# Advocacy on The Hill

## FGRC 2023 Capitol Hill Advocacy Visits

**PIKE HAS PARTICIPATED IN THE FRATERNAL Government Relations Coalition (FGRC) for a number of years. The FGRC is a collaboration between the National Panhellenic Conference and North American Interfraternity Conference to monitor and advocate as necessary on federal government issues of importance to Greek organizations.**

The two organizations set legislative agendas that guide the FGRC's work and co-manage the work of a Washington, D.C. law/lobby firm's activities on its behalf. And the Fraternity Sorority Political Action also aligns efforts with the FGRC to host the annual Capitol Hill visits. Mike Riley (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '84) and Russ Keene (Texas, Beta Mu '80) serve as PIKE representatives on FSPAC's board of directors.

For 2023 the FGRC advocacy agenda includes the following priorities:

- Protect students' freedom of association rights by ensuring they can join women's-only and men's-only student organizations like fraternities and sororities;

- Pass anti-hazing legislation to provide additional transparency and education about hazing on college campuses; and
- Advocate for the passage of the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act (CHIA), which would update the tax code to provide more access to funding for infrastructure improvements to fraternity/sorority housing.

*The group conducted 217 Senate and House office visits.*

The 2023 Capitol Hill advocacy days took place April 18-20. 150 volunteer student and alumni lobbyists attended from 17 men's organizations and 13 women's organizations. The group conducted 217 Senate and House office visits.

PIKE sponsored three collegiate members chosen from amongst 16 PIKE applicants by the NIC. These men included Texas A&M's Kyler Mooney, a political science studies senior from Texas A&M; Brenden Swanik a senior studying bio medical engineering from Delaware and recently named that university's distinguished male graduate at May commencement ceremonies; and Caleb Weiland from South Dakota, a junior serving as student body president. Mike Riley, Justin Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96) and Russ Keene participated as our alumni volunteers.

The PIKE team hit the Hill and the collegiate members in particular found it to be an instructive, formative experience. Our men enjoyed a joint working dinner one evening with Chi Omega Fraternity's delegation of student and alumnae participants including its CEO.

In addition to the advocacy activities, our Alumni Engagement team organized a reception for area alumni during the week which drew 45 participants including former U.S. Senator Pat Roberts R-KS (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '55) and Past International President Bill LaForge (Delta State, Zeta Beta '69). *φφκκκ*

In partnership with the Fraternal Government Relations Coalition, our team had the opportunity to meet with the movers and shakers of our nation such as Senator Tom Carper, Representative Pete Sessions, Representative Dusty Johnson, and dozens of our other elected officials. I look forward to continued collaboration soon to keep this ball rolling!

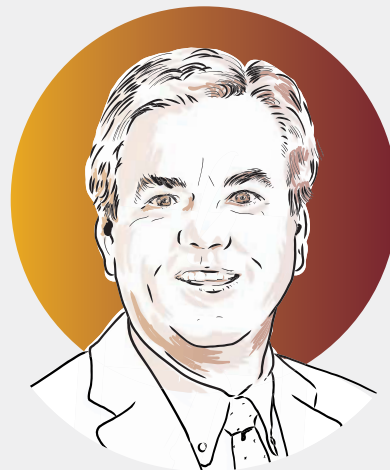

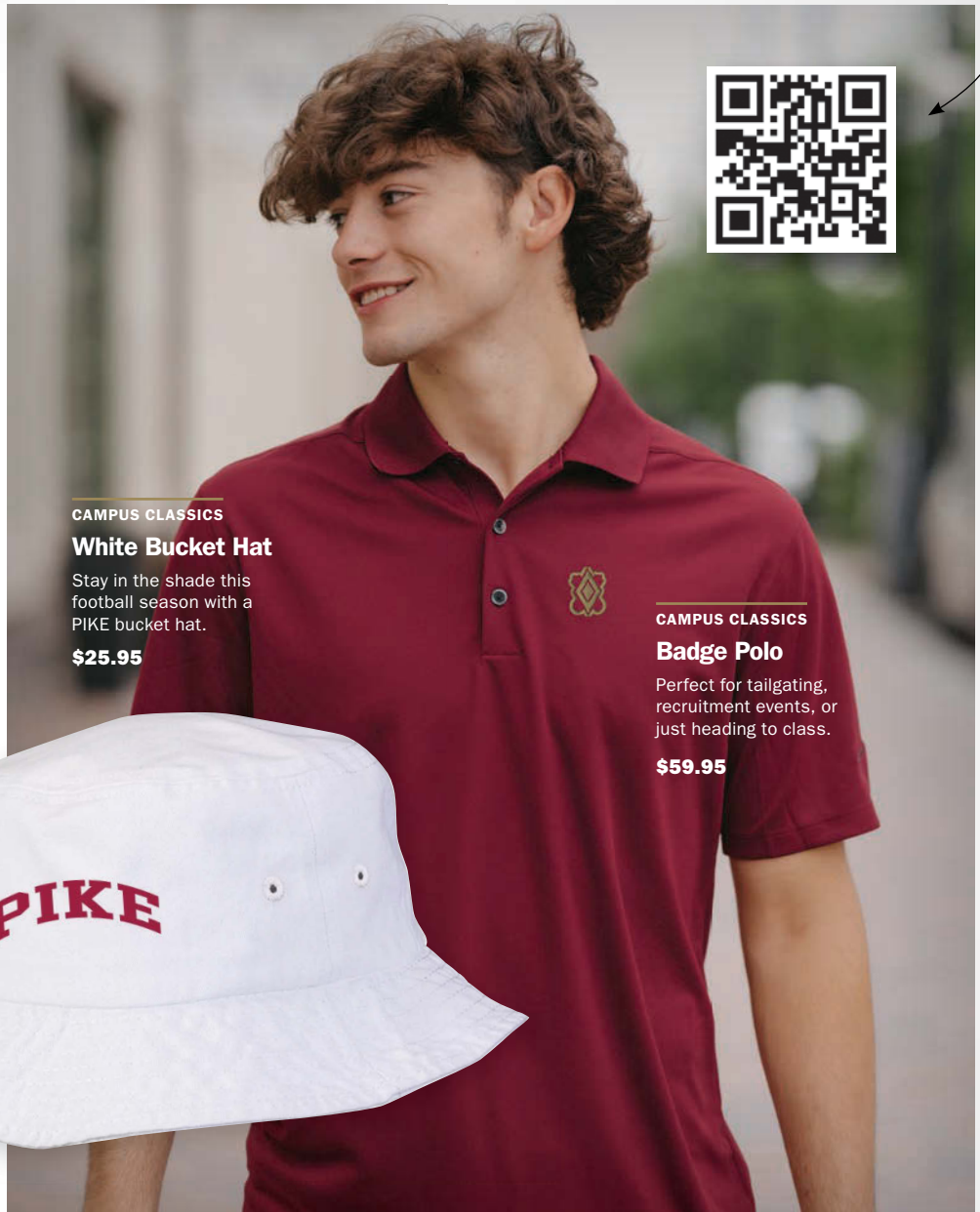

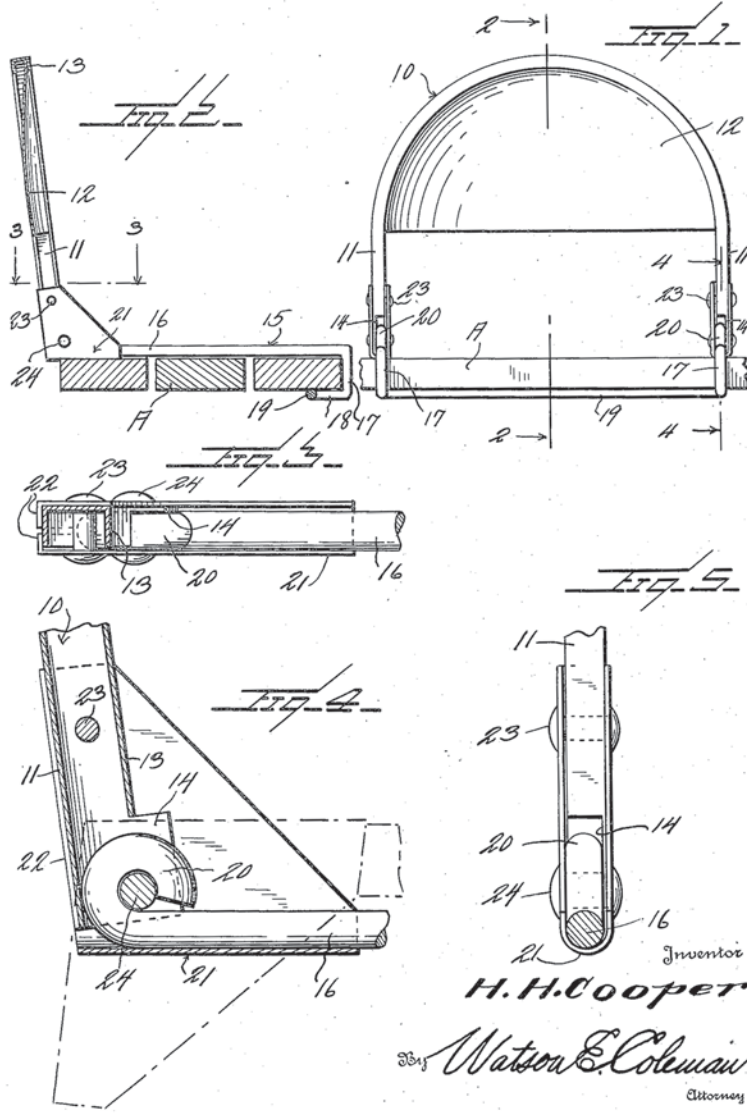

## Comfort in the Grandstands

If you've ever brought a folding, portable seat to find relief from those uncomfortable metal bleachers at the stadium, you have Brother Harold H. Cooper (Tulsa, Gamma Upsilon '31) to thank! In September 1938, Brother Cooper received a patent for his "portable back support for seats." His accomplishment was noted in the September 1940 issue of the *Shield and Diamond*! φφκκ

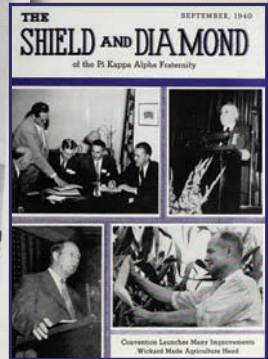
### Invents Portable Seat

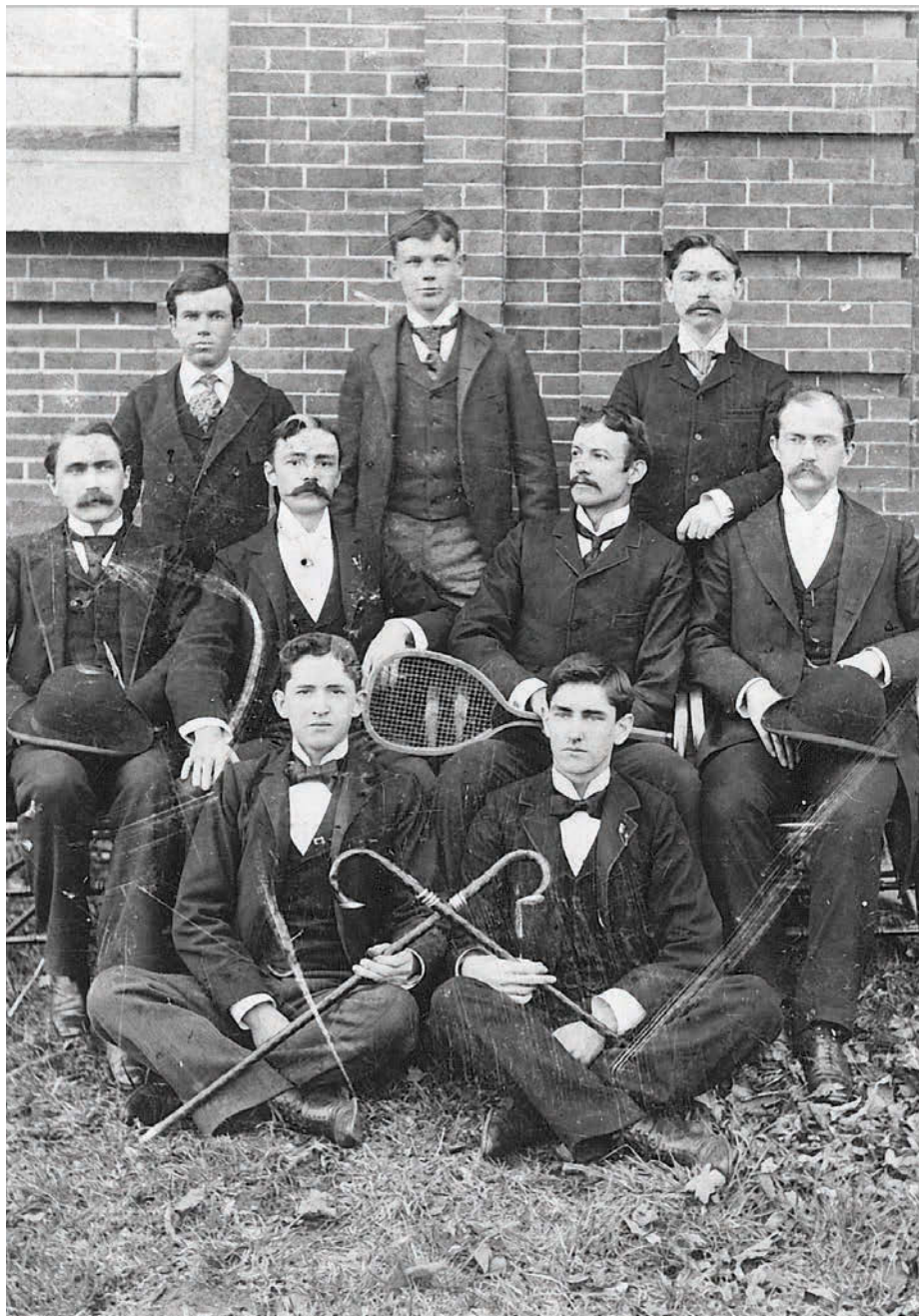


Harold H. Cooper, ΓΥ, and his portable grandstand seat.

From the time he saw his first football game he entertained the desire to provide spectators with comfortable seats and backrests instead of the usual backless hard boards encountered in stadiums. In 1938 he obtained a patent for his device, which he calls the "Grandstander." It fits on a bench or seat, with a folding hook to anchor it and prevent tilting backwards. The soft cushion is kapok-filled. The back rest is of canvas, mounted on spring steel. The whole contraption, which may also be used in boats, folds compactly and is light. It is furnished in several colors and retails for less than \$2, except for de luxe chromium-plated models. Some stadiums rent the seats, usually for 25 cents. The University of Tulsa is using them for the second year. Cooper, whose business address is 1411 East Fourteenth St., Tulsa, says there are opportunities to establish rental concessions at many institutions.

## Recruiting Through Adversity

The importance of recruitment in our early years and why those lessons matter now

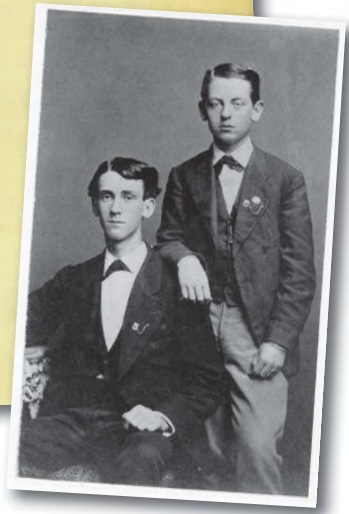
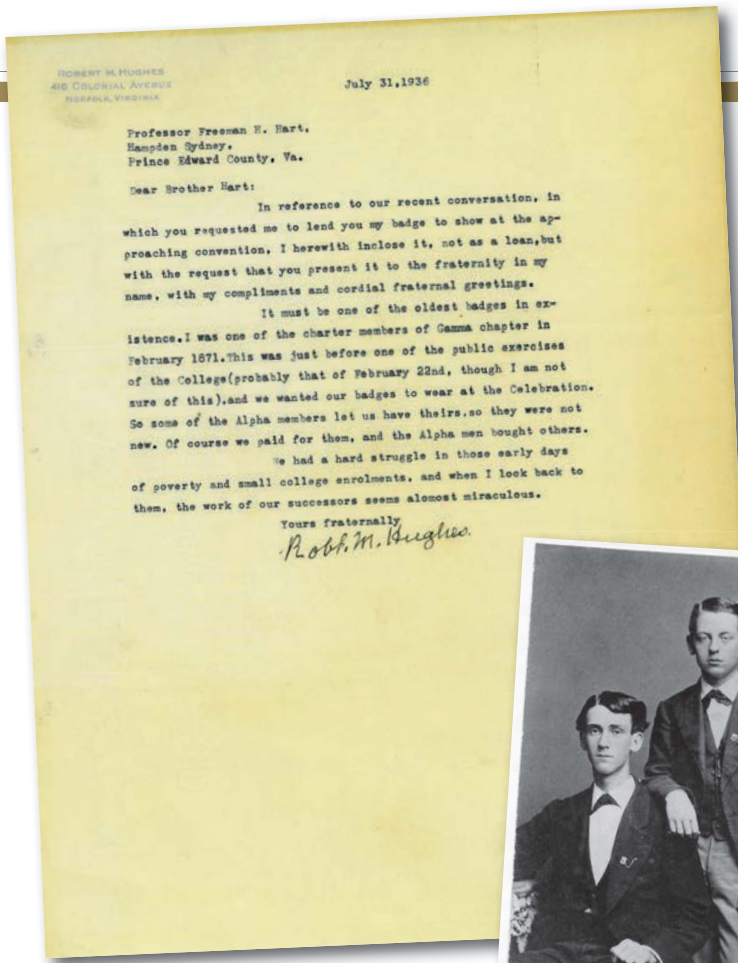


If you've been to any recruitment seminar hosted at PIKE University or by a Chapter Consultant, you've probably heard that "recruitment is the lifeblood of the Fraternity" or "recruitment solves all problems." While great slogans to have, their meaning and truth hold far more weight than we may know. Our Founders knew this at the very beginning and instilled these principles into Pi Kappa Alpha during our earliest days.

As the Historical Society continues its in-depth research into the first Chapter Minutes of Alpha, one thing that's become increasingly clear is the early adoption of continual growth. The very story of our creation mentions it. We know that Frederick Southgate Taylor, Littleton Waller Tazewell, Robertson Howard, and James Benjamin Sclater, Jr. all met at 47 West Range to create Pi Kappa Alpha on March 1, 1868. And in this first meeting, Sclater proposes the name of Julian Edward Wood. During the second meeting of the Fraternity, four other names were offered as potential members, one being William Alexander and another being Augustus Knox. By the third meeting, four more names proposed. While many of these men would not become members of Pi Kappa Alpha — either by withdrawal of their name before the membership vote or by the potential member's rejection of our Founders' offer — it's important to note that our Founders and members of Alpha never stopped recruiting. As past International Historian Dr. Jerry Reel (Tulane, Eta and Southern Mississippi, Delta Mu 1957) explains in *The Oak*, "In its first year alone, Alpha initiated eight members, rejected eight others and was refused by five more."

Beyond Alpha, our earliest chapters found recruitment to be equally important. Much like today, chapters of yesteryear varied in size and make up. Some grew rapidly; Epsilon Chapter at Virginia Polytechnic Institute grew from





East Tennessee (known now as the University of Tennessee) in 1874. While completing research in a historic notebook containing a handwritten copy of Pi Kappa Alpha's constitution, a target list was discovered from 1888 noting twenty-two universities to target across fifteen states. Only twenty years into existence and the brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha understood the need for continual growth.

It's not hard to see the parallels 150 years later. At a time of global recession, changing attitudes of fraternities and sororities on college campuses, and recovering from a global pandemic, the Pi Kappa Alpha of today faces many of the same challenges our Founders and early initiates met. How we face and overcome those challenges is yet to be determined. Our best hope to ensure our continued success is through recruitment.

In 1936, Brother Robert Hughes (William and Mary, Gamma 1871) wrote to past National Historian Freeman H. Hart (Hamden-Sydney, Iota 1928) to provide him with his original badge. Professor Hart had asked Hughes if he would loan him the badge to display at the 1936 Convention in New Orleans. Instead of loaning Professor Hart the badge, he donated it to Pi Kappa Alpha. Given to Hughes by the members of Alpha when Gamma was chartered, it is the oldest known badge the Fraternity possesses. In closing his letter, Hughes writes, "We had a hard struggle in those early days of poverty and small college enrollments, and when I look back to them, the work of our successors seems almost miraculous."

What an enduring sentiment. Through every victory and struggle, the members gained and lost, the resiliency of Pi Kappa Alpha stands in its ability to continually find and bring into our bonds men of character who seek to leave a lasting impact on their community and the people around them. And it remains our duty to continue this lasting virtue. As Hart once stated, "Pi Kappa Alpha is no exception to the basic idea that adversity is the soil in which character at best has found its deepest roots." Let us then take comfort in the challenge and continue to recruit at our very best. For without recruitment, we fail to provide the vital lifeblood of this great Fraternity. **ΦΚΑ**

four to twenty-four in just a year. Others like Gamma Chapter at William & Mary rarely surpassed four members. Often the modest fees for initiation and membership dues were enough to dissuade members from joining.

For some Chapters, resistance came from university officials. Beta Chapter at Davidson experienced this firsthand. Only a semester into existence, the brothers of Beta were met with a ban on secret societies by the faculty of the university. After their unsuccessful attempts to discuss the issue with faculty, the members of Beta wrote to Alpha stating, "We have disbanded our chapter and we do not intend to carry it on unless we can do it openly and aboveboard, as we regard its ties as too sacred for other procedure."

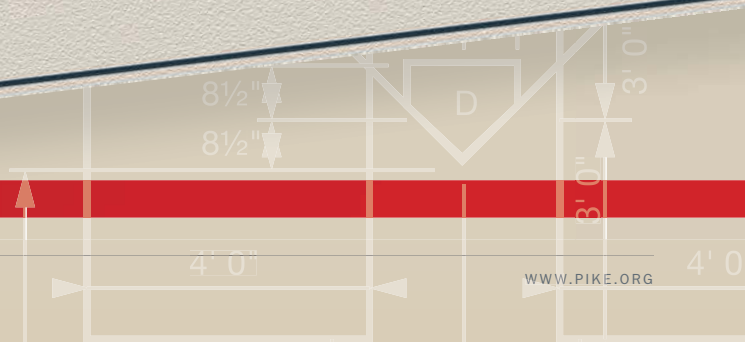
Yet, even in these circumstances, the Fraternity endured. In fact, it surged. After the successful expansion to Davidson — albeit short-lived, Taylor and others began regularly proposing institutions for expansion across the southern United States. Beyond Taylor, Brother George Summey (Davidson, Beta 1869) pushed aggressively to expand, finding success at the University of

# COVERING THE BASES

**IN THE FALL OF 2022, TRIPP GIBSON (MURRAY STATE, Epsilon Lambda '01) reached the pinnacle of his career when he was called to umpire for the World Series being played between the Houston Astros and Philadelphia Phillies. Pi Kappa Alpha had the opportunity to catch up with Tripp shortly after the World Series to hear about his amazing experience, his professional journey, and the importance of the Fraternity in his life.**

### What was it like to umpire in the most elite event in baseball, the World Series?

It was amazing and a dream come true! It was a career defining event that was the result of years and years of dedication and hard work. It was also a humbling experience to be a part of history in the making.

And if being a part of the World Series wasn't enough, I got to work behind the plate when the Houston Astros completed the first combined no-hitter in World Series history!

It was unbelievable. You couldn't have scripted that. It wasn't until the seventh inning that I thought about it. I knew there were no hits in the third, but I also knew that Bryce Harper had walked in the first, so the perfect game was gone. So, in my mind, I disregarded it for a while, and I didn't forget. I just pushed it aside because I had more stuff to focus on because, with the no-hitter, I had zero control as long as I did my job.

### How did PIKE play a role in helping you get to where you are at today with the MLB?

PIKE helped refocus me to understand that many of the attributes I had learned as a child and young teen were indeed some of the most important. If you want something, like truly want to be something or to make your life a certain way, you must be willing to work like hell to achieve it. You must be willing to sacrifice all of your extra time (not be lazy) to ask all the questions, study everything about what it is you want and engulf yourself into that lifestyle.

The trick is to all the while not lose yourself or at least be able to bring yourself back. PIKE truly taught me all of that. There are so many distractions in college. Your attention is pulled in so many directions. PIKE helps center that attention where team goals help

create individual success.

When I began umpiring in college I began at the youngest level. I umpired 10, 11, 12-year-olds. I soon moved up to working high school baseball then Division I and even moved up to Independent League baseball. I would say for my early 20's that I was extremely dedicated to my goals and worked as many baseball games as possible. Sure, I was motivated by making money and paying my fraternity dues, but I also wanted to be the best. Not only did I want to be the best umpire in the game I was working on, but also the best in the tournament I worked, or even the league.

I had these things engrained in me from my parents and my upbringing, but PIKE enhanced these beliefs and encouraged me as an adult. The competition and encouragement that PIKE created not only against other fraternities, but also within our own chapter, helped push me along to be as successful as possible. I can remember meeting older alumni in and around Murray State and you saw what they had become or were attempting to become, and it motivated me to continue in their footsteps.

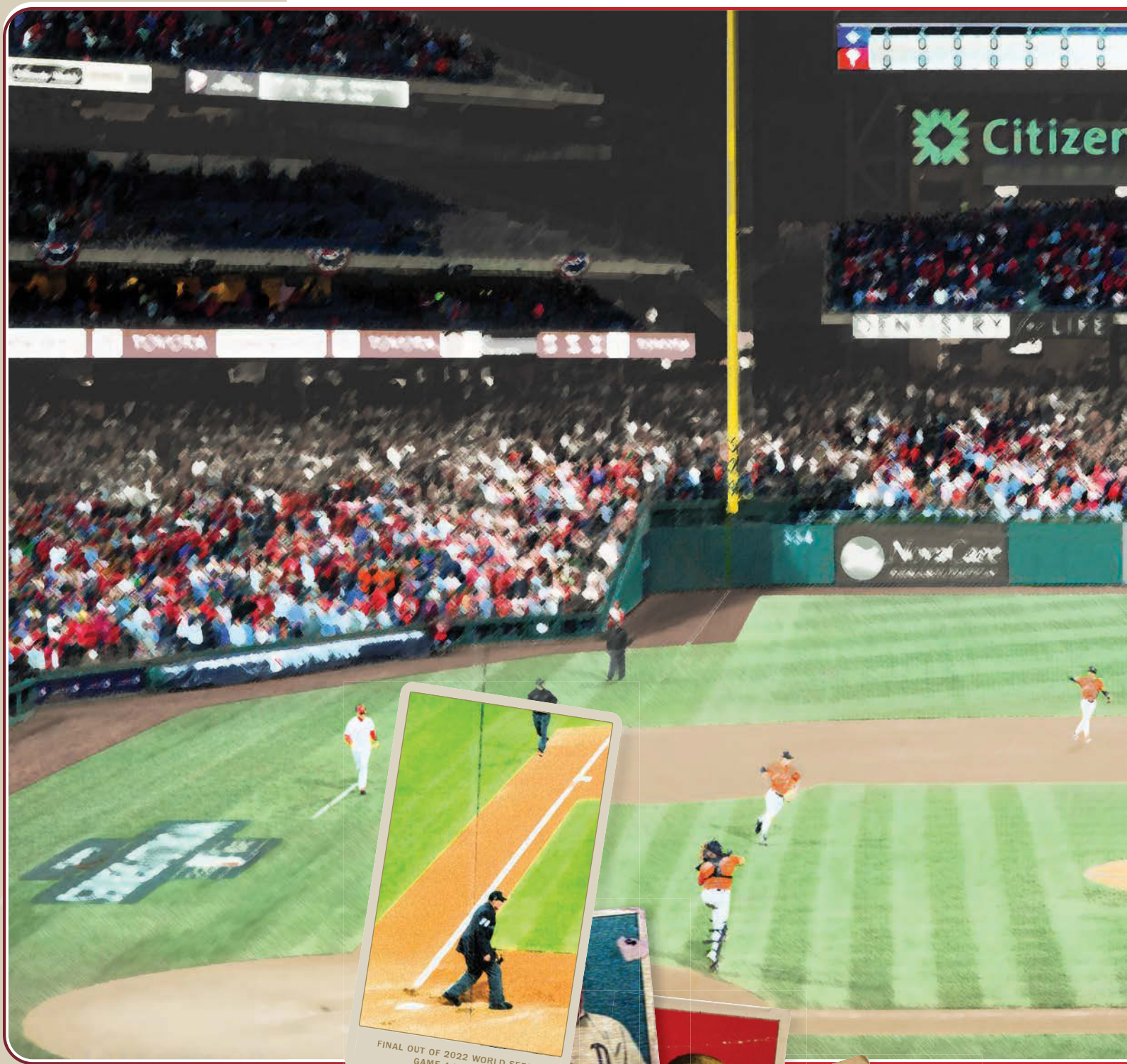

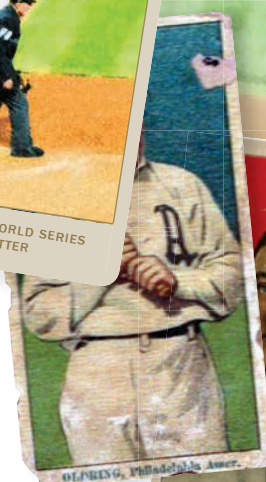

During my time in PIKE, there was such an emphasis on looking beyond your own individual gain. As a chapter we were always attempting to be the best on campus at not only intramurals or student government, but also how you're viewed on the international level as well. When you have that team mentality you begin to see that individual achievements are something to be sought after, but when combined with the ideals of improving as a group, or a chapter, that is when success can be much more attainable.

I've developed this mantra in the past few years, but it was evident as a motto even way back then, it takes "WE TO WIN." In my involvement with philanthropy, I've grown to not only attach myself to it, but also make it part of me. It's not just something that I participate in, but it's who I am.

I think the greatest skill I learned in my time in the active chapter was the ability to speak in front of any group imaginable. When you are elected rush chairman or external vice president, you have to speak often. I remember how afraid I was early on in those experiences, but over

time I began to excel in those situations. Now I'm working games in front of 60,000 plus people on national television. PIKE most definitely removed the fear factor of performing in front of a crowd.

### **Any words of wisdom for young Pikes wanting to be an umpire or chasing their "dream job" whatever that may be?**

I would say be willing to fight as hard as you can for what you want. It's often said that every battle you'll ever fight is in your mind. Mind over matter is another motto of mine. I truly learned that in the nice years I spent as a minor league umpire prior to getting hired full time by the MLB in 2015.

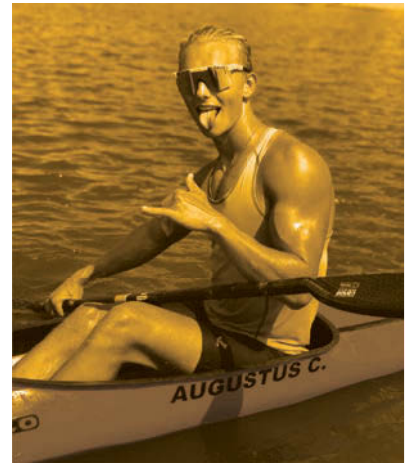
You always hear people say "chase your dream," but what they don't tell you is that there will be roadblocks, difficult times, heartache, and trials along the way. Most people quit. You have to be willing to take a different path sometimes instead of quitting, especially when roadblocks occur. Goals can often be reached in different paths than you first envisioned. The other aspect of this is to talk to as many people as you can, be willing to do the research, and ask all the questions you can to figure out how to actually obtain that job or that dream. The journey seems impossible many times but it becomes the most enjoyable part.

I wouldn't be where I'm at without my wife Danna. She holds down the fort when I'm gone. She's the one that keeps the kids going, takes care of baseball for the kids, and the dog and all the other pets, and life! **φφκκ**

Augustus had the dream that many boys from Oklahoma have, pursuing a passion for football with hopes to play at the collegiate and professional level. This was until fate had a different plan in store.

When Augustus was just 10 years old, he decided to branch out and try new hobbies during the football off-season. Canoeing immediately caught his eye. To learn more about his newly founded interest, Augustus attended a Riversport OKC kayak camp in which he had the honor of hearing from an Olympic gold medalist. Little did he know this experience would change the course of his athletic journey forever.

Augustus is determined to bring his full energy and involvement to sprint kayaking and Pi Kappa Alpha. He is working to compete in a multitude of sprint kayaking tournaments and the 2024 Olympic Qualifier. His goal for the future? Bringing home a gold medal for Team USA.

To stand among the best in the world, an athlete has to train at their level. Augustus knows this well. Completing three training sessions a day, a main training block starts at 6:15 a.m. with 70 minutes of

kayaking, including interval training. Followed by an afternoon rest, Augustus is back at it with a weight-training session. The days end with a paddling session to get in more practice.

To get the most out of his training sessions, Augustus has taken his practice outside of home to learn from those around the world. Recently, Augustus joined his coach, Zsolt Szadovski, and a multiple time European champion & medalist, Levente Kurucz, to further his training in Hungary where he was able to experience his training on a whole new level, learning from one of the best in the world.

Practice makes perfect. Augustus' dedication to honing his skills resulted in a record breaking performance at the 2023 U23 World Championships. Augustus competed as a key member on the K4 (4 man kayak) team, placing 14<sup>th</sup> in the world and setting an all-time American record. While this acts as a large milestone within his career, it is only an early chapter of Augustus' story.

As for after his kayaking career, Augustus is living in the present. When his goals are achieved and he's hung up his paddles, he is committed to staying involved with the kayaking community and the Fraternity - investing in the next generation that comes after him. He sees the value in paying it forward.

As Augustus continues the journey that is life, he will continuously be a reminder of the power of passion, perseverance, and the impact of a supportive community. He hopes to see his fellow teammates and brothers succeed in whatever they choose to do.

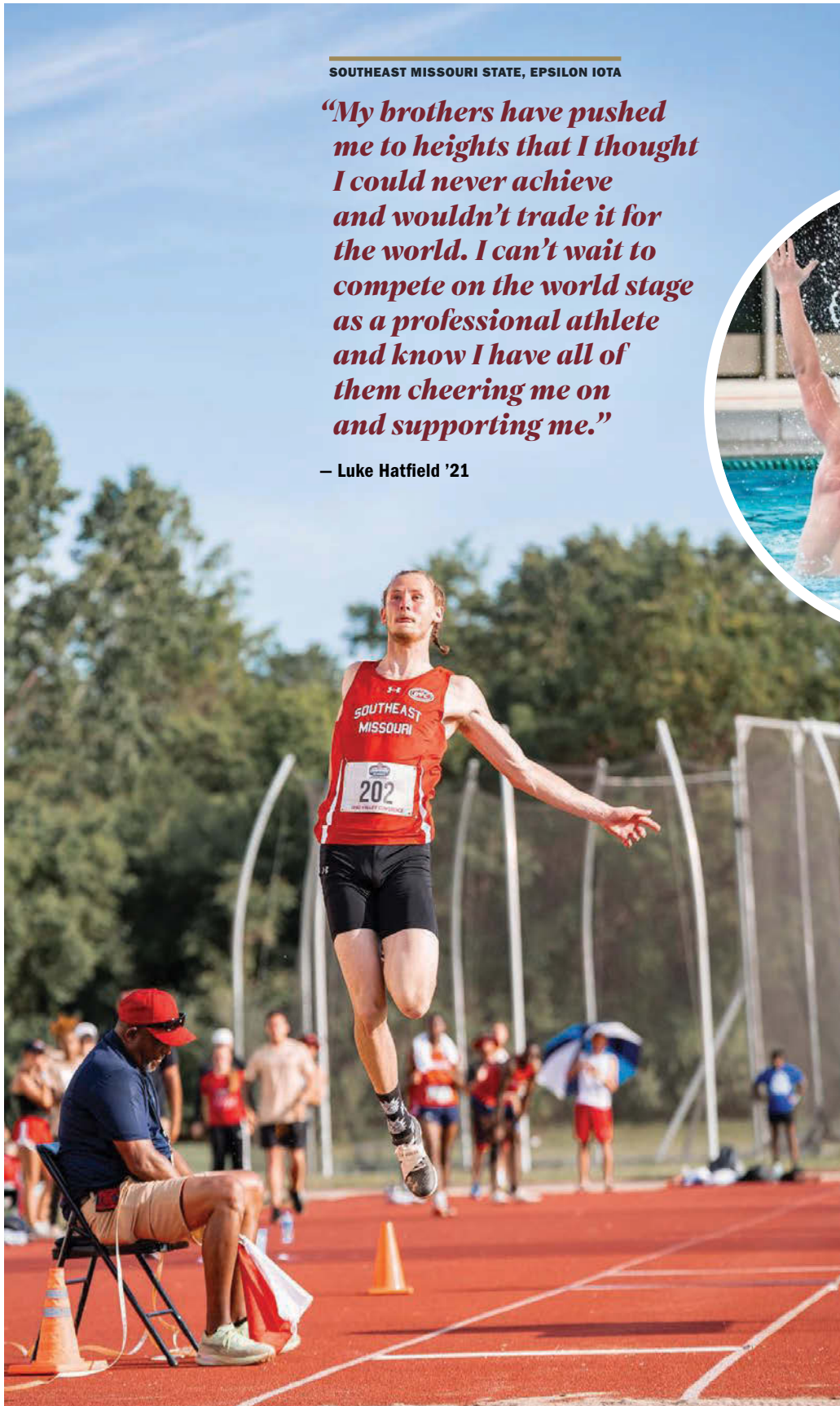

The woman behind 47 years of Zeta Lambda reunions

Chuck Bowsher entered Chapter Eternal on September 30, 2022. As an undergraduate, he served as chapter president of Beta Eta Chapter. He graduated in 1953 with a degree in accounting. After two years in the Army, he earned his MBA at the University of Chicago, then joined the Chicago office of the Arthur Andersen & Co. accounting firm. He served from 1967 to 1971 as Assistant Secretary of the Navy for financial management under Presidents Johnson and Nixon, afterward returning to an executive post at Arthur Andersen.

Over more than five decades, Mr. Bowsher built a reputation as an accountant called upon in crisis, joining teams that guided New York City back from its brush with bankruptcy in 1975 and probing financial improprieties at the Smithsonian Institution in 2007. In 1981, he was appointed by President Reagan as Comptroller General of the United States, leading the General Accounting Office, the investigative and auditing arm of Congress. When he appointed Bowsher to the fifteen-year term, President

Reagan described it as “... one of the most important appointments that I shall make as President.” The President went on to say that, in this position “... a strong and effective leader can have an enduring impact on our political institution.” Under Bowsher’s direction, the GAO saved the government more than \$23 billion in expenditures.

After leaving the comptroller post in 1996, Bowsher served on the boards of various corporate and philanthropic entities, including the Nuclear Threat Initiative and the Washington National Cathedral Foundation, where he served as treasurer and trustee from 1999 to 2003. He received the International Fraternity’s Distinguished Achievement Award and was also inducted into the Order of West Range. His work earned him Distinguished Public Service Awards from both the Navy and Department of Defense.

He is survived by his wife of 59 years, Mary Mahoney; a daughter, Kathryn; a son, Stephen; and three grandchildren.

Wood**  
*(Pennsylvania State,  
Beta Alpha '42)*

Quentin Wood entered Chapter Eternal on February 25, 2023. A native of Pennsylvania, Wood had a successful career with one of the nation’s largest petroleum distributors, Quaker State Oil Refining Corporation.

He served in the United States Army’s Air Force from 1943-46 as an officer and a pilot. During that time, he served thirteen months in combat service in China with the 14th Air Force, better known as the Flying Tigers, where he flew 25 combat missions.

Wood became associated with Quaker State in 1948 as a petroleum engineer. In 1951 he was promoted to chief engineer, and in 1965 to manager of the production division. When Wood was elected vice president of production and corporate director in 1968, he moved to Quaker State’s home office in Oil City, Pennsylvania. In 1970, he was elected executive vice president and in 1973, president and chief operating officer. In 1975 he became president and chief executive officer, as well as a director, of Quaker State. In May 1982, he became chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the company. On July 1, 1988, Wood retired as chief executive officer and served as chairman of the board until 1993. Quaker State led the nation in the sale of motor oil before

and throughout Wood’s career with the company. He served as chairman of the Pennsylvania Oil and Gas Conservation Commission, the Penn Grade Technical Advisory Committee, and the Technical Advisory Committee to the U.S. Bureau of Mines.

He served as a member of several corporate boards, including Mellon Bank, TruckLite Co., Heritage Insurance Co., Minit Lube, Inc., and the Pennsylvania Manufacturers Corporation. He also was a member of the Ohio, West Virginia and Bradford District Oil and Gas Associations, a director of the American Petroleum Institute, and a member of the American Institute of Metallurgical Engineers.

Wood was elected to Penn State’s Board of Trustees in 1978 and served as President of the Board from 1981 to 1984. He continued to serve the Penn State Board until 1999, when he was elected Trustee Emeritus. He was inducted into Pi Kappa Alpha’s Order of West Range in 1988 and received the Distinguished Achievement Award.

In addition to his parents, Woody was predeceased by his beloved wife, Louise Lowe Wood, to whom he was married for 56 years, and a brother, L. Paul Wood.

## Purchasing Your First (Chapter) House



Kappa Mu Chapter was founded at Wilfrid Laurier University in 1996. On September 1, 2021, the chapter purchased its first house.

As a 2002 initiate, Kappa Mu Foundation President Tom Pobojewski learned that nothing was more significant to the long-term success of the chapter than the purchase of its own fraternity house. At that time, the chapter founded the housing corporation (Kappa Mu Foundation) and contributed a large sum towards the house fund. However, the housing fund saw very little growth over

the following years, and the chapter continued to rent another house.

Fast forward almost 20 years later, the chapter became aware that the landlord was selling the home they were renting. What started as a stressful time turned into a massive opportunity for the chapter to accomplish something amazing. It was time to finally turn a 20-year dream into a reality!

With the news of losing the rental property, Tom Pobojewski started working with Daniel Singer '02 to formulate a new plan to purchase a house owned by

Pikes. They realized that the original savings plan wouldn't work as the current program could not out-save inflation and

the rapidly rising price of real estate in Waterloo, Ontario. The new plan would be ambitious to help the chapter purchase a home within the year.

Tom and Dan recruited an executive team of David Bradica '99, Carson Murray '02, Andrew Lawrence '04, Dante Rosso '15, Matthew Koren '16, and Murray Perryman '19.

The executive team organized a Zoom fundraiser, and successfully recruited over 70 alumni for a monthly donation program. This was enough to start the shopping process for the new house. While there were other challenges still to overcome, the executive team was able to accomplish their fundraising goal within six months and purchase a new home for the chapter.

The house immediately became a congregating place, a symbol for the chapter, and a reason for the alumni to return to campus. It provides financial stability, allows the chapter to make improvements as it sees fit, and creates opportunities for alumni and actives to network — all of which create a foundation for a strong chapter moving forward.

Now, the chapter is thriving in their new home, and Tom and the executive team have not taken their foot off the gas. They have ambitious goals for events, renovations, and even expansion!

The efforts of the Kappa Mu Foundation and the undergraduate members should be acknowledged and shared. The story serves as a testament that truly anything can be accomplished when a group of Pikes rallies together around a worthwhile cause.

# A TRUE PIKE

*Tim Culp*  
(Epsilon Gamma, Texas Tech '81)

*Tim Culp is the President, CEO and Owner of Southwest Royalties, Inc. and Desert Production, Inc. He is a 1981 graduate of Tech, with a degree in accounting and currently lives in Midland, TX, with His wife, Annette, and three of his four children also graduated from Tech. Culp is the chairman of the Texas Tech Foundation Board and the First Methodist Church of Midland executive team. He is a member and former board of director of the Permian Basin Petroleum Association and former member of the Texas Society of CPAs and the American Society of CPAs. Tim was recently appointed to the Texas Tech University System Board of Regents.*



**Q: With your appointment as a Texas Tech University Regent, do you have specific goals?**

Yes, I have several goals. The cost off higher education has gotten so expensive over the last 20-30 years that it's becoming a burden to college graduates. Some are carrying significant debt and it's a burden on them after they graduate. I want to find additional scholarships and grants so graduates can reduce, or eliminate, their debt as much as possible. I worked full time in the summers in the oil fields of West Texas and worked part time during the school year to pay for my college education. The cost of my education was around \$25,000 for all four years and it's four to five times higher to get a degree at a public university in today's world. I want to find a way to help these students without them having to work 50 hours a week to pay for college. That would be a primary goal. Another goal...The state of Texas has significant higher education funding and also has a large budget surplus, and Texas Tech has

benefitted from some of this funding. Our leadership has met with Texas legislators to try to get additional funding for Texas Tech and other public universities in Texas. The allocation of funds for higher education in the state continues to get smaller each year. Texas Tech and all public universities should benefit from the state's surplus in 2023. A third goal would be to increase and continue the partnership between the Midland/Odessa area and Texas Tech. I live in Midland, Texas (about 100 miles south of Texas Tech) and our sister city is Odessa. Texas Tech has many events in this area as well as many medical facilities, including a nursing school and physician's assistant school. I want to continue enhancing and pursuing this partnership between Texas Tech and our region.

**Q: What do you want to see fraternities do more of?**

I think it's always important for fraternities to engage in community service. When I was at Tech...we had a fair amount of community service

but probably not as much as we needed to. Service is so important to build trust and relationships with the community, community leaders, and charitable organizations. You need to pick one or two charities to help. These organizations are working on a shoe-string budget and they need that help that fraternities can provide.

In addition, fraternities need to build relationships with university leadership. Get to know your chancellor, your college president, your department heads, your provosts. These relationships are so important in building trust between the Greek system and the universities. **ΦΦΚΑ**

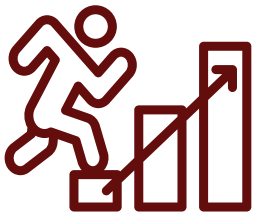
