

## Effective Officer Transitions

There is no better time than summer to focus on officer transitions.

But wait — most executive boards are in the middle of their terms. Why is *now* the best time to contemplate on how to prepare for transitions?

Simply, it's because hosting an annual executive board retreat does not do the job alone. Rather, it's a continuous process for current and future officers throughout the year. By working to capture knowledge beginning from Day 1, both incoming and outgoing officers will be ready to hit the ground running when transitions occur.

There's no question that dynamic officer transitions are a key strategy for high-performing chapters. Given the frequent turnover of officers in typical chapter operations, highly useful knowledge can be lost in the blink of an eye. Having detailed transitional retreats is a valuable tool for transferring knowledge from one generation of officers to the next.

Here are some additional ways in which you can maximize the effectiveness of your transitions:

### Preserve Current Knowledge

Current officers should employ practical methods to document their work. Of course, this comes in handy when compiling the International Awards application each year. But further, continuous stockpiling of on-the-job knowledge will create a database which future officers can utilize as a resource.

After an event, take ten minutes to gather key pieces of knowledge from it. Write down what worked, what didn't work, and what suggestions you have for improvements. Save PR releases, photographs and any other supplemental documents for future reference. Realize that different methods of preserving knowledge work for different people. Try new things and find out what works best for you.

### Create New Knowledge

If you wish to hold a position in the future, take a stake in its success right now. As chapter events occur, capture your own notes as to what you liked about it, what you didn't like about it, and what improvements you would suggest for future events. Keeping thorough notes will not only be valuable for transitions, but will also aid in election preparation for the position you seek.

We can agree that in our pursuit of excellence, change is imminent. Why then, are we so fearful of it? I have found, as I am sure many of you have, that being innovative within the chapter can be an uphill battle. Revising the by-laws, updating new-member curriculum, or increasing the

minimum GPA requirements are not always well received suggestions. These ideas are often rebutted by contentious alumni or stubborn upperclassmen who offer the excuse, "this is the way we've always done it." We've all heard that before. Now I don't want to suggest that *all* change is good and I certainly don't think that there is a universal formula, but healthy analysis is necessary. New ideas should be challenged and tested, but they should never be completely ignored.

### To whom can we look?

When a good organization looks to become great, the first step is to see how other people do it. This scares us sometimes, but we need to explore best practices. Nobody exemplifies this better than our International Fraternity, its staff, and its volunteer boards. Having had this opportunity to serve on the Supreme Council, I have seen that our Fraternity thrives because we are not fearful of change. In fact, we embrace it. We are always looking for ways to do things better, whether it be recruitment or risk management. There is no stasis in mediocrity, but rather a sense of urgency to move away from average in any category.

### Where has it gotten us?

When you are not afraid of change, you become more flexible and adaptable. Our Fraternity is consistently ranked in the top three in almost all competitive categories, including average chapter size, initiations per chapter, and new members per chapter. We also have seen the establishment and growth of Pike University, one of the best fraternal educational programs available. At the local level you can see the result of embracing change in our award-winning chapters around the country. They don't simply win our Fraternity's top accolades; they are winning major awards on their campuses and in their communities. All of this is possible because someone embraced change, and went in a new direction.

We have to push ourselves. As we move into the summer and look forward to seeing each other in Austin, I want to encourage you to become a forward thinker. Let's not be content with "the way it's always been done." Instead, let's take this Fraternity to new heights, and even greater success.



Most notably, those efforts have surrounded the hopeful passage of the **Collegiate Housing & Infrastructure Act, which allows Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation donors to make tax advantaged gifts to enhance or renovate their individual chapter's house.** Formed on March 1, 2005, the FSPAC is the largest PAC focused solely on higher education issues. It has made contributions to a bipartisan slate of more than 100 candidates and more than 90% of those candidates have won their elections. It has recently eclipsed the \$1 million dollar mark in total donations/pledges raised since its inception. ## Commitment to Growth & Excellence

### *An Interview with International President Patrick A. Talley, Jr.*

On August 2, 2008, at the International Convention in Memphis, Tennessee, Patrick A. Talley was elected as Pi Kappa Alpha's 47th international president.

On July 31, 2010, his term will come to an end – but not before having led the Fraternity into a new era of excellence. As he prepares to pass the gavel to his successor, President Talley offers some thoughtful reflections and parting words to his friends and brothers in *phi phi kappa alpha*.

*“Before you can be successful, you have to put in a lot of work and a lot of time.*

*You have to have a plan; you have to stick to the plan; you have to be committed; and you have to be courageous in terms of meeting the challenges.”*

*Pat, being Pi Kappa Alpha's international president places you in some very select company. Looking back, what do you think has gotten you to this point?*

I would say that there are a lot of factors that have probably influenced me. Ultimately, it goes back to my time as an undergraduate in my chapter. I was president of my chapter and it was a great experience. I was surrounded by my brothers, who were extremely supportive and who became my best friends, and they always have been in my heart and mind as the years have gone by.

I remember the occasion, when I received a letter from the International Fraternity – from Chuck Hunt (*North Alabama, Theta Alpha '93*) who was the director of services at that time – asking for some help with a problem at Eta Chapter at Tulane University. I said, “You know, it's time. This is where I need to be.” I got involved at that point as an alumnus and as a volunteer by helping those undergraduates with the situation. It was very gratifying. From that point forward, I've

just been involved. I was eventually appointed to the Supreme Council as legal counsel, then elected as vice president for four years, prior to being elected as president at the Memphis Convention in 2008.

There have been many people who influenced me along the way; you definitely don't get here by yourself. If I were to start naming the people who have helped me through the years, we would be here all day. But, if you were to ask me who were the most influential people in terms of why I am sitting here today as president, I would have to say Mark Anderson (*Wofford, Nu '76*) and Ray Orians (*Memphis, Delta Zeta '66*). Mark Anderson, ten years ago, told me pretty directly, “Hey, you need to be president one day.” Of course, he's deceased now, but I feel like he's right here with me. And then I definitely wouldn't be here if it weren't for Ray. He appointed me to my first international office as regional president, and has been there behind me in every single thing. It's been a great experience.

***In your opinion, what has been the Fraternity's most significant accomplishment of the past two years?***

I am very proud of our commitment to the excellence initiative. We have a strategic plan that commits us to excellence in every area of fraternity life. I would say that the most significant accomplishments have been in growth and quality. Last year for the first time ever, we hit the 5,000 man initiation level, which was just a phenomenal achievement. The other outstanding achievement is in the area of quality. So many of our chapters have achieved excellence status; more so than ever before in the history of Pi Kappa Alpha. We have also seen that we are closing fewer chapters. We are having fewer issues where we have to go in and take away charters. So I think that both of those areas – growth and quality in our chapters – represent our biggest accomplishments.

***During your keynote speeches, you've referenced several quotes by Muhammad Ali. What is your favorite quote, and what does it mean to you?***

A lot of people have commented on that presentation, which says a lot of things that I think are important. It's really in the title, which I took from one of the quotes, where Ali says, "The fight is won or lost far away from the witnesses; behind the lines, in the gym and out there on the road, long before I dance under those lights." That really sums up my message in almost every speech to the chapters and undergraduates. That is, "Hey guys, before you can be successful, you have to put in a lot of work and a lot of time. You have to have a plan; you have to stick to the plan; you have to be committed; and you have to be courageous in terms of meeting the challenges." That's the whole purpose of the quote.

There's another quote of Ali's in there, which is, "Rather than focusing on the pebbles in your shoe, focus on the mountains ahead." So many times, and I see this with our undergrads, we get too focused on the little things, and we lose sight of the challenges that lie ahead. Let's climb the mountains and not worry about the little things.

***Our chapters have made great strides to improve the image of Pi Kappa Alpha, and of fraternities in general. What can our members do to continue this trend, and help***

***the rest of the world understand what it means to be a True Pike?***

I've seen such a commitment by our chapters in terms of being conscious of our image – much more so today than when I arrived on the Council ten years ago. The main point is to continue to have an absolute commitment to our core values. The whole reason we exist as a Fraternity, the reason why the Founders created this Fraternity, and why the Junior Founders and all the people along the line have carried it on, is to persevere and overcome challenges, to be committed to excellence, to have the courage to take a stand for things that are right. I think as long as we are committed to those values, we can overcome and negate these negative images and stereotypes that are out there of fraternities as drinking clubs. Some fraternities may be that way, but not Pikes. The reason why is because we are committed to values. A continued commitment to values in the future is the best thing we can do to enhance our image.

***Being International President requires you to volunteer a lot of your personal time. How have you been able to balance your personal and professional lives with being a Fraternity volunteer?***

It does take a lot of time, and that's probably one of the things that I actually

underestimated. But at the same time, when you make a commitment to do something like this, to take a leadership role, you just understand that you need to live up to that commitment. And so it becomes a priority. The things that are priorities, you find the time for, you make the time for. With me, Pi Kappa Alpha is a priority. My family is a priority; my religion is a priority; and my profession is a priority. So, you've just got to make everything work without losing sight of the important things or priorities in your

life. That would be the message that I would have to all volunteers. Don't use a heavy schedule as an excuse to say, "Well, I can't do that because I don't have enough time." The time is there. It's just a matter of what your priorities are. And with me, giving back to the Fraternity in this stage in my life is important, and therefore I have made it a priority.

***Overall, where do you think Pi Kappa Alpha ranks in relation to other fraternities?***

This has been one of the pride and joys of being president of Pi Kappa Alpha at this particular time in our history, because I can honestly say (and I do say it; I take the opportunity to say it whenever I can) that we are at the very top of the fraternity world. In almost every category, whether it is pledges, initiations, or chapter size, we are right there: number one, two, or three. It hasn't been easy to get to this point; but we're there – and it's great to be president and be able to say that.

***So what do you believe are the Fraternity's keys to success moving forward? And how can we stay ahead of the competition?***

I would say two things, and the first point has to do with our volunteers. I believe that one of the keys to our success is having strong volunteers, strong alumni advisory boards within our chapters, and keeping alumni

involved as active members of the Fraternity in every way possible – in terms of future success this will definitely help us out a lot. The other point is strong chapters. I am a firm believer that the strength of the Fraternity is based on the strength of the chapters. With every chapter that gets stronger, the Fraternity gets stronger. We are experiencing our excellence and success as an international fraternity today because our chapters are so much stronger than they were two decades ago. We have committed to excellence in our chapters, and a continued commitment to excellence in the future is what will ensure that we stay ahead of our competitors.

***Looking back, what is your favorite memory from your term as International President?***

Gosh, there have been so many. And as a lawyer, I can never answer a question to say it's just one. But being at Delta Lambda Chapter (*Florida State*) for the special initiation of Jimbo Fisher, the new head football coach at Florida State University (see page 60), was just a great moment. The anniversary celebrations of Epsilon (*Virginia Tech*), Eta Alpha (*Clemson*) and Alpha Xi (*Cincinnati*) Chapters were also very special. Also, going to new chapters, installing new chapters, and seeing the excitement, and sometimes even tears of joy, on the faces of young men from the colonies as they are initiated, as I am able to give them their charters and welcome them into the bonds of PiKA, is an absolutely incredible experience. But I guess if I were to choose a favorite memory, it would have to be the night that I was elected and I became president of this great Fraternity. Looking out at the undergraduates at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis; and then later on that evening, going to Silky's and seeing the Pikes take over the establishment, then walking in there and being greeted by everybody – it was just an experience that I will never forget in my life. It was great. It's a lot of fun to be president of this Fraternity, it really is.

***What advice do you have for Pi Kappa Alpha's next generation of young leaders?***

One of the things that I have been most impressed with is looking behind me and seeing the guys that are coming up. I refer to them as the "young bucks" (no pun intended with our CEO Justin Buck). The next generation of leadership that I

see – I think they get it. They really get it. They understand what it means, they have experienced excellence in this Fraternity, and they understand that commitment to excellence. So my advice to these guys as they come in and assume leadership roles – whether it's aspiring to serve on the Supreme Council, or ultimately to become president of this Fraternity – is to always be committed to excellence. It just can't be underscored enough. You really only have two directions that you can go. You can continue to be committed to excellence, and take every initiative that you're involved in to the next level; or, you can decline into mediocrity. Those are really the only two choices. So my advice to these young men as they come up is to continue the commitment to excellence.

***And what advice might you offer to your successor?***

There will probably be a lot of conversations that I will have with my successor in terms of advice. I received a lot of advice from my predecessors, as there's not a shortage of advice out there. One thing that was common in the advice that I received, which I will definitely give to my successor, is to have fun. You are going to be president of the best Fraternity in North America, and the greatest group of undergraduates at colleges across North America, so you need to enjoy it. There is no experience that is quite like this. Also, understand the significance of the office. You can't underestimate how important it is to everybody, especially the undergraduates, for you to participate in the events and the functions that they have. You can't go to everything, but it is important to try to do as much as you can – to participate in the lives of the undergraduates and the alumni in the

important things they have going on. So that and two cents will probably buy him a cup of coffee, but hopefully he'll have a good time.

***Pat, thanks so much for taking the time to speak with me about your experience. It's been a pleasure.***

And Kurt, thanks very much for your time and effort handling this interview – you have done a great job. Since I have been president during the past two years, I have worked closely with our staff at Memorial Headquarters and I truly believe that our professional staff is the best in the fraternity world. All of you are models of excellence in your respective roles, and it has been a real pleasure and privilege for me to have worked with such outstanding men and women at Memorial Headquarters during my tenure. You all have made me look good, not an easy task, so thanks very much!

## Lambda Tau Chapter Chartered at DePaul

*Chicago's newest Pike chapter embraces lofty ambitions.*

The Pi Kappa Alpha colony at DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois was chartered on January 30, 2010 by International President Patrick A. Talley, Jr. (*Armstrong Atlantic State, Eta Mu '74*) at the house of Gamma Rho Chapter at Northwestern University. Brothers from Northwestern University (*Gamma Rho*), Indiana State (*Theta Omicron*), Rose-Hulman (*Iota Delta*), Wisconsin-Whitewater (*Kappa Omega*), Bradley (*Delta Sigma*), and Illinois (*Beta Eta*) were present to conduct the initiation of the 27 men of the new Lambda Tau Chapter. The brothers of Lambda Tau expressed thanks to all who were present, especially the Northwestern University Pikes for the use of their facilities and their generous hospitality.

### Life as a Colony

In the fall quarter of 2007, the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity sent expansion consultants Eric Hren (*Toledo, Epsilon Epsilon '04*) and Sean Burns (*Rensselaer, Gamma Tau '03*) to the campus of DePaul University on Chicago's North Side. There they sought recommendations from administrators, professors, advisors, sorority women, and other students throughout the DePaul community for names of men who were scholars, leaders, athletes, and most importantly gentlemen. After they received

the recommendations, Hren and Burns assembled a new Pi Kappa Alpha colony – a diverse group of 27 men brought together by a common goal of forming the strongest group of leaders that DePaul's Greek Community had to offer.

The colony made an immediate impact on the Greek community, becoming one of the largest and most competitive fraternities on campus. Through community service, academics, recruitment, and athletics, the newest fraternity at DePaul jumped ahead of all other fraternities in popularity among the surrounding community. In one of their first activities, the colony reached out to a local fire department and established a relationship that continues to this day. Several times each year, the men go to the firehouse to prepare a meal and spend time with the firemen stationed there. Along with building community relationships, the group dominated intramural athletics and went undefeated in all sports their first year on campus. The men have also displayed their athleticism within the Greek system, winning the Delta Zeta Turtle Tug charity Tug of War contest, the 2010 Greek Week Olympics, and the Alpha Epsilon Pi's three-on-three charity basketball tournament.

The brothers of Lambda Tau have also dominated academics across the Greek community, continuing to maintain the highest GPA among all other fraternities with a 3.27 GPA – well above the IFC all men's average of 3.08. They are also leaders in philanthropy and community service, ranking #1 and #2 respectively, and are working effortlessly to maintain their status as the most successful fraternity on campus. As a chapter, Lambda Tau has set goals of maintaining the highest GPA, increasing chapter size by at least 25% in the fall of 2010, staying at the top of athletics, and working towards becoming the top fraternity in community service.

# McNeese State Chartered as Lambda Upsilon Chapter

*Pi Kappa Alpha enlivens Greek System at Louisiana campus.*

Unfortunately for Lance, once he moved to Lake Charles, Louisiana and enrolled in McNeese State University, there was no Pike chapter at which he could follow in his father's footsteps. Horner petitioned the Pi Kappa Alpha International Headquarters several times before the Fraternity came to McNeese in fall 2008, when he was a graduate student. Once expansion consultants, Michael Cashman (*Illinois, Beta Eta '05*) and Jay Carmichael (*Armstrong Atlantic State, Eta Mu '05*) arrived that fall, the groundwork began on the mighty oak tree that would be called Lambda Upsilon Chapter.

Before the colony was organized at McNeese, the Greek system was small – with seven NPHC fraternities and sororities, three PHC sororities, and three other IFC fraternities on campus. Greek life as a whole was minimal, being kept alive by a small percentage of the nearly 9,000 students enrolled at MSU. However, the new Pike colony began to stir the pot almost immediately by winning the Brotherhood Award, Advisor of the Year Award, and the coveted Zeus Cup during Greek Week in spring 2009, just three months after colonization. The colony continued to grow in numbers rapidly, as many involved men on campus eagerly joined to be part of a driving force that would stimulate the Greek system at McNeese.

During the time spent as a colony, the members operated as any fully functioning chapter would; they held socials with sororities, competed in intramural athletics, performed community service, donated philanthropy dollars, and sent several men to Pike University events. The colony boasted 100% campus involvement of all members, one of the top Pike chapters/colonies internationally.

As the fall semester drew to a close, the colony compiled a chartering packet and a petition to charter and sent it to International Headquarters. It was approved unanimously



by the Supreme Council. The colony also elected new officers at the close of the semester. Lance Horner, who had served as president since colonization, was graduating. Travis Lavergne was elected president of the colony, and a date was set for chartering and initiation in the spring of 2010.

The spring semester began and the last group of founding fathers to be accepted into the colony were pinned. The new colony administration worked diligently to collect dues and initiation fees and plan the long awaited chartering weekend.

Finally, on February 27, 2010, the day came for the colony members to be initiated, and for the colony at McNeese State University to become Lambda Upsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha.

The weekend began on Friday evening, with the arrival of Director of Expansion Ryan Collett (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04*) and (now) Director of Services Jay Carmichael. After a quick trip to the legendary Darrell's bar and grill for one of their famous po-boy sandwiches with their future brothers, they joined initiation teams from Zeta Omega Chapter (*Louisiana-Lafayette*), Eta Omicron Chapter (*Louisiana-Monroe*), and Epsilon Kappa Chapter (*Lamar*) to perform the initiations of 48 men. The initiation took place in Farrar Hall, on McNeese's main campus.

On Saturday afternoon, the group of new initiates assembled in Baker Auditorium

along with members of the Supreme Council and the visiting initiation teams for installation of the chapter and its officers. Eta Omicron Chapter, along with Director of Expansion Collett, Director of Services Carmichael and Supreme Council Vice President Mat Forrest (*Southern Illinois, Iota Mu '94*), performed the installation ceremony. Forrest also presided over the installation of the officers of the new chapter and an alumni ceremony.

The chartering weekend concluded with a banquet and reception at Treasures of Marilyn Event Center in Lake Charles as the newly initiated men and their newly chartered chapter were formally presented to family, friends, and special guests. Lance Horner served as master of ceremonies for the evening. Alumni, Memorial Headquarters staff and university officials spoke briefly, and Supreme Council Vice President Forrest delivered a truly inspirational keynote address. After the presentation ended, the newest members of Pi Kappa Alpha came together for a group photo and enjoyed the rest of their evening.

Pike was well represented on McNeese's campus and in the community of Lake Charles during the time as a colony; in varsity athletics and in student organizations (which many brothers served as officers). Daniel Lavergne was elected Homecoming king in 2008, and Travis Lavergne was elected Homecoming

co-king in 2009. Appearing on court alongside Travis that fall were five other Pikes; meaning six of the seven men on court were brothers in Pi Kappa Alpha. In spring of 2010, Ross Theriot was crowned King of Krewe de Rowdy at the SUB Mardi Gras Ball, and will preside over and represent McNeese's Mardi Gras krewe until 2011. Also, in spring 2010, Jonathan Rutherford was crowned Mr. McNeese, and was joined by four other brothers on spring court. To put it simply, Pike is everywhere on campus at McNeese State University.

As the new chapter looks ahead to the promising future of what they will become, they have very impressive goals and are already accomplishing large feats on campus and in the community. Jonathan Rutherford and Ross Theriot were elected as president and vice president, respectively, of the student body and more than 50% of the Student Government Association senate seats are held by Pikes. Lambda Upsilon chapter is planning to have the most successful fall rush in McNeese history, offering a \$500 scholarship to men graduating high school and spending a great deal of time, effort, and money on recruitment. They will attend freshman orientations and compile a rush DVD that will be sent to individuals by mail, handed out, and will also be posted on YouTube and Facebook. In the future, the chapter is planning to buy or build a house near campus. All in all, Lambda Upsilon Chapter has bright hopes for the future, and intends to maintain

# Eta Omega Chapter Returns to UNC-Pembroke

*Pikes are back at the home of the Braves – North Carolina-Pembroke*

After a 24 year hiatus, Eta Omega Chapter has returned to North Carolina-Pembroke, where 39 men were initiated into the bonds of Pi Kappa Alpha on Friday, March 26, 2010. Brothers from Alpha Epsilon (*North Carolina State*), Lambda Rho (*North Carolina-Greensboro*), Theta Sigma (*Winthrop*), and Epsilon Mu (*East Carolina*) Chapters joined Director of Expansion Ryan Collett (*Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04*), Carolina Chapter Consultant Patrick Coleman (*Embry-Riddle, Lambda Mu '05*) and Eta Omega alumni to participate in the guarded initiations.

These men comprised a colony at UNC-Pembroke that was installed as Eta Omega Chapter on Saturday, March 27, 2010. Carolinas Regional President John F. McCann (*Delaware, Delta Eta '75*) conducted the installation in a secure area on UNC-Pembroke's campus. The new chapter hosted a chartering banquet following the installation. Eta Omega brothers, dates and parents were joined by international officers and Eta Omega alumni. Carolinas Regional President McCann gave the keynote address. Justin Osbourn, president of the UNC-Pembroke colony, received local Pike of the Quarter and Achievement awards for his commitment to the Fraternity and service to his brothers.

The first Pi Kappa Alpha chapter was established at UNCP in 1974 and grew and thrived for many years before going silent in 1986. A strong Pike alumni association focused on growing a new local colony, desiring to reestablish a Pike presence on the university campus. The alumni association contacted the Pi Kappa Alpha International Headquarters to promote the creation of a colony. Expansion Consultants Timothy A. Smerz (*Northern Illinois, Eta Nu '05*) and Duncan C. Robinson (*Washington, Beta Beta '05*) came to Pembroke in the fall of 2008 and recruited 40 men interested in establishing a Pike colony. UNC-Pembroke sororities provided names and recommendations to assist in recruitment.

The time spent as a colony produced many challenges and opportunities. The Pike colony became highly visible on campus and sororities aligned themselves with Pikes



in various social and service events. By the time the group received its charter, the colony had accumulated hundreds of hours of community service, raising funds for the Shriners Hospitals for Children, the Boys and Girls Club, and Relay for Life. At the 2009 Relay for Life ceremony, the colony was crowned "Top New Team" and champion of the Annual Relay for Life Dodgeball Tournament. The men have contributed more than \$1,500 in philanthropic funds and held their second annual "Putt for Pike" golf tournament in April 2010, following their first successful golf tournament in 2009.

Several of the Eta Omega brothers are on collegiate athletic teams. Recently, two Pikes won the championship for intramural wrestling in their respective weight classes. With a number of athletes, the Pikes plan to expand to include leaders of all areas in student life. Service and philanthropy will continue to be high priorities to maintain visibility on campus. Eta Omega Chapter will strive to further raise the bar of excellence they set as a colony at UNC-Pembroke.

The university was founded on March 7, 1887. Today, UNC-Pembroke has a student population of more than 6,000 and offers 41 undergraduate and 17 graduate degree programs. With 21 active social Greek organizations, the campus community is enriched with students who place value on giving back to the institution, community, and their local, regional, and inter/national organizations. UNC-Pembroke readily recognizes Greek organizations as some of the most visible and active on campus.

# The Magruder Chapter

*Beta Eta Chapter at the University of Illinois.*



*“When the Illinois chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha was installed on March 24, 1917, there was an unusual occurrence in the Greek world, the members of a chapter and its national officers celebrated on its success in securing a charter in another national fraternity.”*

The University of Illinois was originally incorporated as the Illinois Industrial University in 1867. Shortly thereafter, in 1872, Delta Tau Delta became the first secret fraternity on campus. What began as a movement separate from normal University life quickly became mainstream, and as the University grew, so did the Greek system. By 1917, 30 national social fraternities were on campus, representing a third of all men at the University of Illinois. Unfortunately, Pike was not among them.

In addition to the social fraternities, the Illinois campus also hosted an assortment of professional fraternities. Generally speaking these two groups got along well. The social fraternities were allowed to join the professional fraternities, and vice versa. There was however, one kink in the system, the Magruder Chapter.



Formed in 1904, the Magruder Chapter was chartered by the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity. Shortly after its chartering however, the Magruders quickly realized that they could best their law fraternity competition by recruiting pre-law students, thereby getting first chance at the pledges. And so the train of thought continued that if they recruited like the social fraternities that they could yet again broaden their pool of recruits. The Magruder Chapter soon found itself acting like, competing with, and winning against the social fraternities.

Fearing that their image as a traditional professional fraternity was in jeopardy, the Phi Alpha Delta Supreme Advisory Board got involved. In an unprecedented move, the Phi Alpha Delta Board recommended and supported the Magruder Chapter in finding a national social fraternity for the chapter to join. The chapter history even indicates that the deal included the men being allowed to keep their house when they transitioned into a social fraternity.

By anyone's account, Pi Kappa Alpha had made a mistake by not being at the University of Illinois earlier. By the time that Pike had abolished its geographic expansion restrictions in 1909, many of the fraternities on the University of Illinois campus had a 20 year head start. Some might argue that the men who made up the Magruder Chapter were always destined to be Pikes. Others, that providence was yet again shining down on one of its favored sons. Regardless, the men of Magruder Chapter decided that PiKA was the right fit for them, and on March 24, 1917 the Magruder Chapter became Beta Eta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha. Beta Eta chapter history indicates that “When the Illinois chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha was installed on March 24th there was an unusual occurrence in the

Greek world, the members of a chapter and its national officers celebrated on its success in securing a charter in another national fraternity.”

As anyone who has had the pleasure of listening to International Historian Dr. Jerome V. Reel (*Eta, Tulane '57*) knows, the creation of Pi Kappa Alpha was not a chance event. Every aspect of our Fraternity’s founding and ritual seem to have been meticulously and thoroughly planned. So too, many of Pi Kappa Alpha’s best chapters throughout its storied history were not started at random, but rather by direct and intentional cultivation.

In contrast, the men at Beta Eta did not grow into one of Pike’s finest, but rather burst onto the scene. In addition to being a dominant force on its own campus, since its inception Beta Eta has racked up an impressive list of national statistics, including:

- Tied for the most alumni recipients of the Order of West Range and Distinguished Achievement Awards with nine. These are the two highest professional achievement awards an individual Pike can receive from the Fraternity.
- In the top five chapters with inter/national officers served, including two inter/national presidents, one Foundation president, thirteen national officers, and four Foundation trustees;
- Can claim the Fraternity’s only living billionaire, Michael T. Tokarz '68.
- Have won Smythe or Excellence awards 8 of the past 10 years.

If Beta Eta’s chapter history is unique, one should not be surprised that it also has a special housing story. As was indicated previously, as a part of the chapter’s separation from Phi Alpha Delta, they were permitted to keep their house, possibly making them the first chapter to have been chartered already owning a house.

Unfortunately, the string of blessings was at an end as America entered World War I in 1917. The loss in membership was felt throughout the fraternity world, but was felt particularly hard by chapters with housing. At the University of Illinois in the 1918-19 school year, all members enrolled in the

student army training corps. While the details of the transaction are unknown, the chapter house was turned into a government barracks for student soldiers. In the interim, a small house was rented off campus at 505 E. Daniel Street to store the chapter’s furniture and Fraternity keepsakes.

Following the end of hostilities in Europe, campus life began to return to normal with the start of the new year in 1919. The chapter was then able to reoccupy their old home until a new chapter house was purchased at 305 E. John Street in 1921. Due to its four large brick columns framing a grand entry way, this house was known as “Four Columns”. Presumably at least a portion of the funds for the purchase came from the sale of the original house.

Not content to live in what many in the chapter considered lower tier housing, only seven years later the men at Beta Eta had purchased a lot, and broke ground on a new fraternity house. On October 15, 1927, the men moved to the corner of 3rd and Armory, into their first facility built as a Pike house. In a newsletter to alumni later that year, the chapter reassured alumni that “Alumni Visitors Are Appreciated; TWO GUEST ROOMS FIT FOR A KING AWAIT YOUR VISIT”.

Unfortunately, by the late 1930s, in the midst of the Great Depression, the chapter could no longer service its debt on the grand


*Beta Eta Chapter at the University of Illinois has owned, lost, built, and rented no fewer than six homes in its history.*

house at 303 Armory. The bank foreclosed on the house, but without a suitable buyer, continued to allow the chapter to rent the facility. When the U.S. entered World War II, Beta Eta had to watch as their house was turned into a military barracks, just as its first house had been in 1918.

Upon returning from the war, the men lost no time in working to secure new housing. Everyday on campus, they were reminded of the house they had lost at 303 Armory, which had been turned into the home of a women's organization. In a typical Beta Eta fashion, instead of dwelling on the past, the chapter set its sites on the future, and in 1947 "with the coming of the spring semester, the alumni association, working in close conjunction with the active chapter, purchased a new chapter house for the Fraternity." The deal was consummated in February, and the house was ready for occupancy at the beginning of the second semester. Located at 102 E. Chalmers Street, the house was formerly the property of Tau Kappa Epsilon. The purchase itself was actually made possible by a Beta Eta alumnus who saw the property was for sale, and fronted the purchase cost of \$65,000.

That facility has served Beta Eta admirably for over 50 years, the longest of the chapter's residence in any house. There had been several renovations, but in the early 2000s it was recognized that something major had to occur if they were going to continue to provide market relevant accommodations for its members. A structural analysis of the building determined that the existing structure was not sound enough to cost efficiently enable such significant modifications. The decision was made to replace the house with a new one; architectural plans were created, a capital campaign was launched, and in 2009 the old house was demolished and construction began. A neighboring facility was rented to accommodate the chapter during construction. The new house will be the best yet, not only will it be grand in

its appearance, but it also incorporates all the most vital design features that today's students demand, such as apartment style living with private bathrooms.

All told, Beta Eta has owned, lost, built, and rented no fewer than six homes in their history. In some cases the moves were due to factors beyond their control. In others, it was their long term planning and vision for the future that prompted a significant change. Like the Magruder Chapter before them, Beta Eta's wise foresight to remain marketable has brought about another major event in its history; again displaying how a chapter and its alumni can work together to continuously improve their fraternity experience.

Upon their chartering as a chapter, the editor of the *Shield & Diamond* wrote in the Summer issue in 1917 that "We welcome Beta Eta gladly into our circle, and refuse to wait for the future to be convinced of the wisdom of our choice; we are conscious of it even now." It is safe to say that history has vindicated that decision.



# Pikes Lead the Way In Senior Military Colleges, ROTC and Beyond

On November 6-8, 2009, the United States Army Cadet Command conducted its first Senior Military College Brigade Ranger Challenge Competition. North Georgia College and State University took the overall First Place Trophy and Commander's Cup, and leading the championship team to overall victory were the men of Pi Kappa Alpha, Psi Chapter. Throughout the nation, there are six Senior Military Colleges: Texas A&M University, Norwich University, The Citadel, Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Tech, and of course, North Georgia College and State University. These Senior Military Colleges offer more than the average university or college ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps) by emulating active military components through their respected Corps of Cadets and extensive military science programs.

For the first time ever, U.S. Army Cadet Command, which oversees all Senior Military Colleges and ROTC, conducted a competition in Fort Knox, Kentucky, which resembled the historically coveted Sandhurst Military Skills Competition that has been held at the United States Military Academy in West Point, New York since 1967. At Fort Knox, the Senior Military Colleges pitted 10 teams in a two day competition which involved an array of events including marksmanship and a 15 mile course full of military skills application and team work. The





#### **Name Generation Strategies**







# Monument Commemorates Tragedy at Virginia Tech

*Epsilon Chapter Brother Tom Tillar Heads Memorial Committee*

On April 16, 2007, thirty-two students and faculty were murdered at Virginia Tech in the worst college campus shooting in American history.

Vice President for Alumni Relations Tom Tillar (*Virginia Tech, Epsilon '71*) was appointed by Virginia Tech's president to chair a committee to create a permanent memorial to those slain. Tillar assembled a committee and observed other sites that had created or were in the process of creating such memorials. Sites such as Columbine in Colorado and Texas A&M University were considered during the process. The committee deliberated for about a month and studied various designs and concepts. A simple design of thirty-two 300 pound stones was selected, and a contractor was engaged to start construction immediately.

The construction extended two months and was done largely using donated materials and gifts raised specifically for it. It was completed in mid-August of 2007 and dedicated on the first day of the fall semester as students returned to campus. No memorial has been completed and dedicated as swiftly as was the one that is in the center of Virginia Tech's campus. According to Tillar, "Our concern was to have a memorial in place as swiftly as possible to help continue the healing process that was so critical to a campus with nearly 30,000 students and over 6,000 faculty and staff. And it helped exactly as we had hoped it would."

Following the April 16 shootings on the Virginia Tech campus, gifts were sent from



all over the world donated to a special Hokie Spirit Memorial Fund. A total of slightly under \$10 million was donated. None of those funds were used for the new memorial. Most of the Hokie Spirit funds were distributed to the families of the 32 deceased, and to another 29 injured students. An undergraduate brother of Epsilon Chapter, Fred Cook '04, was among the injured survivors. In addition to the monetary gifts, more than 88,000 items of memorabilia were sent to the campus, many in quantities of 32.

An Office of Recovery and Support was created in the months following the tragedy to assist the families of those lost, plus the injured students and many others within the campus community who were affected by the tragedy. The staffing for the office was funded by a U.S. Department of Justice grant, made specifically for this purpose. The office was shifted from the oversight of the university president to Tillar in its second year. Tillar serves as vice president for alumni relations for Virginia Tech. 2010 marked the third anniversary of the tragedy and was observed with a day of cancelled classes and special remembrances and ceremonies. The April 16 Memorial becomes the focal point of such anniversary observances and receives tens of thousands of visitors each year, beyond the immediate campus community.



### About the Robertson Award

Pi Kappa Alpha first recognized its outstanding graduating senior in 1926 with the Alumnus-Beta Phi Trophy. Administered by the alumni chapter of Buffalo, New York, the award's first recipient was Howard Bell Arbuckle Jr. (*Davidson, Beta Beta '25*).

After a twenty-six year lapse, beginning in 1936, the award was revived in 1962. Until 1998, the award was known as the Powers Award, in honor of J. Pike Powers Jr. (*Virginia, Alpha 1895*) and David C. Powers (*Tennessee, Zeta '24*).

This award is now named The Robertson Most Outstanding Undergraduate Award in honor and memory of Brother Jenkins M. Robertson (*Clemson, Eta Alpha '71*), a much beloved chapter advisor for Epsilon Chapter at Virginia Tech, who served Epsilon Chapter in this capacity until his life was cut short in 1986. While walking to the

chapter house for a meeting, he was struck and killed by a drunk driver.

The majority of the funding for the endowment that provides this annual award was generously contributed to the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation by Epsilon Chapter alumni in memory of Brother Robertson.





He continues to serve Pi Kappa Alpha as chapter advisor for Delta Chi Chapter. After graduating from college, Ptacnik founded a local non-profit organization (Omaha Nexus) and continues to serve as the chairman of the board of directors. In his free time he enjoys hunting, exercise, and time with family and friends. "I have a passion for the community of Omaha and state of Nebraska and enjoy supporting civic events," says Ptacnik.

Of the Robertson Award, he says, "The award was the culmination of a four year Fraternity experience that was truly life-changing. It served as encouragement to continue a life of dedication to myself, my Fraternity, my brothers, and my community. This award was a great honor and remains an achievement in which I have the utmost pride."

"To this day, I value my time as an undergraduate member of Pi Kappa Alpha more than any other experience in my life. The Fraternity provided me with unparalleled opportunities to develop leadership skills and grow as a man. Through Pi Kappa Alpha, I was able construct a personal foundation that will last me the rest of my life, and it brings me great confidence to know I will always have the values I learned through the Fraternity to guide me I as grow older. More importantly though, my Pike experience allowed me to develop friendships on a firmer and more lasting basis, and it allowed me to accept as brothers men whom I barely knew; it is because of these relationships that I know I will remain always faithful to Pi Kappa Alpha."



As a chapter consultant in 2003, the year he received the Robertson Award, Uebler visited Epsilon Chapter at Virginia Tech, where Jenkins M. Robertson advised with dedication and passion before his life was tragically taken. Uebler had the great privilege of staying in a room dedicated to Robertson. It was called "Jenks' Room" and symbolized the chapter's understanding of and respect for its past.

"By any objective measure, Epsilon Chapter was the best chapter I visited that year. Its members dominated the campus in every way, worked hard to preserve the chapter for future members, and understood and respected the chapter's past," says Uebler, "My own chapter's charter was withdrawn a few years ago. When it is restored, I will encourage the new initiates to model Delta Tau after Jenks' chapter."

Uebler cites the Robertson Award as one of his greatest honors. "The award is an individual one, but the credit goes to brothers like Alex Bray (Arizona State, Delta Tau, '99), Matt



Hendricks (*Northern Arizona, Theta Rho '98*), and Jason Beldand (*Ferris State, Zeta Kappa '96*) among countless others, who gave me opportunities as an undergraduate to contribute to the Fraternity. Applying the skills I learned from Pike, I went on to graduate first in my law school class, serve as editor-in-chief of the law review, and clerk for the Delaware Supreme Court."

Uebler lives with his wife, Cameron, in Wilmington, Delaware, where he works as a corporate litigation attorney.




### ALPHA OMICRON ALUMNI ASSOCIATION Southwestern







# Pike Stars Shine at Fisher Initiation

*The Initiation of Florida State Head Football Coach Jimbo Fisher Highlights One Chapter's Exceptional Alumni Support and Tradition*

Half an hour past eight p.m. on April 9, 2010, Pike alumni began assembling in Brent Sembler Hall at Florida State University. Brent Sembler (*Florida State, Delta Lambda '78*) himself arrived about a quarter till nine, moving among the clusters of alumni, shaking hands and exchanging quiet talk with icons of Florida business, politics and professions. Friends and brothers all, these were the men who helped support the Legends of Delta Lambda Campaign – a housing campaign with the stated goal of building the biggest and best fraternity house in the country. In 2005, that goal was realized.

The Sembler Company develops and manages shopping centers throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. Brent's brother, Greg, is a 1980 initiate of Beta Pi Chapter at Pennsylvania; Brent initiated his son, Logan, into Delta Lambda Chapter in December 2009.

This night, Sembler would help initiate into Pi Kappa Alpha three of the most renowned personalities within the elite circles of Florida State athletics: Bob Stahl, Rick Trickett and Jimbo Fisher.

Bob Stahl is president of Stahl & Associates Insurance, one of the largest private insurance agencies in Florida, and enjoys the friendship of many Pike alumni. His son, Robby Stahl '07, plays baseball for the Seminoles. His wife, Kathy, serves on the National Board of Seminole Boosters, Inc.

Rick Trickett is assistant head coach and coaches the Seminoles' offensive line, but his title understates his influence. Trickett is Fisher's best friend in coaching, and came to Florida State with Fisher three years ago. His son, Chance Trickett '08, is a Delta Lambda undergraduate, and son, Clint, would be initiated this night.

Jimbo Fisher is the new Seminole head football coach, successor to the legendary Bobby Bowden (*Samford, Alpha Pi '49*) following Bowden's retirement after the 2009 season. Just as Bowden quarterbacked Samford in the 1940s, Fisher also quarterbacked the Samford Bulldogs in the 1980s. Fisher was Division III National Player of the Year in 1987.

Fisher coached quarterbacks at Auburn, and was offensive coordinator at Cincinnati and at LSU for six years, including the 2003 National Championship season. He was offensive coordinator at FSU and the Seminoles' official 'Coach in Waiting' for three years.

Fisher began making friends immediately upon his arrival in Tallahassee in 2007, and as time passed he took note that more and more of the people he really wanted to know shared the same Fraternity affiliation.

Many of these new friends awaited Jimbo Fisher as he entered the Pike house the night of April 9th. Three of Pi Kappa Alpha's officers added to the luster: International President Patrick A. Talley, Jr. (*Armstrong Atlantic State, Eta Mu '74*), Supreme Council Vice President Mat Forrest (*Southern Illinois, Iota Mu '94*), and Foundation Senior Development Officer George Miller (*Delta State, Zeta Beta '97*) were on hand in Tallahassee for the occasion.

Doug Russell '79, prominent governmental lobbyist and president of the Delta Lambda Alumni Association, led the ritual team composed largely of former Delta Lambda Chapter presidents. Russell was a major donor to the Legends of Delta Lambda Campaign, and in fact the chapter's history is recorded floor to ceiling on the walls of the Doug Russell Legends Room in the new Pike house. Russell's son, Tyler, will enter Florida State as a freshman this fall.

Many more Legends of Delta Lambda were among those present to assist in the initiations:

- Past Chapter President Andy Miller '70, President of the Delta Lambda House Corporation — As president and CEO of Seminole Boosters, Inc. since 1975, Miller is the most respected senior collegiate athletic fundraising executive in America. He initiated his son, Matt Miller, in December 2009.
- Past Chapter President David Rancourt '84, founding partner of Southern Strategy Group, the largest and most politically powerful governmental lobbying firm in the south — Rancourt played defensive tackle for the Seminoles. He was a major donor to the Legends Campaign.
- Scott Roix '85, the founder and CEO of Vici Marketing, an international business-to-business firm headquartered in Florida — Roix was a major donor to the Legends Campaign.
- Danny Hendrix '75, CEO of the \$1 billion Atlanta-based flooring company Interface — Hendrix provided much of the carpeting in the new house, and it was his initiative to cover the 7,000 square foot courtyard in AstroTurf. His son, John Hendrix '05, is an undergraduate.
- Brett Lindquist '81, CEO of The Mortgage Firm, Inc. based in Orlando — Lindquist was captain of the 1981 Seminole Varsity Swim team, the first of seven consecutive Pike captains. His seven-figure gift

to Seminole Boosters supports the varsity swimming program.

- Alan Winslette '77, CEO of Laser Shot, Inc. — The Texas based firm is a global leader in firearm and force option training solutions catering to military, law enforcement and private security. The "Winslette Firemen's Lounge" in the new house is packed with high tech toys Winslette generously provides and maintains.
- Lyle McAlister '78, president of Florida-based Southern Furniture Leasing — McAlister provided much of the furnishings for the new house. His two sons, Lee McAlister '07 and Jordan McAlister '09, are undergraduates.
- Barry Smith '72, former All-American and first round NFL Draft pick in 1973 — Smith was an enthusiastic fundraiser for the Legends Campaign. After four decades, Barry Smith still holds two Florida State Seminoles wide receiver records.
- Bob Hall '49, Charter Member of Delta Lambda — Hall has remained as an active advisor to the chapter since his retirement 25 years ago. He has also helped organize reunions of alumni from the late 1940s and early 1950s.
- Ken MacLean (Florida, Alpha Eta '44) — Delta Lambda Chapter

Founder Ken MacLean organized the first meeting of Pikes at FSU in September, 1947. One month later he caught the first pass in Seminole football history. Ken was the leading receiver and the leading ground gainer for the first two years of Seminole football. He was initiated at the University of Florida in 1944, and after sixty-six years Ken MacLean still holds the Gator record for the longest touchdown run from scrimmage against Georgia.

Three more of Jimbo's closest FSU Pike friends were not able to attend initiation, but each sent his personal best wishes to "pledge" Fisher. These include Florida Governor Charlie Crist '77, who was attending a fundraiser for his United States Senate campaign. Harry Sargeant '78, owner of the largest fleet of ocean-going tankers in the world, was out of the country on business. The third alumnus is Hall of Fame FSU Baseball Coach Mike Martin '06, who was on the road in North Carolina with his team.

All but one of Delta Lambda's nineteen spring 2010 pledges had already been initiated during the early evening of April 9. The remaining pledge was freshman Clint Trickett. His father, Rick, asked to keep his own involvement with the Fraternity secret until he and son Chance could participate in the initiation ceremony for Clint. The three adults would be

initiated in order. Clint Trickett would be the final candidate.

Bob Stahl was the first to be initiated. Even though his son Robby was away with the baseball team, Robby encouraged his dad to go through initiation on April 9 when so many of his Pike friends could be there to welcome him into the Fraternity.

Coach Rick Trickett was next. After his son Chance pinned his new Pike badge on his chest, Coach Trickett asked if he could participate in Jimbo Fisher's ceremony.


A series of past chapter presidents performed the initiation of Jimbo Fisher, aided by new Brother Rick Trickett. As his ceremony concluded, Fisher asked that he also be allowed to participate in the final initiation of the night.

Clint Trickett was anxious and he was sure he was in trouble. It was close to midnight and he had been sitting alone in a room for hours. He had already missed curfew. Tomorrow he would be expected to quarterback the Garnet team in the annual Garnet & Gold Spring Football Game.

The seventeen-year-old Trickett graduated high school at mid-year and accepted a football scholarship to Florida State, entering classes in January to participate in spring drills. A week after his arrival on campus, Clint pledged Pi Kappa Alpha, joining his older brother Chance as a Pike.

Finally, the brothers came to prepare Clint for the ceremony. Trickett found himself facing three men in the candle-lit darkness of Brent Sembler Hall. His older brother, Chase, stood before him, and to one side stood his father, Rick. To the other side was his coach, Jimbo Fisher.

When the lights finally flooded Sembler Hall again, Coach Fisher was invited to address the jubilant crowd. "I want you to know that I don't enter into this casually," he said. "I'm not really a joiner. My whole life, the only clubs

or organizations I've been part of were composed of all athletes. So when this first came up, I did my research. I wanted to know who the Pikes were and what the organization was all about. And the more I found out, the more I realized that I really wanted to be part of this Fraternity. I want you to know what a great honor this is for me."

International President Talley was most gracious in his remarks. "I had a list of things I wanted to accomplish during my term of office, and one of them was to visit this storied chapter. I'm not disappointed. You are without question one of the finest chapters in our entire Fraternity, and the generosity and involvement of your alumni is probably unmatched in the fraternity world. I hope to see many Delta Lambda alumni and undergraduates at the Convention in Austin this summer."

In the week following initiation, Brent Sembler responded to the many alumni who had communicated their sentiments and congratulations. He wrote:

*"Delta Lambda has provided me with some of the best friends I have on this earth. Phi Phi Kappa Alpha - which I learned as a teenager - is still my Bond. I have not broken it to this day. Should I be called to Chapter Eternal tomorrow, I could go happy knowing I did my small part for Delta Lambda Chapter.*





*Pi Kappa Alpha Artists Span the Genres from Country to Metal*





His total album sales are now in excess of 40 million units and his three disc "Greatest Hits: Volumes 1, 2 & 3" CD set is still selling well after being released in 2008.

As Ole Miss former basketball star Sean Tuohy, McGraw shows his acting skills opposite Sandra Bullock, who plays his wife, Leigh Ann, in hit film *The Blind Side*, which premiered on November 20th. The movie tells the story about how the Tuohy family adopted Michael Oher, who became an All-American offensive tackle at Mississippi and a first round draft

choice of the NFL Baltimore Ravens. Other recent films featuring actor McGraw have been *Four Christmases*, *Friday Night Lights*, *The Kingdom* and *Flicka*. Much of 2010 will feature McGraw and the Dancehall Doctors in the "Southern Voice" national tour from late February until early August.





## News of Bygone Days

**125 YEARS AGO - 1885:** Largely through the efforts of Richard Marcus Kennedy of Theta, the charter for Iota Chapter at Hampden-Sidney College was granted on November 14, 1885, the charter members being Richard Marcus Kennedy, William Cumming Buchanan, Henry Rodman Dillon, Walter Harvey Godbey, Robert Edward Moore, Shadia Moore Engle, and Robert Whittet, Jr. This chapter, like Theta, has always been successful and has always been one of the mainstays of the Fraternity, particularly during its earlier and weaker life, when together with Theta, it was largely responsible for the very existence of the Fraternity.

**100 YEARS AGO - 1910:** Alpha Xi Chapter was installed at the University of Cincinnati on May 17, 1910. The chapter quickly established itself on campus socially and through campus leadership efforts. As reported in the December 1910 *Shield and Diamond*, "On the evening of October fourteenth, Alpha Xi gave a reception to all fraternities and faculty of the University, marking her advent into the Greek world. Yet, Alpha Xi has not given her attention only to social affairs. In the annual fall elections at Varsity, our members received a goodly share of the offices - Alpha Xi landing the president of the senior class, president of the University Club, Manager and Assistant Manager of the University Book Store, Treasurer of the Junior Class, Manager of the Fencing Team, President of the Glee and Mandolin Clubs, Representation on the Junior Prom Committee, Manager and Treasurer of the Debating Team, while along the scholastic lines, she gained the Assistant of Chemistry and the Assistant in Geology."


**75 YEARS AGO - 1935:** Gamma Tau Chapter was installed at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute on May 11, 1935. The October 1935 *Shield and Diamond* reported, "Installed as Pi Kappa Alpha's newest chapter, Beta Psi, the oldest and strongest local at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N.Y., began its first year on the campus this fall as Gamma Tau chapter of the brotherhood of the shield and the diamond. At the first fall chapter meeting of the term Brother Stanley B. Wiltse, Lewis S. Coonley, and James S. Rising, all faculty members, who compose the alumni advisory committee, were present and stressed the importance of a strong rushing campaign."

**50 YEARS AGO - 1960:** Epsilon Nu Chapter was installed at Georgia State College on February 25, 1960. In the chartering article from the June 1960 *Shield & Diamond*, it was reported, "Since its inception in 1956, the Pi Alpha fraternity has worked towards affiliation with Pi Kappa Alpha. In the original group of eight members, there were three PIKA brothers and three PIKA pledges. The Pi Alpha pledge pins were garnet and gold and the fraternity pin was similar to the "Pike" pin. At the first meeting of the Pi Alphas four basic goals were established: to stress scholarship, to promote brotherhood, to develop leadership, and ultimately to obtain a charter from the Pi Kappa alpha National Fraternity."

**25 YEARS AGO - 1985:** Theta Psi Chapter was installed at Chapman College on March 14, 1985. National President William LaForge was the keynote speaker for the chartering banquet and in his address to the newest chapter of the Fraternity he challenged all of its members to build upon the chapter's strong foundation and uphold its reputation. "Pi Kappa (the colony) was founded on the motto, 'We will do all things to the best of our ability...or not at all,' and now as a chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha that motto will grow to mean that much more to all of you," he said. "By becoming a chapter of the Fraternity you have inherited 117 years of tradition, and over 130,000 brothers. As a result of this you have become another sentinel who must protect our heritage and our most noble order. So now, more than ever, you must do all things to the best of your ability."

Another new chapter that year was Theta Omega Chapter, which was installed at the University of California at Davis on May 3, 1985. Eighty-five men were officially initiated as members of Pi Kappa Alpha, with National President William LaForge presiding over the initiation of all the charter members. The colony was established in October 1984 with fifty-one members and grew to over eighty-five members in less than one year, becoming one of the largest among twenty fraternities at Cal-Davis. Installing teams that helped advise the colony were California-Berkeley (*Alpha Sigma*) and Cal State-Sacramento (*Theta Tau*).

## Distinguished Veteran Enters Ranger Hall of Fame



**W**illiam T. Anton (*Nebraska, Gamma Beta '68*) was inducted into the Ranger Hall of Fame in August 2009. The Ranger Hall of Fame was formed to honor and preserve the spirit and contributions of America's most extraordinary Rangers. The members of the Ranger Hall of Fame Selection Board take particular care to ensure that only the most extraordinary Rangers are inducted,

a difficult mission given the high caliber of all nominees. Candidates must have served in a Ranger unit in combat or be a successful graduate of the U.S. Army Ranger School. A Ranger unit is defined as those Army units recognized in Ranger lineage or history.

Anton entered the University of Nebraska, where he played football for the Huskers, with an ROTC scholarship. He was selected as national commander of Pershing Rifles, promoted to Cadet Major General, and was the highest ranking ROTC cadet in the U.S. with 17 regiments and over 20,000 cadets in his command. Anton was a Distinguished Military Graduate, and entered active duty with the U.S. Army in 1970 as a second lieutenant. He completed the Infantry Officer Basic Course, U.S. Airborne School, and the U.S. Army Ranger School.

As platoon leader with Co. O (Arctic Ranger) 75th Infantry (Airborne), he made the historic first tactical parachute jump on the polar ice cap. He also served with the most decorated Ranger Unit in Vietnam as company commander and executive officer, for which he was decorated with valor. Anton retired from active duty in 1990, and serves as unit director for Co. H (Ranger) 75th (Airborne), 1st Cavalry Division, 75th Ranger Regiment Association. He holds a bachelor of science in education from the University of Nebraska, a master's degree in education from North Carolina State University, and a doctorate in education from George Washington University. He is an active Mason, and a member of the Scottish Rite. Other activities include membership in MENSA, the Combat Infantrymen's Association, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, U.S. Army Ranger Association, 82nd Airborne Division Association and Special Forces Association. He was honored as a Legacy in the SOCOM (Special Operations Command, U.S. Special Forces) Memorial in addition to his inclusion to the U.S. Army Ranger Hall of Fame. He also currently sits on the National Board of the Disabled American Vets (DAV), is the Disabled American Veterans Department State Adjutant in Nevada (equivalent to CEO), and in line to become president of the Commanders and Adjutants Association at the DAV national level.







**Fess Parker**  
(Texas, Beta Mu '48)



Fess Elisha Parker Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on March 18, 2010.

Parker played football at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene before enrolling at the University of Texas where he graduated in 1950 with a degree in history. At the University of Texas, he met actor and fellow Beta Mu brother Morgan Woodward '49.

Parker was discovered by actor Adolphe Menjou in 1931, who was a guest artist at the University of Texas. Menjou urged him to go to Hollywood and introduced Parker to his agent.

In California, he completed his master's degree in drama at the University of Southern California, where he affiliated with Gamma Eta Chapter. Parker began acting professionally in 1951 as a stage performer in the national company of *Mister Roberts*. Parker made his motion picture debut in *Springfield Rifle* in 1952. His other movies included *No Room for the Groom* (1952), *The Kid From Left Field* (1953), *Them!* (1954), *The Great Locomotive Chase* (1956), *Westward Ho, the Wagons!* (1956), *Old Yeller* (1957) and *The Light in the Forest* (1958).

In 1954, Walt Disney signed Parker to play the title role in *Davy Crockett, King of the Wild Frontier*. The first installment of *Davy Crockett* debuted in December 1954 as part of the "Disneyland" TV show. The first three television episodes were turned into a theatrical film, *Davy Crockett, King of the Wild Frontier*, in 1955.

The 6' 6" Parker was quickly embraced by youngsters as the man in a coonskin cap who stood for the spirit of the American frontier. Boomers gripped by the Crockett craze scooped up Davy lunch boxes, toy Old Betsy rifles, buckskin shirts and trademark fur caps. The title song, "The Ballad of Davy Crockett" ("Born on a mountaintop in Tennessee..."), was a No. 1 hit.

His TV career took off in 1964 with the title role in NBC's *Daniel Boone*, — also based on a real-life American frontiersman — which aired for for six seasons.

When the series ended in 1970, Parker became a real estate developer in Santa Barbara

with his wife, Marcella, whom he had married in 1960.

He bought and sold property, built hotels (including the elegant Fess Parker's Wine Country Inn & Spa in Los Olivos and Fess Parker's Doubletree Resort Santa Barbara) and grew wine grapes on a 2,200-acre vineyard on California's Central Coast, where he was dubbed King of the Wine Frontier and coonskin caps enjoyed brisk sales.

After its inaugural harvest in 1989, Parker's vineyard won dozens of medals and awards.

Parker was a longtime friend of President Ronald Reagan, whose Western White House was not far from the Parker vineyards. Reagan sent Parker to Australia in 1985 to represent him during an event, and when Parker returned he was asked by White House aide Michael Deaver if he was interested in being ambassador to that country. Parker declined, and later declined to run for U.S. Senate, preferring his California businesses.

In 1988, Parker was inducted into the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation's Order of West Range.

Canada served as Garland County sheriff for six years, then as a member of the Arkansas Legislature for 32 years—four years in the House, 28 years in the Senate. He was retired as president of an insurance company. Canada was inducted in to the University of Arkansas football Hall of Fame.

**Claude A. Hughes**  
*(Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '51)*

Claude Allen "Al" Hughes Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on January 18, 2010. He attended Russellville, Arkansas Public Schools and was a very active athlete, setting state records in the 100 and 50 dashes in 1940. He also lettered in football and basketball. He was mobilized with the National Guard in December 1940, sent to Ft. Bliss, Texas and on to the Aleutians in Alaska. He was commissioned in 1943. He flew over 3,000 hours as a navigator, much of that time in Harford, Nebraska with 2nd AF Air Inspectors Redeployment Center. He then signed on with the Army Air Corps and graduated from his pilot class 1948B at Randolph Field. Hughes went on to earn his Senior and Command Pilots wings over the next 20 years. He served the Air Force in Cuba, Barksdale AB, March AB, Washington, D.C., Yuma, Arizona, and Wright-Patterson AB. He taught ROTC at the University of Arkansas then went to Korea to be the training advisor to the ROK Air Force. Afterwards, he became a squadron commander and director of operations at Yuma Air Station. He was then assigned to Wright-Patterson AFB in Dayton, Ohio. Assigned to ATIC, then with the Foreign Technology Division, he was responsible for the

development of machine translation of the Russian and Chinese languages to English. Hughes retired in 1966 with the rank of Lt. colonel. Hughes was a life member of the UofA Alumni, designated as an Arkansas Traveler, Fayetteville Noon Lion's Club and held a 50 year perfect attendance record. He served as a charter president and president to one club and was a past district governor. Hughes also held a Retired Life membership to the US Air Force Association and was a member of the International Industrial Intelligence Association.

Before taking the head football coaching job at Sacramento State, Mattos coached at Jesuit High School in Carmichael, Orestimba High School in Newman, Turlock High School in Turlock and Stagg High School in Stockton, California, where he won three straight league championships. In 1987, he received the Distinguished Service Award from the Sacramento State Alumni Association. He was inducted as a coach into the Sacramento State Football Hall of Fame in 1998. In 2009, he was inducted into the Stockton Athletic Hall of Fame.




