treasurers, and recruitment chairmen, the weekend seminar brought together leaders from chapters across North America's landscape. This year, 444 students from 160 chapters and colonies attended. The CEC was again held at the downtown historic Peabody Hotel, just blocks from attractions like Beale Street, the Memphis Rock N Soul Museum, Gibson Guitar Factory, FedEx Forum, National Civil Rights Museum, Sun Studio, and the Memphis Cook Convention Center.

While many attendees were still arriving on Thursday afternoon, fourteen Pikes volunteered their efforts and braved the elements for a local community service project with Jacob's Ladder Community Development Corporation, exemplifing the servant leadership Pi Kappa Alpha strives to uphold (see story on page 21).

After registering for the weekend and checking into the Peabody, members were welcomed at the opening dinner by Pi Kappa Alpha's Executive Vice President and CEO Justin A. Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96). An evening meal was followed by regional launch meetings, in which the undergraduates discussed the conference agenda and other chapter specific issues with their respective chapter consultants. For many of the newly elected officers, this was the first time to meet with other chapter officers in their region and begin building relationships with one another.

The evening was capped with an innovative presentation from Pike University Educational and Recruitment Advisor J.J. Arnold (Indiana State, Theta Omicron '96). During this session,



the undergraduates learned what it meant to know their territory and participated in a group networking exercise.

Friday began early for the recruitment chairmen as they kicked off the executive tracks with an extra session of their own. Director of Growth and Marketing Kurt Schoeffler (Houston, Epsilon Eta '03) spearheaded the focus on recruitment. During this time, other attendees participated in sessions covering membership education, ritual use and care, and engaging your alumnus volunteers. These break-out sessions were followed by a general risk awareness and prevention presentation facilitated by International Vice President John Bobango (Arkansas State, Delta Theta '74) and Fraternity General Counsel Richard E. Charlton (Auburn, Upsilon '61). The attendees then convened in their individual executive tracks for introduction and discussion on each of the three respective leadership positions.

Pikes gathered into the Peabody's Continental Ballroom following their tracks for a powerful presentation by Timothy Russell on the importance of building and maintaining lifelong relationships. Russell, headmaster of Westminster Academy in Memphis, holds a Ph.D. in historical theology from Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Drawing on his personal experiences, he explained how everything in life boils down to our relationships with one another in the good times as well as the tough periods of life.

The day culminated with a tour of the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Headquarters. Undergraduates had the opportunity to view the historic structure and see many of the artifacts donated to the Fraternity over its 142 years of existence. Afterward, everyone enjoyed some free time in downtown Memphis.

The final day of the conference began with the Origins and Meanings of Ritual presentation, which has become a staple of Saturday mornings during the conference, with International Historian Dr. Jerome V. Reel (*Tulane*, *Eta* '57) leading the thought-provoking discussion for initiated members.

Shelby County, Tennessee District Attorney Bill Gibbons

Bill Gibbons, District Attorney for Shelby County, Tennessee was inducted via special initiation into Pi Kappa Alpha during the 2010 Chapter Executives Conference. Over 450 undergraduates witnessed the ceremony led by A. Frank Smith (Florida, Alpha Eta'66). After the conclusion of the ceremony, Gibbons spoke with the undergraduates in attendance about the experience.

While he never had the opportunity to join a fraternity in college, Gibbons said how impressed he was with the values of Pi Kappa Alpha and the men who strive to live those values every day of their lives. He spoke passionately about his commitment to do his

best to represent the Fraternity and to live the values taught in the ritual.

Gibbons has served as Shelby County district attorney general since November 1996. He was first appointed by the governor to fill an unexpired term due to the retirement of his predecessor. In 1998, Gibbons was elected to a full eight-year term and was re-elected to another eight-year term in 2006.

Prior to being district attorney, Gibbons was a partner in the law firm of Evans & Petree and served in part-time elective positions as a member of both the Memphis City Council and the Shelby County Commission. He also served on the staff of former Tennessee Governor Lamar Alexander.

He currently serves as a vice president and board of directors member for the National District Attorneys Association, and on the board of trustees of American Prosecutors Research Institute. He has co-chaired the Metropolitan Committee of the National District Attorneys Association. Gibbons also serves on the U. S. Department on Justice's Coordinating Council on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

Gibbons received both his undergraduate and law degrees from Vanderbilt University. He is married to United States Court of Appeals Judge Julia S. Gibbons. They have two children and are active members of Idlewild Presbyterian Church in Memphis, Tennessee.



The evening's Leadership Banquet concluded the 2010 Chapter Executives Conference in an appropriate fashion with a few more surprises in store. 
The Executive Vice President's Badge

The Christmas Fire of '62 and The Missing Ritual Trunk

A Mysterious Calamity and How One Chapter Rose from the Flames.

On December 23, 1962, Christmas break at Mississippi State had already officially begun. Much like today, a college town such as Starkville took on a whole new character without the students in session. A normally bustling campus seems to almost freeze in time. The sidewalks become empty, and the buildings imposing and dark. On this particular evening however, any passerby might have been surprised to hear, and see, a lone beacon of life on campus, the Pike House.

Most of the Gamma Theta Chapter brothers had stayed until the end of the finals week to participate in the annual Christmas Open House. But by the 23rd, only a small group of brothers remained, some of whom were delayed on their return home for the holidays or others who lived in the surrounding area. Given a holiday break, a house to themselves, and a few brothers on hand, the men left at Gamma Theta made a decision that many a Pike might make, to have a social.

One of the alumnus members of the chapter described the event as mostly a brotherhood gathering. He said "You have to remember that almost everybody smoked in those days. In the years that followed, we sometimes wonder if that smoking didn't have something to do with what took place the next day." For all we know, the party went well into the night, and on the next day, Christmas Eve, when the last brother left, the house was fine.

As Wade J. Finger, "Jay", a newly initiated member, went to sleep on the night of December 24th ,1962, his Fraternity was in his thoughts. To some degree he wished he would have been able to attend the social function the night before. As he faded into sleep, he had no way of knowing that the next morning, as families across the world were opening their presents, the Pike house would go up in flames.

We are not sure exactly when the fire started, but by the time the local fire department arrived, there was little left of the house other than the stone shell of what had once been the first and grandest of fraternity houses on the Mississippi State campus. The fire resulted in a total loss, with all of the students' property ruined, and the house destroyed down to the foundation.

As chapter brothers arrived on the scene on Christmas morning, the first to arrive had one thing on their minds: finding the ritual trunk. The Gamma Theta ritual trunk was a thick sturdy metal lock box. They had used it to store their ritual for as long as anyone could remember, and by all accounts it should have withstood the fire. As the flames died down,

and members began to look through the debris, the trunk was nowhere to be found.

No one knows what caused the fire that Christmas morning. The fire department eventually cited faulty wiring as a potential cause, while some members speculated that a misplaced cigarette butt could have been the culprit. Still others believed both the fire and the disappearing trunk were the result of a long standing and heated rivalry with a neighboring fraternity, although there was never any evidence to support this.

How the fire started, and where the Gamma Theta ritual trunk disappeared to, will go down in the Pi Kappa Alpha history books as one of its many mysteries. But perhaps the most intriguing part of the story is the legendary way in which the chapter recovered.

At the time of the fire the house corporation had literally no money to its name. It would be easy for a chapter in that situation to reel from such a stunning loss. Certainly, no one would have held it against the Mississippi State chapter were they to have faltered in the years that followed. From a housing standpoint, it would have been conceivable for a rebuild to take years.

Instead, the chapter and its alumni wiped the ashes and soot from their brow, and took advantage of the two most important elements of a capital campaign, a compelling need and a sense of urgency. In the months that followed both the undergrads and the alumni were abuzz with activity. The undergraduates found a temporary chapter house, where they had meetings and allowed the house mother to stay, and began fundraising. Jay Finger recalls that the chapter sold raffle tickets not just in Starkville, but broke into teams and sold the tickets all over the county. At the same time, the house corporation was out fundraising with an optimistic goal: they wanted to be rebuilt in a year.

Between the fundraising of the chapter, donations from alumni, and a small sum left from insurance proceeds, the chapter had assembled \$35,000. With the help of a local lender and the Pi Kappa Alpha Loan Fund, this was enough cash to make a project happen.

On Christmas Eve of 1962, the Pikes at Mississippi State could not have imagined how their lives would change the next morning. None of them could have predicted the fire.

Over the course of the next week, as the news reached all the brothers, having a new house just as grand as their original house must have seemed nearly impossible. A year and three months after the fire in 1962, the men at Gamma Theta, and their 65-year-old house mother moved into the new chapter house.

Since that day it has not only served as a home to Gamma Theta, but also as a testament to their amazing story.

Life Safety Programs

The International Fraternity offers loans and grants for life safety equipment and makes available a variety of life safety educational materials to help in the effort to provide the undergraduates with the safest living environment possible. Below are descriptions of the Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detector Grant and Life Safety Loan programs. More information and application forms are available at www.pikes.org.

Life Safety Loan Program

What can the loan proceeds be used for and how are they disbursed?

- * The loan proceeds are disbursed on a "draw basis", for work and materials properly completed.
- * The proposed work and materials shall be subject to the review and approval of the International Fraternity, of which shall generally include, but not be limited to:
 - "Fire Sprinkler" or fire suppression system that is properly permitted and approved by the relevant local authorities on such matters.
 - o "Hardwire" (electrical driven) fire, smoke, and/or carbon monoxide alert systems that are properly permitted and approved by the relevant local authorities on such matters. Battery driven systems will be considered if a hardwire system is not practical and/or affordable.
 - Stand-alone fire suppression equipment, such as code required fire extinguishers and suppression systems for kitchen equipment.
 - Installation of new exit and emergency backup lighting in accordance with and as required by code.
 - Permanently affixed signage that describes and identifies fire evacuation routes, and/or gives other life-safety related instruction such as emergency contacts, emergency plan of action, post evacuation rendezvous point, no storage of certain items, etc., as well as signage to warn about premises hazards and non access areas.
 - Equipment related to security, such as, but not limited to surveillance equipment, strategic lighting, personal identification access systems, land perimeter control like security gates and fencing.
- * Funding to replace or repair of any of the above due to neglect or mistreatment would not be eligible with loan proceeds from this program.

Who can borrow the money and how do they qualify for a loan?

* The Borrower must be an incorporated "house corporation", in good standing with the state in which it was incorporated, that exists for the benefit of an active Pi Kappa Alpha Chapter or Colony.

- * Borrower must own the real estate that will be improved with the loan proceeds, or have an adequate leasehold interest with a term at least equivalent to the term of the proposed loan.
- * Borrower must have an organized governing Board committed to the perpetual and effective management of the corporation, that agrees to follow Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity's suggested property management practices and strive to achieve and maintain Pi Kappa Alpha's recommended Operation & Condition Standards.
- * Borrower must properly complete and submit the standard application for the loan (available at www.pikes.org); clearly describing the need and cost of the desired solution, and it shall require financial information about the Borrower and the chapter which shall display an ability to afford the loan with reasonable projections of income and expenses, including adequate allowances for contingencies and reserves.

Smoke, Fire, and Carbon Monoxide Detector Grant

Fire destroys, but the smoke created from a fire takes more human lives than many generally suspect. According to various fire officials, more that 75% of all dwelling fires start by smoldering cigarettes in upholstery and bedding, between 9:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Consequently, people are more likely to be fatally injured in a fire due to smoke inhalation or gases rather than severe burns incurred from the intense heat. Most building codes require smoke detectors in new and existing structures, including fraternity houses. Carbon monoxide can be odorless, and can therefore attack the human body without the person knowing it. Thousands of people die every year from carbon monoxide poisoning while sleeping or relaxing in poorly ventilated areas that are supplied with this gas from a poorly ventilated or malfunctioning furnace, boiler, water heater or other type of flame operated equipment.

The Grant Program

The Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, through consent of the Housing Commission, offers


a grant program to reimburse any chapter up to a total of \$100.00 for the purchase and proper installation of smoke/heat detectors and/or carbon monoxide detectors in the chapter house. All detectors purchased must be installed. The grant shall equal the exact amount of receipt(s) from the supplier(s), not to exceed \$100.00 per chapter. The Housing Commission budgets an annual amount for this grant program and may suspend it if the budgeted amount is reached annually (Notice will be given in this event). Early participation is encouraged.

Qualifications:

- * Complete the grant form (available at www.pikes.org) with certification from chapter advisor or a house corporation officer
- * If your chapter has previously purchased detectors, and those detectors are not in working order, or if you feel additional detectors are needed, you may still qualify
- * Attach receipt(s) evidencing the purchase of the detectors
- * Send to the Memorial Headquarters, 8347 West Range Cove, Memphis, Tennessee, 38125, Attention: Real Estate Department. A check representing the grant reimbursement will be sent to the chapter within five working days upon receipt of a properly completed form.

Purpose of the Grant Program

The Housing Commission is offering this program as a service to chapters and house corporations. Every house should be equipped with a properly installed danger detection system. Several documented cases exist in the fraternity world, and some of our chapters in particular, where detection systems prevented bodily injury to fraternity members. The Housing Commission is not responsible for direction or enforcement of safety regulations in the chapter house. The Housing Commission is simply offering financial assistance in this critical area. It is the responsibility of each chapter and its house corporation to determine if the house meets local safety codes and cure any violations that may occur. We strongly encourage participation in this grant program and hope it is of assistance. Following is some helpful information about heat and smoke detectors.









hapters and house corporations are setting aside one day in the spring for students, alumni, parents and guests to work together and improve their chapter house and grounds. Groups plan constructive projects, food, and fellowship for all who participate and the event has become an annual tradition for many chapters. Since its creation in 1997, the International Work Day program has accomplished over \$2.5 million in housing improvements throughout the Pike nation. This year should also be a huge success as 161 chapters are registered to participate as of February 1, 2010.

This spring the brothers of Epsilon Chapter will celebrate the 40th anniversary of the chapter's colonization and rechartering beginning in 1970. The chapter was established from the Cotillion Club that spring, one of the leading social organizations on the campus dating to the early 1900s. Epsilon Chapter was originally chartered in 1873 as the very first social fraternity on the Virginia Tech campus. Now

in its 40th year since rechartering, it continues to be an exemplary leader in the Greek system and the largest of Virginia Tech's 40+ fraternities.

Brotherhood Trumps Scholarships For Freshman Quarterback

Pike Legacy Storms Murray State

Casey's attraction to Murray State was driven by his desire to be part of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, which meant so much to his older brother, Tyler'06, and his father, Tab'82. What could possibly drive an All-State Kentucky high school quarterback to turn down attractive football scholarships at other schools to stay at home and accept walkon status for his hometown team?

The answer is an interesting mix of emotions and events that landed Casey Brockman (Epsilon Lambda '09) on the 2009 Murray State Racers football team. At least part of the attraction to, and eventual selection of MSU, included Brockman's desire to be part of the Fraternity legacy in the same bonds of Pi Kappa Alpha that he witnessed first-hand through his older brother and father.

Casey enjoyed an outstanding high school career with 72 passing touchdowns and over 6,000 yards in the air as he rewrote the offensive record books at local Calloway County High School in just two years as a starter. He led the Lakers to the state 4A semifinals in 2008 where they lost a heart-breaker 52-49.


Brockman accounted for six touchdowns in the semifinal game while battling an elbow injury on his throwing arm. Calloway's 11-3 record matched the best in school history and the appearance in the state semifinals was another school first.


On top of his football exploits, Brockman excelled on the baseball diamond, earning All-State recognition and the honor of being named to the *USA TODAY* All-USA second team (.552 batting average and slugging percentage of over .900). He was the only player among the 20 on the All-USA team that was not in the MLB draft.

As he rewrote the school's baseball record book, various programs contacted Brockman over the spring and summer, but he had already decided on football as his main interest for college athletics.

The "big schools" surprisingly did not call for the gridiron services of the 6-2/205 gunslinger, so he had to decide between a number of Division 2 and NAIA football scholarship offers. Instead, he decided to cast his lot as a walk-on with the Racers, the team he had cheered for since he was old enough to remember.

The attraction to Murray State was further driven by the desire to be part of the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, which obviously meant so much to his older brother, Tyler '06, also a MSU football player. And, he had watched his father, Tab '82, serve Epsilon Lambda Chapter in many capacities and continue many lifelong PiKA friendships as a chapter advisor. The deepened Fraternal bonds between his older brother and his dad only served to further fuel





the fire to don a Murray State uniform – to become a Racer, and a Pike.

"When I was looking at colleges that were interested in me, one of the first things I looked at was the fraternity system at each school," Casey said. "None of the smaller schools that were interested in me had much in the way of fraternity systems. And, none of them had Pike chapters."

Casey took Murray State's preferred walk-on offer in stride and used it as further motivation as he arrived for the Racers' summer camp. Brockman was one of three freshman quarterbacks recruited to the Racers but was not placed on scholarship, despite his gaudy high school numbers which were among the best in Kentucky that year. His underdog role was further underscored among the six QBs on the MSU roster by the jersey number he was assigned – 24 – definitely a non-traditional QB number.

As fate would have it, an injury at quarterback, a sluggish offense, and his strong work ethic came together to present Brockman with a starting opportunity. Casey was ready to step up when he earned the starting nod for the Racers' November 7 home game.

Murray State coach Matt Griffin announced the freshman's coming out party with three games left in the season. The media, town and region were abuzz about the hometown product's debut on the last home game of the season.

Local football researchers noted that Brockman was the first true freshman to start as MSU quarterback since 1970 and the first Murray native under center since 1948. The drama of the starting assignment was multiplied since Brockman's first start also marked his first collegiate snap.

"The kid has a great demeanor to play the position," Murray State coach Matt Griffin said. "He's an even keeled young man. And he's maybe the first freshman in my seven years as a head coach that I've thrown to the wolves. I'm not nervous at all about him being out there when the bullets start to fly." The Racers responded well to their young leader's first outing and enthusiastic style as Murray State went on to a 27-17 win over rival Austin Peay. Brockman finished 18-for-33 for 216 yards and a TD pass. For his efforts, he was selected as the Newcomer of the Week for the Ohio Valley Conference.

– Murray State Coach Matt Griffin After the debut, the coach was most pleased with Brockman's poise and the ability to step up in the pocket and sort through his progressions.

"The touchdown pass was to his fifth read, the fifth guy," Griffin said. "I don't know if I did that in my three years starting QB."

The Murray State seniors were also duly impressed and carried their embarrassed new signal caller off the field on their shoulders afterwards, like the movie ending.

"Somebody told me I'm the next Rudy," Brockman laughed at the postgame press conference, referring to the 1993 football movie about Notre Dame walk on, Daniel "Rudy" Ruettiger.

"I've never heard of a freshman quarterback telling jokes in the huddle," said senior wide receiver Derrick Townsel, who caught Brockman's first completion and set the school's career reception record.

"I can't be more proud of this kid," said All-American defensive end Austen Lane.

Brockman said he managed to avoid nervousness for most of the week. Perhaps that was because the important football week also happened to be Pike Ingress Week for Epsilon Lambda's pledge class. The nerves stayed away until the game's first offensive series, when the Racer band played its signature call to the post for the Racer's thoroughbred mascot.

"Whenever the trumpet started sounding, the butterflies started rolling and it gave me chills" he said at the post-game press conference. "I calmed down after the first media timeout."

To cap the eventful weekend, Brockman and his pledge brothers were initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha on the Sunday evening. "It couldn't have been much better than that... starting my first college game on Saturday and



then getting initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha the following day. It's definitely a weekend I'll never forget," Brockman admitted.

Casey posted solid numbers as the starter for the final three games of Murray State's season with a 110 QB rating. He completed 55% of his passes, tossed three touchdowns, and threw for 543 yards.

But, the biggest stats for the Brockman family were posted during the final game of the season at Tennessee Tech.

In the fourth quarter, Casey completed two passes to Tyler, placing the Brockman brothers in the Murray State record books in an unusual sibling category. The two passes totaled just 27 yards but will be forever etched in the brother/teammates memories for the rest of their lives.

Tyler, a red-shirt junior, had a stellar high-school career as receiver and tight end for Calloway County High School. At Murray State he had been positioned as tight end, then guard/ center and finally, as fullback.

It was in his position as fullback that he caught the two passes from Casey.



"The coaches called for me to flare out from fullback and Casey found me twice. He said that I had better be ready and not to drop the ball," said Tyler.

Casey recalls that for one of the two plays Tyler was the first read or option but on the other he was the third option. "I was looking for him on both of them and we completed both," he said.

As special as the moment was for Tyler and Casey, it had even more meaning for their father – now their Fraternity brother – Tab.

"Even though the game had been decided, that's the game I'll remember about Murray State football for the rest of my life. Tyler has worked so hard for four years and has been so supportive of Casey all along his career. Those two are so close, which made the moment even better. I'm sure as the years go by that those two passes will be for more yards and might even get to touchdown status with age," the proud father chuckled.

The final game provided a fitting final chapter for the Brockman brothers for another reason. Tyler had decided to hang up his cleats after four years in the MSU football program. He will begin his intended vocational path in high school coaching this spring in baseball and then continue in the fall on the Calloway County Lakers football staff.

The 2010 season will signal another change for Casey. Murray State decided to take a new direction at head coach following the end of the 2009 season.

Hopefully Brockman will trade his walk-on "Rudy" supporting role for a scholarship in the off-season. And if the new coach sees fit, Brockman might even get a starring role as the full-time starter in the Murray State football screenplay for 2010 and beyond.

Until then, Murray State fans, the Pike active chapter, alums, and the Brockman family will have to wait to see how the script unfolds.

Peddling For A Greater Cause

Theta Sigma Chapter bikes to D.C. for Cerebral Palsy

Some people told us it was an impossible thing to do. Others called us crazy. We did not let this stop us, and we were able to prove them all wrong and complete our mission in the end.

On November 6th, 2009, Theta Sigma Chapter at Winthrop University set out on a Bike-a-Thon from Rock Hill, South Carolina to Washington, D.C. This journey led the chapter through three states, 19 counties and covered over 465 miles. We started our journey on Friday morning, November 6th, with a dedication/opening ceremony on the front steps of Byrnes auditorium at Winthrop University. The trip ended on Sunday, November 8th at 4:20 a.m. on the doorstep of the United Cerebral Palsy national office in Washington, D.C.

Winthrop's men's basketball coach, Randy Peele, Winthrop's Greek Life coordinator, Stanley Jackson, and Republican representative for South Carolina's 48th district, Ralph Norman (*Presbyterian*, Mu '73), were just some of the people on hand for the opening ceremony.

Peele also brought with him Wriston Barnes, a 15-year-old who was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at birth, to speak with the brothers and offer his words of encouragement. "I'm very excited to be here," Barnes said. "It's great what these guys are doing." Being able to meet someone with the disease we were helping to fight only fueled the fire.

During the opening ceremony, brothers recognized donors and also read letters from several South Carolina elected leaders, including Governor Mark Sanford, Lt. Governor Andre Bower, South Carolina Senator Lindsey Graham and John Spratt, a member of the House of Representatives, representing the 5th district of South Carolina.

The first leg of the trip took us roughly 150 miles, close to the North Carolina/Virginia border. The guys in the first leg did the 150



miles in less than 12 hours. They set the tone for the entire trip. Hearing stories of their trials and tribulations just made the rest of us want to get on the bike and ride that much more.

As the second van departed, you could see the excitement and anticipation in their faces. They were going to do a tough stretch, through the foothills of North Carolina and about halfway through Virginia. Their journey was an arduous one. They forged their way through these obstacles without a problem.

The second and final vans met at the chapter house of the University of Virginia. We had an opportunity to meet some of their chapter, and they even took us to 47 West Range. Then, the two groups had dinner before the final leg was begun.

The final leg was not an easy one. The final group finished the mountains in Virginia and moved into the D.C. suburban area, which presented different challenges. These challenges ranged from six lane highways to wildlife darting between riders. This group witnessed a little bit of everything that Virginia and D.C. had to offer.

Without the coordination of the brothers in the vans, this would have been a much more dangerous process. These brothers updated traffic conditions, helped to switch riders quickly and gave words of encouragement. "Some of the words of encouragement I have heard come out of people's mouths are truly amazing," Theta Sigma brother Jason Paul said. "It truly brought a tear to my eye."

The group arrived in D.C. around 4:20 a.m., and had some time to kill before the closing ceremony. At 6:15 a.m., Allison Dorherty, administrative coordinator for the National Office for Cerebral Palsy, greeted the group and treated the brothers to bagels, coffee and juice before the start of the closing ceremony.

"It's amazing," Dorherty said. "It's nothing like UCP has had done for them." Dorherty believes the \$8,000 the chapter raised will go towards a newly launched program called "My Child Without Limits." This program is designed to target newly diagnosed children from birth to age five; it also gives parents a resource to look to for guidance and information about the disease.

"They were excited every step of the way," she said.
"They didn't waver their enthusiasm at all." After remarks from Dorherty, thanking and congratulating the brother's on a successful journey and contribution to cerebral palsy, the ceremony came to a close.

We then took the opportunity to visit and take some pictures at the Lincoln, Vietnam and World War II Memorials before loading back into the buses and heading back to South Carolina.

This event was not only a good cause, but one of the best brotherhood events we could have ever hoped for. "You really do not know how much someone loves you," Maxton Mejia, internal vice president and Bike-a-Thon chairman said, "until their words of encouragement are the only things keeping your legs peddling."

When they finally reached the outskirts of Boston they actually needed to stop and wait until the NBC news crews could set up to film them arriving at Fenway. 
LAMBDA KAPPA (Charleston)

Jordan Thomas '07, a full-time student at College of Charleston, was on an annual family boating trip to the Florida Keys in 2005 when he was swept into the boat's whirling propellers. His father and mother, both doctors from Chattanooga, Tennessee, jumped into action. Thomas was rushed to the hospital where he spent the next two weeks undergoing several surgeries on what was left of his legs and, along the way, discovering what would become his life's work. While in the hospital Thomas visited with other amputees. He met many children who did not have health coverage and he knew the future was grim for them. The top-of-the-line prosthetics

Thomas was fitted with cost about \$24,000. He learned that many insurance plans cover only about \$5,000. This is especially difficult on child amputees who will outgrow several limbs before adulthood. With his family's support, Thomas launched a fundraising foundation to provide life-changing prosthetics to children in need. The Jordan Thomas Foundation has raised more than \$400,000 through bracelets, charity golf tournaments and other events.

Jordan Thomas was selected as one of CNN's Top Ten Heroes for 2009. He was chosen as a CNN Hero of the Week in September



2009 and was then selected as a Top Ten Hero by a blueribbon panel that included Whoopi Goldberg and Elton John. His foundation received a gift of \$25,000 with this award. Jordan spoke live with Larry King preceding the Hero coverage on CNN. The CNN Hero coverage ran throughout the United States and the world, on CNN, CNN Headline, and CNN International, also airing in Spanish. Thomas is the recipient of several other awards, and you may find more information on his story and the foundation at www.jordanthomasfoundation.



50 Years of Involvement

Hal Buchert's involvement with Pi Kappa Alpha spans 50 years of "Once a Pike, Always a Pike." Buchert said "Hopefully, my record of 50 years of Fraternity representation and membership as a volunteer at the

local level will be of interest. Volunteers at the local level can provide the attention and assistance from an older, more experienced generation on a continuing basis."

Buchert's student career began with initiation at Gamma Omicron Chapter at Ohio University on April 29, 1959. A review of Gamma Omicron history credits Buchert with an outstanding recruitment effort in 1960 and mention is made of his athletic talents including competition in NCAA track events and participation in the Pan-Am games. In June 1958 Buchert ran in the NCAA national track & field meet at Berkeley, California and was a semi-finalist in the 220 yard dash and ranked 12th in the nation.

Brother Buchert served as chapter advisor to Alpha Xi Chapter (Cincinnati) in 1964-65 and was recognized by the Southland Hall Alumni Association for his outstanding alumnus work with the local chapter. He was the first non-Alpha Xi alumnus to be recognized with the annual award for extraordinary service to Alpha Xi Chapter. Buchert went on to earn National Fraternity recognition in 1966 when he was presented with the inaugural Most Outstanding Alumnus Counselor Award (precursor to the current chapter advisor position) for his work with Alpha Xi Chapter.

Buchert has been actively involved with the Gamma Omicron Chapter (Ohio) Alumni Association, serving on the board of directors since 1999, as vice president in 2002-03 and 2007, as president and on the scholarship committee from 2004-2006. Buchert's leadership contributed to the association's recognition as the William R. Nester Most Outstanding Alumni Association in 2005.

Professionally, Buchert has worked as a senior industrial engineer with The Kroger Co. where he was awarded Kroger Key Club Man of the Year, and prior to his retirement was corporate director of engineering with The R T French Company. Buchert currently serves as principal and consulting engineer with B&A Engineering Consultants in Springfield, Missouri.

Brother Buchert is a member of Pi Kappa Alpha's Gold Chapter recognizing 50 years of membership in the Fraternity and the Pi Kappa Alpha Educational Foundation's Lily of the Valley Donor Society.

PIKES IN THE PROS

Ten Pikes were on National Football League or Canadian Football League teams during the 2009 season. Quarterback Kyle Orton (Purdue, Beta Phi '02) was traded by the Chicago Bears to the Denver Broncos, where he got to know Broncos owner Pat Bowlen (Oklahoma, Epsilon Omicron '63). Orton finished with 336 completions in 541 attempts for 3,802 yards and 21 touchdowns. New York Giants punter Jeff Feagles (Miami, Gamma Omega '86) increased his NFL consecutive games streak to 352 over 22 NFL seasons. He had 64 punts for 40.7 yards, with a best of 52 yards. Linebacker Josh Stamer (South Dakota, Kappa Pi '97) played two games for the Cleveland Browns and two for the Buffalo Bills late in his seventh NFL season.

Four year veteran offensive tackle **Eric**

Offensive tackle Mike Otto (Purdue, Beta Phi '04) played in 14 games for the Tennessee Titans and rookie defensive lineman Ropati Pitoitua (Washington State, Gamma Xi '05) got into eight games for the New York Jets. Thoroughbred horse trainer Todd Pletcher (Arizona, Gamma Delta '86) was second in total earnings with \$15,454,429 over 1,908 starts. His horses had 238 wins, 173 second place finishes and 143 third place finishes.

Dear Brothers,

My name is CPT Joshua D. Lasley (Louisiana Tech, Gamma Psi '90). I'm currently deployed to Afghanistan with the 1-108th Cavalry with SSG Brett Howell (North Georgia College and State, Psi '06) and SGT Ashley Williams (North Georgia College and State, Psi '07). We are assigned to Georgia's fighting 48th Infantry Brigade Combat Team.

Task Force 1-108th Cavalry Roughriders are currently deployed to eastern Afghanistan. This is the second tour in three years for the Roughriders. In 2005-06 we were deployed to the Triangle of Death in Iraq. Ashley, Brett and I have served in the Roughriders for both deployments.

Mississippi State Pikes Enjoy Annual Duck Hunt/Reunion

On January 15-17, 2010 alumni of Gamma Theta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha at Mississippi State University gathered for the 12th consecutive year for a duck hunt and reunion. Each year 30-40 brothers, most of whom were Pikes at MSU during the mid-to-late 1960s, gather at the Popa Duck Lodge in St. Charles, Arkansas, for a weekend of fellowship and hunting. During the late 1960s Gamma Theta had a typical membership of about 100 brothers, so between a third and a half of the surviving members of that era attend the duck hunt annually.

The event began after several brothers met for a weekend of duck hunting in 1998 at a small camp owned by Tom "Bear" Anderton '67 of Little Rock. The group began talking about how much fun they had had together and how much they wished more MSU Pikes from their era could join them. Fortunately Charles Rodgers'67 of Stuttgart, Arkansas knew that friends of his had just bought and remodeled an old high school gym in nearby St. Charles, one of the nation's most popular duck hunting locations, and had turned it into a hunting lodge. The Gamma Theta group began gathering at the Popa Duck Lodge in early January 1999 with 16 Pike alumni, a number which rapidly expanded in succeeding years to the capacity of the lodge, which is 41. In the words of George Sherman '70, "Next to Christmas with my family, this is what I look forward to the most each year." Don Smith '65 said, "There's



a lot more 'bull' than ducks shot each year, but what a great time!"

The hunt has become an eagerly anticipated annual reunion among the 1960s MSU Pikes, who have named the event the Tom "Bear" Anderton Duck Hunt in honor and memory of Brother Anderton, who after a long, brave battle succumbed to cancer in 2002. "We are just an unusually closely knit group who still enjoy each other's company and who have the ability to pick up in mid-sentence a conversation where we left off 30-40 years earlier," said Eddie Keith '67. The experience has been contagious, as a group of younger Gamma Theta alumni from the late 1990s, led by the three sons of Brother Rodgers (Shan '93, Bradley '95, and Brian '98), have begun a similar tradition of an MSU Pike alumni duck hunt in the St. Charles area each year as well.

Although some hunt, the main attraction has become the opportunity to catch up with old friends. The group has found that the rural location gives them an opportunity to visit and renew the bonds of brotherhood. The Popa Duck Lodge provides three great meals a day, pool tables, card tables, and a big screen TV with satellite. The annual hunt has recently expanded to include a Thursday evening gathering in the Mississippi Delta for those who fly in early or just can't get enough brotherhood on the weekend.



News of Bygone Days

125 YEARS AGO: 1885 — In September 1885, Mark Kennedy went from Theta Chapter to Virginia to enter the Union Theological Seminary at Hampden-Sydney in preparation for the ministry. He carried with him his keen interest in sports, his love for companionship, his magnetic personality, and his zeal for Pi Kappa Alpha. On a neighboring hill, a half mile from the Theological Seminary, was Hampden-Sydney College, and soon after the opening of the two institutions, Kennedy was in the midst of various undergraduate sports. Inevitable and warm friendships, which developed wherever Kennedy lived for even a short time, soon resulted and by November he had interested a group of Hampden-Sydney students in Pi Kappa Alpha. They became lota Chapter.

100 YEARS AGO: 1910 — From an editorial in the October 1910 Shield & Diamond: "For chapters as well as for men it is better to die honorably than to live dishonorably. It is better to lose fairly than to win unfairly. Remember this in the season to rushing and initiation. Try for good men. Do not expect too much of your initiates. Be careful not to leave to them all the work of chapter management. It is proper that they gain more than you through their initiation."

75 YEARS AGO: 1935 — From the April 1935 Shield & Diamond, in a letter dated February 20, 1935, William Alexander, the only living founder, wrote: "You have asked me for a Founders Day message. I think my only message would be that I hope every member of the Pi Kappa Alpha recognizes his two-fold responsibilities – his devotion to his Alma Mater and his loyalty to his Fraternity. This, it seems to me, is not unlike a man's obligations to his mother and to his wife. If he neglects his mother, he will not deserve to have a faithful wife. If we have high ideals, are ambitious in reference to the reputation of our organization, and are diligent in maintaining our devotion to our Alma Mater, as well as to our Fraternity, we shall not be exposed to any honest outside criticism at any time."

50 YEARS AGO: 1960 — In the March 1960 Shield & Diamond, the Chaplain's Corner article written by Dr. John McSween read, in part: "America needs today above all else men of character who will lead our nation through the troublous days of the present and future. And character is still at a premium in American life. In my experience as a college president I received many letters from individuals and organizations seeking men for school or office or business. They never inquire as to the ability of a man to carry a football, or hit a baseball, or pass a basketball. They didn't seem to be interested in whether or not he was a 'hot date'. Or even what his batting average was in the scholarship league. But without fail the first question was always, 'What kind of character does he possess? Can we trust him?'"

25 YEARS AGO: 1985 — Pi Kappa Alpha sponsored the twelfth annual SMC Conference on the weekend of January 11-13, 1985. 81 undergraduates representing 71 chapters and two colonies attended the two-day conference at the Sheraton Hotel in Memphis.

Pike Honored for Lifetime Achievement


Pat Robertson (South Carolina, Xi'60)

In recognition of his tireless efforts on behalf of outdoorsmen and women and his work in the outdoors communication field, the South Carolina Outdoor Press (SCOPe) honored long time Outdoors Writer and Columnist Pat Robertson (South Carolina, Xi '60) at the organization's annual Fall Conference in November 2009. Robertson was awarded the SCOPe Gene Smith Lifetime Achievement Award and the SCOPe Service Award, which was also renamed "The Pat Robertson Service Award".

A native South Carolinian, Robertson has spent more than 50 years in South Carolina journalism and has had a love affair with the outdoors and with outdoors writing for most of his life. Many of today's sportsmen and sportswomen grew up reading Robertson's columns and articles in various newspapers and magazines.

Robertson's journalism career began in 1959 as a free-lance contributor to The State. In 1960 he joined The State as a reporter, and later worked as a writereditor for The Newberry Observer (1961), city editor of The Evening Herald in Rock Hill, South Carolina (1962-64), Piedmont bureau chief for The State in Rock Hill (1964-67), state news editor for The State (1967-69) and city editor of The Columbia Record (1969-73), From 1973 to 1977, Robertson was employed by the South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Department, where he was a regular contributor to the award-winning South Carolina Wildlife magazine and was the creating editor of The Resource, a monthly newspaper for hunting and fishing license holders. Robertson became the outdoors writer for the Columbia Record in 1977, and he filled the same position with The State newspaper from 1983 until Jan. 1, 2001. In 2001, he became a full time freelance outdoors writer, providing articles and photographs for newspapers, magazines and electronic media.

A 1961 graduate of the University of South Carolina with a bachelor of arts degree in journalism, Robertson has won numerous state, regional and national awards for his writing. National awards include First Place, Outdoor Writers Association of American Excellence in Craft Contest for newspaper columns dealing with youth outdoor education and family participation and First Place, Easton Waterfowl Festival Writers Award for excellence in reporting on wetlands, Outdoor Writers Association of America. He was the founding president of the South Carolina Outdoor Press Association (SCOPA) in 1988 and again in 2006-07, and is currently chairman of the board. He has been a member of the Southeastern Outdoor Press Association since 1980 and also has served on the SEOPA board and as president and chairman. He was a member of the Outdoor Writers Association of America for 25 years and currently is a member of the Professional Outdoor Media Association. He serves on the South Carolina Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus Foundation Board and is a former member of the Outdoor Journalist Education Foundation of America Board. He has been honored by numerous organizations. Awards include: Conservation Communicator of the Year, South Carolina Wildlife Federation, 1978; Meritorious Service Award, South Carolina Wildlife and Marine Resources Commission, 1982; Harry R. E. Hampton Woods and Waters Award for Excellence in Natural Resources Reporting, South Carolina Wildlife Federation, 1982; Journalist of Year, Midlands Chapter South Carolina Wildlife Federation, 1983; Shriners Sportsman of Year, Great Falls Shrine Club, 1985; Sportsman of Year, U.S. Complete Shooting Dog Association, 1987; Who's Who U.S. Writers, Editors and Poets, 1988-; South Carolina Waterfowl Association Journalist of Year, 1989.



In accepting the award, Robertson delivered an impassioned message to the group of writers.

"It is crucial for outdoors men and women to know what's going on in the outdoors and in the politics that influence our outdoors rights," he said. "It is not just our job but our responsibility to be involved in what happens in South Carolina and the nation. And so too is service which is also crucial to our profession. Specifically, we must lead and encourage young writers to pursue their passion for sharing the outdoors with the public. We must encourage all sportsmen and women to publicly support their right to pursue their endeavors and to keep abreast of what's happening in the political arena of our state. We also must encourage those who are the future to adhere to high ethical standards and the overriding service of stewardship to the outdoor public," he added.

An avid hunter and fisherman, he has judged more than 50 AKC licensed beagle field trials and was the founding president of the South Carolina Beagle Championship. He currently serves as president of the Savannah River Valley Beagle Club in Edgefield. He and his wife, Jan, live in Blythewood, South Carolina, where they collect wildlife and sporting art and participate in beagle field trials together.

Robert shared these comments regarding his special initiation odyssey, "I would like to thank you folks for helping me to complete a life-long dream. I had not spoken with Bill and his wife Betsy for several years, and when I spoke with Betsy, I learned that Bill had passed away. I shared the reason for my call, and Betsy was happy for me. I told her I would call after the initiation ceremony. When I called Betsy back, she told me that after talking with their children, the family wanted me to have Bill's membership pin. I don't mind telling you that I shed

Gamma Phi Chapter at Wake Forest Reconnects with Only Living Founding Father

Tilliam C. Eutsler (Wake Forest, Gamma Phi '39), a founding father of Gamma Phi Chapter at Wake Forest University, has reconnected with his roots at Gamma Phi. Chapter Advisor Joseph W. "Chip" Seidle (Wake Forest, Gamma Phi '68) spoke with Eutsler recently and exclaimed, "What a humble and delightful 91 year old gentleman!" As a student at Wake Forest, Bill served on the Student Council, as vice president of Student Legislature, as president of Junior Class, as president of the Monogram Club, earned recognition in Who's Who, earned a total of six varsity letters in both football and baseball, and served as chapter president of

Gamma Phi's early chapter history credits Bill and other founding fathers with "valuable efforts and untiring work" in securing the successful bid to become a Pi Kappa Alpha chapter at Wake Forest.

Raymond D. Cannata (Wake Forest, Gamma Phi '90) in his dedication of the The House That Brotherhood Built: The History of Gamma Phi Chapter credits Bill for his extreme helpfulness in providing advice and information in compiling the chapter's history. Cannata said, "In the course of my research, I have come to the firm conclusion that no other fraternity has had a greater impact on Wake Forest, nor has any other placed a higher value on the closeness, loyalty, and love that is 'Brotherhood' than ours."

Following his collegiate career, Eutsler played one season of pro baseball with the Washington Senators organization, but he may have made his greatest impact as a prolific North Carolina high school coach. He went into coaching at Rockingham High School (now Richmond

County High) and his coaching record is remarkable. From 1940-1971 he compiled a record of 226 wins, 74 losses and 14 ties (a .753 percentage). During that time Rockingham won 13 conference championships, six Eastern titles and four state championships. Eutsler also coached basketball for six years (1947-1952) and his teams won 104 and lost 24, including two conference titles. As a baseball coach for 11 seasons (1947-57), his teams compiled a 111-48 record with three conference titles and one state

crown. Eutsler retired from coaching in 1972 to devote full time to his athletic director duties. Eutsler received many coaching and individual honors for his service to North Carolina high school athletics and he was inducted into the Wake Forest Hall of Fame in 1977.

On Saturday, May 9, 2009, former players coached by Eutsler gathered to celebrate the occasion of Eutsler's 91st birthday. Players in attendance represented three decades of RHS football and baseball from the 1940s through the 1960s.

John D. Chandler (Samford, Alpha Pi'44)



John David Chandler, Sr. went to be with his Lord and Savior on Sunday, November 22, 2009. Originally from Athens, Alabama, John served in the

navy before graduating from Howard College (now Samford University). John was a 1945 initiate of Alpha Pi at Howard College (Samford University). In 1948 John married Eloise Pence and moved to Nashville, Tennessee where he earned his graduate degree from Vanderbilt University. Following graduation he entered the stove manufacturing business. In 1958 he was hired as a carpet sales representative, covering middle and east Tennessee for Vol T. Blacknall Company. . Blacknall was one of the largest carpet distributors in the country, representing among other lines, Barwick Carpets.

As a IIKA alumnus Brother Chandler was active on the local level as a member of the Atlanta Alumni Club for over twenty years. He also served Pi Kappa Alpha nationally as a member of the Fraternity's National Alumni Commission and as an active member of ΠKA International Alumni Association. He and his family attended numerous IIKA Conventions where he served as a voting delegate representing the Atlanta Alumni Club. John's three sons were initiated at Eta Sigma (West Georgia), each served as chapter president and all worked as chapter consultants.

In 1961, John accepted the position as sales manager at Blacknall and moved to Atlanta. In 1969 he was named vice president and in 1976 John purchased the company and became its president. Chandler loved the flooring business and especially enjoyed helping young salesmen learn the business.

He spent countless hours in his chair listening and encouraging young people as they launched into the flooring business, or any business for that matter. John owned the Vol T. Blacknall Company until 1990 when he retired.

Ted Deacon, sales manager at the Blacknall Company who hired John said, "He had tremendous persuasive ability. He had probably the most outstanding sales ability of anyone I ever knew. From the time I hired him in the late1950s to represent the Blacknall Company in Tennessee I knew he was destined to become the company's top producer, and he did in fact, become exactly that. But he was much more than that. He was extremely intelligent with an intense interest in and knowledge of government and political matters. He was dedicated to those values and traditions which made this country great, and he actively sought to preserve and promote these as vital to our country's present and future generations. In addition, the strength and unity of family were extremely important to him. He devoted much concern and attention to the needs and welfare of his wife and four children. He was a loving and commanding presence, the pillar of strength, in preserving family values and the best interests of his family. In business he became far more than our company's number one sales producer. He was promoted to sales manager, then to vice president-sales, then to president, and finally board chairman and owner of the Blacknall Company. Under his able management and leadership the company grew from a four-million dollar business to more than \$30 million and ranked as one of the industry's leading floor covering distributors. John Chandler was a giant of a man, both in his personal and family life as well as his business life. He was highly regarded and respected by the many business leaders, associates, and friends who were privileged to

know him. His passing was the end of an era. He will be sorely missed."

Nick Howard, a former president of E.T. Barwick Mills said, "In 1963 a rough edged, frightened young sales rep. from Barwick showed up to meet John Chandler for a sales trip. As was always the case, John made him feel relaxed and comfortable about the challenges ahead. No matter what pressure or strain he might be under John never failed to reach out to whoever needed his steady hand. As time went on I was honored to become a friend and confidante and I have never had a better or more loval friend in all these decades. Not only did I love, respect and admire him; but also he was an inspiration to me especially during those early tumultuous years in my career."

Relating to Chandler's industry leadership, Howard said, "Always conservative but more than willing to address change as new opportunity, the Blacknall Company under John's leadership embraced the need to approach the "carpet explosion" of the "60s & 70s" with a new page in distribution strategy. Already the largest distributor in the E.T. Barwick Industries system, the largest manufacture at that time, the Blacknall Company went on to be a major force in the southeast from Virginia to Florida. The strong, competent and ethical sales staff that John had developed was quickly accepted by their vast dealer network as being able to wear "two hats"; the Blacknall salesperson and the Barwick factory rep. Due to John's leadership, the Blacknall sales staff had very little turnover and were usually the most successful and highly respected in the field."

John was incredibly well read and loved to discuss politics, economics and other current issues. While working John was known to read a book a day and always had three or four books going at one time. John was a man of integrity and many friends and business relations from the old days have shared how a handshake from John was all it took. He was true to his word and could always be counted on for doing the right thing.

John liked to joke that he came out of Vanderbilt a socialist but after a few years in the "real world" he realized he could not and should not rely on the government to provide for him or his family. John became an active member of the John Birch Society. For over thirty-five years he worked promote the free enterprise system and to educate his friends and acquaintances about the evils of big government.

John was a life member of the Capital City Club in Atlanta and was integral in the founding of the Atlanta Tip Off Club, which names the Naismith Award to the top college basketball player in the country every winter.

His life was changed in the spring of 1983 when he became a born again Christian. When he died, he was active in his church, Faith Independent Methodist. He leaves behind Eloise, his wife of sixty-one years, his three sons, a daughter and eight grandchildren.

Steven N. Ellis (Clemson, Eta Alpha '74)

Steve Ellis, a tireless and passionate sports writer who covered Florida State University athletics for nearly 30 years, entered Chapter Eternal on November 10, 2009. A native of Winter Park, Ellis was a graduate of Clemson University, where he ran for the cross country team. His journalism career began in college and he became the founding editor of *Orange and White*, and served as sports editor for the *Tiger*. He was a very active member of Alpha Eta Chapter. FSU graduate Jerry Kutz, who started

the Osceola, a weekly independent newspaper that covers FSU athletics, hired Ellis in 1981 to be editor of the start-up publication. For a couple of years, Kutz said, Ellis was the Osceola's one-man editorial staff — reporting, writing, typesetting and pasting up the paper.

Ellis, a senior writer and columnist, joined the *Tallahassee Democrat* in 1990. He won numerous Ronda Sports Writer Association awards and was an inspiration to aspiring sports writers. He was working on an article in his home office when he suffered a heart attack. He insisted Karen Detrick Ellis, his wife of four years, email the story to the newspaper before he would let her call 911.

Serafino D. "Foge" Fazio (Pittsburgh, Gamma Sigma '82)



Serafino Dante "Foge" Fazio entered Chapter Eternal on December 2, 2009. A center and linebacker for the Panthers, Fazio was an All-East center

and team MVP as a senior at the University of Pittsburgh in 1959. He was drafted by the Boston Patriots and played one season in the AFL before



embarking on a career in coaching. He began by coaching at the high school level while earning a master's degree in education.

Fazio returned to Pittsburgh as the linebackers coach (1969-72; 1977-79), defensive coordinator (1979-81). In 1982 he succeeded Jackie Sherrill as head coach and guided a Panthers team that was ranked number one in the nation, quarterbacked by Dan Marino, to a Cotton Bowl appearance (1983), culminating with a 7 to 3 defeat to Southern Methodist University. He was dismissed following the 1985 season after compiling a 25 win, 18 loss and 3 tie career record.

Fazio then moved on to the University of Notre Dame to serve as the defensive coordinator under Lou Holtz. He also coached collegiately at Boston University, Harvard University and the University of Cincinnati.

Fazio's defensive mind translated well to the pro game, where he coached for the Atlanta Falcons and New York Jets before getting the Minnesota Vikings' defensive coordinator job under Dennis Green in 1995. In 1998, he assembled a formidable defense that helped the Vikings achieve a 15 win 1 loss regular season record leading to an appearance in the NFC Championship Game. He moved on in 1999 and coached the Washington Redskins' linebackers for a season before becoming the defensive coordinator of the Cleveland Browns in 2001 under Butch Davis.

Fazio retired from the Browns in 2003 after their famous meltdown to the Steelers in the AFC playoffs, but resurfaced again in the NFL as a defensive consultant to Mike Tice in Minnesota in 2005, where he helped turn around a struggling Vikings defense.

Beginning in 2008, he worked as a radio analyst for the University of Pittsburgh football broadcasts until his battle with leukemia forced him to stop.

On December 18, 2009 John A. Jackson entered Chapter Eternal after a valiant, three-year battle with ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease). He attended Southwest Missouri State University, graduating in 1978 with a bachelor of arts in finance and general business. Upon graduation, he moved back to his hometown of Richmond, Missouri to manage Jackson's Hardware, eventually serving as third generation owner. John was respected as a community leader, a devoted family man and a Pike alumnus through and through. In his years as an undergraduate in Zeta Chi, he held the offices of treasurer and chapter president.

In 2000, Zeta Chi Chapter fell silent. Upon learning of this event, he began seeking recolonization along with other ZX alumni. Thus, the Zeta Chi Alumni Association was formed. In the years prior to his death, he became more active in the recolonization process. He would hold Pike golf tournaments in his hometown and, despite his condition, would travel to attend gatherings of ZX wherever they occurred. His energy and intimate love for the organization brought the ZX alumni closer together during a very critical time.

Witnessing John's extraordinary courage during his struggle with this vicious disease was an inspiration in itself. He refused to be defined by the disease that ravaged his body, and he remained hopeful throughout the long, arduous journey. Just two months prior to his passing, John even attended the Association's presentation to Missouri State University (formerly Southwest Missouri State), where the ZX Alumni were vying for re-entry to campus. John established a scholarship fund through the ZX Alumni Association, with a request for all donations from his services to be placed in the trust.

John's fraternal brothers will always remember his ever-smiling face as he rolled into the thirty-year ongoing alumni float trips, annual gatherings and other Pike functions. His wife, Kathran, survives him, along with a son and daughter. His presence and inspiration will be greatly missed.


